


Just a few reminders and notices for this month ...



CLIDDESDEN CLEAN~UP DAY Sat 21st March HEROES NEEDED! 10am at the Pond





As many of your know, long-standing resident Shirley Maunder sadly passed away in December last year. As a salute to one of the very first editors of this newsletter, and someone who was always actively and enthusiastically involved in many aspects of Cliddesden village life (as readers will discover below), we publish here an edited version of the tribute given by Ben at her funeral.

SHIRLEY MAUNDER

20 05 41 13 12 19

Shirley was born in Preston Candover. Her parents were Roland and Maud Barker, a butcher and a tailoress. She had two younger sisters, Sally and Jane. Sally says that Shirley was always in charge, but that she did look after them lovingly and carefully all through their childhood.

She remained a country girl all her life although the family moved to Essex Road in Basingstoke on her father getting a new job at Harry Hall, one of the famous tailoring companies in the town. She initially attended the old Victorian village school at Preston Candover where her vigorous and forthright character may have first showed itself. On one occasion at primary school she and girl friends ambushed and thrashed a notorious school bully, apparently to good effect.

She passed the 11-plus and then attended the girl's high school in Basingstoke. She was head of class in most of the years she was at the school. You may see a pattern beginning to emerge.

With her decent O levels she was keen to continue her education. Sadly, her father, a stern man of his times, would not permit it and she had to leave school and seek a career.

She chose banking, and joined the old National Provincial in Winchester Street. She enjoyed her early years in the Bank and progressed up the hierarchy, getting involved in security work and becoming a senior cashier. However it turned out that there was a glass ceiling through which girls could not progress. I remember well her outrage at the unfairness of her treatment, especially when told, "Well, you'll be off having babies soon, won't you dear?" Frustrated by all this she left the Bank and candidates for loans no longer had to face up to her steely inquisition.

By this time we had married in 1963 and spent all our lives together living at Church Lane Cliddesden.

After some years she took over the village shop and post office on my mother wanting to retire. She and her great friend Juliet ran the business together.



This was when the great armed robbery took place. On a quiet, dark Wednesday afternoon three armed robbers confronted the girls and made off with the post office's money. Shirley and Juliet dashed outside and got the escaping robbers' number. They were arrested a few hours later as they had foolishly parked their car outside their house over on Brighton Hill without bothering to change the number plates.

Shirley always said the most frightening thing about the whole business was the way the hand of the young man holding the gun shook uncontrollably.

The girls got some sort of award from the Post Office and somewhere there is a photograph of them receiving their gifts looking sheepish and wearing their fashionable maxi dresses.

Selling the shop business after some ten years she threw herself into other activities.

She was a Samaritan for many years, ending up as director of the Basingstoke branch, a very demanding role.

She was involved with the Churches' Together Homeless Shelter at May Place, her only complaint being that her favourite sheepskin coat got stolen. However, as she said, no doubt it went to a more needy home.

She found both these activities hugely satisfying, and they both illustrate her innate kindness, and not a little courage, as neither was entirely free from risk, sometimes requiring overnight stays at the respective centres.

In the village her life came to centre on the church, but not exclusively. Over the years she was churchwarden twice, treasurer of the PCC, a member of the church council, Deanery Synod treasurer, a keen promoter of the church nature conservation area in the churchyard, and a devoted and generous supporter of the church's link with our sister diocese, Lango, in Uganda. Her own quiet Christian faith was a central part of her life, so she was pleased to be able to help her fellow believers in Uganda.

Activities outside the church included starting the village old people's club, called the Friendly Circle. In a different demographic age, the early1980s, they had plenty of members, maybe up to forty at times, mainly older people who were not well off and often had no private transport. They offered outings, talks, feasts and bingo and other treats and filled a very useful role in village life. She was joined by Pat Rampton and Margaret Kew and they ran the club together successfully for some years. However times changed through the 1980s, the old clientele declined as the nature of the village changed and the need for the club diminished and faded.

