MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR OF BASINGSTOKE & DEANE COUNCILLOR DIANE TAYLOR

I have always noted that humans are great adjusters. Whenever there is a difficult and significant change in our lives, perhaps a death or illness or relationship break-up, we can feel that we will never get used to it... but somehow, with time, we always manage to adjust to our 'new normal' and get on with life in its different format.

If you had told me last year that in Spring 2020 I would be confined to my home for weeks on end, working forever at the computer, not meeting people face-to-face, queueing to get into food shops, unable to attend a single public meeting or event, I would have been horrified. How can I live like that? Guess what - I can! Like everyone who is either completely isolated for health reasons or, at the other end of the scale, working all hours to save the lives of dangerously ill people, somehow we humans adjust and find a way to get on with life.



ne of the final public duties of my Mayoral year would have been to lead the celebrations of the 75th Anniversary of VE Day on Friday 8th May. In the meantime, please stay safe by staying at home unless it's for an essential journey as outlined by the government and help to reduce the spread of COVID-19.



The service is strategically important because it can scale to over 3000 home deliveries every week. Orders are delivered in 48 hours and there are no issues with slots.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

Local Government legislation has arguably been behind the times but has stepped up to allow for remote Parish Council meetings. Up to 3rd April 2020, only meetings in person have been lawful as from the creation of Parish Councils in England by the reforming Local Government Act of 1894. This situation has been updated (temporarily) by regulation under the Coronavirus Act 2020.

Annex A to <u>Letter to Local Councils</u> from Paul Rowsell CBE, Head of the Governance Reform and Democracy Unit, Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government 6th April 2020

The Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authority and Police and Crime Panel Meetings) (England and Wales) Regulations 2020

These Regulations enable all local authority meetings to be held remotely, including allowing remote access by members of the public.

The Regulations are drafted very broadly, applying to different types of local authorities, and to different categories of meetings including annual meetings, cabinet and committee meetings. Local authorities can decide not to hold the legally prescribed annual meeting.

Where meetings are held, local authorities have the flexibility to hold them at any time of day and on any day, to alter how frequently they are held and to move or cancel them without further notice. Where a local authority does not hold an annual meeting (AGM), current appointments will continue until the next annual meeting of the authority or when the local authority determines.

Meetings may be held remotely including via telephone conferencing, video conferencing, live webchat and live streaming. Members of the public and press may also access meetings remotely.

The Regulations are not prescriptive about how local authorities may facilitate remote meetings or related matters such as voting and access to documents by members and the public. Different solutions will be appropriate in different localities and local authorities may make appropriate Standing Orders.

The Regulations came into force on 4 April 2020 and apply to meetings taking place before 7th May 2021. We are able to legislate to bring forward this date if medical and scientific advice leads to the relaxation of social distancing rules.

TEMPORARY CHANGES TO WASTE COLLECTIONS

From 20 April, BDBC, working with Serco, will collect grey waste bins fortnightly instead of weekly. Green recycling bin collections will take place as usual and waste bins will be emptied on the alternate week. The day of the week will not change.

The service will be monitored and reviewed regularly to respond to changes in government guidance as they emerge.

Residents who receive an assisted collection, as they need help to put out their own bins and do not have anyone who can do this for them, will continue to get this support from the bin crews. The clinical waste service will also continue as normal for those customers who are registered to use this service.

Households with smaller 140 litre waste bins will be able to leave out two extra sacks. Those households with larger 240 litre waste bins can only fill their bin as normal and no additional sacks will be taken. If you are a large family you can apply for a larger or additional bin if you do not already have one.

CAR PARKS CLOSED AT BASINGSTOKE PARKS (9th April)

The car parks at Eastrop Park, Crabtree Plantation and the Lime Pits are all being closed after people were using the open spaces to gather in groups during the good weather.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR RESIDENTS, COMMUNITIES AND LOCAL BUSINESSES (21st April)

All households across the borough automatically resume Council Tax payments from June 2020 for 10 months.

Council tax bills have been reduced by up to ± 200 for workingage residents eligible for the Council Tax Reduction Scheme.

The Council has awarded £200,000 to Basingstoke Voluntary Action, enabling it to provide grants to Community Groups so that they can provide support and distribute essential supplies to residents unable to leave their homes.

Following the announcement of financial support by Government, the Council is also supporting eligible local businesses through a combination of business rates relief and grants.

Leisure, retail and hospitality businesses, as well as early years providers, estate agents, letting agencies and bingo halls, will not pay business rates in the 2020/21 financial year.

Grants of £10,000 and £25,000 have also been made accessible to an estimated 1,600 eligible local businesses.

To further boost the available financial support for businesses, the Council has made a three-month rent and service charge holiday available for all 344 small businesses in council-owned properties with annual rents of up to \pounds 50,000.

