BROADBAND Update

We are delighted to announce that Acol has achieved its target for Broadband Voucher pledges, meaning that development of our Fibre-To-The-Premises (Household) infrastructure will soon get underway. Once completed it will deliver reliability and speeds measured in hundreds of megabits per second, rather than the patchy double-digit (if you're lucky) performance we currently experience.

Openreach will now submit our pledges to the Government Department of Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS), which will email households requesting their confirmation by clicking a hyperlink. (See Parish Council Minutes for more details)

We are aware of some people who indicated their intentions to pledge but haven't yet done so. The Openreach Community Fibre Partnership webpage will remain available for new pledges throughout the development so further households can commit, as required. The more households we add, the more resilient our project becomes - benefiting our whole community in terms not just of broadband connectivity but in associated benefits such as property value!

We will continue to report progress online and in Village Voice but, as ever, Richard and Karen will be happy to field any queries.

ACOL PARISH COUNCIL

Draft Minutes of the Meeting of the Council held at the Village Hall, Acol, at 11.00am on 13th January 2020.

Present: Cllrs Miss S. Bransfield (Chairman), D. Hayfield, J. Inchley and Mrs. I. Osborne. Also present: Cllr. T. Roper (TDC), Roy Wade (Clerk) & 8 residents.

62. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs. Ms. Dawson & Pugh, PCSO Ms. Debbie Forsyth, KCC Warden Tony Gander and Ray Owen.

63. MINÚTES

The Minutes of the meeting 2nd December 2019 were approved and signed by the Chairman.

- 64. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST
 - There were no disclosures of interest.
- 65 REPORT OF POLICE/COMMUNITY WARDEN/PCSO's.

No officers were in attendance to report.

66. REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

The Chairman reported upon the following:

- Planning application for a Perfume Factory in the Walled Garden. It appeared on the Weekly Planning List in March as "Garden Cottage, Minster Road, Monkton, Ramsgate" which did not stand out as being at the top of our Minster Road so it was missed. It was approved in November. The Parish Council will write to TDC to request that they notify neighbouring villages of a planning application that will impact upon them.
- There was a mixed response to the approval of additional retail units by Minster Services and McDonalds, but relief it will not become a site for travellers.
- Stagecoach have now responded to our request for a courtesy stop and have sent a letter to Mrs Ann Murray with this statement:

"In certain areas there are no designated bus stops. In those areas buses will stop on request where it is safe to do so. Customers should pick a point away from parked cars, road junctions etc and give a clear signal in good time to the driver of the vehicle. When you come to alight you should ring the bell once in good time to alert the driver.

We have reiterated the importance of this instruction to our drivers."

67. RECREATION GROUND - PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

Cllr. Hayfield reported further upon the proposed improvement to the play area to modernise it and on discussions with some residents who favoured the installation of a see saw instead of a carousel. The equipment would cost £1,200.00 and there would be the cost of removing the wooden climbing frame and the placement of the see saw. The total cost of purchase and installation would be met from the £2,000 now approved within the budget for 2020-2021

RESOLVED: the report and proposals of Cllr. Hayfield be approved and the see saw purchased and erected in the Spring.

68. DRAFT BUDGET 2020/21

RESOLVED: that the draft budget in the sum of £7,490.00 be approved and a precept of £5,500.00 be requested from TDC.

68. INTERNAL AUDIT OF PARISH COUNCIL'S FINANCIAL RECORDS

The report of the Internal Audit was still awaited. The Clerk to report once the report has been received.

69. PARISH WEBSITE/BROADBAND

Richard Steel introduced Tim Clarkson from Openreach who attended our meeting to discuss the planned Community Broadband Partnership. Tim is an Openreach Customer Field Manager and currently has around 80 such projects on the go. Although 95% of the UK now has broadband provision that's considered to be adequate (with speeds of 30 mbps or more) the Community Partnership programme is enabling coverage for harder to reach communities such as ours. So far, 800 such communities have been provided for.

The timescale for our provision should be within 12 months, and there should not be too much disruption from the works. Existing infrastructure will be used so far as possible – and Tim confirmed that existing services will be unaffected so those who do not need fast broadband service will be able to continue with their existing suppliers.

