Wild Oxfordshire - Water Report

We are pleased to share with you our water quality summary report for 2021-2022, though it doesn't make for great reading. The incredible data collected by volunteers is now the biggest contributor to water quality monitoring in the catchment and is showing that sewage effluent is the main cause of poor water quality in the Evenlode.

Water is the basis of life. Our rivers are facing significant challenges from pollution, physical modifications, climate, over-abstraction and the Evenlode is no exception. Many of the streams flowing into this river, as well as the river itself, have been affected by poorly treated wastewater, spills and agricultural runoff. This has led to the loss of biodiversity, habitats and ecological services.

The Evenlode Catchment Partnership (ECP) is led by Wild Oxfordshire and brings together partners from across the catchment including members of the Evenlode community, Thames Water Utilities, the Environment Agency and Earthwatch Europe; all working towards improving the catchment for the benefit of wildlife and people.

Solar System goes live at Village Hall

We are very pleased to now be generating solar energy at the Village Hall provided by 46 panels on the rear roof next to the play area. This will potentially provide up to 60% of our electricity usage. The panels have been inset and we have saved the tiles we removed either to sell on or reuse if we need them in the future. We are very pleased with JoJu Oxford, our supplier, and look forward to the next stage in early October when the 2 large batteries arrive and we will be able to store the excess energy generated. Any surplus both now and after the batteries are full, is being fed into the grid with a small financial return to the hall funds.

Our thanks go to the Parish Council, who have hosted the contract and also secured the S106 planning obligation funds from recent housing developments in the village. We have topped this up with our fundraising efforts to cover the final bill and should recover this with savings on our electricity bills over the next 18 months or so, based on how much energy we are predicted to generate.

Page Three Bird - Song Thrush



Meet IIIain (three-an), a Song Thrush from the UK, fresh from a successful appearance at Toast Festival where he headlined with Ronald Stevens and Emu Dreams.

The song thrush is a popular garden songbird whose numbers declined by 54% between 1970 and 2010. Their conservation status is amber (of moderate concern), but there is good news – they moved from red to amber status recently.

The song thrush's habit of repeating song phrases distinguish it from the blackbird. Their repertoire can consist of 100 or more distinct phrases, including mimicry of other birds and sounds such as car alarms. As a 21st century song thrush, IIIain creates a melody of low-fly chill hop beats inspired by nature and his love of the English countryside; the perfect accompaniment to a balmy summer evening with a rhubarb and blackberry gin.

When IIIain isn't practising his set or recording a new album for Spotify he likes to eat snails which he breaks into by smashing them against a stone with a flick of the head - he's been spending too much time with Wiggly Tim!

What we can do to help:

- Maintain or restore damp areas of pasture, woodland, or ground; this will encourage earthworms and snails, a vital part of the song thrush's diet
- Avoid management of hedgerows between March and August to protect nesting song thrushes
- Save some blackberries for our feathered friends to pick too

Fruity Tea Loaf

22nd September is World Hobbit Day, which celebrates the birthdays of Bilbo and Frodo Baggins. Why not throw a hobbit party: rustle up some tasty morsels, grab yourself some Old Toby, and sit back whilst your dwarf friends raid your pantry.

If you're feeling especially hobbit-like you could go barefoot in honour of our favourite little people.

This tasty tea loaf is perfect after second breakfast with a mug of tea made with the finest Shire tea leaves.

Ingredients: (serves 12 slices)

150g sultanas

150g raisins

300ml freshly made tea (using 2 tea bags)

250g plain flour

2 tsp baking powder

200g soft light brown sugar

1 tsp mixed spice

2 tbsp unsalted butter, melted

2 large eggs

Method:

- Place the sultanas and raisins in a bowl and pour over the hot tea.
 Cover and allow to soak up the liquid overnight.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 170°C. Line a 2lb loaf tin with baking parchment or a loaf tin liner.
- 3 Combine the flour, baking powder, sugar and mixed spice in a mixing bowl and stir together.
- 4. Mix in the melted butter and eggs using a wooden spoon or spatula.
- 5. Add in the raisins, sultanas and any liquid left in the bowl.
- Stir together until everything is thoroughly combined. It will be a very wet mixture.
- 7. Spoon the mixture into the lined loaf tin, place in the oven and bake for 1 hour to 1 hour 15 minutes, or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Cover with foil if the top is starting to look too dark.
- Once cooked, remove from the oven and leave to cool in the tin for 10 minutes. Then remove from the tin and allow to cool completely on a wire rack before slicing and serving.
