

Misson has a Pop-Up Village Bakery! Lots of volunteers are busy making thank you parcels for the many keyworkers who are keeping our country going. Parcels typically contain a home-made something, a sachet of instant latte or a tea bag and ~ by far the most appreciated thing ~ a handwritten thank you note and "a hug from the villagers of Misson". These Misson Hugs then find their way to frontline NHS workers, teachers, police officers, carers, supermarket workers, pharmacies, district nurses, charity workers, posties, delivery drivers and so far, 319 individual hugs have been delivered. This project is co-ordinated by Mandy Walker 07974139662, and she regularly posts stories of the wonderful feedback received from the recipients of these very thoughtful gestures. For as long as we are permitted to take our hour of exercise outside our own homes and gardens, there is a weekly Treasure Trail every Monday, in and around Misson Village, for all ages. The first clue is always on the Post Box on the Village Green.

Our parish has a large number of working farms. Due to current circumstances, they are reporting an increase in dog walkers not keeping on the paths and an increase in dogs off the lead. Lambing season is here and farmers don't want the sheep worrying. Recently, a loose dog ran into a cattle corral where the farmers were vaccinating the heifers. This caused the heifers to panic which is very dangerous for animals and people. Whilst incidents like this are not at all frequent, the last thing we need is a preventable accident. Farmers are doing a great job of self isolating in their teams and don't need us tramping over fields chasing loose dogs. The farmers are essential workers look after livestock and crops which in turn feed us. Also, please be respectful of river paths and those along the flood banks as there has been a significant increase in littering and dog poo (both in and out of bags) which makes things unpleasant for people and poses a risk to livestock.
