

#### Dear Friends,

I am one of those who "never does today that which he can put off until tomorrow." I am not a planner, a scheduler but I react and often 'fire from the hip'. This way of living is not a choice but it is just who I am. Today it has paid off. Today is the deadline for me to write this piece for you and the thoughts that were going round in my mind are not those you will see before you because Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second died yesterday. I am sat in my study feeling very empty, sad and somewhat forlorn. Today we tolled the bell for an hour and gathered in church for some prayers. I listened to HM King Charles the Third give his first address to us.

I know it is not universal, but she, over her long reign, has managed to keep the respect of her people to a far greater degree than all other national institutions. I wonder why that is? The church is not respected – to most, it is probably irrelevant. The police, education, doctors, almost every group I can think of, are not held in the esteem they were when the Queen came to the throne.



I think that it is all down to the way that Her Majesty conducted herself. We seem to instinctively know that she was genuine to the core. Integrity personified. When she swore, publicly, to serve us, that is what she did. She led through sacrificial service.

She said it herself, and it has been commented on by others, that she was fundamentally shaped by her Christian faith – she was the head of the Church of England. She was guided by her belief that as Jesus came to serve His people, she was called by God to serve hers and like Christ she did it by loving us.

As we reflect on her gift of her service to us, it is an opportunity for each of us to reflect on what we think our purpose is in this, our all too short, life. What values and beliefs are we committed to?



I was warmed by King Charles's address to us. He affirmed his commitment to serve us in the manner of his mother.

#### **RECIPE - MALVERN PUDDING**

Malvern pudding is a Georgian pudding from the town of Malvern in Worcestershire. It is a baked dish made with apples and a custard.

In 2010, it was listed as one of the ten most 'threatened puddings' after a survey conducted by UKTB Food – it is a good way to use some of your apples and makes a change from crumble!

#### **Ingredients**

450g (1lb) cooking apples 25g (1oz) butter 25g (1oz) sugar grated rind of one lemon

**For the sauce**25g (1oz) butter
25 (1oz) flour **Topping**50g (2oz) demerara sugar
1 x 5ml sp (1tsp) cinnamon

450ml (3/4pt)milk 25g (1oz) sugar 1 egg beaten

Peel core and slice the apples. Put in a pan with the butter and sugar and cook slowly, covered until soft.

Remove from heat and stir in the lemon rind. Spread in a 900ml (1 1/2pt) oven proof dish

Put the butter, flour and milk for the sauce in a pan and cook gently, stirring all the time until the sauce has thickened; cook for a further 2 minutes.

Remove from the heat and stir in the sugar and beaten egg. Return to the low heat and cook gently for a further 1 minute; pour the sauce over the apple mixture.

Mix together the demerara sugar and cinnamon and sprinke over the top. Place under a hot grill until the sugar has caramelised. Serve hot or cold.



#### MEMORIES OF HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II



#### The Coronation

In 1953, I was amongst the 27 million people in the UK - out of the 36 million population. - who watched Queen Elizabeth's Coronation on television not counting the 11 million who listened on the radio. I was 4 years old, living in a coal mining village in the North East of England.

My parents had bought a Bush 14" black and white television especially for the event, at an extortionate cost of 60 Guineas (one Guinea equalled one pound and one shilling) which is equivalent to approximately £1,400 today. Of course, all the neighbours came into our house to watch and my poor mother spent her time making tea and providing cakes. It's a good job

she was a member of the WI (Women's Institute) and knew how to bake a sponge cake using 1 egg. In 1953 rationing was still in force – it did not end until 4<sup>th</sup> July 1954.

In 1960, the Queen visited a new town near where I lived, called Peterlee in Co. Durham. As she was scheduled to be driven past the end of our village towards Durham City, the whole school was given the day off to stand and watch her. As she was driven past and waved to the waiting crowds, it seemed as though she was waving to each of us individually. My write up of the event was published in the school's newsletter.

However, all was not lost, I won the large jar of sweets by guessing the number inside correctly.

#### In Brunei and Saudi Arabia

Towards the end of our 2 year time there, Her Majesty came to visit Brunei. We were told that she would be travelling in her Royal Yacht, so we went down to see them coming into the Brunei River with a fine Band playing on the deck. Phillida and I were invited to meet her Majesty at the house of the British Representative. The female guests had to get the necessary outfits to wear, in a hurry from Hong Kong. The Royal Party included Her Majesty, The Duke of Edinburgh, Earl Mountbatten and Princess Anne and Princess Anne's Lady in Waiting. We all lined up on a red carpet, and shook the Royal Party's hands.

