

#### Dear Friends,

Well, here we are in February. As I write (towards the middle of January), the Covid-19 infection rate is starting to decrease, but hospital numbers are still rising, and death rates are still horrendously high. Thank goodness though that during this lockdown, we are fortunate enough to have the hope of vaccinations being rolled out as quickly as possible. We might now be well beyond the season of Advent, however our message is the same - hunker down and wait patiently.

But then, if we think about Candlemas, celebrated on 2<sup>nd</sup> February (when Jesus was presented at the temple) we hear how Anna had waited patiently for decades. Anna was a remarkable woman: it is believed that she was either an 84-year-old widow or a very old lady who had been widowed for 84 years (making her about 105).

Her lifestyle would be viewed today as eccentric, and possibly was also at the time. Anna "never left the Temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day" (Luke 2:37). As a prophetess and filled with the Holy Spirit, Anna received insights which remained hidden to most people.



So, when Mary and Joseph brought their new born baby Jesus to the temple, 40 days after his birth, Anna recognised Jesus, praised God and spoke of Jesus' significance; that this baby in front of her *was* the long-awaited Saviour.

There then followed another 30 years of waiting until Jesus started his earthly ministry. In bible terms, waiting is nothing new, but for us, it can feel quite uncomfortable. We live in such an immediate society where we expect replies from our emails within hours, and with a few clicks on a screen, we expect our purchases to arrive on our doorstep the next day. But with Covid-19, all we can do is stay at home and wait patiently for our vaccination.

The challenges of our waiting are compounded by everything that have been taken from us: our loved ones, our incomes, our security, and many, many simple pleasures which ordinarily sustain us. This is tough.

And yet, HOPE (especially hope through Jesus) is a treasure that will never be taken away. Hope is the light we are walking towards, whilst in this dark tunnel. Hope is what keeps us going when we feel defeated, demoralised, desperate. Hope expresses joy and peace in bleak times. Covid-19 has taken much from us, but it will never take away our hope, as we continue to wait patiently for our vaccination.



## census 2021

Households across Longparish, St Mary Bourne, Woodcott and Hurstbourne Priors will be asked to take part in Census 2021 on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives the most accurate estimate of all people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics said "This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

The census will include questions about sex, age, ethnicity, work, health, education and household size. For the first time there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions aimed at the over 16's on sexual orientation and gender identity.

It will be the first run online from early March with households receiving a letter containing a unique access code to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets. We have been advised that paper copies will be available. However, **please** offer to help your family, friends and neighbours fill out the census online if possible (Covid-19 guidelines permitting).

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

#### **REPORT FROM MEETING HELD REMOTELY ON 11 JANUARY**

#### **Planning**

The Parish Council had no objection to:

It was reported that Raymond Brown has been granted permission by HCC to relax their operating hours during lockdown and will be operating 24 hours a day from Monday to Friday and to 2pm on Saturdays, commencing 11 January through to the end of March 2021.

#### The Plough Inn

The Chair of the Working Party reported that procedures for the purchase of The Plough Inn are progressing well. A meeting of the Plough Committee is scheduled to take place on 15 January prior to the final recommendations to the PC for drawdown of the PWLB loan to complete the purchase.

#### **Playground**

The Open Spaces team has been exploring solutions to the very wet and muddy entrance to the playground.

#### Village Hall car park

The parish Council resolved to appoint a contractor to install a land drainage pipe and soakaway at the car park to alleviate the flooding that has been an annual problem in the winter months. It is hoped that this can be completed in the February half-term break or sooner with the agreement of car park users.

Until further guidance is received from HALC, the Parish Council will continue to meet remotely via Zoom. Members of the public wishing to "attend" any meetings should contact the Clerk or the Chairman.



#### **Government Lockdown Guidance**

**Leaving Home:** You must not leave or be outside of your home except where necessary. You may leave the home to:

- shop for basic necessities, for you or a vulnerable person
- go to work, or provide voluntary or charitable services, if you cannot reasonably do so from home
- exercise with your household (or support bubble) or one other person, this should be limited to once per day, and you should not travel outside your local area.
- meet your <u>support bubble</u> or <u>childcare bubble</u> where necessary, but only if you are legally permitted to form one
- seek medical assistance or avoid injury, illness or risk of harm (including domestic abuse)
- attend education or childcare for those eligible

If you do leave home for a permitted reason, you should always stay local - unless it is necessary to go further, for example to go to work. Stay local means stay in the village, town, or part of the city where you live.

