Chair's Update

Apologies. For the second time in the past year, we were unable to publish our newsletter quarterly due to Covid 19 restraints. We hope you enjoy this bumper 6-month edition. Little did we know as we went to press in November last year that there were such things as Tier 4, a Kent variant, or that Christmas could be cancelled. Thank you to everyone who supported our 'Light up Dunton Green' campaign for Christmas. It certainly brightened up the dismal December evenings.

As we now go to press, the data all seems to be heading in the right direction, and life is slowly returning to 'normal'. I know that many of you will still have difficulties, and should you need help we continue to signpost health, mental health and advice organisations, who are wating to help you, from our website. The Lockdown Larder is now able to operate from the Pavilion, supporting families in Dunton Green.



The Parish Council has continued to meet using Zoom. At our Annual Parish Council meeting in May I was re-elected as Chairman and Paul Lockey continues as Vice Chairman.

....Chair's Update

We now have a new Bookings and Facilities Assistant, Wendy Jackson. She's the person to call if you'd like to hire the Pavilion for activities and events. Many of our regular hirers are slowly returning as the Covid regulations relax, and I know they would all welcome new recruits. Maybe this is the year you take up martial arts or do some Pilates?

Despite the Pavilion being closed for most of the financial year, we've managed to recover much of our lost hirer income. Our Parish Clerk ,Tracy, successfully applied for several Government support grants . This means we were able to keep the increase of our portion of your Council Tax to just 0.9 % - 95p for the year on a Band D property.



Maintenance of our public land areas has continued. We recently met with our grounds maintenance team, tree surgeon and cycling consultant to plan the further clearance and planting of native trees in Price's Wood, where the cycle track has proved very popular with kids and their dads

during lockdown. In November we planted ten native flowering trees on The Crescent.

Currently the goalmouths at the recreation ground have been reseeded after taking a battering, like the rest of the grass, during the very wet weather in March and right through the most recent lockdown. We are also hoping to replace some of the older play equipment in the coming months.



We were delighted that KCC Highways finally got round to resurfacing London Road from Tesco's to the parade, although it was very noisy for a few nights.



It has certainly improved the look of the village.

They also did some muchneeded work on Lennard Road's pavements.



The train station has had some new lights which get brighter when you walk under them and will make it safer in the dark. Fortunately, there was no permanent damage to the station and rail tracks after the maintenance train fire.

As we are all aware parking continues to be difficult in the village. For insurance and safety reasons our small car park was closed through lockdowns. Now it is reopened can I remind you that it is only for users of the recreation ground and Pavilion. You wouldn't dream of just leaving your car in the Duke's Head car park or on someone's else's drive all day, so please don't do that in our car park. We continue to object to all planning

applications which fail to provide adequate parking which we believe should be at least 1 space per bedroom.

Over the lockdown an area of land in the recreation ground was cleared of brambles, and, the assortment of fly tipping which has accumulated over the years.

I wish it was the only fly tipping in the



village but it wasn't. The dump is open. If the bin men won't take your rubbish, use the dump. Fly tipping is expensive to remove and that's a cost that adds to everyone's Council Tax bill. We will reinstate our bulk freighter



collections asap (we are waiting on SDC to give us the go ahead).

There were some incidents of anti-social behaviour including smashing bottles against the Pavilion, and repeated damaged to the mirror on the Lennard Road cut through. We have supplied CCTV images to the police who follow up all such incidents.

It's been a tough year. We all need something to look forward to, so we have provisionally booked for our

fireworks display event and have our fingers crossed that this will be able to go ahead on Saturday 25th September.

DUNTON GREEN WAR MEMORIAL

The Parish Council was recently contacted by David Spicer, who had been reading with interest the information on the Parish Council's website about those who died in World War Two and who are commemorated on the War Memorial.

Dave had only recently discovered that his granddad's brother, Frederick Collison, is remembered on the Dunton Green war memorial.

Fred is thought to have died as a Prisoner of War on 16th February 1943. He was only 28 years old. He is buried in Germany.

Dave has very kindly sent in this photo of Fred in his army uniform, with his younger brother Alf (Dave's grandad), who hadn't been called up yet for service (he went on to serve with the Kings' Royal Rifles).



We didn't have a picture of Fred before Dave contacted us and we are honoured to share it with you.

If you have any information or pictures relating to those listed on the memorials we would very much like to see them, so that we might put together an archive of photographs for the website to bring to life those who have been lost.

