A CALL FOR FOSTER CARERS

Fostering Hampshire Children will be launching an 18-month campaign. Dedicated to discovering these new foster carers across the county in 2022 and 2023, the campaign works with local communities across Hampshire to galvanise local residents to help support vulnerable children who desperately need our help.

Fostering Hampshire Children, part of Hampshire County Council, is made up of a community of over 450 fostering households and 60 staff members. Based within Children's Services, we find and assess new foster carers for the children of Hampshire as well as support our current foster carers. While we have been working hard to reduce the number of children coming into care through sectorleading transformation programmes, in Hampshire "Children deserve to feel safe. They deserve to be cared for. They deserve the opportunity to work towards achieving their potential. They deserve to be happy. They deserve to have a stable home."

the gap between the number of children needing a loving home, and the number of Foster Carers available, continues to widen. For every child we can find a home, there are others waiting.

'In the UK, every 20 minutes another child comes into care needing a foster family. The majority of children are placed in care due to abuse or neglect.' (The Fostering Network, 2022).

Since 2018, the number of children in the care of Hampshire County Council has grown by over 200 and is still rising. Meanwhile, the number of fostering households in the county has plateaued. The numbers just aren't adding up anymore and the need for more Foster Carers is becoming increasingly urgent. We now need an additional 150 fostering households by the end of 2023.

Many of our Foster Carers are in their 50s, 60s or 70s. There's no upper age limit on fostering and these knowledgeable and experienced carers are providing loving homes for some of the county's most vulnerable children. Inevitably though, there will come a time when these carers are thinking about retirement and need to hand the baton over. As of March 2021, Foster Carers in their 20s and 30s accounted for 13% of all Foster Carers in England (National Statistics 'Fostering in England 2020-2021', 2021) although this number is increasing as more young people are realising, they too have the skills and values to change lives and we hope that continues!

If you look at the demographic of Foster Carers in England you could be forgiven for thinking you have to be white, over 50 and in a heterosexual relationship to take on the role. That simply isn't the case. You don't need to own your home or be in a long-term relationship. You do need to be over 21, but sexuality and ethnicity don't matter. You don't have to do it as a 'full-time job,' and you certainly don't need to be 'practically perfect in every way.' We're looking for ordinary people who want to help make positive changes within our community, across the county.

There are things you do need: a spare bedroom, patience, resilience, open-mindedness and positivity to name but a few. Fostering isn't always easy, there are challenges to overcome and difficult days, but it's also a chance to build new relationships, learn about other cultures and offer stability to a young person at the time it's needed most. The support and training opportunities provided by Hampshire County Council are excellent, and the peer-to-peer support networks are second to none.

Our Foster Carers are a wonderful group of people from a range of backgrounds, who come together to support each other through the bad times and the good.

SURGERY UPDATE - August 2022

Surgery

Blood tests have been temporarily suspended at Beggarwood due to staff resignations, however they will be reinstated in early September when a new nurse joins the team. Meanwhile patients are being asked to visit the hospital for these services, where patients have reported a well-organised and speedy service. Telephones have also been a recent problem with staff holidays and sickness. Staff from CGH have been drafted in to help with this, hopefully, temporary problem. We will be monitoring both these situations closely over the next month and welcome your feedback via our email address.

Following previous feedback from us at our August meeting with Operose we are led to understand that they intend to reorganise the staffing levels at all the surgeries in Basingstoke and they encouraged us to believe that this would result in a more reliable and positive experience for patients – time will tell.

Maria Miller MP Meeting

The Health Update meeting called by Maria Miller MP, on Saturday 16th July, at the Beggarwood Community Centre was well attended by patients of both Beggarwood and the CGH surgeries as well as a strong representation from Operose who run our surgeries. The meeting reflected the growing concern from both sets of patients over the running of the surgeries with questions posed by attendees and answered by Operose. From the meeting we now have a list of serious concerns and we are in discussion with Operose on how they plan to address these issues.

Dr.iQ

We are all being encouraged to use this new Operose app – Dr.iQ - available free for both iPhones and Android devices. Current feedback to us is mixed. What are your experiences using the app? Once again replies via our email address please.



Any Complaints?

If you feel that you have not been dealt with correctly by the surgery, or perhaps not had a good experience in dealing with either the surgery or a member of staff, you can make a formal complaint. Operose employs a full time Complaints Manager and so you should get a speedy response. If you feel after receiving the reply that it did not meet your expectations or did not correctly respond to you then you can then escalate the problem to the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), again via email: NHCCG.COMPLAINTS@NHS.NET or NHCCG.ENQUIRIES@NHS.NET . The CCG will carry out its own investigation and report back to you. We would also welcome your feedback.


PROPOSALS FOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

A proposal to build 28 houses behind Woods Lane has been detailed in a letter from Michael Conoley Associates (chartered architects) on behalf of the landowner. It has been posted to residents, and also to the Parish Council via the clerk. **Re: Proposed Residential Development at Land to the South of**

Myhaven, Woods Lane


The communication says it is intended to be a 'personal letter to the residents of Cliddesden' but it has not been received by everyone. The letter explains that this is NOT a planning application at this stage, the intention is to give an insight into the proposals. It is 'anticipated a planning application will be submitted within the next month'.