Saudi Arabia - I went to Saudi Arabia, as Binnies' representative in the country, in 1976. In 1978 Her Majesty arrived in Riyadh by Concorde. By this time our children were going to informal schools, and our daughter was selected to give Her Majesty a posy of flowers. She did this well. The next excitement was for all the British representatives, and their wives, to meet Her Majesty on the Royal Yacht. We all arrived and waited for the Queen to finish her meeting with the Saudi Arabian leading Member of Government. Her Majesty waved to him from the deck and then it was time for the British representatives to go on aboard. We climbed up and came to the entrance to the deck. There was a bright light and suddenly we realised that we were shaking hands with Her Majesty. As we went on deck we were met by members of the crew, with trays of drinks. Since we were strictly no longer in Saudi Arabia, alcoholic drinks were provided! We watched the "beating of the retreat" on the dock, the band came aboard, and we were all hurried down to the dock, and watched as the Royal Yacht departed.



At the time of writing, the windows and doors have been put in and the interior of the building is starting to reveal the space it will become. Community has always been at the heart of The Boundary, from its conception to planning to evolving, and will continue to be at the very

foundation of everything we do. This is a project for us... me and you and everyone who is fortunate enough to live in this vibrant, beautiful parish. It is so apt, therefore, that we have been on the receiving end of some very generous local businesses who also felt that sense of community and working together. I would like to thank Kong Scaffolding and Freedom Bespoke for their huge generosity by gifting their goods and services, free of charge, to the build. Both companies are run by locals and we are very grateful that they wanted to be part of this project. Thank you.

Everyone I speak to is excited to see the progress of the shop and café and, so far, (massive fingers crossed), we are running to time and budget. There's a lot going on behind the scenes to ensure this happens and a lot of research is being done to ensure we are getting quality and value for money. Recently, we heard about a big shop in Southampton that went out of business and were able to buy all of their gravity dispensers and scoop tubs for our Eco Shop at a massive saving than if we had to buy new. Saving money where we can and reusing and recycling is a

double win. Auction houses and second-hand shops are being scoured for lovely vintage plates for the café and endless hours are being spent online researching every item needed.

The Eco Shop will be a great asset to the shop. We aim to sell dry goods like rice, pasta, nuts and seeds, couscous, etc from dispensers so that customers can bring their own containers to fill up. This not only has the benefit of zero packaging but means customers can buy just the amount they need rather than a whole packet of something. We will also sell wet goods such as washing up liquid, detergent, shampoo and conditioner this way. Alongside the dispensers will be a packaged eco range which will include items like shampoo bars, eco-friendly cleaning products and food wraps to name just a few. All this eco-friendly produce will be sold alongside our existing range of goods including our value brands and local produce. The retail space will increase by 30% compared to the old shop enabling us to ensure that there really is something for everyone.

#### Bridget Culley

53 years ago I married a local farmer and have been fully involved in village life since then. From Play Group (chair), Friends of the School committee member and Chair of Governors for 30 years. Also fund raising for the new Village Centre and for the Millennium Village party.

I have just started my fourth term as a Parish Councillor, six years as Chairman. Villages to survive as communities need to grow, adapt and change, and this has always been my philosophy. Without this, all aspects of village life, from the Church and School, the Shop and Village Centre and all the various social and sporting groups could perish.

#### **Parish Council Activities**

Guidance and Governance - It has recently been discovered that the Parish Council didn't renew membership of a group called HALC (Hampshire Association for Local Councils), from which information, training and guidance can be obtained. This possible 'oversight' will be addressed, as we look to make sure that our actions and activities are provided in accordance with the appropriate best practice and for the benefit of the whole parish.

The Parish Council Councillors undertake a commitment and duty to uphold governance and ensure that documents and policies are maintained and made available, and this will be part of the support we will be seeking as we move forwards.

If anyone has experience in these areas or operations or Health and Safety documentation and would be prepared to get more involved, we would be grateful to hear from you.

**The 'Lengthsman'** - The joy of living in such a beautiful parish, surrounded by nature, is that things grow!

The lengthsman is a contractual commitment made to maintain aspects of the parish. Currently centrally funded, albeit diminishing, work schedules are placed with the contractor to maintain vegetation growth for community benefits, e.g. around speed signs etc.

As with most, these grants are being reviewed and it is more than likely this will become more of a locally funded commitment. While the commitment for access and maintenance of footpaths is with the landowner, vegetation growth can be a side-stepped responsibility. One thought may be that if the budgets continue downwards for this parish community service, then a working party could be created to help with clearing these wonderful assets for the benefit of all? We would be very interested in ideas around this function

Tony Grunsell - As you may know, we recently lost a committed member of the parish and a PC councillor. It is with great joy we note that his employer (Booker) has proposed to donate a memorial bench.