* Climbing Rox Project - Longford Meadow The Parish Council would like to provide a climbing installation that will be challenging for youngsters and adults alike. We would like your comments on whether you think this would be a good addition to the facilities that are already available in Dunton Green.





These Rox combinations provide a range of multi-functional sports and fitness climbing rocks which offers the ultimate climbing experience with a natural rock look and feel. ROX consists of pre-cast reinforced concrete walls as an inner section, which has a solid-coloured, moulded layer of jet-crete added to give the rock appearance. The ROX units are not only functional, but are also visually appealing within the environment. Beginners or younger children can use the climbing hand and footholds that are attached to the surface, whereas older children or adults can progress their skills by using only the hand crafted rock finish. The surface on the products has a relatively rough finish which is ideal for climbing.





Spring

After over a year of restrictions and lockdowns due to the Covid 19 pandemic, things are starting to get back to normal. While it has had a wide range of negative affects on all of us, nature seems if anything to have benefitted from the reduced movement of people. The air is cleaner (momentarily I'm sure), and many of us have discovered (or often rediscovered) the nature around us.

Although as I write this it's overcast and cold, Spring is definitely settling in. The woods and hedges are alive with birdsong, blossom and



wildflowers. Blackthorn, Hawthorn and various Cherries are bursting with white and pink flowers, providing a welcome feast for bees and other pollinators, and a much-needed flash of colour. Honesty, Cuckoo Flowers and hyacinths are starting to flower and the bluebells are not far behind. In the grass the daffodils are coming to an end, but the celandines and daisies are opening.



It's a great time to explore our local area, the Sevenoaks Nature Reserve is looking beautiful and the path round the bigger lake isn't too strenuous and not usually too

muddy. Other paths locally have taken a bit of a battering over lockdown, but they're

getting back to normal now. We're lucky enough to have several routes criss-crossing the village – North Downs Way and the Darent Valley Path are the 2 longest ones, but there are lots of shorter paths connecting the local villages and beauty spots, and these often have surprisingly spectacular views.



It's a great time to explore our local area, the Sevenoaks Nature Reserve is looking beautiful and the path round the bigger lake isn't too strenuous and not usually too muddy. Other paths locally have taken a bit of a battering over lockdown, but they're getting back to normal now. We're lucky enough to have several routes criss-crossing the village –



North Downs Way and the Darent Valley Path are the 2 longest ones, but there are lots of shorter paths connecting the local villages and beauty spots, and these often have surprisingly spectacular views.

The Darent Valley Path is described as follows on the LDWA website: *The River Darent flows from its source in the Greensand hills, south of Westerham, to join*

the Thames, north of Dartford. The walk is through a varied landscape of riverside fringed with ancient willows, hop gardens and cornfields, secretive woodlands, downland carpeted with wild flowers and expanses of marshland and has the added attractions of Roman remains, majestic viaducts, historic houses, old mills and picturesque villages with beautiful churches.

Even longer is the North Downs Way, which is described by the LDWA as: *The North Downs Way National Trail broadly follows the historic Pilgrims Way along the North Downs to Canterbury. The first 14 miles are over sandy countryside to the south of the Downs. The Downs are first reached at Newlands Corner, east of Guildford, and from there on the trail mainly follows the crest of the southern escarpment of the North Downs or footpaths and tracks along their lower slopes. There are views over the Weald to the South Downs and several steepish ascents where the ridge is cut by valleys, notably those of the Mole at Box Hill, the*

Darent at Otford, the Medway at Rochester, and the Stour near Wye. Generally the route provides comparatively easy walking through woods, over chalk grassland and - especially in Kent - through orchards and farmland.



It's a fairly long way, but obviously you don't have to walk all of it at once (or indeed at all). The local bits are very pleasant to ramble along just for a little while, but it's worth wearing appropriate clothes and footwear and taking provisions if you're going for a longer walk. Be aware that the weather is changeable this time of year (it was actually snowing yesterday!) so be prepared for rain/cold even if it's nice when you start out. It's also advisable to have a map if you're not sure where you're going, remember that your smart phone may not have a good signal in the more remote places.

Given the impact of antisocial behaviour on the local area over last spring/summer lockdown, it's also essential to remember the Countryside Code, which aims to show how we can all respect, protect and enjoy the countryside and to make sure it remains available for us all for decades to come. I know I'd miss it if it was gone.

there are also Peregrine that are reasonably regular




P.S. I had 2 Waxwing by the caravan park on Rye Lane 2 years ago, so winter doesn't mean the action stops!

