

Suddenly we're in a new ward



Well, it's not all that sudden, really. Electoral boundaries in Ashford Borough have been under review for some time. But the new Ward boundaries have now been finalised, and for the Local Government elections in May of this year we shall be voting for a Councillor for Upper Weald. Instead of Downs West.

As these boundaries have now been finalised, there's nothing any of us can do to change them. The only aspects of the changes still available for comment is the location of the polling station, and as that is still Hothfield Village Hall, it's unlikely any of us will be demanding changes.

The map above shows that in future we in Hothfield will no longer be voting along-side Westwell and Challock. Instead, we are partnered with Little Chart, Pluckley and Charing Heath. Coincidentally, this keeps us well in line with the new Church

Parish arrangements. The seven ecclesiastical parishes of the G7 Benefice will (if plans go ahead) in future function as a single Parish. This, it must be emphasised, is simply a matter of organisation within the Church of England, and will make no practical difference to the people of Hothfield.

Interestingly, the new Ward boundaries include Little Chart and, within Little Chart, Calehill House, which is named after an older subdivision of Kent called the Hundred of Calehill; and the new Church parish is to be called the Parish of Calehill with Westwell (For administrative purposes, Westwell will be separate).

However, while the new Ward boundary will make a real difference to Hothfield, the new Church parish won't. We will still have a Parish Church, and it will still be Saint Margaret's, Hothfield.

MARCH ON HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS

Water, the stuff of life and part of the magic of the Heathlands. There wasn't much water around in summer 2018, even the little tributary of the Great Stour became a trickle. Reserve Warden lan Rickards reports that last summer was the first time he remembers there not being ANY standing water in the main bog - usually these pools are full of rare dragonflies, fighting over breeding territory; last summer they were empty. The result of the dry weather last summer and over December and January is empty pools this February, which is not normal and will have an impact on the wildlife as it emerges in the spring. Longer-term impacts are that the big sandy Tolls (hills) are not filling with water, and therefore not able to provide the constant supply of water that would keep the bogs wet through the summer.

The bogs have formed over thousands of years because the valley bottoms on the reserve are clay, causing springs to emerge where the upper sandy layer of soil meets the watertight clay, and impeding quick drainage of that water. The bog on the slope below Cade Road where the water trickles very gently downhill is more acid than the lower bogs. The water surface can look oily; this isn't due to run-off from an oil spill, or even from fabled military tanks, it's due to high levels of iron deposits in the sandy soil, which reacts with water to produce the

The wetland near to Chapel Road and Lakeside Village is very different; fed by a different water supply (underground reservoirs on the chalk downs), it becomes a habitat for amphibians that can't tolerate the conditions in the more acid bogs. This area, dominated by grasses, sedges and flowers such as ragged robin and water mint, is categorised as fen. The pools near Chapel Lane still

have sheets of heavy plastic in places to smother out the highly invasive Crassula helmsii, New Zealand pigmy weed, which in the New forest has done millions of pounds' worth of damage.

Twelve species of sphagnum moss occur here; identification often requires dissection under a microscope. The plants soak up more than eight times their own weight, thanks to the large waterholding dead cells that lie alongside the tiny living cells containing the chlorophyll for making food from water, sunlight and carbon dioxide. The large dead cells are what makes the moss a sponge, retaining water long after the surrounding soil has dried out, and they are also structural, enabling the moss to spring back into shape when trodden on by animals. The underside of the mossy layer only partially decays without oxygen in the water, while the growing moss continues piling up on top of itself each year, absorbing water and lifting the water level. Imperceptibly, the compacted layers of decayed moss increase by perhaps a millimetre a year and acid bog is formed. Peat is one of the most efficient stores of carbon dioxide; around the globe it holds more carbon than all the rainforests combined. The peat at Hothfield is only I - I.5 m deep, while bogs in wetter areas such as Ireland are 10 -15m deep. Peat in a compost bag could have destroyed 100 years of peat formation.

These ponds, bog and fen attract a complex community of interdependent plants, insects, animals and birds; they are legally protected because more than 90% of the bogs in England have been damaged or destroyed, and these are the only such bogs in Kent. Water is one of the best elements to provide for wildlife, in any size of garden, and can quickly become a valuable complex habitat. If combined with a bit of bog garden they



attract more wildlife than each habitat on its own.

Hothfield Heathlands is open to everyone. Please keep dogs in check especially around children and animals, and clean up, including in the Triangle compartment. Trails are signposted and marked on entrance maps, along with the location of livestock. The noticeboard down the main slope from the Cades Road

car park gives recent wildlife sightings. For email alerts on the location of the livestock on Hothfield contact Ian Rickards on 01622 662012 ian.rickards@kentwildlife.org.uk.

Hothfield Angling Club

John and Clare Nicholls' daughter Diane has donated a number of items to the History Society from the village's past. As well as a collection of John's trophies for fishing, darts and shortmat bowls, she has given us a box of the Hothfield and District's Angling Club trophies.

There's a range of wooden shields, cups and other trophies for the 'heaviest one day's catch', 'heaviest roach' and the 'breakwater trophy' amongst many others.

The club's account book and minute book were also in the archive. It looks as if the club was very small but well financed with lots of trophies and tankards for numerous winners each year.



The Angling Club seems to have been formed in 1973 and was wound up in 1993 when its final balance of £55.93 was donated to the Lifeboat Institution. There don't seem to have been many members but they organised lots of dances and presentation nights in the village hall, with live bands and discos. In 1982 the Minutes recorded: "a member who was seen fishing in the close season could rejoin the Club with a severe warning as to his future conduct", but the records don't tell us who that was!


