PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting was held in the Village Hall on 21st February attended by 6 Councillors and the Clark. Both District Councillors were present at the meeting, together with 1 parishioner.

- Concern was expressed regarding street cleaning and further efforts would be made to get this started.
- It was reported that the proposal for a Village Open Garden Day was to be held in abeyance due to lack of volunteers.
- 3. Agreed that the Parish Council would apply for a grant from the County Council's special maintenance fund to pay for a fur ther length of footpath on Halam Hill and/or a child refuge opposite the bottom gate of the school.
- 4. The procedure for letting the Halam pensioners' bungalows was discussed and Mrs. Armstrong, who is on the Housing Committee, agreed to investigate this.
- An estimate is to be obtained for rendering the back wall and painting the woodwork of the bus shelter.
- 6. The District Council appear to be insisting that every Parish should have a village envelope and conservation area. It was likely that a further public meeting would be required to reconsider this matter.

PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Village Hall on April 22nd. Seven members and the Clerk attended the meeting, together with five parishioners.

The Chairman, Councillor E Bust, presented the Annual Report:

- a) Ten Parish Council meetings had been held during the year.
- b) The election of the Parish Council took place on May 2nd 1991.
 - c) The Parish had won the District Council's Best Run Village Hall contest.
- d) The District Council was now responsible for street cleaning in Halam with effect from April 1st 1992. e) There had been an improvement in the operation of the sewage pumping station
- although some further work was still required. f) A successful Harvest Supper had been organised by the Parish Council
- g) Restructuring of local government was briefly mentioned. h) The Parish Council were pressing for a further length of footpath to be
- constructed on Halam Hill. i) A considerable number of planning applications had been referred to the Parish
- Council.

The Clerk, Mr P Rickett, presented a financial statement for the year which, after discussion, was approved.

A vote of thanks to the Parish Council was proposed by Mr N Yates and seconded by Mr H Kemp.

Following the Annual Parish Meeting, an Ordinary Meeting was held.

The annual electrical inspection of the Village Hall had been carried out by HS Group Services at a cost of £57.95. This was significantly less than the previous cost.

Agreed to obtain an estimate of the cost of minor restoration works required in the Village Hall such as dealing with flaking plaster in the small committee room and dampness in the porch.

The requests for a further length of footpath to be constructed on Halam Hill, and the reinstatement of the vandalised signposts, were discussed.

The Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council is to be held on Thursday May 14th at 7.30 pm. in the Village Hall.

<u>PARISH COUNCIL</u> A meeting was held in the Village Hall on 14th May attended by 7 Councillors and the Clark, together with one parishioner. Both District Councillors representing Halam were present.

- 1. Messrs E. Bust and R. Brown were re-elected as Chairman and Vice-Chairman.
- 2. Representatives on the Notts. Assoc. of Local Councils to be Messrs R.Brown and E.Bust.
- 3. Tree Officer and correspondent for Halam News to be Mr. A. Hallam.
- 4. Reply received from Notts. County Council indicated uncertainty about when the vandalised sign posts would be re-instated. Agreed that the matter should be raised at the next meeting of the Road Safety Committee.
- 5. Details of restoration works required in the Village Hall were agreed and tender to be obtained for carrying out the works.

- 6. The necessity for a further length of footpath to be constructed on Halam Hill to be raised at the next meeting of the Road Safety Committee.
- 7. A planning application by Sir John Starkey's Daughters' Settlement for the erection of a new dwelling on land opposite Bluebell Cottage, Back Lane was considered and it was agreed to recommend approval. Voting 6 for, l against.
- 8. A planning application by Mr. & Mrs. A. Hallam for a ground floor extension to Holly House, Back Lane was considered and it was unanimously agreed to recomment approval. (Mr. A. Hallam did not vote)
- 9. A planning application by Mr. S. Bust for a 2-storey side extrsion at Hollybeck, Holme Lane was considered and it was unanimously agreed to recommend approval. (Messrs S. and E. Bust did not vote)
- 10. According to information received from Newark & Sherwood D.C. it appeared that road sweeping in Halam would be carried out every two weeks.
- 11. Newark & Sherwood D.C. are promoting a scheme to encourage home composting of garden waste by providing containers. Details from either Kelham Hall or the Parish Clerk,
- 12. It was reported that new roof tiles being used at Roseneath, Radley Road, did not comply with the planning permission granted and that enforcement action was being considered by Newark & Sherwood D.C.
- 13. Future meetings to be held on 26th June, 14th August and 2nd October at 7.30 p.m. in the Village Hall.