Dunton Green Primary School

All the teachers and support staff were happy and excited to welcome the children back to school on 8th March after the extended lockdown in January and February. During the lockdown the school remained open to vulnerable

children and those whose parents are key workers. We continued to keep the kitchen open so that we were able to provide all children in school with a hot meal every day and those children at home eligible for free school meals received vouchers via the government scheme. On-line learning and live lessons were provided via Microsoft Teams throughout lockdown and the school were able to provide children without IT equipment at home, a loan of a school iPad or laptop meaning that all children had access to the learning.

One of the first events that the children enjoyed on their return to school was World Book Day which we celebrated on 10th March. The theme was 'Around the World in 80 Days', the children dressed as tourists and adventurers and boarded a flight. DG Airways then 'flew'

the children to a range of destinations to explore food and art from countries such as Japan, London, France, China & Egypt. Two of our classes have been writing to pen pals at a school in Canada, replies have been received and were opened with much excitement.

Our Easter Bonnet competition had some amazing entries, the children showed their creative side and great imagination, there was a winner in each class!



We also had a fun intra-house sports competition this term. All the children were involved in a range of multi sports with the points awarded added together resulting in an overall winning house at the end of the competition. The house cup is then adorned with the winning house ribbons and awarded to the house captain.

We have recently had some ready to hatch eggs via Living Eggs which the children were able to watch hatch and grow in the early weeks. The children loved this experience and we will definitely repeat it next year.

The school now have a brand new website which we would encourage



you to visit www.dunton-green.kent.sch.uk . There is lots of information on the website about the school and a link to our Twitter page @DGprimary which gives an insight into daily life. There is also a link on the website to our brand new school video. Due to the pandemic we have been unable to hold open events this year for prospective parents, so this video gives a lovely introduction to our school for those parents unable to visit in person.



We are especially proud to have recently been awarded overall Primary School Champions in the Kent Literacy Awards for our Friday book initiative.

October



BEE WATCH!

As the days warm and spring flowers bloom, one of my favourite sights and sounds as I tend the garden is the buzz of the emerging bees. Like many people, I am saddened about the current plight of our bees and the sharp decline in their numbers due to pesticide use, disease and loss of habitat and I am trying my best to plant bee-friendly flowers that will help them all year round.

As I watched bees foraging on my comfrey and lavender in the heat of last summer, I was amazed at the variety of different shapes, colours and pollinating styles of the various bees (short vs long tongue, hover style or crawl etc.) so much so, that this year I promised myself to be able to identify the bees that visited my garden. This, however, as I am finding out, is not as easy as I thought it would be!

A little homework has informed me that in the UK, as well as the one honeybee species we have, there are 24 species of bumble bee and over 240



species of solitary bees. So, armed with my phone camera I have tried to snap and identify the first of the intrepid bees to visit my garden this spring.

The first was an easy bee to take a picture of and I recognized it immediately from my childhood days as a Honeybee because of

its' elongated shape as opposed to the rounded shape of a bumble bee. What I did not realise until I consulted the various internet Identification charts, is that this is actually a male Drone honeybee. Drones are identified by their very large eyes which enable them to easily spot Queen bees in flight and the lack of pollen sacs on its legs, as being Drones they do not collect pollen. In

fact, the life of a Drone, although shorter, is one of hedonism and laziness, flying about keeping an eye open for Queen bees, occasionally feeding and resting a lot, which is why I had plenty of time to get a clear(ish) picture of this Drone (above).



However, the next bee I saw was a worker Honeybee. It was difficult to take a clear picture of her because she never stopped flying quickly from flower to flower collecting pollen, but she was identifiable by her smaller eyes and heavily laden pollen sacs. I was also delighted to discover that the pollen she had collected was bright blue rather than yellow as I expected, as this worker honeybee had obviously been foraging on bluebells as well as the tiny Forget-me-not flowers.

I also remember being told as a child that honeybees do not sting, and armed with this information, I remember happily and fearlessly spending many hours in my Nan's front garden catching honeybees in my cupped hands and letting them go again. A bit of a shock now then to read that it is only male bees of any species that do not sting (as the stinger is a modified form of the female egg-laying organ) and all female workers and Queen bees do indeed sting. I must have been just very fortunate as a child when catching bees, or perhaps it was my confidence in (albeit wrong) knowledge that gave me an assuredness and calmness when cupping bees in my small vulnerable hands. Fortunately, honeybees are tolerant and passive creatures, and only sting

when truly provoked as they will die after stinging, unlike bumble bees and wasps that will happily sting multiple times.