There were then the famous village lunches every couple of months, run by the same doughty trio with their friend Monica Tilley, attracting often some eighty guests at times. These sort of followed on from the Friendly Circle, attracting in part the remaining less well to do but also many who valued the high quality of the quisine. These lunches were also a fundraiser for the new village hall in the late 1990s This great project, led not by her but by others, was also of interest to her and she enjoyed getting involved in money making activities, including her own production of a dramatic revue called the Seven Ages of Man. This featured on the cover of its programme probably for the first time in village history the warning: "This production contains strong language" and it did. If you want to look up the reference it is Philip Larkin's poem "This be the verse."

She was an early director of productions of the now famous Cliddesden Players, which may surprise no-one. A veteran actor recalls her goading the cast to learn their lines and sternly insisting that they "be serious" in preparing for the production. An innocent newcomer to the village around this time remembers his first encounter with her. "Can you act?" she demanded.

She was also one of the first editors of the Cliddesden Village Newsletter.

Latterly she was also involved with Godfrey Thomas in the formation of the village film club which continues to this day, her last project.

To mention just one other element in her life, she was a passionate supporter of Hampshire Cricket Club. She was specially proud of organising a benefit match at Hackwood Park for the great Hampshire and West Indies batsman Gordon Greenidge. Sadly, the cricketer's baby daughter died at the same time so she was able to display both her compassionate and organising gifts.

Her health was never robust. She survived breast cancer twice and bowel cancer twice and another dose of cancer on the spine but shrugged them all off, although in recent years she lost much of her strength and energy and took a much quieter part in village life.

She had a well-earned reputation as a tough not to say bossy woman, but she was more than that. Any suffering wild or domestic creature, or suffering human for that matter, would melt her heart. Her bank account is peppered with small direct debits in favour of animal charities like Battersea, the RSPCA and Cats' Protection. Mind you, the Red Cross and the Salvation Army and Blind Veterans also figure.

I can add one more story to illustrate her rare character. This was the time when she intervened in a fight between two men outside the Red Lion in London Street, one kicking the other viciously. Apparently other passers- by just passed by, leaving Shirley to remonstrate with the aggressor, send for the police and get the violence stopped.

What a girl!

I have been greatly moved by all the expressions of affection and indeed admiration that I have received. She would have been amazed. Thank you all.

Cliddesden Primary School

In addition to our usual busy curriculum based work, the first half of the Spring Term has been packed with visits, visitors and sporting occasions.



Southampton City Art Gallery

The whole school enjoyed a visit to The Southampton City Art Gallery. During a guided tour the children learned about different artists and styles through looking at specific works in the collection. This was followed by an art workshop where the children produced seascapes using different media.

Finally the children searched for specific paintings and sculptures and had time to see the whole gallery.

This educational visit was not only highly enjoyable but also helped our children develop an awareness of culture and the arts and supported our Art and Design curriculum.



Beech Class visit QMC Science Centre

Our visit to QMC focused on the developmental stages of animals, their habitats, the differences between animals and our senses. We enjoyed 4 fun filled activities:

One activity was looking at animals and their young. We discovered that mammals and their young look very similar. Insects looked very different in their stages of development. We also had great fun building bodies from a baby to an adult keeping the proportions correct.

On a different table we had pictures of a mammal, amphibian, bird, fish and reptile. The children each took turns picking out of a bag something associated with each of these pictures and they had to guess which one went with which picture. The children had to work out if they were hot or cold blooded and if they could breathe in air, water or both. The children did really well in matching and also learnt a lot about the differences between them.

We enjoyed playing a game where we were given a life, air, food/drink and shelter token. We were then given information about an animal and its habitat. Some earned you extra tokens whereas others you lost a token. It really made us think of the impact food, breathing and habitats have on different animals.

Another activity involved using our senses. We had several small containers each filled with a different scent. We had to guess what each one was. The mint was the easiest to identify and a lot of us were able to recognise the orange. However, the cucumber, tomato and strawberry were not so obvious. We also taste-tested different apples to see which was sweetest or sourest.



