Moulsford News: February 2024

In between eating turkey and mince pies (and now trying to wear it off,!) your council have been pretty busy over the Christmas period! Specifically, we have been looking at budgets and what we should set the precept at for our next financial year, as well as reviewing various planning applications.

Parish Precept

The parish precept is a charge levied as part of your overall council tax. Put simply, it is the difference between the amount of money the parish council intend to spend between April 2024 – March 2025 (the expenditure), less the expected income.

The precept is used to cover a variety of council costs, including (but not limited to):

- Costs of running the council (including renumeration for parish clerk, various insurances, maintenance costs for pavilion and grounds, plus bin emptying and verge cutting within the village)
- Election costs
- Training for council members
- Website maintenance and enhancement

Over this last year, the cost-of-living crisis and high levels of inflation has impacted us all and for Moulsford Parish Council, specifically, the services we use, causing these costs to rise.

In addition to this, several significant additional costs for which we need to set aside reserves have been identified, including:

Website redesign – the village website needs a complete review and overhaul as we recognise that it is dated and difficult to navigate. We have already made some changes which should make it easier to find the site itself, but over the next few months will be pruning back out of date information and putting in place changes planned some while ago, including enhanced information for the village pavilion and a bookings calendar. These changes are particularly important as the website is now considered the official way to keep the village up to date with parish matters.

Playground repairs – the playground is wooden and over the last few years, various tables, chairs, and play equipment have been removed as they became damaged, rather than being replaced. We are due to have a safety inspection shortly and are expecting that some of the equipment will require repairs and/or complete replacement to ensure it remains safe.

Riverside landing stage – there is a small landing stage at the end of Ferry Lane, next to the Beetle and Wedge and the willow and at the end of the old Beetle & Wedge Hotel (now Beetle House). This is slowly disintegrating, having not had any attention for many years; the situation is likely to have been made worse by recent floods. We have therefore decided to set aside money to review its condition and make any essential repairs as required, again for safety reasons.

Pavilion roof repairs – some items of the pavilion have a set life, after which it is recommended elements are repaired or replaced. One of these is the roof. We need to set aside money towards the cost of a review and overhaul within the next couple of years.

Contingency fund – we have been advised by Oxfordshire Association of Clerks that as a parish we should hold significantly more general contingency funds (e.g. to cover sickness of parish clerk or an accident on council property) than we currently do. We are not intending to raise this fund to the level they recommend in one go; but instead to build it gradually over the next few years.

With this in mind, we have asked OCC to increase our precept for 2024-25. We expect this to equate to an average additional charge of £36.80 per household per annum, to be confirmed by OCC. This is aligned with other local parishes of a similar size in the area and is still lower than many, thanks to the help from fundraising activities within the village (see below).

Planning applications

One main planning application occupied us over Dec – Jan – the Cranford School 5 year plan for expanding their buildings. This was a significant piece of development and required careful consideration, as well as input from different individuals directly impacted.

In the end the primary reason your council objected to the development is that there was no traffic management plan or construction management plan submitted with the planning application. Given the levels of congestion already seen on the A329 at key times, we felt it was essential before any further development occurred, that these plans were both drafted and, at least partially, implemented.

Note: On 23/1/24, the Parish Council received notification from SODC that the Cranford School planning application has been withdrawn. I very much hope we can work with the school to alleviate the traffic problems and to allow their application to go forward at a future point.

Fund raising

I would like to extend a huge thank you from all the council to the Moulsford Events Committee and the 100 Club for their generous donations to the Parish Council this last month, as a result of funds raised over 2023. Together, these are expected to amount to over £3600 and enable us to carry out vital maintenance within the village.

We know organising events and managing the 100 Club is a significant amount of work, particularly for events such as the hugely successful Comedy Night and the Village Gala. Thanks also to all of our villagers, since of course, it was you who bought drinks at village socials, tickets for social activities, or signed up for the 100 Club.

WLPM hosts the best of locally-produced food and crafts that are grown, harvested and made within 30 miles of Wallingford. We champion local farmers and vegetable growers, cheese-makers, bakers, and makers of honey and preserves. Every market has a range of craft stalls including textiles, jewellery, ceramics, art and photography, all hand-made by local people.

Wallingford Emergency Food Bank

We are a registered charity operating a food bank based in the centre of Wallingford with the aim of providing emergency food packages to those who need them. Wallingford Emergency Food Bank was set up by Churches Together in the Wallingford Area and we began serving the community in 2011.

In the first year, we provided food for approximately 400 people. The current annual demand is approximately 3000 people. We rely entirely on unpaid volunteers and donations of food and money from the public, churches, and other local organisations.

All Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty renamed as National Landscapes

On 22nd November, it was announced that Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty will now be known as 'National Landscapes'. This includes the North Wessex Downs AONB which will now be called North Wessex Downs National Landscape.

This new name reflects the national importance of these protected landscapes and the vital contribution that they make to protect the nation from the threats of climate change, nature depletion and the wellbeing crisis, whilst also creating greater understanding and awareness for the work that they do. The name underpins the ambitious targets that, nationally, the National Landscapes family has for nature recovery and mitigation of climate change.

The statutory designation of AONB and its primary purpose, to conserve and enhance the natural beauty of the landscape, remain the same. And the North Wessex Downs National Landscape Partnership will continue to collaborate with the thriving, diverse communities living and working here to restore ecosystems, provide nutritious food, safeguard against drought and flooding, and nurture people's health and wellbeing.

Our new logo reflects this name change and depicts the best-known landscape icon in the North Wessex Downs - the Uffington White Horse - and the big skies enjoyed on top of chalk downs which are such an integral part of this stunning part of the world.

Archaeology Festival of Discovery 2024

For one weekend only, the Festival of Discovery will bring together the archaeologists and experts behind the recent digs at Earth Trust Centre, to share their fascinating discoveries in a series of specialist talks and unique hands-on workshops.

The team from DigVentures unearthed a previously unknown Roman villa and a vast Iron Age settlement at the foot of the Wittenham Clumps. From the contents of a prehistoric pantry to the arrival of the first pet dogs in Britain, the results have provided a glimpse into these ancient lives. At the Archaeology Festival, experience an unprecedented insight into the discoveries, and what they can tell us about the people who once inhabited this part of Oxfordshire, with daily talks from the experts and practical workshops with the archaeologists. 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
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
