COMMUNITY FUNDING FROM KEW GARDENS

To embellish the proposed Commemorative Wood in Frog Lane, I applied for wild flower seeds that are being donated by the National Botanical Gardens, Kew. I also found a source of funds from Kew for our village teenagers and those in their early twenties that seems to be worth publicising.

"Grow Wild" is Kew's outreach programme to the public. It has money from The National Lottery and others, based upon and inspired by the Great Outdoors. The organisation is inviting 14-25 year olds to dream up and undertake a project that is judged as a really good idea for promoting wild life – either visually, creatively, in a transformational way or even musically! Grow Wild is offering to help each project along with a grant of £500.

The website is www.Growwilduk.com/creative that includes a short video and offers of available support to projects.

It appears that these projects can cover just about anything based upon the inspiration of our UK native plants or fungi. I asked the coordinator about it and received the following reply:

"You might decide to create visual art through painting or photography. Maybe music, poetry or dance are more your thing? How about transforming a space in your community? Or even designing your own fashion collection? Pick something you enjoy doing, involve other people and let your imagination run riot."

Grow Wild was publicly voted the UK's Best Environment Project in the National Lottery Awards on BBC1.



FORMER WATERCRESS BEDS, FROG LANE

With the support of the Parish Council and having consulted with both the Hampshire Wildlife Trust and the South East Rivers Trust (Loddon catchment) on how best to approach this, some work has begun to try to improve the environment around the water channel at the former

watercress bed on Frog Lane.

The aim over time is to narrow the channel into a more sinuous flow with planted areas on opposing / adjacent banks (see diagram). Hopefully this will lead to slightly deeper, faster water flow which in turn will scour and clean the chalk bed (ideal for spawning fish) and better control existing overgrown vegetation (which in one case is non-native).

This is a medium term plan; we are learning as we go along, and the aim is to work a section at a time, outside nesting / spawning time, to manage everything sensitively. The area around the water channel has

been somewhat dominated by one or two plant-types and if we can encourage greater diversity then this should also attract more varied wildlife over time.

One of the methods of narrowing the channel is to use brash piles (loose bundles of reed and wood eg willow, hazel or the thin branches from the crown of local, native trees). Similarly, trunks of fallen / dead trees (native again) can also be useful. With the help of Herriard Estates we have been able to secure a good supply of hazel in particular, that was due to be coppiced in any event.

Delivery of the Nomination Papers, Consent to Nomination and assorted paperwork MUST be by hand, and should usually be by the candidate or the proposer or seconder of the nomination. Where it is delivered by somebody other than those listed above, the Returning Officer may accept it but this person cannot make amendments if they are needed.

NEWNHAM GREEN

The Parish Council is working to put together a five-year plan for Green maintenance - which will be agreed with owners the Malmesbury Charitable Trust and mindful of residents' views and use of the Green. The offers received of volunteer help are greatly appreciated.

HOOK NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN JUDICIAL REVIEW

In October last year Wilbur Developments initiated a Judicial Review against the Hook Neighbourhood Plan (NP) on grounds associated with the NP's designation of the 'Local Gap' between Hook and Newnham. This Judicial Review was held at the Royal Courts of Justice on 21st January 2020.

On 11th February, the presiding Judge issued her judgment dismissing Wilbur's claim on all three grounds of challenge. This means that the Hook Neighbourhood Plan can now proceed to formal adoption by Hart as the local Planning Authority and will inform future planning decisions for Hook.

HART LOCAL PLAN

Hart District Council is pleased to announce receipt of the Inspector's Report for its Local Plan. This follows the examination hearings which took place in late 2018 and the consultation on the proposed modifications which concluded in August 2019.

The Inspector Jonathon Manning has found that the Local Plan is sound, subject to inclusion of his recommended Main Modifications and that the Local Plan can now proceed to formal adoption.

