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Letter from our Curate, Rev. Mike Madden:

Dear friends.

"That day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." ³⁶ Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm." (Mark 4:35-41)

I remember before, the 'storms' of pandemic, the invasion of Ukraine, rising inflation, crazy energy bills, and not to mention our own personal 'storms', life did seem to be at least a little bit predictable! Whether our lives have been impacted by big global 'storms' or personal 'storms' it can be all too easy to focus on the problem, the 'storm' rather than on the love, power and greatness of God. We can learn many things from the short account shown above of Jesus calming the storm in Mark's gospel. However, one lesson that Mark was trying to teach his readers was that Jesus, the Son of God, had authority over creation because he was in fact the creator.

So my prayer for each of us this month is that as we grapple with the 'storms' that life throws at us, that we would...'pause,' take time out of our busy lives to slow down, to look away from the storm and 'turn' towards God. That as we pause and turn towards God, that we would 'focus' on Jesus the Son of God on his greatness, his love, and his power. Remembering that whatever storms we face even those that might have been initiated by presidents, prime ministers and kings that Jesus, the Son of God, the creator God, is greater, and more powerful. Remember it was Jesus who spoke to creation and calmed the storm.

So remember, when you find yourself in the middle of a storm, 'Pause, Turn and Focus'.

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
The first closure is the section of Eynsham Road between the Swinford Toll Bridge and The Talbot Inn, to facilitate tree felling.

This will be a complete closure of that section of the road in both directions between the hours of 9.30am and 4pm, for a five day period between Thursday 19th May and Wednesday 1st June 2022

The second closure is on Freeland Road, in the section between the A40 and Cuckoo Lane, to facilitate the installation of a new water main for a new development.

This will be a complete closure, for 24 hours per day, in both directions, from Monday 6th June to Friday 10th June,

There will be limited access for emergency service vehicles and for frontages within the closed section of the road, subject to the progress of the works.

CONCERT IN FREELAND HALL RAISED OVER £450 FOR UKRAINE

After a pandemic-enforced break from live performances for over two years, it was wonderful to have an evening of live music from these two local orchestras in Freeland Hall. The evening began with a 9-piece performance from the West Oxfordshire Learners. WOL is a mixed age group that first started playing together in 2016. By chance, more than design, the programme formed an impromptu "Night at the Movies", with the performances being mainly pieces from TV and film. Somewhere Over the Rainbow was a fitting start as this had very much become the anthem of the COVID pandemic, and the mixture of flute, clarinet, oboe, saxophones and cornet worked together perfectly. The arrangements took us time-travelling through the different cinematic eras as we listened to favourites old and new, including music from Raiders of the Lost Ark and Disney classics such as Beauty and the Beast and The Bare Necessities. Although playing together as "learners" the musicians were extremely accomplished and the overall performance was so polished and professional it was hard to believe that for some it was their first ever performance and were still quite new to their instruments.

Next up were the West Oxfordshire Clarinets who are a group of more experienced musicians which included alto and bass clarinets. The programme took us on a chronological passage through musical history starting with Bach, Handel and Mozart. The mood and style then changed dramatically as we whizzed forward to the twentieth century and we were treated to several more contemporary pieces including a slow ragtime from Scott Joplin and a classic from the Father of the Blues, WC Handy.

Both orchestras played magnificently, with the music being expertly arranged and conducted by Wendy Marks. Both WOL and WOC clearly enjoyed being able to play together in real life, rather than via Zoom, and it was certainly food for the soul to be able to enjoy such wonderful live music again. The proceeds from the tickets and a retiring collection raised £455 in aid of the DEC's Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal.

Look out for the next event when the Freeland Orchestra & West Oxfordshire Winds perform at Wood Green School in Witney on **Friday 1st July at 7.30pm**.

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FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

The Club had another superb lecture on 28th March from Andrew Mikolaski entitled 'Practical Pots'. He covered many other subjects related to pots. Firstly he mentioned that all chemicals are now banned from slug pellets so an organic way to control slugs is to boil 2 heads of garlic in 2 litres of water, mash and strain. Use 2 tablespoons of garlic mixture to a watering can of water and spray plants with this mixture weekly.

