Parish Council Report

Over the last couple of weeks, we have had a couple of meetings with SODC Planning Officers regarding the simpler approach to the neighbourhood planning pilot which will result in Moulsford's Neighbourhood Planning Statement (NPS). The first meeting was to introduce our fellow participants in South and Vale and to outline the objectives and parameters of the pilot. Since then, we have been assigned a lead officer from SODC with whom we will work closely throughout the project duration and we've had a second meeting to discuss Moulsford's priorities and how these can inform our NPS.

We are envisaging our NPS will cover not just the usual Moulsford planning concerns around major development, lack of infrastructure, location in and adjacent to AONBs, environmental and biodiversity factors. We also want to include issues arising from Moulsford's unique position, bounded by the river on the East and the county boundary on the South, with development nearby impinging on local services resulting in over-subscribed medical practices and schools, with additional users of our amenities increasing the traffic and parking issues in the village. Where possible, within the NPS we want to address issues raised with tangible solutions. In cases where this is not possible, we will still capture the issue so it can be taken into consideration by SODC for planning and development.

We already have three members for the NPS working group, we are looking to recruit a minimum of two more from our village. Ideally with an interest in planning and a desire to understand better how it works at district council level, members will need to commit time and energy to a project which is set to run for the next 4-6 months. If you're interested in getting involved please contact Cllr Sue Powell (spowell@moulsford-pc.org.uk) for more information.

And if you are interested in standing as a councillor in next year's parish council election, this would be a great opportunity to understand more about our community and how the local government works.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee was enthusiastically celebrated in Moulsford as we marked this unique occasion. Even the slightly damp Sunday weather couldn't subdue the buzz of having an indoor shared picnic lunch. A special thanks to all those who entered the Victoria Sponge competition especially the children's entries that were all beautifully decorated and declared very tasty by the judge. The weekend activities passed far too quickly for many with lots of wonderful memories to share with future generations! A big thankyou to the small team who worked very hard to ensure we all enjoyed the numerous village events plus the relays from the London based celebrations.

At church the excitement continued as we learnt that we were to have a visit from a priest linked to our partnership parish of Huhudi/Vryburg in South Africa. Despite delays with visa applications Rev. Martha Seteso eventually arrived post Jubilee and too late to attend the Oxford diocese clergy conference. Never the less we soon made up for lost time as she meet up with numerous groups of parishioners and explored several aspects of village life; all quite a shock to the system having come from an urban community of over 65,000! Her river trip in beautiful sunshine seeing lot of swans and herons as well as experiencing navigating through locks was one such experience never to be forgotten. During our Sunday morning service she told us her, long patient, persistent and eventually joyful journey to become a priest having set out to train as a nurse only to be thwarted 3 times because of lack of funds. She left with a bulging suitcase stuffed full with warm clothing for babies and the elderly, plus a last minute plea for wool, needles and patterns as Huhudi had seen photos of our small church knitting group in action and wanted to replicate the project. We meet on a Wednesday morning for an hour if you would like to join us as we add to the stock of warm clothing to be taken out to Huhudi on the next visit to the partnership.

Between all this planned and unexpected excitement the church council has now completed work on producing our Benefice Profile - a joint document prepared by Cholsey and Moulsford churches - to be made available to any interested applicant for the post of Benefice Vicar. There are still some additional aspects of the recruitment processes to be completed but if all goes according to plan, interviews will be held at the end of September with an anticipated start date for the new Vicar of early 2023.

So it only remains for us to wish you all a happy holiday for all those fortunate to be able to get away or maybe to have a little more time to relax at home and enjoy the sunshine. To all our young people, particularly those who have been involved in external examinations, we send our best wishes for successful outcomes. We hope you will have the opportunity to enjoy catching up with friends and families over the school holidays prior to beginning the new school or college year in September.

Gardening diary

Hello! This month we made a polytunnel in the allotment. First, my dad dug the holes for the poles. Then he and my mum put the poles in. I helped with putting the stabiliser poles on, after they had done that. Then we put the plastic sheet over. It is this white, opaque sheet. After putting it on and lining it up properly, we had to secure the polythene by screwing on planks of wood. After it was finished, we moved all of the chillies and peppers to the polytunnel. Now we have some more space in the greenhouse (finally). The nicotina that I thinned last month has bin growing really well and has been potted into different pots. They are already SO much bigger! My broad

beans have been growing really well — they are the best in our allotment, but most of my onions died. Luckily, my sister's onions are doing brilliantly. My dahlias have flowered, I have 2 yellow ones and one red one. Recently I have been eating some delicious strawberries and raspberries from the allotment.

Challenge

You may want your garden nice and neat, but do keep a patch of lawn unmowed. Having places with daisies and longer grass is a good idea as bees, bugs and beetles will like it there.

Gardening Tip

If you have any plastic water bottles, you can use them as mini greenhouses for seedlings. Here is how you do it. First, cut it in half. For smaller seedlings, use the top half of the bottle. Take off the lid and put it over the seedling. Push it into the ground a bit so that it doesn't blow away in the wind. For bigger ones you use the bottom of the bottle and cut holes in the bottom, for ventilation. Then you do exactly the same as with the other bottle.



