Celebratory Service & Halam Open Gardens: 9 July

On 9 July a service will be held in St Michael's Church at 11am to celebrate and give thanks for all those volunteers who help to make Halam such a special place to live by giving their time, skills and friendship in the community for the good of all. Many people make a wonderful effort for special events and fund-raising, but also we must give thanks for those who perform everyday acts of care and friendship. In particular we will remember Linda Bass, a devoted and practical member of the church and who was church warden for many years.

Many of Halam's gardens will be open to the public from 12.30pm on the same day. This event has attracted many visitors over the last 11 years and this year there will be teas served in 2 of the gardens, as well as plant and book stalls.

One of the 'gardens' will be St Michael's churchyard. Over the last 3 years a new management plan has been in operation; upkeep has been simplified by creating 3 zones. One area is left wild; one is regularly mown; the third is extensively planted with perennials to suppress weeds. Maintenance is easier and there has been a marked increase in numbers of villagers and visitors walking around the churchyard each day. Visitors also enter the church to view the mediaeval windows and comment on how loved our church must be. Once again the church is perceived as being at the heart of village life.

It would be wonderful to see as many of you as possible at the service of Sung Eucharist & Thanksgiving at 11am on July 9th. Open Gardens will take place 12.30pm - 6pm; Entry: £3 for adults, no charge for children. - David Herbert

Nature Notes: Butterflies

As we head into summer and hopefully better weather keep your eye open for the beautiful butterflies which are common in and around the village. You are probably familiar with Large, Small and Green Veined Whites, but have you noticed that there seem to be a lot of Orange Tip butterflies around already? You could well have seen the yellow Brimstone early in the year and there have also been Peacock butterflies around.

Others to look out for are Gatekeepers, Meadow Browns, Speckled Wood, Small Tortoiseshells, Commas and Red Admirals. You could also see either Holly or Common Blues. When you start to notice the different types it is surprising just how many you can see throughout the summer. - Elaine Gathercole

Ancient Village Occupations and Crafts

Village occupations complemented farming practice in Halam. Wool, hemp and flax must have been grown locally as there are records of a large number of spinning wheels in the village from an early date. Wool cards were household items, and early inventories of household items include lengths of woollen and linen materials. In the 19th century there were framework knitters living in the village – the names of Hallam, Mitchell, Black and Adamson are recorded in the 1841 census. Another craftsman in the village was the cordwainer; the earliest named one was W. Gilby in 1763; J & H Glazebrook were cordwainers between 1832 and 1895. The making of rushlights was another skilled job for housewives; rushes cut from marshy areas of Halam were stripped and dipped in tallow.

Hops, fruit – especially apples, and willows were grown. The willows provided material for basket and chair-making. There were kiln houses and beer brewed. Bees were kept for honey production. There was a water mill and two windmills existed. Blacksmiths worked at different locations, and are recorded in at least one house name! There were at least two wheelwrights at work in Halam at any one time, the earliest recorded in the mid 16th century.



This is a wonderful photograph showing Halam village wheelwrights at work; I guess its date as about 1910 and think it was taken at Hill Farm. Can anyone say who gave this to the Millennium archive collection? If anyone has information about this picture please let the editor know!

Parish Council Meeting: 10 August 2006

<u>Present:</u> S. Bust, A. Fraser, G. Herbert, A. Paris; I. Sharman. **Apologies**: N. Armstrong; D. Parrish.

<u>Village Hall Referendum</u>: 254 ballot papers received (out of approx. 316 potential voters). The results were 125 for the new proposed village hall scheme and 129 against.

Parish Plan: 1) Contact information for Halam's Beat Office to be published in Halam News & the Halam website – www.halam.org.uk; 2) Neighbourhood Watch – A.P. to investigate the possibility of circulating Farm Watch information; 3) Road Safety – interactive speed sign for Halam Hill:P Cllr. Andy Stewart reported that Halam was a high priority for this scheme due to the position of the school – the 'travel to school' plan will be useful in support. A report and statistics from the Community Speed Watch from John Whitaker was given to Cllr. Stewart to help support our case. 4) Hedges – hedge (bottom Halam Hill) is obstructing the view for traffic from School Lane.

<u>Design Statement:</u> A meeting was held 3 August with Andrew Paris is attendance. A series of information sheets will be released with Halam News over the next few months, leading to further consultation with Halam residents. Next meeting is scheduled for 11 September.

Open Meeting: Matters raised 1) Speed watch – is it possible to have a monitoring point to check cars coming in from the Edingley direction? Andy Stewart said this would not be possible, 3) Can anything that can be done about the increase in traffic using Radley Rd as a cut-through? The situation will be monitored, but it was felt little can be done. The view was expressed that any improvement to Radley Road could lead to an increase in the level of traffic.

<u>Planning</u>: <u>Evergreen House, School Lane – Split plot to create two residential units with office/storage/training space</u>: Some concern expressed re creation of a new dwelling, but the application was passed unanimously

<u>Planning Decisions</u>: 1. <u>Holbeck Cottage, Radley Road – erect timber fence:</u> Approved by D.C. <u>2. Strickland Farm, The Turnpike: Approved by D.C.</u>

Finance: Resolved to pay: village hall cleaners

Village Hall: I. Sharman declared prejudicial interest & left. Proposal: the referendum results should be sent to the planning department at D.C. to ask if the figures are enough evidence of "strong support" in Halam to proceed. A.P. felt that, as the vote showed a majority against the scheme, the P.C. had no mandate to proceed, & this should be made clear to the D.C. while seeking their views. The amendment was not seconded & so fell; Proposal carried: 3 for; 1 against.