In accordance with the Town and County Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012, Regulation 25 requires the Council to publish the Inspector's Report. Accordingly the Inspector's Report and Schedule of Main Modifications can be viewed on the Council's website at

The case presented by Wilbur Developments essentially challenged the need for a Local Gap between Hook and Newnham which the Hook Neighbourhood Plan states should be preserved. Wilbur argued that the Examiner and Hart DC failed to challenge the evidence provided by the NP to establish the need for the Gap. And Wilbur placed emphasis on the withdrawal of the Gap Policy from the Hart draft Local Plan.

Hart District Council's barrister argued consistency with the emerging Local Plan which recognised the Neighbourhood Plan could designate a Gap in order to prevent coalescence. He also stressed the boundaries of the Gap were established by practical planning work on the ground with consultations with the local community – providing fact-based site visits/observations.

Interestingly, as part of their case, Wilbur's Barrister argued that 'opinion of residents is not material in regard to the making of Planning Policy'. This is not in keeping with the concept of making of Neighbourhood Plans where 'Neighbourhood Planning gives communities the power to develop a shared vision for their area'. 'Neighbourhood Plans can shape, direct and help to deliver sustainable development' (para 29, NPPF).

Hart DC and Hook PC have fully adhered to the Neighbourhood Plan process which went through Independent Examination, Hart DC scrutiny, and a very successful Referendum.

PREPARING FOR MORE FREQUENT FLOODING

Hampshire County Council (HCC) is our Lead Local Flood Authority. Flooding or drainage problems can be reported at https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance/roadproblems/flooding .

However all land and property owners are responsible for preventing surface water flowing from their land onto the Highways and responsible for maintaining their own ditches and culverts.

HCC will respond to instances of Highways flooding or of trees blocking the Highway, call emergency number 0300 555 1388.

When storm weather warnings are issued, 'partner agencies' including the Environment Agency, HCC Emergency Planning and the Borough Council

(BDBC) work together 'to ensure the public is warned and informed and that all necessary precautions are in place'.

During named storm periods, BDBC will have operational staff on standby - 'to provide emergency sand bag distribution and chainsaw clearance of fallen trees on the council's land - plus additional tree surgeons on standby to deal with any TPO trees that are damaged or pose a risk'.

HCC and BDBC hold a limited emergency supply of sandbags which they say are for 'rapid deployment' - 'directing and diverting surface flows into existing channels or ditches'. Councils do not generally supply sandbags to residents. With regards to flooding of private land, all residents are responsible for protecting their own property.

CLEAN AIR ANTI IDLING CAMPAIGN

Councilor's Briefing - update by Cllr Hayley Eachus, Cabinet member for Environment and Enforcement.



It has been over year a since the Borough Council (BDBC) launched its Clean Air Campaign encouraging people to reduce air pollution by using their vehicles less, to stop idling their car engines and to think about the ways in which they can reduce pollution in their own homes.

The campaign has seen BDBC and partners work with local schools to encourage parents and children to travel to school differently and reduce idling outside the school gates, and work with taxi drivers to reduce idling and encourage the use of ultra-low emission vehicles. We have also supported awareness and education events giving out over 5,000 anti-idling stickers to motorists to place on their car windows.

Response has been positive but in light of the Climate Emergency declaration last September, BDBC is bringing in new powers to issue fixed penalty notices to those motorists caught idling while stationary on a public highway. The notices can be issued by the council's Civil Enforcement Officers, Community Safety Patrol Officers and Environmental Officers. The $\pounds 20$ fines will be a last resort and a notice will only be issued when a motorist refuses to switch off their engine.

The fixed penalty notices will come into force in March 2020 and support the work towards a carbon neutral borough by 2030.

NEW PERMIT SYSTEM FOR HCC RECYCLING CENTRES



Hampshire residents will need to register their car for free <u>by 1st April</u>

A new residents' permit system is to begin operating at Hampshire Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs). It will be controlled by Automatic Number Plate Recognition and will allow continued free access for Hampshire residents to dispose of household waste.

