VOTER ID

To vote at a polling station on Thursday 4th May 2023 you will need to bring photo ID. Polling station staff will all attend comprehensive training sessions on Voter ID and its application at the polling station.

You will only need to show one form of photo ID. It needs to be the original, not a photocopy. Expired ID is acceptable, provided the photograph remains a good likeness.

Accepted forms of photo ID when voting at a polling station include:

- Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- Driving licence issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (this includes a provisional driving licence)
- A Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card.)
- A relevant concessionary travel pass funded by the UK government.
- Older Person's / Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Oyster 60+ Card (more rigorous application than 18+ Oyster Card)
- Freedom Pass
- A badge prescribed under the "blue badge scheme."
- Voter Authority Certificate
- Student cards that are PASS accredited would be accepted (e.g. the National Union of Students 'TOTUM' student card). All accredited PASS cards bear the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram.

Potholes

In the Chancellor's Spring Budget on 15th March he announced an additional £200M for the national 'pothole fund', with £5,954,400 confirmed

for Hampshire. This is welcome additional funding. But the twin challenges of ongoing materials inflation and severe weather mean that substantial further funding is needed. We will continue to make the case to Government for further funding and a multi-year settlement.

Create a Local Nature Reserve

On 20 March 2023 DEFRA and Natural England updated the guidance on declaring a Local Nature Reserve (LNR). It is now much easier for Parish and Town Councils to make a declaration. This is a great opportunity to contribute to Nature Recovery while engaging members of the community of all ages.

To declare your site as an LNR first contact Natural England: consultations@naturalengland.org.uk or 0300 060 3900.

You'll be asked to formally declare your LNR by sending a draft declaration document (template on the website). It must include a boundary map and a management plan detailing:

- ownership of the land
- any agreements or partnerships
- why the LNR site was chosen
- aims and objectives
- biodiversity management and environmental education
- community participation, access and visitor management
- costs and funding arrangements.

While we have been working hard to reduce the number of children coming into care, the gap between the number of children needing a loving home and the number of foster carers available in Hampshire, continues to widen.

Dedicated to discovering 150 new fostering households across the county by the end of 2023, the campaign works with local communities across Hampshire to galvanise residents to support vulnerable children who desperately need our help.

Selling door to door 'Nottingham knockers' reported in the area to be doing a bit of a 'hard sell'. Local Police attended relatively quickly but suspects had left prior to arrival, probably as the weather had taken a turn for the worse.

A scam using Whats App is currently doing the rounds. There has also been similar sent as text message. A scammer will send a generic message... 'Dad [or Mum]! It's your son. I've broken my phone so using this number can you message me back.' Scammer is trying to engage in order to obtain details from you.

Police urge people to not respond to unexpected messages without knowing or verifying where they have come from.

Car theft is still on the increase especially high end with the keyless functionality. Please use Faraday bags to block the car signal.

A CELEBRATION OF NATURE'S SYMPHONY

Taking place on the first Sunday of May, International Dawn Chorus Day is the worldwide celebration of nature's greatest symphony.

All across the world people rise early to revel in the sweet sound of birdsong, from rattling wrens in Rotherham to crooning cowbirds in the Caribbean. And remember you don't have to head out to a nature reserve, you can always just open your window - and listen...

WHO CAN I HEAR?

Log on to wildlifetrusts.org/dawn-chorus-day to listen to recordings of some of the star performers.

Song thrush... Often the most confident voice in the dawn chorus, and one of the earliest to start singing. Listen for loud, clear verses repeated two to four times.

Blackbird... Another early riser, with a clear and confident voice. The song is low-pitched and given in short, fluty verses. Unlike the song thrush, blackbirds don't repeat their verses.

Robin.. Like the larger thrushes, robins start singing early in the morning. The song is clear and comprised of rippling notes and whistles. Robins are one of the few birds to sing all through winter.

Blackcap... This migrant warbler has one of the finest voices. Its song begins as a chattering warble, before breaking into louder, clearer flute-like notes.

Chiffchaff... One of the most easily recognised voices in the dawn chorus. The chiffchaff's song is a repetitive 'chiff chaff, chiff chaff, chiff chaff', occasionally with an extra note mixed in.

WHAT IS NO MOW MAY?

'No Mow May' is Plantlife's annual campaign calling all gardeners and green space managers not to mow during May – liberating your lawns and providing a space for nature.

Why should I take part?

We've lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970s, and along with them vital food needed by pollinators like bees and butterflies.

A healthy lawn with some long grass and wildflowers benefits wildlife, tackles pollution and can lock away carbon below ground. Best of all, to reap these benefits all you have to do is not mow your lawn in May!

With over 20 million gardens in the UK, even the smallest grassy patches add up to a significant proportion of our land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate. This is why Plantlife is calling for people to get involved with #NoMowMay and let wild plants get a head start on the summer.

Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall Chairman's Report 2023 – Annual General Meeting

fter a few years of reporting on the impact of the pandemic on the Hall, I am very pleased to not have to do the same in this report. In fact 2022 saw the Hall return to normal operation, having welcomed back all our regular hirers, retired all our Covid documentation and thrown ourselves into a number of projects during the year.

A detailed financial position is reported on separately, but with this return to normality it is pleasing to note that our income is now more or less back to prepandemic levels and our many years of good financial governance and control continue to see us in a sound position as we go into 2023.