African Dance and Drumming Workshops

On Tuesday 11th February we were treated to a visit from the Zamble African Dance Company. On a cold windy February day, a taste of African sun shone down on Cliddesden! Gaspard taught each class an African Dance and Nii accompanied him on the Djembe. The dances required good coordination and lots of energy, and all the children participated fully with smiles on their faces. It was great to learn new dance techniques and experience West African culture.

After the workshops we all gathered in the Hall and each class performed their dance routine. It was amazing to see how much they had learned in just one workshop. Oak Class' performance was especially good as it began with our own Alize leading a African traditional song.

A huge thank you to Gapsard and Nii for coming to Cliddesden and enhancing our cultural awareness.

KS1 Gymnastics

Four KS1 children enjoyed an afternoon at the Active Life Centre where they competed against 11 other schools in a gymnastics competition. They performed two routines one focused on body management, showing strength and shape, and the other a skill based routine. The children had to perform the routine on their own on the large gymnastics floor. All four children demonstrated confidence and courage throughout.

They then completed the afternoon with some coaching from the Active Life Centre coaches. They practiced their balancing

skills and used a spring board to jump. The children demonstrated excellent sportsmanship throughout, giving support to other teams. After the results of the two routines were collated we were pleased to have come 6th overall.





Year 5/6 Athletics Tournament

Cranbourne school again hosted the indoor athletics event this year. The event is always well attended and is a very lively occasion! Our team participated well and there were some great individual performances. India won her sprint race and stepped up at very short notice to participate in an additional running event.

Ellie showed brilliant teamwork supporting others and showing great determination herself. Although we didn't place very highly it was a close competition with the bottom three schools only being separated by 20 points.

Year 3/4 Cross Country Competition

A team of year three and four children took part in the cross country running at Down Grange.

There were large numbers of children from a wide range of Basingstoke schools and our team put in a determined effort on very muddy ground. The runners all displayed great team values and supported each other in the race. We are waiting for the results of the competition but they can all be very proud of the values they showed.





Whole School Gymnastics Competition

Friday 7th February saw the culmination of our hard work in gymnastics this year when we held our intra-house gymnastics competition. The standard of performance across the school was great to see, with all children joining in and trying hard. It was especially good to see the skills progression across the school. The younger children were very impressed by the counter balances and paired support shown by the older children. It was a close competition in the judges made some difficult decisions. In the end the winning team was Ellisfield.

There is no easier way to help with fundraising than joining the 100 Club, or increasing your "holding". More tickets sold mean more funds for the Hall and more prize money.





CLEAN AIR ANTI IDLING CAMPAIGN

New powers to issue fixed penalties

BDBC powers under The Road Traffic (Vehicles Emissions) (Fixed Penalty) (England) Regulations 2002 will come into force on Monday 23rd March.

Drivers who leave their engines running whilst stationary may be asked by an enforcement officer to switch off their engine. Raising awareness will remain the priority, but drivers who do not comply with a request, may be issued with a fixed penalty notice of £20.

These regulations cover all vehicles on public roads including private cars, motorbikes, delivery vehicles, taxis and buses. They do not apply to vehicles:

- moving slowly due to road works or congestion
- stopped at traffic lights
- under test or repair
- where the windscreen is being defrosted.

Please help to tackle air pollution by switching off your engine while you are waiting.

NEW PERMIT SYSTEM FOR HCC RECYCLING CENTRES



Hampshire residents will need to register their car for free by 1st April

A new residents' permit system is to begin operating at Hampshire Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs). It will be controlled by Automatic Number Plate Recognition and will allow continued free access for Hampshire residents to dispose of household waste.

Access for non-Hampshire residents will be for a fee of £5 per visit. Charges for non-household waste, including soil and rubble, plasterboard and asbestos remain. Hampshire residents can register up to three vehicles at www.hants.gov.uk/vehicle-registration-hwrc, or by calling 0300 555 1389.

The system will check the registration of the cars coming into the site against the registered number plates so that Hampshire residents can freely enter the sites as many times as they wish, without any further checks. Note that Hampshire residents who already hold a van or trailer permit do not need to re-register that particular vehicle.