"Forgive me Lord, but things have changed. I need Building Regulation Approval - the Ark is over 30m squared. I've argued with the Fire Brigade about the need for a sprinkler system. My neighbours claim I should have planning permission to build the Ark in the garden as it is site development, although I believe it is just a temporary structure. I await a decision from the Secretary of State. The Local Area Access Group complained my ramp would be too steep, and the Ark was not fully accessible. 
Getting the wood was another problem. All the trees have Preservation Orders on them and we in Halam live in a quasi Conservation area close to a Site of Special Scientific Interest set up to preserve and protect birds and plants that Halam footpath group think important. I tried to convince the environmentalists that I needed the wood in order to save these species - but no go!

"Then I started gathering animals but the RSPCA sued me. They insisted it was confining wild animals against their will, arguing the accommodation was far too restrictive, & it was cruel and inhumane to put animals in such a confined space. The County Council, Environment Agency, and the Rivers Authority ruled I could not build the Ark without an Environmental Impact Study, and the village's opinion should be obtained in a searching questionnaire.

I am still trying to resolve a complaint with the Equal Opportunities Commission on how many BME's I should hire for my building team. The Trade Unions say I can't use my sons - They insist I hire CSCS accredited workers with Ark building experience. Worst of all Customs and Excise seized all my assets, claiming I intend to leave the country illegally with endangered species. Forgive me, Lord, - it will take at least 10 years for me to finish the Ark."

Suddenly the skies cleared, the sun began to shine and a rainbow stretched across the sky. Noah looked up in wonder and asked "You mean you're not going to destroy the world?"

"No," He said, "Your national and local government have already beaten me to it."

Kathleen Shaw came to the village in 1972 when she and her family moved to Rose Cottage from Nuttall. She was a kind and caring member of the village community and an active community worker being a commissioner in the Girl Guide movement. She was an active member of the Church family in Halam and worked hard to make the Church relevant in the life of the village; she went out of her way always to greet newcomers and visited them within a short time of them arriving in the village. She and her husband moved to Farnsfield in 1995 after 22 years of living in Halam, but returned here often to take gentle walks around the village. In the last 10 years she became too infirm to visit Halam any more.

Her funeral took place in St Patrick's Church, Nuttall on Wednesday the 22nd of November, and a number of those villagers who knew her attended. A maple leaf from her favourite tree was given with the service sheet to those who attended, and the wonderful passage on the subject of charity from Corinthians Chapter 13 verses 4-13 was read. She was a quiet, kind person. When we think of her we remember William Wordsworth's lines: "That best portion of a woman's life, her little nameless, unremembered acts of kindness and love."

At the Lions sponsored swim we have raised over £200 so far. The book fair raised £928.66 which means each class will have £130 of new books in their classrooms!


Last year's girls' football team won the Newark area competition and came 3rd overall in the Nottinghamshire sports final.

Millennium Picture Archive:

Laying the Foundation Stone of Halam Village Hall



<u>Mr Cedric Hallam</u> has contributed this photograph and the following article:

'The photograph in the October edition of Halam News showing the Methodist Chapel (now the village hall) at the end of the 19th century prompted me to re-read the account of its being built:

"At a meeting on 8th May 1896 it was decided to invite tenders to build a new chapel. On 23rd May a tender from John Pogson of Farnsfield was accepted on condition that it should be completed within 3 months! This tight schedule was met, the stone-laying taking place on 18th June and the opening ceremony on the 17th September, and by the end of the year all the funds had been raised."

This information is taken from a book containing the Minutes of Trustees' Meetings for a period of over 80 years. This document is now deposited at the County Records Office in Nottingham, but I have photocopies of all the pages and would be happy to show them to anyone on request.'




Halam & District Women's Institute

Recipe For A Very Merry Christmas...

<u>Dry Martini</u> (makes 4 glasses): 8fl oz dry gin; 4fl oz dry vermouth; ice cubes; 4 strips lemon rind. Impale an olive on a cocktail stick. Pour gin & vermouth into a jug with a handful of ice and stir gently. Strain into glasses. Twist a strip of lemon rind over each glass to release the oils then drape over the edge of the glass.

<u>Buck's Fizz</u> (makes 8 glasses): 8fl oz fresh chilled orange juice; 1 bottle chilled champagne. Pour juice into a large glass jug & add champagne; pour into glasses.

White Lady (makes 4 glasses): 4fl oz gin; 2fl oz cointreau; 2fl oz fresh lemon juice; white of an egg (optional); 4 maraschino cherries; 4 orange slices; ice cubes. Put ice & all ingredients in a cocktail shaker, shake, then strain into glasses.

Halam Church Fabric

There are several projects in progress at the moment to preserve and improve the fabric of the church. The first is to install a handrail at the side of the chancel steps and this will be dedicated to Lynda Bass and include an inscribed brass plague in her memory.

Secondly conservation work is in progress to the historic Donations Board which hangs on the wall of the tower near to the heating boiler.

Finally work is due to start in January on redecoration of the internal walls of the tower and this is to be followed later by work on the remainder of the church.

The cost of work to the Donations Board is to be partly met by a grant of £300 provided by Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd (WREN) who distribute the Landfill Tax Credits of Waste Recycling Group Plc. The allocation and distribution of the grant has been made by the Nottinghamshire Historic Churches Trust. Simon Settle of WREN says "We are very pleased to be able to help finance this project which will ensure that a bit of Nottinghamshire's rich church heritage is preserved for generations to come."

Also the generous contributions from Halam Arts towards the cost of the fabric work are gratefully acknowledged and contributions from other sources towards these projects would be very welcome. - Tony Hallam
