POLICE UPDATE

Dear Residents

Sadly my reporting of a reduction in reported crime last month has come back to haunt me. I am seeking any information / witnesses to a series of twelve burglaries to outbuildings and garages all

across our area from Preston Candover through to Up Nately, this over two separate occasions. However the area of this magazine was only mainly affected overnight of April 5th /6th when the thieves returned and a further six outbuildings and garages were broken into, one in Weston Patrick, five in Herriard. A garage was also broken into in Upton Grey. On the same night three outbuildings were broken into at separate premises in Up Nately. In Blaegrove Lane a chainsaw and petrol can containing petrol was stolen from one premise whilst in another more fuel, a hedge trimmer, garden strimmer and chainsaw was stolen and at the third nothing was stolen and the garage was entered.

At 01:30 am on Wednesday April 13th a silver Subaru was seen in Tunworth being driven into private wooden gates which thankfully held and the criminals did not managed to get into the grounds of the house. The same night metal containers were broken into at a farm in Old Basing where £`1,400 worth of tools was stolen, this at 04.30 am and a garage was entered in Blackstocks Lane, Nately Scures where again nothing was stolen. At 04.30 on April 19th we had three further sheds broken into in Tunworth Road at Mapledurwell.

I ask if any one saw or heard anything suspicious or unusual over these nights please give me a call direct, as always all calls treated in strictest confidence. Whilst at this time of year we often do see a rise in outbuildings and garden sheds etc being broken into this clearly not to this extent and I continue to urge residents to have good security with shed alarms etc to protect their property. Please record serial numbers, take photographs and engrave your postcode on items. If you are not a member I ask you to consider contacting your local Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator and have ONLY your email address added to their contacts list so I can update local residents at the TIME of such crimes taking place, and likewise residents can contact me. Our local NHW co-ordinators who do a really first rate excellent job: For Newnham we have newnham.clerk@ btinternet.com, for Mapledurwell we have gillyradcliffe@hotmail.com I am looking for someone at Andwell, Nately Scures and Up Nately, basically all I need is some who is available to send out emails to a contact list of local residents that live in that parish, no meetings etc just a point of contact who can keep other residents who only need to supply an email address, (no other details), up to date with events as and when they happen. If anyone is interested within these parishes please give me a call direct.

May I also conclude that the above burglary pattern is part of a much larger set of crimes all of a similar nature across various parts of North Hampshire not just our area in particular. If you want crime prevention advice please give me a call and I will call around. Likewise I am preparing some advice which I will send to the local NHW who will then pass on if you are signed up.

On May 5th 2016 the second Police & Crime Commissioner Elections are due to be held, Polling Stations will be held in the usual places. This is an opportunity for you to vote for who you would like to hold the position.

Many thanks and please remain vigilant but do not worry, if you have any concerns please give me a call direct.

NEWNHAM NEWTS NEWS

It's good to see that our Great Crested Newts (and also smooth and palmate newts) have once again returned to our Newnham Village ponds . They spend most of their lives on land and return to the water after their winter dormancy to breed , leaving the water again after mating . Hence the conditions of the



habitat around the ponds (woods , uncultivated land, gardens) are just as important to a thriving newt population as is the condition of the ponds themselves . Other ponds within a short distance are vital for dispersal of young newts and for standby water should a pond dry out. Other wildlife undoubtably benefits from well-maintained habitat in and around the ponds.