If you are <u>clinically extremely vulnerable</u> you should only go out for medical appointments, exercise or if it is essential. You should not attend work

**Meeting others:** You cannot leave your home to meet socially with anyone you do not live with or are not in a <u>support bubble</u> with (if you are legally permitted to form one).

You may exercise on your own, with one other person, or with your household or support bubble. This should be limited to once per day, and you should not travel outside your local area.

You cannot meet other people you do not live with, or have not formed a support bubble with, unless for a permitted reason

Stay 2 metres apart from anyone **not** in your household.

#### **COVID Vaccination Scam Alert**

There have been reports of a new scam where a person receives a text saying they need to book a vaccination appointment and it takes them to a fake NHS form which then asks for their bank details to prove their identity.

The NHS will never ask for a person's banking information so please do not provide as it will be a scam

The Plough Inn – latest news

**Longparish Community Pub Ltd** 

If everything has gone to plan, the Plough will now belong to Longparish!

At the time of writing, the details of the sale were agreed, the paperwork had been drawn up and the finance was in place ready for an exchange on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> January, with a completion due to follow several days later.

It follows weeks of intense preparation. Since the last edition of Hill and Valley, the Plough Ahead team has been very busy drawing up legal documents and lease agreements, which has all been very time consuming. We've also been busy getting the last of the funding together. As we have previously reported, the original share scheme (last spring) raised £228.000. Over the last couple of months an extended share offer yielded a further £100,000 from new subscribers and existing shareholders.

Once the sale of the Plough has gone through, the plan is to start work on the building as soon as possible. The priority is to get the roof secured and make the building water-tight and weather-proof. Once that has been completed, we can concentrate on reinstating the heating and electricity. Plans will then need to be drawn up so we can apply for planning permission, where required, for works on the building and tree works in the grounds.

We are delighted that several local professionals have already stepped forward to offer their expertise with design for both the pub and outside areas. Most recently we have also been offered some excellent refurbished kitchen equipment from a company that fits and services professional kitchens.

If you would like to offer help or expertise with the transformation of the Plough, we would be very pleased indeed to hear from you. In the coming months we will need volunteers to help with clearing the garden, building fences, decorating inside and out, and many other tasks that will need to be completed so we can renovate and reopen the Plough.

#### LONGPARISH OF OLD -

#### A SAD DAY FOR THE VILLAGE

On Saturday 2nd February one hundred and twenty years ago Longparish was in mourning.

Blinds were drawn, shops were closed, women were mostly in black and the bell of St. Nicholas Church tolled.

It was the day the body of HM Queen Victoria was taken from Osborne House to St. Georges Chapel Windsor.

The scene in Longparish was reported in the Hants and Berks Gazette.

The reporter observed: "The village flag drooped half-mast under a gloomy sky or fluttered mournfully in the drizzling rain. For nature seemed to be sharing in the national grief."

There was not a vacant seat in the church for a service to honour the memory of "our beloved sovereign." It was timed to coincide with a similar service in St. George's Chapel although in Longparish the mourners were of a humbler type.

Among the congregation were the village policeman and postman; four soldiers and three sailors as well as landowners and farmworkers.

The atmosphere was: "remarkable for the depth of quiet feeling"

The organ "wailed forth" Chopin's funeral march and Handel's Dead March from the oratorio Saul. Among the hymns sung were Now The Labourer's Task Is O'er and Sleep On Beloved, and also On The Resurrection Morning

As the report noted, "Longparish was a house of mourning" that day.





#### THE BUS SHELTERS

As I hope many of you will have noticed the bus shelters which were destroyed in the dreadful lorry fire have at long last been finished. Following a long and drawn-out ordeal with the lorry's insurance company we finally received full payment meaning that the thatch was able to be finished off in December. Charlie Ayres of Ayers & Stanley Thatching, did a fantastic job with the weather very much against him, managing to finish it on Christmas Eve. I hope that you all agree that it is nice to see the thatched shelter back to it's former glory.

