REPORTED CRIMES OF INTEREST FOR THE BASSETLAW EAST EVERTON/ BECKINGHAM BEAT AREA – NOVEMBER 2017.

The Everton/ Beckingham beat area includes the following villages and hamlets – Misson, Misson Springs, Newington, Scaftworth, Harwell, Everton, Gringley on the Hill, Walkeringham, Saundby and Beckingham.

The crimes of interest – incidents of burglary, criminal damage and thefts – reported for the beat area between 01/11/2017 and 30/11/2017 were –

Burglary Dwelling – 2 (Beckingham and Misterton).

Burglary Other – 2 (Everton and Scaftworth).

Theft of Motor Vehicle – 1 (Newington).

Theft from Motor Vehicle – 2 (Walkeringham and Misson).

Theft Other – 6 (Gringley on the Hill x2, Beckingham x2, Misson and Everton).

Criminal Damage to a Dwelling – 1 (Walkeringham).

Criminal Damage to a Motor Vehicle – 2 (Beckingham x2).

Criminal Damage Other – 3 (Everton x3).

This month there has been nineteen reported crimes of interest across the whole beat area. This compares with seven crimes reported throughout November 2017 and fifteen crimes reported over the same period last year.

There has been a noticeable spike in reported burglary dwelling crimes across rural East Bassetlaw in December 2017. This reminded me of a similar period in early January 2015 where the parishes of Beckingham and Walkeringham, in particular, were targeted. Offenders were arrested for those crimes.

In relation to recent burglary dwellings across East Bassetlaw, and further afield, a teenager and a man have been charged following ten burglaries in the north Nottinghamshire area. The burglaries occurred between December 7th and 15th in Winkburn, Gamston, Norton, Woodbeck, Retford, Rampton, Bothamsall, Coates and Sturton le Steeple.

A sixteen year old boy and a twenty three year old man were arrested and taken into custody on December 15th and later charged with conspiracy to commit burglary. The sixteen year old was

released on bail, while the older male was remanded in custody, both to appear at Nottingham Crown Court on Monday, January 15th.

A Police spokesman said investigations are continuing and officers are looking for a further three men in relation to these offences. Anyone with information is asked to call Nottinghamshire Police on 101.

Following the Christmas period and, in some cases, visits to January sales events, please be careful in how you dispose of unwanted packaging. Do not advertise to criminals what new items have been purchased to enhance the look of your home.

Some auto crimes are being reported across adjoining beat areas, and historically across this one, which could be prevented by adopting basic security measures around vehicles.

Vehicles are still being left insecure overnight and, in a lot of cases, items, which are attractive to criminals, are being left inside on full view to the same.

There are criminals out and about who randomly visit villages in order to check on vehicle insecurities. They will try door handles of vehicles of vehicles parked on the public highway or on private driveways.

Some vehicles, particularly in the colder weather, are being left with the keys in the ignition and the engine running. These instances might only be occurring for very short periods of time, such as when visiting the local shop or, indeed, when collecting the vehicle from a garaged area. Criminals only need a very short period of time to steal vehicles when opportunities such as these arise. Some criminals will monitor individuals' movements and habits before targeting their vehicles. Please do not be caught out as the consequences could be a long and stressful claim to the insurance company who may not honour the same due to the circumstances.

This month there has been nine reported incidents of anti-social behaviour across the whole beat area. This compares with six reported incidents for November 2017 and eight reported for the same month in 2016. The anti-social behaviour umbrella covers a wide range of incident types including hoax calls to the emergency services, found/ abandoned vehicles and wildlife/ animal issues.

The control room continue to receive reports from community members of sightings of suspicious persons, vehicles and activity across the beat area. These calls are important to us all and do help in keeping reported crime figures relatively low across the beat area.
