Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan Update

As you will all be aware at the beginning of September we sent every Household a questionnaire on the way forward for the Neighbourhood Plan.

We have received 179 responses which equates to 39% of the residents of the village. This is a truly excellent response as many questionnaires only receive response rates of around 20%.

Brian and David are now busy analysing the results in detail and preparing a full report which will be published early in the new year. When it is ready we will be coming back to you with all the details.

a very early review of data it seems that we have been successful in translating feedback from previous consultations into options, with the majority of the options presented receiving very strong support.

We also had a number of excellent written comments which need to be considered and form part of the final analysis.

Managing expectations will also be important, as a Neighbourhood Plan is mainly concerned with land use. It is clear that the expectations of some residents may exceed what is possible within the legal framework of the plan.

The next stage in the process will be developing further evidence and then writing the policies which will make up the plan.

However we do need more help from you. As a team we do not have enough resources to complete the work and as you will see many of the team are also engaged on other critical activities for the village.

NOTES FROM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 3RD NOVEMBER

Remote meeting via Skype. Thanks to Chairman for hosting. Next scheduled meeting Tuesday 5th January 2021. Wishing everyone the best possible Christmas and New Year.



Present all Parish councillors and clerk; two members of the public for part of the meeting. PC Reid forwarded his apologies and report.

Parking on Station Road due to the fencing at Millars Cottages. PC Reid advises that: 'It is forcing vehicles to come around a blind bend on the wrong side of the road potentially causing a head on accident, and if there is, and they are shown to have caused it, they may well be liable. There is an obstruction offence also.

Road Traffic Act 1988 c. 52 Part I Section 22: 'Leaving vehicles in dangerous positions' states:

'If a person in charge of a vehicle causes or permits the vehicle or a trailer drawn by it to remain at rest on a road in such a position or in such condition or in such circumstances as to involve a danger of injury to other persons using the road, he is guilty of an offence.'

Thank you to everyone who responded to the BDBC Local Plan Update consultation on Promoted Sites and Issues & Options.

Stanhd petition has 5,200 signatures. Please continue to spread the word and reach 6,000! CPRE has assessed the majority of the area, south of Cliddesden to Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop, to be 'Valued Landscape'.

White Paper – *Planning for the Future* – response submitted.

Pensdell Farm owner, Herriard Estate, has requested a meeting with the Parish Council regarding the site promoted to the SHELAA – CLID010. The proposal is to build more small industrial units. Parish Council policy is to agree to listen to all proposals.

Neighbourhood Plan Thanks as always to the Neighbourhood Planning team, in particular this time for compiling all the questionnaire data.

Highways and flood mitigation

'As a starting point it seems we are now better off and Highways are doing more than they have previously done, including adding the pond silt traps to their maintenance schedule.'

Dialogue with HCC is ongoing, a site meeting still to be arranged considering:

- Gullies and culverts leading to the pond need to be clear (noting that

prolonged heavy rainfall will always overwhelm the gullies).

- Grips, ditches and soakaways need to divert water from the Highway.
- Good verge management helps with rainwater capture and reducing levels of runoff and silt to the pond.
- There will always be a challenge with the pond as it takes water from such a wide area.
- Plastic liner prevents natural dispersal.
- The inlets from the silt traps can't
- work if the pond level is above them. - Now silted up, the capacity of the
- pond is now massively reduced. - Problems with the pond outflow, being the responsibility of several different landowners.

Enforcement regarding floodwater from or via private land is with Hampshire Flood and Water Management, ref requirements under the Flood & Water Management Act.

'A meeting will enable a route forward if involving all parties... Important to continue momentum... The way the environment is heading this will happen again and more regulary.'

Parish Lengthsman on visit of 20th September cleared Footpath 2 by the old railway north of Station Road.

SID SEEKING VOLUNTEERS For traffic data management

The Speed Indicator Devices seek to raise driver awareness by a flashing display of their speed. However each one carries its own data recorder which logs every vehicle which passes and its speed (though not the type of vehicle). The data is overwritten every month and so is lost if not regularly downloaded.

Volunteers are urgently sought to help download and make use of this data which can be processed into reports and graphs.

The software, Houston Radar StatsAnalyzer, can be download free of charge from the company's website. But to note a Microsoft OS is needed, the software won't work on Apple devices.

 provide a range of green spaces for natural habitat, parkland, sports and play space, plus sustainable drainage and carbon storage


 develop and manage land to protect water quality
secure land to provide nitrate mitigation so as to support development in the River Test and Itchen catchments.





COUNTRY WATCH

I thought I had best use my time at home constructively and provide you all with an update from a Country Watch & Neighbourhood Watch perspective. PC Reid will have given us an update on crimes within the area but I will just reiterate that there has been a spate of non-dwelling (ie shed & outbuilding) burglaries. Thieves have been targeting power tools, guad bikes and plant machinery. Please do make sure your sheds and out buildings are kept secure when not in use or when unattended, unfortunately thieves can be guite brazen with one theft occurring during daylight hours at the weekend when people are usually about. Do consider registering your items at www.immobilise.com it's free to do so, helps the police reunite stolen items to rightful owners and also to prove that items are actually stolen. Most importantly, please report anything suspicious but do not be tempted to challenge thieves in the act; they will do almost anything in a bid to escape, it is simply not worth the risk of injury (or worse).

The Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) that the Parish have store the data they collect (date, time & speed of every vehicle that goes past). This data can be used to allow PC Reid to target specific roads at specific times with the mobile speed trap. It can also be used to show traffic flows on the routes through the village and back up data collected during traffic surveys which the Parish Council can then use as evidence when dealing with planning applications.

The software needed to download the data from the SIDs is free but you require a Windows device with Bluetooth to connect to the SIDs. Training can be given on how to collect the data and also how to manipulate it to produce graphs showing traffic rates, average speeds, peak times for speeding etc. The devices can store up to 3 weeks worth of data so this would be a regular ongoing task to download and process it.

The other crime that is on the rise across the area is poaching/coursing. The modern day poacher is not the romantic countryman portrayed by characters such as Claude Jeremiah



Greengrass in Heartbeat, taking a couple of pheasants or a rabbit for the pot. Modern day poachers are often linked to other crimes such as non-dwelling burglaries or criminal damage and can be violent if challenged. They often leave the animals they kill in situ not even bothering to butcher them for their meat. They often use powerful catapults shooting steel ball bearings to kill the animals they are targeting because they know that the punishment if they are caught is less severe than if they were caught in possession of firearms. They also use dogs (most commonly lurcher types) to chase down rabbits, hares and deer. Coursing is also used to support illegal gambling with events either recorded or live streamed on social media for others to bet on. Poaching & coursing cost farmers & landowners thousands of pounds in damage to fencing, hedges and crops, this is on top of the suffering caused to the wildlife being targeted. Left unchecked it also encourages criminals into the area. As with any crime or suspected crime please report it; if you believe poaching or coursing is happening at the time call 999 and tell the call handler that it is a priority rural crime (as it is across Hampshire). If you see people acting suspiciously or believe you have seen evidence of poaching please either call 101 or report it via www.hampshire.police.uk .

I will close by reminding you all that we live in a relatively safe, low crime area (despite what I've written above!). A big factor in keeping us safe is the continued cooperation, support and diligence of you, the residents so thank you and please do continue to report all suspicious activity to the police. Either directly to PC Reid or via 101 or the website above.
