



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH Fred Carter

Community Policing Teams.

The name will be changing shortly to Neighbourhood Teams. Newbury and Thatcham will each have an Inspector, one Sergeant and 8 Police Constables. Newbury will have 3 Police Community Support Officers (PCSO's) and Thatcham will have 2. The Neighbourhood Policing areas in Newbury will be Speen and Shaw to include Donnington, Clayhill, Greenham and Wash Common.

PCSO's are members of the Police staff who are employed, managed and tasked by the Police. They wear Police-type uniforms. They will compliment the work of Police Officers by providing highly visible patrols and tackling "quality of life" issues in communities such as anti-social behaviour,



confiscating alcohol and tobacco from young people and environmental issues such as vehicle obstruction. They will be able to issue fixed penalties. Their work frees up time for Police officers to concentrate on tackling more serious crime and disorder issues.

PSCO's will play an important part in the Forces neighbourhood policing teams.

Junk Mail and Telephone Calls.

If you are under siege from unwanted junk mail, e-mails, faxes or telephone calls register with the Direct Marketing Association (DMA) to get them stopped.

For unwanted telephone calls:

Contact DMA, Telephone Preference Services - Telephone 0207 291 3320 or 0800 398 893.....or WWW. tpsonline.org.uk . The service is free of charge but only lasts 6 months, so you will have to renew this regularly. It takes 28 days to come into effect.

You can also register for Silent Call Guard which will block your telephone number for 1 month at a time, so that you do not receive silent calls. To register and re-register each month, phone 870 444 3969

Finally the majority of Insurance Companies are now quoting in their policies that whenever a building is left unattended, all windows and doors must be closed and locked and the keys must not be visible from the outside. Do not leave keys in doors, on a keyrack or within easy reach of a door or window...If you do your insurance could be invalid.



WEST ILSLEY TENNIS COURT

I have to report another good year for the court. We've
had no vandalism this year apart from some litter and a
broken bottle thrown onto the court and coke cans left
round the perimeter. The court surface and tennis
lining are in excellent condition; the fencing is sound
and unblemished and weed control on the court is
satisfactory. There is, however, work to be done on
the court surrounds where thorn bushes and nettles
tend to proliferate.

The court bench has finally met its demise and
according to John the carpenter is beyond regeneration
that applies to the bench and not to John. However,
we've raided the cash box and bought another bench.
A solid looking affair (although in soft wood) from
Chilton Garden Centre that was reduced from £130 to
£100 in a recent sale. With prompt preservation
treatment this should last us for a number of years.
We thank the village fete committee for their donation
of £150 and as they donated the original bench we
intend to retrieve the brass plaque and transfer it to the
new bench.

Last year, the income from Tennis court fees was
£320, together with a show committee donation of
£150. Our expenditure was £50 for Cricket Club grass
cutting, £25 for Booking Clerk's honorarium and £20 for
weedkiller which has yet to be organised. This gave us
a profit for the year of £375. Our total income stands at
£1,027.93 – less £100 for the recent purchase of the
bench.

We now come to the future of tennis court and I must
reiterate what I've said for the last two years. The
present committee have served the court for the last 20
years or so and now wish to retire. We need some
young blood to take over, preserve the court as an
Open Court for all to play on and maybe expand its

facilities for the future. Jackie Atkins and I remain as Guarantors to the Court and naturally we would relinquish that responsibility also. I hope for a good response from interested parties.

Meanwhile, the court is now open and fees remain the same as last year. £2 per hour for adults and £1 per hour for children.

Finally, the court surface has been swept; it is not immaculate, but satisfactory to play on. We have decided not to have the court professionally cleaned this year at a cost of £320 +vat ie some £376. One of the reasons for this, other than the financial outlay, is that Southern Electric have contracted to top the fir trees this year where the cables cross the court with tree debris on the court this would negate any professional cleaning done. I am satisfied we can happily delay this for a further year.

Camp Out report

25th and 26th June

Once again many village children and their families took part in the Camp Out. About 35-40 enjoyed an afternoon of fun in the woods involving a teddy bear's picnic for the under 5's, Camp fire building and wood collecting for the 5-8yr olds and an orienteering



adventure trek for the 8+ group. Then the real camping started as tents and parents arrived. Our camp site of 20 tents was perfect, as was the weather, bar a quick shower and we all enjoyed a family BBQ and more fun in the woods. After an early start, cooked breakfast was most welcome and after some more games we returned to the village dirty and tired.

Many thanks to the Carlisle family for the use of the woods and to the The Village Hall Committee and our helpers (especially Philip Knight, Tony Scriven, Ross Studholme, Dan Whidborne and many others) who made it happen.

CRIME REPORT

Our thanks to PC Andrew Buckingham (Hungerford Police 08458 505 505) who emails us with his NWN article, from which we extract items which may be valuable in keeping villagers alert to what's going on in the area:

28 June

Overnight between last Saturday and Sunday a shed was broken into High Street Chieveley. Thieves stole a steam cleaner and a quantity of diesel.

Between 2pm and 2.30pm last Saturday offenders forced the lock to the shed door located at the rear of the Village Hall Leckhampstead. Did you see anyone hanging around the village hall that afternoon?

21 June

PC Alan Wilkinson is dealing with a number of burglaries where garden machinery and power tools have been stolen. He asked me to mention that on several occasions prior to the theft a strange vehicle has stopped in the vicinity, possibly doing a quick 'reconnoitre' and when challenged the driver has given a feeble excuse for his presence. If you do see anything you think even remotely suspicious please report it.

7 June

Between 10.30am and 1.50pm on Friday a burglary occurred in Front Street East Garston. Recovered nearby was a stolen Bedford van items from which were seen to be loaded into a white Transit van which then made off. We are keen to trace the white transit, did you see anything suspicious in the village that morning?

31 May

At 11pm on Wednesday 25th May an assault took place in woodland at Smithy Site in the village

of Farnborough. The offender described as a white male with a tanned complexion, 5'8" tall, stocky build with large arms and shaven black hair which was slightly longer on top, got out of a small red car, approached and assaulted two males who were walking a dog. It looked like Martin Johnson chasing Willy Carson! Two minutes later, out flew the owl again hotly followed by the blackie. What a racket! I guess that the smaller bird was protecting some offspring and little different to a Spitfire out-maneuvring a Wellington bomber. It was quite an extraordinary performance to watch, though.

Anke and John Summerhill are moving on from West Ilsley. They are heading for Barcelona with Nienke and Meryl (Digby left for Holland yonks ago). Although I haven't seen a huge amount of Anke recently, every time I have we seem to carry on where we left off the last time (it always seems to be over the smelly wheelie-bin on a Friday). What is more concerning is just how it can be improved to make the roads everywhere, as well as West Ilesley, safer. Using the roads should be about consideration, common sense and safety as much as enforcement and big brother watching what we're doing. The B. B. approach means people braking as they see a speed camera; safe driving means you should be driving at an appropriate speed past hazards and other road users.