In association with CAEcology , a private ecology company , I have undertaken a Habitat Suitabilty Index (HSI) , torch-light inspection and bottle-trapping of Great Crested Newts (GCN)on our 3 village ponds . The HSI is a recognised method of analysing the state of habitats in and around the ponds . It consists of ten measurements including water quality, presence or absence of fish or waterfowl, presence of other ponds within 1km etc . Our two biggest ponds score extremely well due to optimal size , not drying out too often, good water quality , absence of fish , only moorhens as waterfowl (they don't bother newts), other ponds within 1km , good terrestrial habitat close by and optimal weed cover. The HSI for the two bigger ponds was .9 (out of 1.0) and therefor scored as excellent for a thriving newt population . The smallest pond scored lower due to its increased weed cover and closely overhanging foliage . Torching revealed 1 male and 1 female GCN in the largest pond . Bottle-trapping overnight produced 4 female GCNs and 2 smooth newts from the biggest pond and f 1 smooth newt from the middle-sized pond . No newts were found in the smallest pond . It was still early in the mating season and these numbers probably reflect a healthy newt population.

Interestingly, the newly-excavated Rotherwick pond produced no newts at all from bottletrapping .

CAEcology were highly complimentary regarding our management of the ponds and have offered to help us continue to assess the conditions of the ponds and advise on future maintenance. The habitat surveys were undertaken with no cost to the Parish . I would like to thank the "Band of Brothers "who helped with the winter pond work; Johr Broughton Nigel Downes , Marcus Jefferson, and Chris Bingham . I would like to see more helpers when we tackle the ponds in November . With more willing hands we can achieve even more, especially with the middle-sized pond. As before hot-dogs and tea will be provided and who knows , if the pub reopens then we may able to provide beers all round !!!!

SOLVE Report

Local Plan sound says Inspector – Good news for the Loddon Valley. The Planning Inspector has accepted the Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan as

sound. He agreed the Council figure of 850 houses per annum and did not suggest any further Greenfield sites. The news for Old Basing and Lychpit and sites in the Loddon Valley is excellent. Lodge Farm, Poors Farm and Hodds Farm, sites in the Loddon Valley, were put forward as 'omission sites' by Taylor Wimpey in an attempt to get this area developed. However, The Inspector considered that they were not suitable on several grounds, e.g. environmental, biodiversity and flood risk. He also cast doubt on the future viability of all these sites beyond this Local Plan (2029 onwards).

In reply to those who thought that the housing allocations were skewed towards the West and South-West, the Inspector echoed our views in a number of comments. These are best summed up by - recent growth has been to the north and northeast, the west and south-west plan can be viewed as catching up.

SOLVE would like to thank all our supporters who contributed in any way to our campaign to save the Loddon Valley from inappropriate development. A special thank you to our Local Borough Councillors, Sven Godesen, Onnalee Cubitt and Clive Pinder (also founder member of SOLVE).

Newnham Parish Assembly

Thank you to everyone who attended the Newnham Parish Assembly, the fourth and final assembly of this serving Parish Council. Numbers were down rather this year but there was still a good mix of fun, social event and parish information. An entertaining and memorable royal-theme quiz was devised by quiz-master Clive Pinder, the winning table comprising Joanna Bell, Linda & Robin Dixon, and Angela & Nigel Downes who share a £50 voucher kindly donated by the Hatch, Old Basing. In spite of his supposed day off, PC Andy Reid attended to share the event and present his local policing report. Massive thanks were extended as always to Andy. Clive Pinder, who chaired the event, said Andy was a paragon of commitment, effort and attitude; that he represented authority and commanded respect without any of the negative connotations that may come with that. Revd Jane Leese who will be retiring in July thanked the communities she had been part of for the past eight years. Jane's last weekend as our local vicar will be 9th and 10th July with a tea party on the Saturday and Service on the Sunday, with details in the Villager nearer the time. Peter James reported on Newnham Green ponds which have been assessed as A1 status for wildlife, and in John Broughton's absence, Clive reported on the highs and lows of this year's litter pick with thanks to all those who took part; a regular weekend litter pick along Newnham Road was suggested.