There is still time to plant bare root roses either in pots or the ground. Soak plant overnight. Dig a large hole, loosen soil at the bottom, water, more soil or compost, water again and plant rose 1 1/2 inches below graft and firm soil around it.

He had observed that peat free compost dries out quickly and is impossible to rewet, so he recommended Melcourt compost which is bark based. Shallow rooted plants should be planted in shallow pots, and tall plants in tall pots with stones in the bottom for stability. Polystyrene can also be used to improve drainage.

Multipurpose compost has limited use as it is based on green waste which may contain herbicides. Spent compost can be used if fresh compost is added as well as a fertiliser such as chicken manure.

Plants which do well in pots include figs, begonias, lilies, blueberries which need ericaceous soil, hostas, fuchsias and hydrangeas also do well. He warned against planting climbers in pots unless they are non vigorous.

Jobs to be done shortly include feeding roses and spring bulbs, Plant out annuals after last frost. Feed and weed borders and mulch if possible. Deadhead spring bulbs and wait till foliage dies before discarding.

Clean and sharpen tools as well as hard surfaces. Repair mortar joints. Watch out for aphids. Put a glove on and squash the aphids. Vine weevils eat notches out of leaves, particularly in pots. They lay their eggs in the soil and the grubs eat the roots weakening the plant, discard all the soil and place the plant in clean soil and squash the grubs.

The speaker at our next meeting on **Monday 23rd May at 7.30pm** in Freeland Hall is Mary Fenton. Her subject is 'The Wonder of Trees'. As the trees are coming into full leaf we enjoy their beauty and look forward to learning more about them.

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


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The war time memories continue and this month Mrs Bunyan describes some of the ways her family's farm was affected..

MY VILLAGE IN WARTIME by Mrs Barbara Bunyan

As I recall, whenever there was a power strike, Freeland House was never cut off and shared the same supply as the farm. It was fortunate for us too as our farm was the first in the County to have an electrically powered Alfa-Laval milking machine – a huge asset for our dairy herd of Shorthorn cattle. Our farm was one of the main suppliers of Tuberculin Tested milk to go daily to local dairies in Oxford.

Farm labour during the war years was very difficult and a real headache. My father found men who had not joined up for war service, for whatever reason, were 'absolutely useless' for the physical work on the farm. He had twelve men in as many months of the year – quite incapable of the hard work required milking, feeding livestock, handling machinery – keeping up routines – even getting up in the morning! Some seemed incapable of receiving and carrying out routines such as preparing animal feed, rounding up cattle – feeding young calves and filling up barns with hay bales and carrying corn for poultry scattered around the farm fields. Waking up in the morning and getting the milking done every single day was particularly important, for the milk lorry arrived at 8am to pick up five or six 8-gallon churns – all labeled ready for the driver to load up and move on to another collection point.

The War Agricultural Committee (WarAg for short) was based in Oxford. I later learned their offices were, in what is now Wychwood School, on the Banbury Road. WarAg was the body which dictated rules and policies from the government to farmers and, according to my father, 'was an absolute pain in the neck'. My father was very intolerant of interfering and petty officialdom. In fact, he once ordered some ministerial officials off his farm by telling them in no uncertain terms that he did not want them coming to tell him how to run his farm as he regarded them as 'broken down' farmers themselves. He felt they were not equipped to act in an advisory basis.

My father was, of course a farmer's son from a family of farmers going back many generations in Shropshire; farming was therefore well and truly in his blood. My mother too came from generations of landowners, farmers and horse breeders in Shropshire and on the Welsh borders. Some of her ancestors bred Shire horses for the drays in Liverpool and Manchester.

Returning to the subject of help on the farm, prisoners of war were drafted in from the local prison camps to help with hay making, corn harvesting and labour for the threshing machine on its annual contractual visit.

There were several prisoner-of-war camps in our local area – Witney – at Cogges, Bampton and Carterton - plus a large German camp at North Leigh on the Eynsham Hall Estate. As we travelled up the hill towards Witney, I was always entranced by the brightly painted, wooden miniature houses and fairy castles built by the prisoners who had placed their handiwork up and against the perimeter fence adjacent to the main road – for all to see. The army was based at Eynsham Hall too – under the direction of one Major Gooch – another friend of the family. It may be that they oversaw the running of the prison camp.

