
Glyn Macey Thursday 13th Feb, Millennium Hall 7.45pm


Cornish artist Glyn Macey will give a painting demonstration and Q&A session in the Village Hall, evening of 13th February.

NOTES FROM JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

All Parish Councillors in attendance together with PC Andy Reid and one member of the public. Apologies received from the Parish Clerk and Ward Cllr Mark Ruffell.

PC Andy Reid reported on incidents and crime since the last meeting. If you see anything suspicious please report it to directly to PC Reid.

Finance The Parish Precept for 2020/21 was agreed at £8,652. This is a 10% increase on last year and equates to £36.75 (a rise of \pm 3.34) per band D household. (Bearing in mind it will be half this for a band A household and double for a band H.)

Taking into account the increase, Cliddesden's Precept remains comparatively low at a time when other funding sources are restricted. For example the Parish Council no longer receives a `general grant' from BDBC.

The Neighbourhood Plan is funded from a Government grant via 'Locality' but additional funding souces will be needed to complete the Plan. As a backup, should such funding be not forthcoming, the Parish Council has agreed to support up to a limit of £4,000.

Cherry tree at the pond The Parish Council recorded its thanks to Mrs Caroline Gifford, Mark Gifford and Alison Mosson for the donation and planting of the Cherry Tree at the village pond in memory of Eddie Rapley.

Highways drainage & flooding The Parish Council's has reported on flooding to Hampshire County Council, recognising that the remedial works required to improve drainage from the highway into the pond, along with dredging the pond, are beyond the resources of the Parish Council. It is believed that County as the Local Flood Authority should undertake the work.

Neighbourhood Plan Building on the Questionnaire responses the Steering group is tackling the next 'Issues & Options' stage. This will be discussed at the May Parish Assembly with a further Open Day planned for later in the year.

Traffic & Highways Both Speed Indicator devices are in place and working. Feedback on them would be welcomed.

The Parish Lengthsman will be asked to strim round the pond and clean the signs around the village.

The Parish Council is providing a priority list of footpaths for 2020 to be cut back by HCC Countryside Services. To note that HCC is responsible for clearing the 'walking surface' of public rights of way in the same way as they are for maintaining road surfaces. Landowners are responsible for cutting back encroaching hedges.

The Village Spring Clean is scheduled for Saturday 21st March. Please make a diary date.





Police Update

Dear Residents

Before I write of 2019 crimes statistics, to date at the time of writing, we have had an assault reported at the Cliddesden Village Hall. However this was a private

party and will have no effect on the community.

The crime in this parish during 2019 was a slight reduction of one reported crime from 17 in 2018 to 16 in 2019. In our surrounding Parishes the reported crime rates was as below:

Parish	2018	2019
Ellisfield	5	17
Farleigh Wallo	op 5	4
Dummer	22	25
Cliddesden	17	16

It is important to stress that this is reported crime. Sadly a great deal of crime goes unreported, so the figures provided are only those using actual crime recording. For such reasons it is important that if you are a victim of ANY crime, you should reported it via 101 or if an emergency 999. We need to know as it may be part of a trend, linked with other crimes or particular criminals who may have just moved into an area or perhaps passing through, but we need to know.

Across the Candovers and Upton Grey ward which consists of 22 parishes, reported crime rose in 16 of them, five saw a reduction and one Parish, Nutley. saw no reported crime.

The largest recorded crimes figures were in Herriard where 17 more crimes were reported than in 2018, Ellisfield with 12, Preston Candover with 35 and Upton Grey with 12.

I am pleased to report that, at the time of writing, other than the assault above there no reported crimes have occurred this year within the area of this *Newsletter*.

BRACKEN FOR FUCHSIAS

'In the light soil of our warm and sheltered little valley we leave even tender fuchsias outdoors all the winter, so far without disaster, but we always over them with mounds of bracken against the frosts. An Old Wife seeing this one autumn was shocked. She said that there was nothing better to dig in under fuchsias when planting them than chopped green bracken, which would encourage the roots to go down; but that they had such a passion for it that they would tend towards the surface if bracken was laid there, suffering accordingly in a hot, dry season.

'We now compromise, supplying bracken at both ends.'

Cabinet Member for Homes and Familie

BASINGSTOKE AND DEANE 'OWN HOME LOAN'

I'm pleased to update you that BDBC's equity loan scheme to help people get on the housing ladder launched on Friday 24 January 2020.

Using £580,000 of Council money allocated to provide affordable housing, 'Own Home Loan' aims to support young people to buy a home with deposits of up to £30,000 per application.

It is available to single people, couples and those with children who are on the housing register, with those who have been on the register for the longest time given priority. Priority will also be given to those applicants under the age of 35. The key difference to other loan schemes and a major local benefit is that it enables people to buy existing homes and not just new-build homes.

People wishing to apply must:

- Be living or working in Basingstoke and Deane and registered on the Council's housing register
- Have a household income under £50,000
- Be the first home that you have bought and your only home
- Be able to provide a 5% deposit
- Pass an external financial assessment.

Samaritans Mission

Samaritans is available 24 hours a day to provide confidential emotional support for people who are experiencing feelings of distress or despair, including those which may lead to suicide.

Samaritans Vision is for a society in which:

Fewer people die by suicide;

People are able to explore their feelings;

People are able to acknowledge and respect the feelings of others.

Samaritans Values are based on these beliefs:

The importance of having the opportunity to explore difficult feelings;

That being listened to, in confidence, and accepted without prejudice, can alleviate despair and suicidal feelings;



That everyone has the right to make fundamental decisions about their own life, including the decision to die by suicide.

BEING A SAMARITAN VOLUNTEER

Before writing the reference we have requested as a Prospective Volunteer you may like to consider the following summary of the essential qualities of being a Samaritan:-

Reliability

Samaritans is available 24 hours a day and Samaritan volunteers are people who are prepared to commit time to carry out Listening Duties with callers for an agreed number of hours a year, which will generally include some night duties.

Confidentiality

Samaritans must retain caller confidentiality and be trusted

never to reveal information about callers outside the branch other than where the law demands it.

Honesty

Samaritans must be honest with the callers, other volunteers and themselves and not promise callers they will do things they cannot ensure are carried out.

Emotionally Supportive

Samaritans use their listening skills, recognise the needs of callers and respond appropriately.

Samaritans will not impose their own convictions or influence callers in regard to politics, philosophy or religion.

Selection & Training

Samaritans aim to provide a consistent service to callers using agreed guidelines which volunteers are expected to follow at all times whilst on duty.

Samaritans volunteers are subject to a police record check, selected and specially trained.

It may now seem like a distant memory, but we wanted to share with our local community all the extra curricular activities we get to enjoy alongside our busy curriculum. Last term was a term of visits, a residential, musical performances and of course Christmas.



Oak Class had a wonderful time on their residential at Marchant's Hill PGL. They took part in a range of outdoor activities that helped their resilience, teamwork, determination and physical skills.

They also got to enjoy a visit to the QMC Science Centre to further their learning about Space. The children made models of why we only see one side of the moon and found out more about the constellations that can be seen from Earth.