Clive thanked the many Village volunteers: Footpaths officer Nigel Downes; Carolyn Peck and all those who helped with the Newnham BBQ; Monica Wardrop for leading the church community initiatives and the Nately Scures summer fun day; Richard Wilson and the St Nicolas' churchyard maintenance team; also to Chris Broughton and her team who look after the church and flowers; Colin Lewin & Michael Crockford for mowing the Green; Peter James and the pond working parties including Chris Bingham, Marcus Jefferson, John Broughton & Nigel Downes; Becky Brookes, Kate Guy and Richard Fouracre for their hard work on the Oppé Garden; Philippa Heffner and Jackie O'Regan for taking the lead in organising the Newnham Open Gardens, as always with thanks to the hard work of the Clubroom Committee. Michael Rogerson thanked Peter Brown in his absence for his pivotal role in the Clubroom rebuild and therefore its current success.

The efforts and success of SOVLE, Country Watch and Ward & County Councillors were recognised in protecting the Loddon Valley; the Chairman said that the major tasks of the next Parish Council were to keep their pub – the Old House at Home – and to prevent Newnham being linked to Hook as part of the new Hart Local Plan.

Thanks are due to all Parish Councillors for taking on the role over the past four years. Both Clive Pinder and Peter Lumley are stepping down this year and Richard Wilson thanked Clive on behalf of the Parish Council for his role as chair, saying he had been a brilliant chairman and would be a massive loss.

Local Elections 5th May

The six Newnham Parish Councillor roles have been filled for the next four-year term by uncontested election. Ward Cllr Sven Godesen will be standing for re-election as will the Hampshire Police and Crime Commissioner.

BDBC Local Plan 2011-2029

The Planning Inspector has approved the final draft of the Basingstoke & Deane Local Plan which is expected to be adopted at the full council meeting of 26th May.

SOLVE's report reflects relief that major sites in the Loddon Valley put forward again by Taylor Wimpey as 'omission sites' in a last ditch attempt to have them included for development, were rejected by the Inspector. Massive thanks are due to SOLVE and CountryWatch for their roles in a process that started in early 2010 – with 10,000 houses being proposed for the 'Loddon Village' – and then centred on the legal challenge to BDBC in 2011/2012 resulting in the inclusion of Manydown in the site selection process. Land East of Basingstoke (Pyotts Hill) is now allocated 450 houses for this Plan Period.

Despite successes in the Loddon Valley, the Local Plan figure of 850 dwellings per annum equates to a total of 15,300 – including approx 7,690 on Greenfield sites – over the 18-year Plan period 2011 to 2029. This is 1,800 dwellings above the Council's original recommendation. Cllr Onnalee Cubitt commented that: `Monitoring of the river and water quality will remain paramount and we need to ensure we watch that data carefully.'

Next Parish Council meeting



We are having our United Parish Rogation walk around Mapledurwell on Sunday May 29th at 9.30. As we walk we shall ask God's blessing on all our villages – the families that live there, the farmers who work the fields around them and the life of the community in general. We shall begin and end in the church. All the family welcome – and dogs too if you want to combine dog walking and worship! It won't be too long a walk – but depending on the weather might be a bit muddy in parts!

Your Kingdom Come

The Archbishop of Canterbury is encouraging all churches to take part in a nine day prayer event from Ascension (5th May) to Pentecost (15th May). On Sunday 1st May we will be handing out tea lights and asking people to commit to praying for the Church's mission and evangelism during the period whilst the candle stays alight. This doesn't have to be completed in a single session but will amount to approximately two hours of prayer. A leaflet will also be distributed giving a full explanation and ideas for prayer. In addition, it is hoped that the deanery will host 9 prayer stations in different churches where a variety of prayer styles can be explored (Long Sutton and Odiham have been identified as probable places). The event will culminate at a selection of 'beacon' cathedrals of which Winchester is one. There will be a variety of events taking place over the Pentecost weekend on the Cathedral Green and a final informal evening of prayer, worship, baptisms and confirmations led by the Bishop of Basingstoke. This will feature Matt Redman and Carla Harding from 24-7 Prayer.