As already stated, 2022 was a year of some diverse projects including installing solar panels, replacement low energy lighting and rejuvenating the big flower bed in front of the Hall. Taking this last project first, which is supported by a legacy from the late Bob Kew, my thanks go to Marilyn Smith for overseeing this project, engaging designers, and procuring plants and materials, and to everyone who helped remove the old plants and prepare the beds for the new planting. We all look forward to seeing the results of this hard work this spring and summer.

Coming back to the solar panels and low energy lighting, this is part of a three-pronged approach to reduce the Hall's carbon footprint and make it more energy efficient, the third prong being the replacement of the draughty front and back doors. My thanks go to Rose Beevers and Julie James for leading the solar panel project to completion, supported by a very generous legacy from the late Eddie Rapley, and we look forward to seeing just how much energy we save this year once the final piece of infrastructure is installed - the smart meters. The door replacement is still an ongoing activity, started last year but bedevilled by supply problems, with thanks going to Angie Fewster for her continuing tenacity in trying to keep this moving along.

Moving on to entertainment, 2022 saw a return to a full year of performances from the Cliddesden Players, performing the play 'Fair is Foul' in June and 'Jack and the Beanstalk save Panto!' in December, both written by the Players themselves. It is great to see the Players on stage, and as always my heartfelt thanks goes to the Players for their continued support for the Hall.

As we know, the successful running of the Hall is dependent on a good team, and with this in mind, my thanks first go to Pat and Ken Rampton for their continued oversight of the Hall throughout the year: Pat for managing the regular and one-off lets and Ken along with James Piper and Annie Houstoun for opening and closing the Hall and keeping it clean and tidy.

Thanks also go to a number of other people not on the Committee but who nonetheless provide valuable assistance to the Hall:

- To Andy Fewster, Rob James, John Lurcock, Kevin
 Mountstephens and Martin
 Conboy who give up their spare time doing repairs and carrying out the many small, and not so small, jobs that a Hall such as ours requires in order to remain in a top condition;
- To the organisers and helpers of the Film Club and Coffee Mornings;
- And to Neil Carmichael for continuing to maintain the Halls grounds to a high standard.

Thanks go to Vice-Chair Angie Fewster, Treasurer Julie James, Secretary Jo Capehorn and 100 Club Organiser Rose Beevers. And finally, my thanks yet again to all the other members of the Village Hall Management Committee for their help and involvement in 2022. They are nominated by various village organisations and as well as being Committee Members they become Trustees of the Charity known as "The Village Hall at Cliddesden". So, in no specific order, my thanks to Sian Banks, Pat Doel, Marilyn Smith and Hazel Metz, and a big welcome to our new Trustees Christine Stanbury, Robert Gofton-Salmond, Alex Conboy and Simon Barker.

Catherine Dawson – "Peat-free Composts"

We had a fabulous turn-out for our talk with Catherine.

Thank-you to everyone who attended, members, guests, and visitors.

It was so interesting to learn about the different barks used in the composts, and so shocking to see the after effect of peat 'strip-mining'.

Catherine brought to life the damage that peat harvesting has done to, and is still being done to, our peat-bogs.

Like looking at the devastation caused by the logging industry, or gold mining, we don't appreciate the value that our peat bogs have for flora and fauna, and for controlling water flow.

The way that Melcourt use waste wood products as an alternative is both innovative and effective.

Melcourt is recommended and used by the RHS, and, thanks to Seumas for arranging, we have been able to purchase peat-free compost to try for ourselves and not drive too far to collect it! — hopefully our gardens will become even more lush and vibrant this year

Our evening meetings are becoming more and more social as we have refreshments both before, and after, the talk. Please do come along to our next one on 25th May – details below.

Sunday April 2nd – Spring Show –

As always, the day before the show, I'm stood in the kitchen saying 'why do I do this?', as I'm trying to cook 3 things at once, pick daffodils, help youngest child cook their entry, and get all the other bits and pieces ready. And every year I still do as many entries as I can. It's a tradition started when I was a child, and entering the flower show was a marathon undertaking – 3 children with about 8 classes each, cookery and flowers for mum, walking 2½ miles in the morning to set up (and 2½ miles home) then back again in the afternoon. Sue Essex came along to our March meeting to tell us about her time in India. Sue travelled to Dehradun, in Uttarakhand province which is in the foothills of the Himalayas in 2005 to carry out a role as a housemother to 26 children.

She was going to be working with the Pestalozzi charity. They take young gifted children whose parents cannot afford to educate them, give them intense learning in English, Hindi and Maths to prepare them for entrance exams for secondary schools.

The children are Indian, Nepalese and Tibetan with a ratio of 2 girls to one boy. Sue's role was to look after these children and all that entailed as well as speaking English to them at all times to help them, master the language. The children spent long days learning, to improve their chances of gaining places at the very good schools in the area.

Sue's photos and videos showed how happy and well cared for the children were, and how they learned many life skills as well. It was a very uplifting talk highlighting what these children can achieve if given the opportunities.

Sue was there for 8 months from September to the

following May and she still keeps in touch with the children she looked after. Sue brought us up to date with what this class are doing now. They are now in their twenties, have gone through university and are doing very good work in many countries of the world.

Sue has kept in touch with this group of children, seen they grow up, is proud of their many achievements – some have very good jobs abroad now – and even attended their weddings.

We held our Crafty Lunchers Day on 28th March and 20 people came along to enjoy the day making cards with Catherine followed by lunch. A great day as usual enjoyed by everybody.