There has been no prior consultation with the Parish Council or the Neighbourhood Plan team, but the letter advises that Hampshire Highways have been consulted, as has BDBC Planning via a pre-application enquiry.



It has to be considered that this is one of several substantial development schemes for which landowners are seeking approval. You will know two Planning in Principle (PIP) applications are presently being considered by BDBC:

22/01551/PIP Land South of Woods Lane. Planning in Principle for up to nine dwellings



<u>22/01550/PIP</u> Land to Rear of Manor Farm. Planning in Principle for up to nine dwellings.

Police advice is that they should be the first to be contacted and not

charities / animal welfare groups who do not have sufficient resources. The police can task vets and/or an organisation called UK Deer & Track who can humanely despatch the animal if required. Trying to contact other organisations can lead to delays and extend suffering.

The information below is taken from *Rural Times* (Aug 2021), the article is aimed at the New Forest but the process applies across the county, and nationally in terms of contacting the relevant police force or constabulary.

IF YOU SEE AN INJURED DEER ON THE ROADSIDE?

Rural Times August 2021

- Pull over at a safe place
- Call Hampshire Constabulary via 101
- Giving as precise a location as you can (eg via use of What3Words)
- Hampshire Constabulary will deal with the situation and have access to specialist officers
- Do not try to assist or move the deer as this can put you in danger.

IF YOU HIT A DEER WHILE DRIVING, YOURE PRIORITIES IN THIS ORDER ARE

- Keep yourself and anyone with you as safe as you can
- Park your car in the safest place with hazard lights on
- Call an ambulance if required for any injuries to people
- Call Hampshire Constabulary via 999 immediately.

IF A DEER HAS BEEN HIT & IS ALIVE & STILL VISIBLE AT ROADSIDE

- It is best not to approach, it may run across traffic causing another
- Do not move or handle live deer, this needs a trained specialist. Do not place it in your car
- Call Hampshire Constabulary via 999 immediately
- Giving as precise a location as you can (eg via use of What3Words)
- They will deal with the situation and have access to specialist officers.

Dorothy Ireland, Trustee/Director of British Deer Society (BDS) and Chairman of the Wessex branch of BDS, said: 'In Hampshire, there are about 40 humane animal dispatchers, who are volunteers, and are qualified and experienced in dealing with an injured deer or other large animal on the roadside...' VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Very little going on during the summer months and hence very little news, so a brief glimpse at what goes on "behind the scenes".

We have a rolling four-year schedule for the redecoration of the Hall and this year it was the turn of the Hall exterior – all doors and fascias. We redecorated the kitchen and toilets the year before last (having missed last year due to Covid closures) and next year it is the back rooms and then the main hall and meeting room in 2024. This is just one of the activities that the committee manage and monitor to ensure that the Hall stays in tip-top condition, something regularly commented on by all our groups and hirers.

On top of this we noticed that the area where the tables are stored in the back room was getting damaged by the movement of the table trolleys. So, we have had the walls repaired and repainted before installing new Perspex wall protection to prevent future damage – the committee's thanks go to Rob and Julie for doing this.

Earlier in the year we replaced the very old thermostats and heating controllers with new, something well overdue as the old controllers were becoming very difficult to set and operate after 23 years of use. And this year we once again tested all the portable electrical equipment in the Hall (known as PAT testing), something that we required to do for legal and insurance reasons – the committee's thanks go to Andy for doing this once again.

It received generally positive reviews from critics and grossed \$194 million worldwide. Rotten Tomatoes critic's score 84%.





Thursday 6 October "Green Book", 2018, 130 Minutes, Certificate 12A

Biographical comedy-drama directed by Peter Farrelly. Starring Viggo Mortensen and Mahershala Ali, the film is inspired by the true story of a 1962 tour of the Deep South by African-American pianist Don Shirley and Italian-American bouncer Frank "Tony Lip" Vallelonga, who served as Shirley's driver and bodyguard. Written by Farrelly alongside Lip's son Nick Vallelonga, the film is based on interviews with Lip and Shirley, as well as letters Lip wrote to his then-wife.

The film is named after "The Negro Motorist Green Book", a guidebook for African-American travellers published from 1936 to 1966.

The film grossed \$321 million worldwide. The film received positive reviews from critics, with praise for the performances of Mortensen and Ali, although it also drew some criticism of its depiction of both race and Shirley.

Green Book received numerous awards and nominations, including Academy Awards for Best Picture, Best Original Screenplay, and Best Supporting Actor (for Ali). Critics' Score 72% on Rotten Tomatoes.

BDBC COST OF LIVING ASSISTANCE FUND



Approved by borough councillors in July, the Cost of Living Assistance Fund is open to households in the borough struggling to pay bills, with grants available to help pay for food and energy costs.

One-off grants are available for:

- up to £1,000 for those on a household income of between £0 and £15,000
- up to £500 for those on a household income of between £15,001 and £20,000
- up to £200 for those on a household income of between £20,001 and £25,000.

A maximum of 25% of the grant can be used to buy food, with payments made through vouchers or a Post Office payout code which allows cash to be withdrawn at a Post Office branch. The remainder is for support with energy costs. These payments can be made directly to the supplier or paid through a Post Office payout code.