The next bee I heard long before I saw it. A deep drone progressively got louder as the bee



equivalent of a B52 Bomber slowly bumbled past, aptly living up to its name, resolutely and repeatedly bashing itself into the lounge window until it realised it wasn't getting anywhere and changed course, thereby causing me to duck out of its lumbering path. How these amazing big furry barrels get airborne appears to defy any normal aerodynamic principals, but is, I understand, a feat of physics more akin to that behind the action of helicopter rotors. Large, round, furry with black and yellow stripes and a white bottom, this was a classic White-tailed bumble bee. Unfortunately, I couldn't get a clear view if it had pollen sacs or how hairy its legs were to be able to identify whether it was male or female (rather similar to humans, hairy legs are another apparent distinguishing feature between male & female bees!). The last bee I saw was a little more confusing to identify. Much smaller than the White-tailed bumble bee, its round shape identified it as one of the other 23 species of bumble bee – but which one?



The ginger thorax, black abdomen and white tail suggested that it might be a one of our most common species, the Tree bumblebee. As the name suggests, these bees colonise holes in trees and will also use nest boxes and are found in habitats ranging from woodland to gardens. However, I will not be catching these cute-looking bees in my hands as they are reportedly feistier and more aggressive than other bees and can sting with impunity. Please do let me know if I have erroneously identified any of the bees in this article. I will carry on trying to identify bees as the summer progresses and more bees emerge as the weather warms up.

If you are interested in getting to know the bees visiting your garden, there are many of these identification charts available on the internet and there is also a Bumblebee Identification App from the Bumblebee Conservation Trust (https://www.bumblebeeconservation.org/) to help bumblebee-beginners identify the most common species

of bee in the UK.

I am rarely disappointed and this week, thanks to Nick Carter, Roger Tingley and the parish council clerk Tracy Godden, I am now able to identify all the jollylooking members of Dunton Green Social Club (Chronicler, January 21).

The picture was taken in the 1970s soon after Roger Tingley became Club Secretary. Only he and Ron Edmeads are still alive and, according to Nick Carter, whose father is in the picture, they have been members of the club for more than 60 years.

RIGHT PLACE, RIGHT TIME

The day I left school was the first time I'd ever been given a camera to take some photos. It was the 70's and the concept of having a mobile phone that took pictures was science fiction. It was the start of a lifetime of capturing memories and moments. Anyone who knows me, knows I take pictures all the time, and friends know who will have a photo of someone's 50th or of a holiday in 1986. However, I have always wanted to take a photo that was used on the news. I've often looked at the photos that others have taken of events, and thought that they had been lucky and been in the right place at the right time.



My husband and I were once all over South Korean social media because we happened to be sitting on a French beach when one of their chart-topping stars- Sunmi was doing a photo shoot following her sell out concert at the O2 the night before. Hundreds of thousands of South Koreans saw it, but not many Brits. Anyway, I didn't want to be IN the photo used, I wanted to take the photo used!

At 5.15am on Friday 21st April, I was woken by my neighbour banging on the front door and my fire alarm

tweeting. 'There's a fire' she said, and for a moment I thought it was my house. In fact, there was a burning maintenance train on the embankment at the bottom of my garden.



Around the corner in Ryewood, firemen were dousing the flames too!

By this time, trains had been cancelled, and Dunton Green was headline news on BBC Breakfast TV and BBC South East news. The fire was out by 8am and slowly the emergency workers left and railway teams started the task of getting





the line opened again. I decided to send some photos into the local press and media. Soon camera teams arrived at the station, and there were mentions of the fire and disruption of services throughout the morning on

national tv and radio. My photos were on various media websites and Facebook.

Mid-afternoon, I got a phone call. Would I be happy to do a TV interview on Zoom? So I did, and my photos were on the news, but it was KMTV news so I doubt many saw them. However, all was not lost. BBC South East were still covering the fire in their 630pm show, and finally one of my photos was on the news!

Later it also made the national press on the Daily Express website.

So it turned out my 'Right place, right time' was 5.30 in the morning in Dunton Green.