The location is still to be finalised and will be made with guidance from Sandra and the family, but his commitment to the shop helped significantly in its survival, and the Rec / Bowling Green were areas close to Tony's heart and this is where the initial location is proposed.

#### Summary report - September meeting of the Parish Council

Seven councillors and the clerk attended the meeting, plus four members of the public.

**Governance -** An update on the Hampshire Association of Local Councils (HALC) was given and it was agreed to retain membership which equates to 7.42p per parishioner.

Health and Safety, Play Area and Grievance Procedure it was agreed to approve the adoption of the policy documents. Lengthsman - Footpaths continually require attention, but one that has been reported a number of times is footpath 29 from Springhill Lane towards the Woodland Burial Ground. The PC grounds maintenance contractor will be asked to look at this if there are not sufficient Lengthsman hours available.

Flood and Emergency Group - Will be required to discuss remedial work identified by the recent flooding of the High Street due to heavy rain showers.

Highways - HCC to be asked to reinstate 'NO HGV' and 'Road Unsuitable for Large Vehicles' signage, particularly from the direction of Harroway. Vitacress also to be contacted regarding the lack of HGV signage.

The installation of speed indicator devices was discussed to try to deal with speeding in the village, but this will require posts to be erected due to lack of street furniture.

There are still issues with the edge of the road near the entrance to Stevens Green which is constantly being damaged by large lorries being unable to negotiate the corner. Help to obtain the required remedial work from Hants. Highways to be discussed with Cllr Tom Thacker.

Recreation Ground and Lake - Agreed to a request for a bench to be placed within the recreation ground to commemorate the life of Tony Grunsell made by his employers. DP

#### **Light Touch How about a Hibernaculum?**

Very soon our frogs, newts and toads will be looking for a safe place to spend the winter. They do not hibernate as such and will emerge in milder spells. They need somewhere safe away from inquisitive dogs and cats which is frost free in winter and can also be used in the summer to keep them cool and damp as they spend very little time in the water after mating is over.

A winter home takes very little time to make. Just dig out an area of earth in a quiet preferably sunny corner a foot or so deep, then put in bricks, stones, broken terracotta pots and logs with lots of small gaps and entry holes then partially cover



it with turfs or more logs and branches. Imagine it as an underground maze, which will have the added advantage that it will attract lots of insects as well, providing dinner whenever the animals emerge. Do not put it in an area which is likely to be waterlogged as they can drown when comatose.

**Ponds...** One third of Britain's ponds have disappeared in the last fifty years and 80% of the remaining ones are classified as in poor or very poor condition. Chalk areas such as ours are especially bad as ponds have to be actively kept watertight and the need for maintenance is long gone with the advent of water troughs and the more recent lack of livestock in the fields. Desperate frogs in our local woods lay their spawn in heaps in any tiny puddle which is fairly certainly doomed to dry out before the tadpoles are grown.

Putting a wildlife pond in our gardens is the single most important action each of us can do to help our beleaguered amphibians as long as no fish are added. The charity Froglife has an excellent advice booklet online. Search for "Froglife just add water" for a pdf or order a free copy from their shop. Now is the perfect time to build a pond as it can fill up with rain water before the spring.

October is also the best month to clean out your pond. Wildlife ponds need a little regular maintenance to prevent them silting up and turning into bog gardens. (It is far better to do a little every autumn or you can upset the natural balance gradually created by nature). Remove dead leaves and vegetation with a small net from the surface and base along with some of the collected silt. Leave it in a shallow heap at the edge for a day or two as some pond animals such as dragon fly larvae and beetles can crawl back into the water. Cut back any over enthusiastic plants a little, but always leave enough for the water surface to be partially covered by plants in the summer. Frogspawn appears surprisingly early in the spring so do not disturb a pond at that time.

#### **Go Star Gazing in October**

7th - Draconids Meteor Shower is a minor shower producing about 10 meteors per hour. This is an unusual shower as best viewing is early evening instead of early morning. Runs from 6 to 10 October.



- 8th Mercury at Greatest Western Elongation Best time to view Mercury as it will be at its highest point above the horizon in morning sky. Look for Mercury low in sky just before sunrise.
- 9th Full Moon Moon will be located on opposite side of Earth as the Sun and its face will be fully illuminated. Known as Hunters Moon by early Native American tribes.
- 21<sup>st</sup>/22<sup>nd</sup> Orionids Meter Shower Average shower producing up to 20 meteors per hour. Runs from 2 October to 7 November. Thin crescent moon will leave mostly dark skies for good show. Best viewing after midnight.
- 25<sup>th</sup> New Moon Moon located on same side of Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in night sky. Best time to observe star clusters and galaxies as no moonlight to interfere.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Partial Solar Eclipse A partial solar eclipse occurs when Moon covers only part of the Sun. Sometimes resembling a bite taken out of a cookie. Not visible in UK.

