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ACOL VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall is at the centre of village life and is an important resource for us all. Whether it is the Horticultural Society, the Art Group Textile classes or Dance lessons, the hall is in regular weekly use, and is also available to hire for private functions.

The prices are kept competitive, and Village residents get to hire it at a special discounted rate. The Hall is kept heated and lit, as well as cleaned weekly. We also ensure the building is kept well decorated and maintained. Many of our users are very complimentary about the facilities we provide, and the way the Hall is kept.

It is therefore very disappointing when a resident books the Hall for a party and they fail to observe the rules in the hiring agreement. In a recent case a hirer overstayed their hire, vacating the Hall well after Midnight when our licence requires that we must not stay open beyond 10.30pm without obtaining a licence extension. They also left the Hall with sticky residue of spilled drinks on the floors, bags of rubbish in the kitchen (when the hiring agreement clearly states that hirers should take their rubbish away with them), dirty, greasy ovens, etc.... I could go on.

Sadly, the normal hiring deposit was not taken in this case, so the Hall Committee had to bear the additional cleaning costs. Our only sanction is that we will not in future accept any bookings from the individual or family concerned.

It is a great sadness that people no longer respect other people's property, and honour agreements honestly entered into.
