

COURTING EXCELLENCE

A new era for the tennis court was ushered in last month when John and Elaine Clemenger stepped down from the management committee after 26 years of distinguished and dedicated service, and a fresh team took their place with a brief to get more of us playing. Among the proposals discussed at a meeting of the parish council and the tennis committee were coaching for children and adults, a West Ilsley tournament and a new system for booking the court. More than 20 people contributed their thoughts for the new committee of Amanda Knight, Andy Driver, Sue Evans and Polly Muir to mull over. These included setting up a club with an annual fee while ensuring that non-members still have a chance to 'pay and play', obtaining tickets for Wimbledon and replacing the surface of the court in a few years' time. The parish council applauded the Clemengers for the huge amount of painstaking work that has gone into maintaining the court over so many years, and wished their successors well in ensuring that more tennis is played on it from next spring onwards. We also decided to make a start on cutting back the trees around the court, particularly on the side where they overshadow the gardens of the adjacent cottages. If all goes according to plan, this year's bonfire on November 5 will be even bigger than usual!

WEST ILSLEY TENNIS COURT

Following an EGM Parish Council meeting four (later to be Five!) members of West Ilsley volunteered to serve on the new committee. The five of us reconvened at The Harrow (where else?) to discuss certain urgent matters (trees, keys, use of court, etc.) with Elaine Clemenger. We shall, henceforth, of course, be known as The Famous Five (only joking!)

It was agreed that John and Elaine would hand over the relevant paperwork and details formally at the beginning of November. The Clemengers were offered lifetime membership access in recognition of all the work they have done: they have declined, graciously, to take up this offer.

There were many issues that we wished to discuss, some of which will need to be tackled in the future: at the moment we need to take one step at a time. Anyone wishing to see the minutes of the meeting is, of course, most welcome to approach the secretary.

The committee is very keen that the use of the court is maximised: the chairman reiterated that he was wanting to encourage all ages and abilities to play, especially the younger ones. The idea is to make the club inclusive, not exclusive, for both the serious and occasional player, as well as fun and sociable (with the cricket club as a role model we have a very high bar!). To this end we propose to change both the booking system and the access to the key.

PAYMENT: we decided that membership would be a fairer and easier way of paying, endeavouring to keep prices competitive, but at the same time sufficient to cover the considerable overheads of the court. These we will need to review on an annual basis (suck it and see basis!). Proposed fees as follows:

- Household rate: £40
- Individual membership £25 (Junior and Concessions £20)
- The court should also be available to hire on an hourly basis (?charge£6.00/hour)

BOOKING: Sue has set up an on-line booking system (details will be delivered by way of the WIN), but, additionally for those who don't have internet access, there will be a notice put up, ? outside the village hall). Clearly, there may be some trial and error involved here, as we haven't had a similar scheme running before and we may not cover all eventualities.

ACCESS: we thought that a combination lock would provide security with accessibility (possible

periodical change of number), but conveyed to all who pay.

It is possible, if there are enough keen players to run tournaments...tone up your batwings and thunder thighs...

The trees will, by now, have had their grade one short back and sides on the eastern perimeter. What it will look like is anybody's guess. If three of the committee go missing it looks bad (they voted one way for the trees): if two disappear, then it is the other way round: if all five disappear someone else will have the problem of burgeoning conifers. Let's hope they make a good bonfire great!

We are going to be meeting monthly, so if you have any requests please do contact any one of us. We are keen to get some ideas for the younger members of the community, so we would love to hear from you i'il and not so small fellas out there. If there are youthful tennis players out there with ideas, we would like to you to attend the meetings (you needn't stay!).

A NOTE FROM JOHN CLEMENGER, RETIRING CHAIRMAN OF THE TENNIS COURT COMMITTEE

Suffice to say, that after 26 years on the management committee I have some "thanking" to do. Thanks, firstly, to Norman for agreeing to give up some of his land for tennis; to Jan Wiejak , a past chairman who masterminded the resurfacing of the court in 1992 (incidentally, the cost now £26,000?); to John Verney and Denis Gilmore, two stalwarts on the committee for almost the life of the court. Also , not forgetting our own Julia Rockall who was Booking Clerk when she ran her much loved (and missed!) General Stores in the village. I also thank Jackie Atkins for her support throughout, as one of the Guarantors to the court. Finally I must say a big "thank you" to my wife, Elaine, for her unstinting and loyal work as Booking Clerk for many years. A great one for supporting the youth of the village, I have often marvelled at the ease with which she can communicate with the young people when they present themselves for 'the key'. A mixture of humour, discipline and a real concern for the individual seems to be her style.

So, the future looks bright for the court. The tall leylands have been cut on the west side, for reasons I will let others explain. The other two sides will follow as and when finance allows. The Parish Council and West Ilsley Trust have generously agreed to pay for this. Our own finances will be needed for renewal of fencing in the future.

It may well be that in years to come the court may become a multi-sports facility. Meanwhile, Carole Driver and her small group of regular players might well decide to form the nucleus of a Tennis Club. I am assured that the court will remain an 'open' court and that all youngsters keen on playing will be well catered for also.

THE SUMMER OF 08

Little doubt countless articles will find their way into the mass media regarding the summer that never was, but in geological terms we are bearing witness to a period of change that occurs with a degree of regularity. Comprehensive weather records go back less than 100 years so we tend to compare with what we know, but we are aware of severe winters and wet summers from the Middle Ages on, peaking in the 18th century with what is best described as a mini ice age. Compared with a temperate climate a millennium prior to that saw grape vines flourish in southern England

The reason I'm waffling on has more to do about our future than the present - and our ability or lack of it to adapt. The farming members of this village were no doubt fed up to the back teeth with me inquiring on a daily basis about the progression of their harvest, but it is a matter that may well have to be addressed not only locally but globally if we are to feed the developed world let alone the third. We are, as a species, pretty adept at meeting future needs and little doubt varieties of grain will be developed to meet changing climate, but it doesn't happen over night and I'm not a little concerned about the interim. I am writing this in the middle of a world wide financial breakdown which will effect some more than others but the bottom line to all life subsistence is food, nothing else matters, but the body politic is concentrated on matters fiscal at the expense of the real issues of agricultural self sufficiency in a country that once nearly was and now sadly isn't - and as much as I would like to remain "A political", the question we must ask of our elected (present or future) representatives is not so much what they are going to do (heaven forbid) but if they are aware of the problem. This may or may not have anything to do with greenhouse gas emissions, personally I think it has not, at least not in the sense we can do anything to combat its inevitability other than meet the challenge before it meets us.


