

The meeting of Egerton Parish Council was held on Tuesday 5 December 2023 7pm Committee Room, Millennium Hall, Egerton

Present

Cllrs John Lawton, Peter Rawlinson, Jeff Hopkins, Pat Parr, Claire Foinette, Richard Wall, Simon Palmer, and Sonia Young (Clerk).

Cllr Graham Howland resigned in writing to chair John Lawton. Chair John Lawton accepted the resignation with regret. Graham Howland will however continue to assist Egerton Parish Council in his longstanding role as Egerton Parish Council tree warden. The resignation leaves a vacancy for a Cllr. The process for co-option to fill the vacancy Cllr commence in the New Year. Four members of the public were present.

2) Declarations of Interest

Cllr Pat Parr: Neighbour to the Orchard Nurseries site proposed for development.

3) Minutes of the Previous Meeting – 7th November 2023

The minutes were approved and signed as a true record of proceedings.

Proposed: Cllr Richard Wall. **Seconded:** Cllr Jeff Hopkins. **All in agreement**. Cllr Simon Palmer abstained as not present at the November meeting.

4) Matters Arising from 7th November (not covered by the agenda below)

a) **The George Pub**. Roofing works have stopped. A decision by Ashford Borough Council Planning Conservation Officer on the part retrospective planning application is expected by December 26.

b) Renewal of fencing around the cricket field

No quotes received from EPFA.

Action: Cllr Jeff Hopkins to follow this up. The EPFSA have asked for extra bins as there is litter following football matches. Cllrs agreed it would be more appropriate to relocate the bins from the area of the cricket nets to the steps rather than pay for more bins and additional emptying.

e) Repairs to the car park

Work is scheduled to commence 22nd January and last for four days. The School and Pre-school have been alerted to the closure. Residents will be given advance notice in January.

6) Footpaths Report 163 (See Appendix i)

It was confirmed that the addition of steps to the footpath crossing the Canham Homes housing development is against KCC footpaths policy re accessibility. The path was gently sloping or level



before the development and easily accessible. It would also appear that the footpath has been moved without permission to enable longer front gardens to the houses bordering the footpath. The original plans also showed eight steps installed on the footpath, but there are only four which implies that the houses abutting the footpath have been built at a level 0.9m higher than the plans approved.

Action: Cllr Richard Wall will raise the issue with the Borough Councillor and the ABC Planning enforcement team.

7) Highways Report (See Appendix ii)

The clerk also to send details of the broken and worn street signage discovered during the recent clean to Borough Cllr Kayleigh Brunger-Randall so that ABC have the details and can replace them.

8. No applications received

8.1 Planning appeal

The EPC Housing and Development Working Group and the Egerton Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group were both represented at the hearing on 29 November in the Royal Courts of Justice in London to seek permission on appeal for a Judicial Review of the Planning Inspector's decision to allow the development of North Field. The Planning Inspector's decision was contrary to the wishes Egerton residents as expressed by 92% of those who voted in favour of the Neighbourhood Plan. The Plan did not include the development of North Field for speculative development of 13 executive homes that Egerton does not need. As such, Egerton Parish Council felt it had to try its very best to support and protect the wishes of Egerton residents by trying to overturn the Government Planning Inspector's decision by applying via the courts for a Judicial Review.

The barrister acting for the village had carefully argued in court that the Planning Inspector had erred in law by not acknowledging the factors resulting in the unsustainability of the village and thereby not justifying speculative development. Despite the clear argument, the application for leave for a Judicial Review was not granted at this appeal hearing in person.

The majority of all costs of the campaign against the Inspector's decision have been met by very generous private donations. Egerton Parish Council took the view that it was reasonable to bear a small proportion of the legal costs from its budget because a campaign to uphold the views of the 92% of villagers who voted in favour of the Neighbourhood Plan was an important and justified objective. It was more than unfortunate that the efforts were in vain but EPC believed it was reasonable and justified to try and uphold the overall interests of the village.

It was proposed to discuss donations to the Neighbourhood Fighting Fund in a Closed Session.

Proposed: Chair John Lawton. **Seconded:** Vice-Chair Peter Rawlinson. **All in agreement.** Egerton Parish Council will consider how it will communicate the full and proper details of the campaign to protect the village from unwanted development and agreed that comments pedalled on social networks were inaccurate and misleading.