I thought I had best use my time at home constructively and provide you all with an update from a Country Watch & Neighbourhood Watch perspective. PC Reid will have given us an update on crimes within the area, but I will just reiterate that there has been a pattern of non-dwelling (i.e. shed) burglaries. Thieves have been targeting power tools, guad bikes and plant machinery. Please do make sure your sheds and out buildings are kept secure when not in use and consider registering your items at www.immobilise.com it's free to do so. Nationally there has also been an increase in both online and face to face scams. Criminals have been quick to try to cash in on fears surrounding COVID-19 and using this as a lure to try to part you from your money. The advice is to not respond to any unsolicited emails or texts and never click on the links contained within them. Criminals have also been using the current situation as cover to conduct distraction burglaries. They turn up on the doorstep offering home testing, to collect shopping or offering advice and once inside the property keep you distracted while an accomplice helps themselves to your valuables. I will say that we have not heard of this being tried in the village and we are lucky to have such a great community where friends and neighbours pull together meaning nobody should be left relying on strangers. I'll finish this section with a request for new members to join the distribution list. I currently have approximately 35 households and businesses registered to receive alerts from Country Watch, Neighbourhood Watch and directly from PC Reid. If you'd like to join, then please just drop me an email.



Another issue that has unfortunately increased during the current lockdown is fly tipping. I feared this would be the case when Hampshire County Council temporarily closed the recycling centre on Wade Road and Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council stopped large waste collections whilst reducing household waste collections too. It seems a day does not go by without more waste being dumped somewhere in the Parish, be it a mattress dumped on Farleigh Rd, waste left in the various laybys or sharps bins left in hedgerows.

The borough council's clean up teams are still working and will clear the waste when it is reported so please keep reporting it at; https://www.basingstoke.gov.uk/report. I am currently seeking permissions to deploy camera traps in the known hot spots, if successful these should help bring the culprits to account. For small scale fly tipping the authorities can issue fixed penalties of up to £400 and this includes if your waste is found to have been illegally dumped not just to anyone caught dumping it. For larger or persistent offenders, a successful prosecution at court could lead to an unlimited fine and/or 5 years imprisonment. I strongly believe that if a few people are caught and punished the message will spread which will lead to a reduction in this awful activity in our area, fingers crossed!

Finally, I've been asked to explain a little bit about the Speed Indicator Devices (SID) I manage on behalf of the Parish Council. These not only display the speed to approaching drivers to help them 'remember' to stay below 30mph in the village, but they also record data. For every vehicle the date and time plus the speed at which it was travelling is recorded on the SID (no details of the vehicle itself are recorded). I can then download and analyse this data before passing on to the police who can then target problem areas at problem times with a speed trap and (if required) issue fines/points. When set in a 30mph zone the signs will only display speeds between 27-43mph this is to deter 'boy racers' from trying to set the fastest time through them, apparently this had happened with the original design. Unfortunately, one of the SIDs has developed a fault and we are currently awaiting a replacement once lockdown is lifted. They do appear to make a difference to those 'forgetful' drivers and help to reduce speeding within the village. So far, my analysis hasn't revealed anything we didn't already know; peak times for numbers of speeding vehicles coincides with rush hour and school timings whilst the highest individual speeds are recorded during the quiet hours at night.

I hope you all stay safe and remember that we live in a relatively safe area despite the points I raise here and in my emails to Country Watch & Neighbourhood Watch members.

What a month! We went into April with the COVID-19 related lockdown in full force and at the time of writing it is still in place and still will be by the time you read this. As a result, the Hall has been closed since 23rd March and sadly we have had to postpone or cancel all events and bookings for the time being.

Prior to the lockdown the Trustees had already discussed and agreed a programme of improvements for the Hall, some annual and some one-off, and we are pleased to say that we are continuing with this programme, bringing a few forward to take advantage of the Hall being completely unused for the time being.

One of the key improvements is an upgrade to the carpark lighting, replacing the old bollard lights with something similar but now with much more economical and environmentally friendly LED lights, along with the placement of a few extra bollards in the far corners of the carpark.

In addition, we continue with our regular schedule of work which includes redecoration and floor revarnishing. But the key to these going ahead is an assessment that it is safe to do so in the current climate by ensuring that social distancing rules are adhered to with the prime focus being on people's health and well-being.

A request: Since the Hall is now not being used it is potentially at a higher risk of malicious damage and theft. There is already a report of lead having been taken from a hall elsewhere in NE Hampshire! If you see anything suspicious going on in the vicinity of the Hall, then please report it through the usual channels.

Otherwise, there is no news to report this month, so a couple of items focused on Hall fundraising in these financially difficult times:

We have mentioned **Give As You Live** many times over the years so this is a reminder that this is a very easy way to make **free** donations to the Hall whenever you shop online, and by all accounts we are all doing that a lot more at the moment. So, if you have not done so already, please sign up for free at www.giveasyoulive.com/join/cliddesdenhall before you do any more online shopping. Once you have done this then whenever you shop at over 4,200 top online stores, a donation will be made to the Hall on your behalf at absolutely no cost to you. What could be simpler?