When haymaking season started, we had four German prisoners who came every day by lorry very early in the morning and the transport collected them at the end of the working day. I remember them as very young men, tall blond-haired and usually called Hans (German form of John). They were quiet and very pleasant but found farm work very hard going and exhausting. Of course, in those years, hay was collected by horse and cart and wagons. Hay balers and Fordson/Ferguson tractors came onto the scene at a much later time.

My father was very good to these young men from Germany, having been a soldier himself in France in World War One. He related to their immaturity and camp conditions – probably away from home for the first time. He appreciated their efforts in trying to cope with the hard work on poor rations and usually gave them fresh eggs every day. They could not take the eggs back to the camp, so they swallowed them in their raw state during their 'lunch break'.

Then the threshing machine came (an annual Autumn event). Among the English labour force was a young german student who had one of the worst threshing machine jobs, dealing with the output. He had to collect up the huge piles of chaff expelled from the side of the machine. Chaff was the leftovers from the sheaves once they had been stripped of the main stalks for baling. The only way to collect the chaff was in a huge sack, which, when filled, was carried on one's back, into the storage loose box for bedding. A scratchy and very physical job, to say the least, but essential work. I remember asking him if he was enjoying being part of the threshing gang and his job. I was quite surprised by his reply, that he was enjoying the work because it took him away mentally from his studies which were constantly going around and around in his head. He was a philosophy student at one of the German Universities and he had requested practical work in agriculture in the UK.

There was great pressure and publicity at that time on food production to feed the nation and for the nation to be self-sufficient. Farmers were constantly pressed to do more and more and grow more corn for flour, root vegetables, kale for cattle feeding, mangolds and potatoes. Lord Woolton was the Minister of Food and I remember 'Dig for Victory" posters everywhere.

As well as good pasture on our farm for milk production, we had rich arable land too and the farm was known as a good wheat-producing area.

One of our largest acreages was made up of half pasture and half woodland and our cattle had the best of both worlds – good grass land and shady areas in which to wander in the height of summer. This was not to last. Sadly, for the cattle and for us, the WarAg came along and commanded that the woodland had to go, the whole area cleared and ploughed for more food production.

Before we had time to blink, lorry loads of forty Italian prisoners of war plus armed sentries arrived daily with heavy equipment for the removal of trees and the burning of the debris. This went on daily for three months and the whole area looked like a recreation of the trenches and warfare of World War One. These chaps were really tough looking folk - unhappy looking and very rugged. The weather did not help as it was wet and very muddy.

We children – always curious – were warned by my father to stay away from these men but we were able to stick with Luigi, their cook, who I remember as a very delightful young man. Every day he lit a fire within a tripod and boiled water to make coffee for the prisoners. Luigi fetched buckets of fresh water from the barns several times a day and then made coffee served in bowls to forty prisoners and their sentries. Luigi obviously liked young children and I became his devoted companion, following him everywhere until it was time to return to the house for lunch. Luigi spoke English fairly well, so he and my father had daily chats on progress and Luigi was in turn interpreter for the whole gang.

The farm was enveloped in burning and wood smoke for days and days – a fact which did not please my mother especially when the wind was in the wrong direction and blew over the house and buildings.

This clearance was not without drama. One day a prisoner decided to escape and charged off over the fields making for the thick hedgerows. Suddenly there was a lot of shouting, work stopped, and the sentries raised their rifles and dashed off in pursuit across the fields. For a while it was alarming for, we thought there would be shooting but thick hedges reinforced with strands of barbed wire saved the day. The prisoner got entangled in the wire trying to push through a hedge, so he was captured and marched back to work. What happened to him? We never knew.

This must have happened in 1943 for, soon after, there was much jubilation among the prisoners, for Italy had capitulated and all were overjoyed with the news. Work continued however until the field was completely laid bare, cleared of the debris and ready for cultivation and the prisoners left.

We were sad to say goodbye to Luigi, but we later learned that he did not return to Italy but joined the British army instead.