All the English Elm which was salvaged from the original shelter has been reused where possible, a small amount was also used on the South side shelter as there wasn't enough for a full wall on the thatched one. Unfortunately, the cost of replacement Elm was prohibitive, but the Oak used in its place comes from a tree felled locally. Several residents have asked why the Parish Council didn't take this opportunity to thatch the South side shelter. This is because of its position under Lime trees whose sticky sap is very incompatible with thatch and causes it to erode.

We now await the repaired iron bench which was damaged when a VW collided with it last year. It is being rebuilt by Jacks Bush Forge who built the original over 20years ago.

I would like to thank Paul Knipe for all his help in coordinating the team behind this project.

#### **Against All Odds**

Despite the difficulties experienced in 2020, nearly 15,000 people visited the Mill and enjoyed all that we offered, from Winter Lights in January to the successful Great Wishing Tree of Whitchurch in December. What's more, we had our first commercial order for ribbons for many years, which gave our weavers the chance to create something not only beautiful but guaranteed to be money-making. During the year our trainee weaver completed her training and is now working for us full time. We'll be recruiting a new trainee as soon as we can.

#### Covid-19 Update

At the time of writing, restrictions mean the Mill, café and shop are closed to the public. In the meanwhile, the Mill team and the weavers are working hard, and we'll continue our digital programme of talks and virtual group tours and social media and blog posts. Our online shop offers a free local click and collect/delivery service, and we're running a fundraising campaign at <a href="https://www.justgiving.com/campaign/supportwhitchurchsilkmill">www.justgiving.com/campaign/supportwhitchurchsilkmill</a>

#### **Ripping Yarns**

A new series of our popular online 'Ripping Yarns' is planned. These explain how some common expressions derived from the language of weaving. Previous Yarns can be found on our Facebook page. You can look forward to finding out more about the phrase 'cloth ears'. It first originated in the industrialised mills of northern England during the 1800s. The noise generated by the machinery was quite literally deafening, and the build-up of cotton dust in the workers' ears added to the problem. Nowadays, the expression is used as a rebuke to someone who has not heard or understood what's being said to them, along the lines of 'Oi, cloth ears, wake up!' Naturally our weavers don't talk to each other in this way!

#### A Look Back in Time

Have you been watching the most recent series of The Crown? If so, did you know that in 1980 the Mill played a vital role in the creation of Diana's wedding dress? The raw silk used to weave the cloth for the dress was wound on to bobbins on our winding frames. It wasn't until after the job was done that the Mill Manager, Ted Moss, told his staff this exciting news.

#### CIVIL WAR ART AND POETRY COMPETITION



The Mayor of Basingstoke and Deane has re-launched an English Civil War art and poetry competition for young people in the borough after it was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mayor Cllr Diane Taylor is inviting all schools and sixth form students in the borough to produce a piece of artwork or a poem relating to the Battle of Basing

House in 1645. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, Hampshire Cultural Trust and Hampshire County Council are co-running the educational project which commemorates the 375th anniversary of the battle in 2020.

Pupils will learn how the nationally important historic site at Old Basing was besieged and destroyed by Oliver Cromwell. Basing House was the last Royalist stronghold in the south east and a key site in the battle between King and Parliament at the end of the English Civil War.

Art entries for the competition can be in any form, for example drawing, photography, sculptures and music, together with poems, and should be inspired by Basing House and/or the English Civil War. The closing date is Friday 12 March 2021 and judging will take place on Friday 19 March 2021.

There are three categories – primary, secondary and sixth form. Subject to coronavirus restrictions being lifted, all the winners will be invited to join the Mayor at a special opening of the English Civil War Art and Poetry Exhibition at Basing House, where they will receive a Mayor's plaque and an annual family pass to Basing House. The winners' schools will also each receive a free educational visit to Basing House, potentially including a travel bursary.

#### BERE MILL RESTORATION



More than two and a half years after Bere Mill at Whitchurch in Hampshire was destroyed by a devastating fire on the night of 7th

February 2018, the reconstruction of this beautiful group of buildings is now complete, and the west barn is available for community uses.