Please try to minimise light pollution & protect our dark night skies by reducing outdoor lighting. This benefits wildlife, environment and humans alike.

#### **Postcard from Binley**

A tribute to Micky Wedge 9th July 1949 - 31st July 2022

> "Such a morning it is when love leans through geranium windows and calls with a cockerel's tongue.

When red-haired girls scamper like roses over the rain-green grass. and the sun drips honey.

When hedgerows grow venerable, berries dry black as blood, and holes suck in their bees.

Such a morning it is when mice run whispering from the church, dragging dropped ears of harvest.

When the partridge draws back his spring and shoots like a buzzing arrow over grained and mahogany fields.

When no table is bare, and no beast dry, and the tramp feeds on ribs of rabbit." Laurie Lee

Michael Wedge, more often known as Micky or "Wedger", passed gently away on the 31st of July 2022 after four long years in hospital, the result of a debilitating stroke suffered on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of April 2018.

There was a time when you could have said every rural community had a "Wedger", but times they are a-changing and it is much less likely now. Micky was a one-off, a unique character. His was a lifetime lived within this valley. He knew every blade of grass, every stone and every tree that grew here. He knew every creature that crawled, swam, ran or flew, above or below ground.

He was as equally happy crouched in a cold, wet muddy ditch in November waiting for a skein of geese, as he was laid out amongst the cowslips on the Binley Downs on a warm spring day, his beloved dog by his side, both intoxicated by the sounds and scents of nature as he tended to his bees. He lived season by season, knowing precisely what each in turn would bring, when it would bring it, and most importantly how he could get it. He was a gourmet forager, taking only the best, be it game, wild fruits, or fungi. What he couldn't find here he imported. Crabs and whelks from Devon, Bloaters from the Essex coast. August saw grouse arrive from Scotland and Yorkshire. Autumn saw the finest Iberico ham from black toed pigs in Spain which stood mounted on a stand in his little kitchen for all to see. And he was generous with it, particularly to those near and dear to him and to elderly villagers.

He moved seamlessly from the animal kingdom, where it has to be said he was at his most comfortable, to the periphery of the human one. His comfort zone wasn't ours. The dead of night in the countryside isn't for everyone; the sudden yowl of a vixen close by can make your scalp wrinkle, yet it held no fears for Micky. He was the last to walk into the Hurdlers Arms before closing, a quiet Guinness before retiring; his spoils waiting to be skinned, cleaned, eviscerated. It was outside that very pub one Sunday afternoon that I sat and watched him climb an ash tree, a hessian sack over his shoulder, to take "Branchers", young rooks that had left the nest but not yet fledged, for to make a rook pie. His ways were the old ways. And he was a damn fine shot!


He smoked meats, fish and cheeses in an old upright fridge freezer that he converted in his garden until an overheated mackerel burnt it to the ground. That garden was turned over entirely to the growing of fruit and vegetables. He pickled, he cured, he air-dried his own biltong. His honey was liquid sunshine. He literally handpicked his bees and the crops they were to pollinate. His pickled walnuts were sacrosanct. He became a part of all of us. A somewhat wild but much-loved attachment to our own families and he was in essence our very own diamond in the rough. When his father, dear Freddie, passed we tried harder to bring Micky into the fold with invitations to social occasions, birthdays, parties, and on Christmas Day and Boxing Day. And sometimes he turned up! But in reality, he was at his happiest just him and his dog, walking the racecourse at Cheltenham on December 25th in blissful solitude. It is doubtful we will ever see his like again.

Micky was born in 1949. A Wedge. An ancient and proud village family. A lineage that goes back hundreds of years, some say to the Domesday Book. His parents were Freddie and Winnie, his brother Terence. As a lad Micky lived outdoors in the countryside, given the right to roam over Sid Nimmo's farm at Upper Wyke where he learned his bushcraft. On leaving school he took to the family trade as a plasterer, working on many listed and ecclesiastical buildings. He worked hard and he played hard right to the end.

And then out of the blue one day, a cruel stroke cut him down and he was hospitalised. And while the wildlife breathed a sigh of relief, those of us that were left were bereft. A great countryman, a true friend, a village character in every sense of the word was taken from us. Visits at first carried some optimism but slowly and perhaps inevitably the truth dawned on us that he wasn't coming home. Never returning to the downs and water meadows, the chalk streams and the hazel copses, the towering beech woods of his beloved Hampshire.