It was agreed that the Neighbourhood Plan remains a robust and valuable document that covers a range of policies and topics of value to the village and aims to facilitate the type of housing the village said it needed: local needs affordable rented housing and private housing designed to meet the needs of older residents.

10) Affordable Housing

Planning permission is awaited for eight plots for affordable homes for local people at G(s)ale Field. These include a pair of semi-detached bungalows for affordable rent by older local people, 4 other semi-detached houses or maisonettes for local people to rent, two homes for shared ownership by local people and one self-build plot which will be sold to offset some of the build costs of the affordable rentable homes. Applicants for the homes will need to be on the ABC Housing Register. Enquiries would be made to English Rural Housing about the procedure, since some local people had already expressed interest.

The outstanding issues below are listed with the KCC Reference, the date reported, the footpath number, the location, the difficulty experienced and the status of action.

- 1. **PROW 210959063.** 10/09/21. AW75 at Heronsdale, Wanden Lane. Egerton resident complaint of overgrowth (brambles) and fence panel leaning towards the footpath. Status: Still Awaiting Allocation.
- 2. PROW211126930. 09/11/21. Part of AW87 to the west of the church behind the Glebeland houses where the path is quite narrow has collapsed due to badger activity. Status: Still Work Scheduled but it is accessible with matting in place until a more permanent solution is found. Status: Still In Progress.
- 3. PROW211117086. 21/11/21. AW64 Footpath opposite Egerton House on Greensand Way in a small wooded area towards the byway up to Coach Road. Two planks missing/broken on the bridge over a small stream. Status: Still Work Added to Forward Maintenance Plan.
- 4. PROW230285561. 07/02/23. AW67. Egerton House Road, next to Willowdene, the 'finger' of the fingerpost at the entrance to this footpath has fallen off the post. Status: Still Work Added to Forward Maintenance Plan.
- 5. PROW230288567. 07/02/23. AW97. Near Frasers on Barhams Mill Road fingerpost is leaning into the hedge. Status: Still Work Added to Forward Maintenance Plan.



- 6. PROW230732955. **28/07/23.** AW96. Barhams Mill Road, before Frasers, on the right-hand side from Egerton village end. Broken stile at the entrance to the footpath from the road. Status: Still Awaiting Allocation.
- 19/10/23. AW81 (Greensand Way) at Stone Hill adjoining the 5-bar gate into the Heathcote's field out to Greenhill Lane. Stile too high (reported to KCC in June 2022 under PROW220641396 and marked as "Resolved – Officer Action" in September 2023)

However, in mid-October a resident raised this issue again. A request was sent on 17th October to the landowner's manager to repair. 21/11/23. <u>Update</u>. The manager emailed to say they had fixed the broken plank and sent a photo but it didn't solve the original complaint which was the top plank was too high for shorter ladies to get over. The manager has been asked if he might get the original problem sorted.

8. 27/10/23. AW92. New Road – Canham Homes Development. Builders have started to install wooden steps to connect the public right of way footpath at the New Road end of the site and the new path for residents. This leads ramblers/dog walkers out to the orchards and is there because the levels of the field have changed quite markedly from being completely flat from that end of the field to the other at the orchards end. Residents raised this because if the wooden ones are to be permanent, they look slippery in wet weather and have no handrail and it would be appropriate for the builders to install a graded path or put in proper stone steps in.

31/10/2023. Canham Homes emailed for a reply. On 14/11/2023 they responded that "for safety reasons the steps will be finished with a handrail on both sides".

<u>NEW</u>: **PROW231147996.** 13/11/2023. AW92, as above. Matter reported to KCC so that in the event of problems later on KCC will be aware.

16/11/2023. The following reply from KCC:

"I inspected the steps in question and made some enquiries with the developer. Firstly, I noticed the steps were made from high pressure treated timber, which should last at least 20 years. There is a drop in the ground, and we would prefer steps to a slope as it would be safer—we felt concrete steps would look unsightly and although the whole development is not ideal for the locals, the wooden steps are far more pleasing on the eye. The developer has agreed to fit handrails, anti-slip bars on the steps and in relation to future maintenance, the steps will be covered by the land management company for which the residents will have to pay a service charge. It's still a work in progress and I will keep a watchful eye on things."

23/11/23. A 0illow up letter was sent to KCC, and they replied to say it had been saved on the file for AW92 file and would be discussed with the manager.