Access for non-Hampshire residents will be for a fee of £5 per visit. Charges for non-household waste, including soil and rubble, plasterboard and asbestos remain. Hampshire residents can register up to three vehicles at www.hants.gov.uk/vehicle-registration-hwrc, or by calling 0300 555 1389.

The system will check the registration of the cars coming into the site against the registered number plates so that Hampshire residents can freely enter the sites as many times as they wish, without any further checks. Note that Hampshire residents who already hold a van or trailer permit do not need to re-register that particular vehicle.

Have you ever just sat and watched as a young child desperately tries to copy something their parent is doing? Whether it's sitting in a certain way, tying their shoelaces, or even using phrases they've heard – both good and those not necessarily to be used in polite company!!

A few weeks ago, I had the absolute pleasure to be sitting on a mat in the sunshine playing with my youngest goddaughter, who was about to turn one. I don't know quite what possessed me but, in attempt to make her smile, I started clicking my tongue at her. She immediately cocked her head to one side, fixed me with her intelligent eyes, listened really carefully, and proceeded to click back. This 'conversation' went on for some time – me clicking, her responding, me clicking back. As it continued, she got more and more excited, grinning from ear to ear – as of course was I – and becoming more and more confident with her efforts.

This got me thinking – who do I listen to... I mean really listen to... who do I pay attention to? Who, when they say or do something, do I really want to emulate? Who or what do I allow to influence my life?

Our daughter used to be an international competitive swimmer. She'd practise her strokes for hours on end in the pool, listen to her coaches for advice, watch other swimmers to see how they placed their arms or flapped their feet. She knew, if she spent time listening, watching and putting into practice these good habits, she'd become a better swimmer. She dedicated hours of her time to just being around the people who could help her become better. As her coach always said, 'practice makes permanent'. He didn't like the other version, practice makes perfect — as he quite rightly pointed out, if you're practising doing it wrong, you'll only get worse!! You see, the people we spend time with, the things we watch, who we listen to... they all influence so crucially who we are, what kind of person we become...

So, my question is, who do we choose to surround ourselves with? What practices or habits are we forming now, which will eventually become permanent? Is it our friends around us? The sports team we're part of? Work colleagues? Family? Technology? You see, however hard we try, it is almost impossible to allow ourselves only to be influenced by the good, to filter out the stuff that isn't useful. In fact, let's face it, it is impossible. We see people we sometimes barely even know and yet admire, and somehow wish to copy their dress sense, attitude or taste in music. What else are we allowing them to influence us in? Where do we draw the line between being part of the crowd and succumbing to peer pressure?

As you read these lines, we will be heading into Easter. A time when we remember Jesus, arguably the most influential person in history, at his most influential moment – the days surrounding His death and resurrection. As we leaf through the Bible's account of those days, we see example after example of ways that Jesus was an influence on those He came into contact with. Whether it was His saving words to His fellow prisoner, as He hung on the cross; the stark image of the darkened sky and torn curtain, which convinced the centurion of who He really was, or even doubting Thomas, as he was able to experience the physical proof of Jesus' resurrection. They were all changed in some way through their encounter with Him, spending time in His presence.

But His influence certainly didn't stop there. Today nearly 2.5 billion people around the world would consider themselves Christians, their lives influenced on a daily basis by Jesus and His life – and that's not to mention those whose lives are governed by legal systems and moral yardsticks, based on His teachings.

But the scariest part of this influence thing is it goes both ways... Just as much as you are influenced, you are also influencers! There are already people who are looking up to you for advice and help. Your admiring grandchild, your employee, your neighbour, the one who pops around for coffee, even though you wish they wouldn't; these are the people you are probably already influencing.

You have most likely come across our new logo over the last few weeks – More+, and I guess this is exactly what that logo and the idea behind it is all about - that we as a church become ever more influenced by Jesus' teachings; become filled with more love, joy, peace, kindness and more of a sense of purpose, and that the fruit of this influence will ripple out into our communities as we offer them life, and life in all its fullness.
