Bishop condemns seemingly harmless amusement

The Bishop of Donegal, Rt. Revd Conor O'Rhioda, preached a sermon recently saying that April Fool's Day was a form of organized lying practiced by unbelievers, and that Christians therefore should not participate in the tradition. He made his comments in response to a query from a local Catholic newspaper.

Bishop O'Rhioda acknowledged that many younger Christians were very fond of the custom, but said, 'It is prohibited because lying is prohibited at all times and under all conditions.' He noted only three exceptions to this rule: when lying brings reconciliation between people, when it occurs during times of war, or when a husband or wife must protect the honour of the spouse. Also, of course, in newspaper articles where the writer is merely having you on.

APRIL ON HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS

Spring was in the air as soon as the first brimstone butterflies were seen on the margins of woodland and thickets in February, with a red kite, one of the kings of the food chain, patrolling high above. The pale yellow brimstone was probably the first owner of the name butterfly. A powerful flyer, it can be seen almost all year and hibernates among ivy leaves from November to February. Through March and April brimstones are the main pollinators of primroses as they hunt for early [

ment plan for the reserve. To maximise conditions for the fragile specialist plants adapted to survive in nutrient -poor soil and bogs, more invasive species are judiciously (and vigorously) removed, smothered, grazed or bashed. These include not only birch producing millions of seeds. New Zealand pond weed introduced possibly by some well-meaning member of the public, and bracken with milea-minute rhizomes, but also nettles, brambles, cleavers (goosegrass) and the grass Yorkshire Fog, which all thrive on an invisible threat.

These species easily absorb the excess nitrogen caused by emissions from transport, power stations, farming and industry, which is still being deposiedt from the air and in rain, despite the drop in pollution levels due to tighter controls. Nitrogen increases the vigour of these species, which outgrow and swamp the rarer plants that can only survive in nutrient-poor soils, the vigorous species are all important in their own right, in the right place, providing shelter and food for insects and animals, part of the food chain crowned by birds of prey such as the red kites. Warden lan Rickards says: 'We need to be careful that these plants don't dominate in

areas where we may lose important species. Quite often it is the grasses that really benefit from this additional nutrient load, species like Yorkshire Fog will quickly dominate a landscape and are very hard to control as grazing and cutting will often only encourage them.'

The 2017 report We need to talk about nitrogen by sister charity Plantlife concluded that the continuing destructive impact of atmospheric

nitrogen deposition on plants and ecosystems is one of the greatest challenges facing conservation: 90 per cent of all nitrogen -sensitive habitats in England and Wales, such as

Hothfield Heathlands, receive higher levels of nitrogen deposition than they can tolerate, with the consequent decline in nitrogen-sensitive plants. Conservation and health organisations continue to lobby for coordinated national and international strategies reduce pollution that also kills thousands of people. Locally they work to protect reserves from potential new sources of nitrogen pollution. Everyone can help by reducing car journeys and the use of artificial fertilisers in gar-

Hothfield Heathlands is open to everyone; trails are signposted and shown on entrance maps, along with the location of livestock. The noticeboard down the main slope from the Cades Road car park gives recent wildlife sightings. Please keep dogs in check, especially around children and animals, and away from the heather and undergrowth to avoid disturbing wildlife. 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Hothfield Honey: Ethical and Sustainable



Bee Welfare at Hothfield Apiary

Honey bees provide an essential pollination service vital for many crops. Without beekeepers maintaining colonies, honey bees would cease to exist in this country. Keeping my bees happy and well is my top priority.

Providing good accommodation is important. make my own hives, and each year they are cleaned and repainted to ensure they provide protection from the weather and from attacks by predators. I regularly monitor the hives for parasites and diseases, and use only natural remedies.

I take honey from the hives in spring and summer following periods of abundance. This allows time for the bees to rebuild their supplies before the winter. To further ensure they have sufficient stores, I check the weight of the hives in the autumn and provide additional feeding if




they are becoming light. All of my beehives have come through the winter, as they did last year. This compares with a national average of around 30% winter losses, so my bees are reasonably contented. The bees have been out enjoying the recent warm weather. and are already bringing back pollen to raise new foragers for the summer.

My six beehives in Hothfield are close to Hothfield Heathlands Nature Reserve. The main honey flow is later in the season, when many wild flowers, particularly heathland heather, bramble and clover are in flower. My honey goes straight from the hive to the jar. It is filtered, but not finely, so it retains pol-

Many of my customers buy local honey to help control allergies such as hay fever. It's not heat treated, and nothing is added.



Q: Is there any reason I have to be in the delivery room while my wife is in labour?


A: Not unless the word "alimony" means anything to you.