Micky loved all the seasons, but I believe his favourite was Autumn, when the first frost was on the pumpkin and his chilled hoary breath hung in the air; when pigeon fat was as yellow as Jersey butter. And I can picture him now busying himself for the day ahead, loading his guns into the car, stashing two litres of chocolate milkshake on the front seat and some "delicacies" shoved in that infamous waistcoat pocket for him and the dog.

And that is how I shall choose to remember him, anxious to get on and get as much enjoyment as possible out of the day that lay before him. On reflection, perhaps that's not such a bad philosophy.

After all that talking, listening and learning, many needed a sit down with a cuppa with a wonderful choice of delicious cakes.

This was an opportunity to find out how we can all make a difference on a small scale to reduce our own carbon footprint, which now **in the parish of St Mary Bourne** (calculated in tons of  $CO_2e$  - carbon



dioxide equivalent) is **at a whopping 24 tons** compared to **18 in the Borough of Basingstoke & Dean** and just under **16 tons for the Great Britain average.** That should make us all think.

#### **Top Tips!**

- Plan meals, do batch cooking, use slow cookers. Borrow the thermal heat camera from SBV to see the areas of heat loss from your house.
- Make draft excluder to keep out drafts. Run water to get hot for a shower for least time possible and keep a bucket in the shower to make use of that water.

#### No knead for bread: Keep our ducks and chalk streams healthy

As we head into autumn, many of us are looking for ways to support our wonderful wildlife. Out on our local chalk streams, waterfowl like ducks, swans, and geese will be filling up in anticipation of the colder months. With their usual food sources growing less plentiful, a little boost from us can make a lot of difference.

Did you know, though, that feeding them bread does more harm than good? While it fills them up, the lack of nutrition can cause them to become malnourished. The same goes for things like crisps, pastries, popcorn, and cereal. What's more, uneaten food attracts pests and encourages algal blooms that damage the streams.

The good news is that there are many other affordable and accessible options. Got leftover lettuce or wilted greens? Iceberg, rocket, kale, chard, and cabbage are all great choices. If your salad bin is empty, raid the freezer for peas – just be sure to defrost them fully. Tinned, defrosted, or fresh sweetcorn will also be well received.

In small amounts, rolled or porridge oats, plain cooked or uncooked rice, and bird seed provide nutritious nibbles. Alternating them with vegetables creates a balanced diet of fibre, vitamins, and fatty acids. However, always steer clear of onion, spinach, avocado, and citrus fruit, which can give the birds digestive problems.

When out on your adventure, there are a few more things

to bear in mind. Make sure your snacks are in bite-sized pieces since waterfowl don't chew their food. Remove any packing and remember to take it home with you. If the birds seem disinterested or stop eating, keep your remaining food so it doesn't get left to rot.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> November 7- 9pm there will be a drop-in meeting, the venue to be confirmed in the November issue. This is for anyone interested in topics around the reduction of energy consumption and will include discussions on retro fitting, the thermal imaging camera, how minor changes can save energy. We welcome people who can share their own experiences of retrofitting with people who are just at the start of the retrofitting journey.

TVBC congratulated the fete organisers on the impressive separation of general waste from the recyclable brown bin waste. Unfortunately, there was an overflowing skip full of waste, some of which could have been recycled.

Every year the tea stall tries to reduce its waste and this year we encouraged people to bring their own cups for a free drink but also openly asked people to recycle into the correct bins. Nearly 300 items were sent for industrial composting, 200 cups recycled in the tetrapak bin, and a trug full of cans collected.



#### LONGPARISH WILDLIFE **RABBITS**



Who doesn't like to see a Rabbit when they are out for a walk. Rabbits were first introduced to Britain by the Normans in the 12th century from Spain and are now a common sight or used

to be. They live in large groups underground called Warrens. Female Rabbits called Does produce one litter of between three and seven babies every month during the breeding season (November-June). The female makes a nest of fur from her body and the young are born blind and hairless. The disease Myxomatosis arrived in Britain in 1953 and drastically reduced their numbers until a resistance developed. A new disease, rabbit viral Haemorrhagic, arrived in 1992 which again reduced numbers. Rabbits diet is chiefly plants, grass dandelions and clover etc. Because there is not much nutrition in grass, they need to eat a lot. They are partial to vegetables as people with allotments will tell you.

Well Autumn is just about here the summer visitors are leaving but there is a pair of Swallows still feeding young as of the 17/9 the vast majority have left.


