HOLSWORTHY WALK AND TALK

Last month our walks took us to Sheepwash, Efford Down, Bude and the Ruby Way out to Hollacombe, together with several other locations. The sunshine brought out an array of sun hats, sunscreen and plenty of water and helped to enhance the scenery with colourful and aromatic flowers and blossoms along the way. At Bude we slightly changed our usual route to avoid the recently started works to relocate the Watch Tower by accessing the Down via Vicarage Road and then through Efford Farm. This was a new route to most people and made for an easier climb up onto the clifftops, where we had lovely views across the sea and also Northwards to the GCHQ radio dishes at Morwenstow.

Our walk along the Ruby Way took us to Hollacombe Church. Margaret Stacey, who frequently joins our walks is the organist at the Church gave us the opportunity of a look inside. One of her colleagues had been researching the history of the Church and she was able to pass on some interesting information about the various stained-glass windows and what the scenes were depicting. Some 40 years ago the Church suffered from a severe case of dry rot which meant that most of the woodwork had to be replaced and the historic pews were lost. The short tower, which has a saddleback roof, one of only 6 in the South West, has 3 bells. They can't be used at the moment due to the bell frame needing strengthening works, but it is hoped that this can be remedied in the next few years. Margaret also provided some cold drinks, which were much appreciated before we continued with the rest of the walk.

It has been very pleasant to take advantage of the shade given by the Pavilion in Stanhope Park whilst refreshing ourselves with coffee and biscuits after our Walk in the Park. Over the three days of the end of May bank holiday Holsworthy Cricket Club celebrated their 150th anniversary with a 'Festival of Cricket'. Stanhope Park, and the Pavilion, were host to live music, food, drinks, children's entertainments and, of course, lots of cricket.

If you would like to join us on any of our walks and find interesting snippets of local history or spectacular views amongst all the physical and psychological benefits of walking in a group then please come along.

We walk on Mondays and Fridays. All walks start at 10.30 am and are **FREE.** Membership forms are available from our Volunteer Walk Leaders prior to the start of the walk.