Artificial Intelligence set to support biodiversity research at Oxfordshire wetlands site

Local environmental charity Earth Trust has partnered with the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology (UKCEH) to install a state-of-the-art monitoring station at a floodplain on Clifton Meadow, adjacent to the River Thames. This high-tech piece of equipment uses AI software to monitor the wildlife visiting the site through sound recordings and photographs. By tracking changes to the wildlife and atmospheric conditions present at the site such as birds, bats and small mammals, Earth Trust can scientifically prove the value of these wetlands, which are visible from the historic Day's Lock at Dorchester-on-Thames. At a global scale, using AI technology to track wildlife activity is still in development, which makes this work especially ground-breaking.

Earth Trust are thrilled to be partnering with UKCEH on this project, who provided the state-of-the-art equipment thanks to their work with Network Rail in 2021. The rail provider enlisted UKCEH to create a biodiversity monitoring station to autonomously record and identify the calls of birds and bats, plus photograph small mammals and moths. The prototype model is now being put to good use for the River of Life II project. As part of an ongoing ecological research project, the monitoring station will be generating important evidence. Earth Trust will use this evidence to learn about the impacts of creating wetland on a flood plain plus the potential changes in species richness, and diversity of life – including any new species in the area.



River of Life II is the largest wetland habitat creation of its kind, and follows the success of Earth Trust's first wetland habitat creation, River of Life, which was carried out near Shillingford.

River of Life II is enabling the transformation of three locations along the River Thames and Thame, working in partnership with two other landowners — Church Farm Partnership and The Hurst Water Meadow Trust. With wetlands increasingly suspected to play an important role in storing carbon, and with their ability to act as natural flood defences and filtration systems to improve water quality, these habitats can have far-reaching effects. Earth Trust aim to create a demonstration of how landowners working in partnership can

make a difference through initiatives like the River of Life II. If replicated on an even larger scale (for example, at many more places along the River Thames) then the impacts would be even more significant for local communities of people and wildlife alike.

The solar-powered equipment was put in place earlier this month and is set to remain there for many years to come. The first set of data is now being recorded via several bespoke features including a moth camera, a small mammal camera and a bat ultrasound recorder. It also records rainfall, wind speed and humidity to track the meteorological impacts on wildlife. A 360° camera records the vegetation growth.

Earth Trust volunteers will collect the data at regular intervals, then UKCEH will conduct the necessary data-crunching to help the charity deliver the findings. It is expected that a variety of bats, wetland birds and water voles, will be identified, but surprises may well be in store as well! Earth Trust will be sharing data as it is received, so anyone keen to track progress can keep up to date by following the charities social channels.

Ian Nutt, Director of Programmes and Partnerships at Earth Trust, shares his thoughts about the enterprise: "We are so excited about this piece of kit, and looking forward to putting the data to good use. We want to share the findings with others to demonstrate the benefits that other similar projects may create. The best part is that, since the new features of this wetland area have just begun bedding in, it's the perfect opportunity for us to monitor the impact from inception. We are so grateful to UKCEH for their support and innovation."



Dr Tom August, Computational Ecologist at the UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology (UKCEH) says, "New sensor and AI technology is having a big impact on how ecologists monitor biodiversity. UKCEH is harnessing a range of these developments to build and test autonomous monitoring stations for monitoring wildlife, from bats to birds and moths mammals. Working with the Earth Trust is a fantastic opportunity to test these technologies 'in the wild' and at the same time gather data on the wildlife colonising this inspirational new habitat creation project."



Earth Trust are excited to see what discoveries will be made.

River Of Life II key info

- Habitat creation was the River of Life project which was undertaken in collaboration with the EA, it involved the creation of 17 ponds, 5 backwaters, 2 reedbeds, 1 fen and 3.3Ha of wet woodland containing 4,000 trees.
- Significant amount of BAP habitat creation contributing 20% of lowland meadow creation and 5% of fen creation to the Oxfordshire targets.
- LIDAR was used to identify the low-lying areas which would readily flood, this was key when it came to working out where to site the planned features. For example, the wet woodland needs a high water table for most of the year so we planted it in a low-lying area. The images also helped show paleochannels, old tributaries or backwaters of the Thames, long filled in, which could be reinstated.
- Overall 38,000 m3 of spoil was excavated, some of which was then spread over our arable fields. Construction took 12 weeks in 2013 and although it made quite a mess initially it's now looking great and has established well.
- Off of the success of the River of Life I we applied for a Water Environment Grant (WEG) in order to undertake a 2nd River of Life project. The WEG is a one off funding stream created to fund works to improve wetland habitats. At the end of 2018 we applied for the funding and then successfully secured approximately £1.6 million to carry out our ambitious plans.
- Three of the project's sites are within the floodplain of the River Thames or River Thame (Clifton Meadow, Church Farm and Overy Mead). Work here created 16 ponds (c. 15,000m2) and 7 backwater channels (c. 32,000m2).
- The works at these locations involved the movement of approximately 44,000m3 of spoil in order to shape the new wetland features.
- We created ~6 additional breeding ponds for Great Crested Newts within Little Wittenham Wood SSSI/SAC;
- The project put in place structures such as boardwalks and directional signage to enable people to easily access wetland ecosystems both within the original River of Life project area and to some of the newly created wetland features.