The new FTTP (Fibre to the Premise) infrastructure will provide each home with its own connection from the Exchange, with speeds measured in 100s of mbps rather than the current single digit speeds experienced in the south of Acol, with much greater reliability. Although, at present it appears that BT is the only current Acol broadband supplier that can provide service across the new network, as previously reported, the expectation is that as fibre infrastructure develops more providers will come onboard.

The latest monitoring indicates that UK fibre coverage has just reached 11%, so our community can now look forward to changing from a fast broadband laggard to being among the frontrunners!

70. CLERK'S REPORT

Parish Elections – Members were advised that TDC had responded to the Parish Council's concerns in respect of the invoice received in the sum of £232.38 from TDC in respect of elections held on 2 May 2019.

TDC had stated that although the Parish Council had not been charged for elections since 2003 they should have been and further insisted that the invoice now presented should be paid. **RESOLVED: That the invoice in the sum of £232.38 be now paid.**

THERE'S A NEW PEST IN TOWN

There is a new pest arriving on our shores called the **ASIAN HORNET**. It arrived in southern France only a few years ago when a hibernating Queen is believed to have been in terracotta pots imported from China. It very quickly spread across France before it was realised it was decimating colonies of honeybees. Its main prey throughout the summer is the honeybee. When it finds a colony, it patrols in front of the entrance and picks the bees off as they return laden with nectar. It decapitates the bee and takes it back to its nest to feed to the larva. When it has weakened the colony sufficiently it enters the nest and finishes it off. This is not only a threat to honeybees but to all pollinating insects.

The Asian Hornet was found in the West Country about two and a half years ago. Since then several nests have been found and destroyed. Two years ago one was found in a distribution centre in Scotland. In April 2018 one was discovered in Lancashire in a cauliflower transported from Lincolnshire!

Last year on Jersey a man almost died from Asian Hornet stings when he disturbed the nest whilst cutting a hedge.

This insect is about the same size or a little smaller than our native European Hornet (which is no threat to us or the insect world). It is dark almost black in colour with an orange face, the lower part of the legs is yellow and there is a thin yellow line on the first segment of the abdomen and the fourth segment is yellow/orange. It builds a primary nest about the size of a tennis ball low down before moving to a larger nest, up to 90cm, higher up normally in trees (although in Jersey it was discovered in old buildings).

In Autumn 2018 two Asian Hornets were found at Dungeness believed to have been blown by strong winds. Last year, they were found in Hampshire and Staffordshire. Worryingly the latest confirmed sighting was at Ashford late last year.

A Pilates class, led by Kim - a Physiotherapist, is due to start on the 10th February in Acol Village Hall. Classes will run every Monday from 9.30-10.30. There will be a maximum of 10 people per class to ensure correct technique.

Pilates is a great way to improve posture and manage persistent spinal conditions and tone muscle - it is often recommended by a health professional as a management technique if pain is chronic and/or cannot be cured. All are welcome; from novices to advanced, all ages, shapes, sizes and genders. You get to know your regular class attendees.

Pilates originates from Joseph Pilates, who developed "Contrology" - a way to rehabilitate himself through working "core" or what I call posture, muscles; the muscles deep in the torso, close to your skeleton, which hold you in an upright position, meaning your body can work at it's optimal efficiency (Hargrove, T., 2010). This is something I feel is very relevant in today's society considering our generally sedentary lifestyles; working in offices, or similar. Core, or posture, muscles are also very important in any activity, - particularly sport - where power is needed from the muscles further from the torso. This is because the core muscles provide stability so that power and strength can come for the muscles on the surface. Finally, it is a great way in which to keep your body aligned symmetrically; misalignment will mean your body is not working efficiently and one side of your body will be more prone to injury.

The first class will cost £5 as a trial offer. Subsequent classes will be £10 on a "pay as you go" basis There is also an option to book a block of 4 classes for £30 (which need to be used within a 2-month period). Mats will be provided but they are welcome to bring their own for extra comfort. Just wear something you can move easily in.