We will be contacting our housebound patients to arrange a date for their covid booster vaccinations.

These offer appointments at the large vaccination centre at the Kassam Stadium in Oxford or at several Oxfordshire community pharmacies.


Well blow me over with a drinking straw....SUN!!

FREELAND ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION

The Allotment Association Committee have for some time now been investigating possible sites to allow expansion of the allotments. The waiting list had grown to 18 people and, with a very slow turnover of current plots of approximately one per year, looking elsewhere seemed the right thing to do.

The search has narrowed down to the field opposite the School on Wroslyn Road, which is owned by Blenheim Estates and under direct control of Pye Homes. This opportunity was initiated by Councillor Alaa Al-Yousuf, and is being coordinated by Andy Murray.

Several meetings and online discussions have taken place and have led to us being offered a stretch of this field which would provide 32 additional 13m x 4m plots over an initial 15 year tenancy. Taking over this area would involve the construction of a permanent gateway, a hard track to the bottom of the field (subject to approval of a planning application to be submitted by Pye Homes in the event we proceed) where the new plots would be sited with a turning / unloading area, erection of a perimeter and rabbit proof fence and installation of a water supply, so quite an involved job. This would of course come at a considerable cost. However, Blenheim Estates and Councillor Liam Walker have kindly offered to provide some support.

If we are to proceed with this opportunity, we must ensure that the take up of plots will yield sufficient revenue to cover the annual repayments plus water charges. To estimate this and determine if the proposal is financially viable, the Committee therefore wish to invite anyone living in the village who would be interested in taking on a plot to contact Jacky Scotney-Jones, (email **faadigger21@gmail.com**), before the end of May 2022. Existing plot rents are currently £25 per year and we envisage the new plots could be available to begin cultivation by the end of September this year.

A further article from Julie Stuart-Thompson on the service personnel listed on the War memorial in St Mary's Church Yard.

Alastair Conway Hill 27th March 1915 - 1st January 1942

Alastair Conway Hill was born in Chertsey Surrey and was a career soldier, from a family of career soldiers, who came from and married into the landed families of England and Ireland, across several generations. As with many military families, they were constantly moving around the country and living/serving abroad.

Alastair's father was Conway Rowley Hill, born 1881 in Berkshire. In the 1891 census he was living in Berwick and by 1901 is recorded as an Officer in the Royal Field Artillery. By 1911 he is a married soldier stationed in the 2nd Battery of the Royal Horse Artillery in Potchefstroom Transvaal, South Africa. He won a DSO in WW1 (Distinguished Service Order) in January 1916 and awarded the Legion of Honour – Croix de Chevalier in February 1916 and a Greek Military Cross in July 1917. Conway married Georgiana Marion Larkins in December 1910 in Horwick. Alastair was born in 1915 and his sister June Victoria Conway Hill born in 1923. Conway would go on to marry a second time in 1925 to Gwendoline Winifred Cleminson. He died in the Devon and Exeter Hospital in December 1943. His effects were left to his wife and totalled £1438 4s 6d.

Alastair's grandfather was Rowley Richard Conway Hill, born 1841, who rose in the ranks from Ensign in 1861 to Lieutenant Colonel by the time of his death in 1914. He married Marion Eliza Blanche Cropper, born 1859, 18 years his junior, in March 1878 in Sevenoaks. Their children were born in Scotland and Northumberland. They were Rowley A E 1879, Hugh Rowley 1880, Conway Rowley 1882, Oliver Conway Rowley 1884, Lesley Rowley 1885, Blanche Edith 1887, Margaret 1888, Janet Dorothy 1893 and Helen Irene Susan 1898. Each of the houses the family lived in had many servants. By 1911 just the last 4 daughters were at home in Hamble House, Hampshire. Rowley now retired aged 70 and Blanche aged 52. He died in September 1914 leaving £13935 Is 2d to his wife Marion, who died in 1936.