Bere Mill is a historic mill on the River Test, with a significant history, having been home to Portals, the maker of British bank notes, who made paper for the Bank of England in the early 18th century. The fire, caused by an electrical malfunction, destroyed much of the house, the mill itself over the river, and the west barn and destroyed the detailed renovations of the last 30 years which had brought the buildings back into use as a family home, while maintaining their historic identity.



Over the last two and a half years the exterior of Bere Mill has been rebuilt precisely as it was before the fire, with original brick walls, timber cladding, and antique roof tiles. Windows and doors have been remodelled, as previously, in oak. The reconstruction has respected traditional building techniques, through construction of an oak timber frame to match the original, traditional hand-cut joinery, and lathe and plaster wall coverings, with the use of lime render throughout. The mill machinery will shortly be restored to its previous state. The renovation respects the original layout of rooms and the west barn has been fitted internally for community use, with modern lighting, a/v systems and good access. The building renovation was carried out by P J Roper, traditional builders of Whitchurch, Hants and the architecture was by Michael Kaner of Kaner Olette, Tunbridge Wells.

The Bere Mill butchery has remained open throughout the renovation, supplying grass-fed, home-reared lamb and beef, offering a click and collect service, or home deliveries. The beautiful gardens and water meadows that lie alongside the River Test, complete with Mediterranean, herbaceous and bog plants, and sculpture by well-known artists, will be open for private visits by arrangement, and under the National Garden Scheme on 14 March and 2 and 31 June 2021 (subject to Covid restrictions).

Owner of Bere Mill, Rupert Nabarro, commented "My wife Elizabeth, and I, are grateful for the sympathy and support we have received from the local community through this long reconstruction process and most especially to the building team that has carried out the work, led by Paul Roper of P.J.Roper and his specialist trade colleagues. Their level of skill has been exceptional and they have cut no corners. We were delighted to give the renovation work to local experts, as the entire building team live and mostly originate from the Whitchurch area. They are an extraordinary witness to the continued existence of historic building skills." (*Photos Miriam Nabarro*)

#### January 2021 - Update from Two Rivers Surgery

I am sure everyone is aware of the challenges facing the health system at the moment. Observing the growing numbers of our patients become infected with COVID and a small number who have become very unwell or needed admission to hospital over the past few weeks and months has been really tough. We are aware of the severe challenges facing Hampshire Hospitals at the moment. We want to reassure all of our patients that we are doing everything we can to remain open and accessible. We will continue to follow the guidance to initially have telephone or video consultations and bring patients into the surgery when absolutely necessary, either for examinations or for urgent investigations. We particularly want to ensure patients attend their cancer screening appointments and we are putting in extra effort to ensure these continue over the next few months.

We continue to lead the delivery of the COVID vaccine programme as part of our rural General Practice network. We have already vaccinated all of our care home residents and their healthcare workers, the majority of our patients over the age of 80, frontline healthcare workers and patients who are housebound. We remind people of the importance to maintain strict hygiene measures and physical distancing following your first vaccine to keep you and others safe. Everyone who has had their first vaccine is on the list to be called for their second vaccine within 12 weeks of the first one, so you do not need to call our reception team to enquire about this. Those next in line, similarly, the practice will make contact as soon as the vaccine is available for you. We are making good progress with this so far. We will not forget you.

We would like to thank everyone in the community for your kindness and continued support during this difficult time for all of us. We will do our utmost to ensure that the vaccine is rolled out to our patients as quickly and smoothly as possible. There is finally some light at the end of the tunnel!







#### **Light Touch Our Valley Toads**

After starting the toad patrols last spring, we have now learnt a lot more

about our local celebrities' lives. They spend the summer on dry land in local gardens and water meadows around the lake, in the churchyard, the woods above the lake and some even live as far as 2 kilometres away. Depending on the weather they will arrive in a great state of excitement from all directions at our lake to breed



occasionally in early February. Toads prefer large areas of deep cold water to breed and return to the place they were born each year. The males arrive first and lurk about waiting to catch their very own female by clamping themselves on her back. They are most at risk when they try to cross the B3048 which they attempt to do from just south of the George Inn down to the surgery junction. They have even been seen coming down from Stevens Green. They are also in danger from visitors to the Surgery and Derrydown houses, while the residents and staff there are well aware and often pick them up themselves as they cross from the water meadows. Frogs come out earlier from late January, but they are either looking for food or trying to get to the local garden ponds as they prefer warmer shallow water.



The toads choose wet nights above 5 degrees centigrade when there have already been a few scattered mild evenings. They begin to cross just as dusk descends and Toad Patrol tries to be there to help them across. You will see us in yellow jackets and tabards waving buckets and torches. Please think of our toads as you drive through, they have walked (only frogs hop) a long way to reach us to be squashed in the last few yards. Once in the lake they feed, rest and wait for a full moon to get down to it in a seething mass.

The spawn is wrapped around water plants and roots in long strings of black dots which can be up to 7 metres long and contain 4000 eggs. Toad tadpoles hatch after 2 to 4 weeks depending on the temperature and swim around in shoals eating rotting vegetation and later on tiny insects. Both the adults and tadpoles have glands on their necks which eject a nasty tasting fluid if anything tries to attack them so are safe from fish and many predators. They have never objected in this way when we have had to pick them up. Last year we picked up nearly 400 but saw hundreds more crossing in safe places.

The baby toads emerge in a crowd from the lake after rain around 2 to 3 months after hatching. They will stay around the lake if there is enough food and shelter for many weeks and will then have a much better chance of surviving. There are plans to help wildlife by improving the habitat round the lake by increasing plant and dead wood cover which also increases their food. The mowing will be less and it may look "untidier", but so much better than tiny toadlets being chopped up.

Our lake is an especially safe environment as no dogs have been there since it was fenced. Dog's flea medicine contains neonicotinoids which pollute the water and kill aquatic insects if dogs swim. The geese are

mainly vegetarian so are unlikely to harm them and fish steer clear because of those glands. The main threat to their survival, are cars and new development, blocking their ancestral paths or even draining their lakes.

Toads are another gardener's friend as the young eat aphids and the adults love slugs, snails, insect larvae and the odd worm. They often return to regular summer haunts and can become quite tame living up to 12 years.

#### Go Star Gazing in February

11 February - New Moon - so without light of moon it is perfect to star gaze. PLEIADES - Seven Sisters - cluster of stars visible in South just after sunset. Andromeda Galaxy seen towards the West just after sunset.



11 February - Venus and Jupiter conjunction. Look to South East horizon. This celestial pairing will occur 20-30 minutes before sunrise. Venus and Jupiter will appear as brilliant dots to the naked sky, so close as to be visible at same time. Added bonus planet Saturn be drifting to pairs upper right.

**18 February - Perseverance landing -** the touchdown of NASA's latest Mars rover. The series of cameras on the rover will enable us to view this event on TV.

27 February - Full Moon - known as Snow Moon by early Native American Tribes, because the heaviest snows usually fall at this time of year.

#### **STAR COUNT** A lockdown star gazing activity for the family

Each February - Council for Protection of Rural England organises a star count in support of dark night skies. Just 3% of England experiences," truly dark night skies" & 61% live in areas with severe light pollution. So CPRE needs our help to map the nation's view of the stars, so dark night skies can be better protected.

How to take part. Go to CPRE website. Sign up for Star Count between 6-14 February. New moon on 11 February, so darker skies. 7 pm is a good time. Looking South, using the naked eye only, the stars to be counted are in the rectangle formed by the four corner stars in the Orion constellation. There is an excellent diagram of this on the CPRE website. Submit your count, then check back to see how our area compares to national results. Thank you for participating and helping to protect our spectacular dark night sky.

#### Postcard from Binley - January 2021

Christmas in Binley was a low-key affair. It's never exactly exuberant and you could drive through Binley and be forgiven for not knowing it were Christmas at all, save for the odd glimpse of twinkle behind drawn curtains. No illuminated plastic snowmen or reindeer stand sentinel in gardens, no Santa's disappear down chimneys and even the giant inflatable elves that usually sit in the cab of the army lorry in the Frogley's front garden at the top of Red Lane are missing this year. Self-isolating perhaps? What do twinkle and shine brightly are the empty cans of Red Bull, packets of Lambert and Butler King Size and shiny Ginster's Pasty wrappers that litter our verges. An early morning walk finds my wife and I wombling around and collecting them up. Why do people do this? I could kick myself now as I should have kept it all and then hung them from a tree as a festive piece of modern art. It would be unlikely to win the Turner Prize... though on reflection why not if an unmade bed and discarded pair of drawers can?