Alastair's great grandfather was Richard Kirwan Hill was born 18th November 1794, in Wexford Ireland. He married Jane Margaret Halkett on 2nd April 1832. She was from a very distinguished military family – for instance leading battalions at Waterloo. Richard died a Captain in the 52nd Foot Light Infantry on 5th December 1842, of a disease of the brain. This regiment was based in Oxfordshire, in the Cowley barracks. Jane was left to bring up their young family and granted a pension. Her last child named after his father was born in September 1842 just a few months before his father's death, but he too died the following year. In 1851 we find the widowed Jane living in the household of her brother in law Edward Rowley Hill, also a Lieutenant Colonel in the army. Jane was born in 1806, her father was Admiral Sir Peter Halkett, 6th Baronet of Pitfirrane Fife and his with Elizabeth nee Todd. Jane's brother John became the 7th Baronet. He married Amelia Hood Conway. Jane and Richard's daughter Eliza Anna married her cousin Sir Peter Arthur Halkett who went on to become the 8th Baronet.

One more generation back, was General Hugh Hill born in 1770. The Rowley name handed down through the generations was one of the oldest landed families in Ireland. It should come as no surprise that Alastair joined the military with this pedigree.

Alastair married Marion A McBain in Shanghai China on 17th August 1940. He was 25 and she just 18. Marion had been born in Chelsea in the September 1921 daughter of Neville S McBain and Susanne Carter. On the marriage certificate, Neville is listed as a Merchant. After Alastair's death, Marion would remarry in 1948 aged 27 and also outlived her second husband by 16 years.

Alastair's service number was 66132 and he was quickly promoted through the officer ranks; 2nd Lieutenant 29.8.35; Lieutenant 29.8.38; Acting Captain 16.4.40; Temporary Captain 16.7.40, serving in the 2nd Battalion of the East Surrey Regiment.

In 1940, the 2nd Battalion sailed from China to Malaya it became attached to 11th Indian Division based in North West Malaya. In December 1941, Malaya was invaded by the Japanese Army and the Battalion suffered considerably from casualties and being taken prisoner during the defence and retreat. 19 December 1 941: The Battalion was amalgamated with the 1st Battalion of The Leicestershire Regiment to form the "British Battalion", and fought gallantly throughout the rest of the short Malayan campaign. He was originally listed as missing on 7.12.41 presumed killed in action, and then his death was recorded as 1.1.42. Alastair's name is recorded on the Singapore Memorial, Column 67, as well as the memorial in St Mary's. Alastair's probate record shows his address as Bublong Wells Road, Shanghai. His effects came to £6893 4s 10d which was left to his wife.





The link with Freeland is an interesting one. In 1939 we find two unmarried sisters living in The Old Parsonage in the Wroslyn Road, Margaret Hill, born 28 June 1888, and Blanche Edith Hill, born 30 April 1886. Blanche was recorded as President of the WI and Billeting Officer for the area. These were both the maiden aunts of Alastair Conway Hill who lived together according to the all the census details, from Berwick Northumberland to Hampshire and finally to Freeland. Margaret died in September 1965 aged 77, and Blanche outlived her by another 12 years, dying in June 1977 aged over 90.

CHANGES TO THE STAGECOACH 700, 800 & 900 SERVICE

From **Monday 9th May 2022**, Stagecoach will be making some changes to their services which serve the |R Hospital, Churchill and Nuffield Hospitals.

Services 700, 800 & 900 will be combined into one new 700 route serving:

- > Kidlington (anti-clockwise loop)
- > Oxford Parkway Park & Ride
- > John Radcliffe Hospital
- > Oxford Brookes University
- > Churchill Hospital (serving Roosevelt Drive and Churchill Hospital stop C3 no longer serving the current stops in use at the Churchill: C4, C5, C6, C7)
- > Nuffield Orthopaedic Centre (serving Windmill Road stop N5 no longer serving the current stops in use N1, N3)
- > Thornhill Park & Ride.

The timetable will have slightly earlier and later departures times, with the first journey to the JR at: 06.10 from Oxford Parkway (previously 06.30 on 700) and 06.12 from Thornhill (previously 06.30 on 800)

The last journey from the JR will be at: 20.20 to Oxford Parkway (previously 20.15) 20.25 to Thornhill (previously 19.25)

The new route will run up to every 30 minutes and will give different connections between all of the Oxford University Hospital sites.

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
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