The numerous building sites here closed down just before the big day and Binley returned to tranquility. The effin' and jeffin' of carpenters has been replaced by the bleating of sheep, the drilling and crash bang walloping has been succeeded by the drumming of a woodpecker echoing through the park. In the sky above, the shrill cries of kites ring out as rooks and jackdaws, cartwheeling and spiraling through the air, drive them from the rookery. And below, birdsong charms me from the garden. A deer barks and in reply so does Dennis, my neighbour's new puppy. Nature has taken back control of the audio and it is a sensorial

Despite being very happy in my own company the last year has taught me how important social interaction is. The golf bores in the pub, those sniffy drinks parties, the angstridden dinner parties. They all seem so joyous and frivolous now! And I miss them. As humans, whether we like it or not, we possess an inner need to interact with our greater tribe. Pre-Covid, I was a natural party pooper. I'd look at an invitation on the dresser like it were a reminder for a colonoscopy appointment. And then the awful day would arrive, and I'd run out of excuses not to go. But right now, I'd kill to be stood in someone's drawing room, a tepid glass of Albanian sauvignon in my hand as a bandy legged blue rinser pebbledashes the front of my shirt with vol aux vent shrapnel and brings me up to date with her Labrador's gland problem. One thing I have discovered though at drinks parties is that the people you normally hide from behind an industrial trolley of frozen peas in Waitrose are actually really rather interesting when you get to know them, and I've been pleasantly surprised on so many occasions.

When you first arrive at a drinks party conversation will be at a murmur, punctuated by the odd "Mwah!" air kiss. Within an hour and with a few drinks inside them the volume will have risen to Iranian street funeral levels and you will find yourself shouting to be heard. I don't know if someone tips off the catering staff bringing round the nibbles, but they all avoid me like the plague. This is precisely the time I am at my hungriest and to stand there glumly following a plate of tempura king prawns around the room as the platter gets picked bare is torturous. Last year I found myself at the point of breakdown when Rosemary Plincke took the last two and I had to be restrained by my wife from lunging at her. What sort of monster have I become?

A novice to the drinks party circuit needs to learn the rules fast. In town they are scheduled later but here in the country lunchtime drinks are generally at 12.00 midday and evening drinks at 6.00 or 7.00 pm. You are expected to arrive punctually and stay two hours at the most.

Overstaying your welcome is frowned upon and getting rat faced and falling asleep in the dog's bed or being discovered comatose and upside down behind the television will result in you being scratched from all further engagements. #### **Harry Black**

19th December 1938 - 24th December 2020

Harry was the second child of Henry and Mabel Black who ran The Railway Inn (now the Bourne Valley Inn) in St Mary Bourne. He had one older sister, Pat.



Harry attended St
Mary Bourne school and
then went on to
Whitchurch School.
After leaving formal
education, Harry got an
apprenticeship with the
local plumber, Fred
Taylor. He then went to
work for Southern
Water for over 30 years.

During his childhood and early adulthood, he was a faithful worshipper at St Peter's Church where he sang

in the choir, carried the cross at the beginning and end of services, served at the altar and was a bell ringer. Harry met Ann Byford (who lived in Upper Wyke) in St Peter's when she was 18 and he 24. They married on 20<sup>th</sup> November 1965 and rented a house in Southview Terrace, Lower Link. Their first child Malcolm was born in 1967. After later suffering the sadness of the stillborn birth of a baby boy, their family was eventually completed with the birth of a daughter Hilary in 1976. When Hilary was 6 months old, the family moved to Andover but after Harry's retirement and when the children had grown up and

were leading independent lives, Harry and Ann were keen to return to St Mary Bourne. They became the first residents in the development of new houses at Stud Farm where they settled happily, and Harry continued to enjoy his prizewinning hobby of gardening.

But unfortunately, his health began to deteriorate. After two earlier successful operations, cancer returned aggressively to many parts of his body and Harry went into the Countess of Brecknock Hospice on 19<sup>th</sup> December where he passed away on Christmas Eve.

Harry is sadly missed. He is remembered as an amazing husband, dad, grandad and brother and with affection by lifelong local friends who shared many experiences together.
