The big announcement this month is that January will see the launch of our new website which is aimed at putting all our information at your fingertips, be they at your computer or on your tablet or phone. Initially the content and functionality will be much the same as our current site but we hope to develop this over time, particularly around the ability to make bookings. Our huge thanks go to Alastair Thomas who has maintained the current site in his own time over many, many years. More news on this next month.

Hot off the press is news that the Hall has been awarded a large grant to help us replace the four sets of double doors out of the main Hall, with the new doors being double glazed, draught proofed and, most importantly, with lowered thresholds to provide much better access for all. The replacement of these doors will complete our plan to reduce the Hall's carbon footprint, starting in 2022 with the installation of solar panels and then with the upgrading to LED lighting and replacement of other doors earlier this year. Thanks goes to Alex Conboy for leading the grant application, and more news next year when we know the dates for replacement.

The eagle-eyed amongst you may have noticed that the Hall signage on the main approach road has disappeared. Fear not – not stolen, but simply slightly damaged when the 25 year old mountings failed. So it has been taken away for repair and we hope to remount it soon.

Hello from Claire!

Has to be a Christmas theme – so 5 facts about Holly

There are more than 200 different cultivated varieties of native holly.

Druids, Celts and Romans brought evergreens into their homes during winter, believing the plant's ability to keep its leaves was magical and assured the return of spring.

In Christianity, holly was adopted as a symbol of Christ's crown of thorns, the crimson berries a symbol of his

blood and the evergreen a metaphor for life and death.

Most hollies are either male or female and need the opposite sex nearby to produce fruit. There are many varieties of both in the holly wood in Dr Wilfrid Fox's arboretum at Winkworth in Surrey, but two confused specimens stand out.

When naming the festive sounding silver queen and golden king, with their creamy-white and yellow-tipped leaves, the plant breeders muddled the sexes. The queen is actually a male holly and the king is female.

The wood of the holly has been used by furniture makers for centuries. It is a dense and finely-textured

wood and was popular in decorative marquetry and inlay work, and as a white wood it can be easily stained.

As well as its variety of uses in furniture the logs burn hot and long, so it's a perfect fuel for the fire in cold weather.



Over the centuries holly has also played a major part in garden design.

So bring in the holly, enjoy its rich green, vibrant red, and have a wonderful Christmas!

The planned 'Update' with Council Leader Cllr Paul Harvey, and Portfolio Holder for Strategic Planning & Infrastructure Cllr Andy Konieczko, unfortunately had to be postponed at short notice.

A new date will be arranged as soon as possible, but likely to be in the New Year.

'MANYDOWN IS DONE'

Almost... The deal is agreed, paperwork to be finalised, all is on track to exchange in December.

BDBC Cabinet meeting of 13 November agreed to: 'Delegate authority to the Executive Director Corporate Services & Assets... to complete the purchase of Manydown North land.'

To begin development, the aim is for 'infrastructure first' to start next year, with reserved matters applications for the first houses expected late 2024 / early 2025.

FALLEN LEAVES – The epitome of autumn – carpets of colour underfoot and maybe the precursor for hours spent raking and clearing. If left to itself leaf litter provides warm, safe places to shelter from the elements, supporting a whole range of species, as diverse as butterflies, toads, maybe frogs – and hedgehogs – through the winter.

Hedgehogs use leaf litter to build their nests. They will spend the winter hibernating, surviving off their fat reserves. A few quiet spots in the garden for leaves and log piles can help nature support itself. Birds such as robins and sparrows will be encouraged to visit to forage for worms and bugs in the leaf layer. The RSPB says that: 'where you put the logs and leaves will affect the wildlife that uses it. Try different spots in your garden, with different sized and shaped piles.'

On hedgehog boxes, the Wildlife Trust says they 'can help increase suitable nesting spaces, but natural is always best' and 'research has shown that homemade boxes are preferred by hedgehogs to shop-bought ones' and 'if you do have a hedgehog box in your garden ensure you are providing suitable bedding, ideally fallen leaves'.

By Common Law, fallen leaves belong to whoever owns the land they fall on... It is unlawful to 'return' fallen leaves to someone else's land without their permission, including Highway land. It is unlawful to blow leaves from private land onto the Highway.

CLIDDESDEN NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan sets out a vision for the future of the Parish and the planning policies which will be used to help determine planning applications locally.

This document has been prepared with the help of the local community and has been sent to Basingstoke and Dean Borough Council who have confirmed it complies with the relevant legal requirements.

Before this can proceed to an independent examination, there needs to be a public consultation period (24/11/2023 - 12/1/2024) where the plan and all its associated documents can be reviewed and comments made.

Cliddesden Parish Council as the qualifying body has prepared a neighbourhood development plan, entitled the Cliddesden Neighbourhood Development Plan 2022-2039, for their parish with the help of the local community. The neighbourhood plan sets out a vision for the future of the parish and planning policies which will be used to determine planning applications locally.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is satisfied that the submitted Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan complies with the relevant legal requirements and can therefore proceed to formal consultation and independent examination.

In accordance with the Regulations, the Borough Council is required to publicise the Neighbourhood Plan and supporting documents and invite comments.

Our solar panels helped considerably but also the ECO Teams' work on promoting saving energy in school by turning lights, display screens and computers off when not being used and items such as photocopiers being turned off at the end of the day and at weekends. Carl Webb from SATRO came back to school for a special assembly to present the awards to the ECO Team members.

Cliddesden 3 vs Kempshott Juniors 2



Cliddesden's football team took part in their first fixture of a local school's league in November against Kempshott Junior School.

It was an excellent game with both school's showing skill and determination.

In the first half Kempshott scored two goals and a half time motivational talk was required. We changed a few positions and tactics which worked well. In the second half we pulled back two goals within the first few minutes and finished with a third with just minutes to go. The final result was 3-2 to Cliddesden. Well done to all the team and to hat-trick hero Matthew for scoring all our goals.

We next face North Waltham in December; Chiltern and Park View next term.

Oak Class visit Winchester Science Centre



Oak Class went to visit the Winchester Science Centre to complement our learning in Science about Space.

We first went to the amazing planetarium, which projected lights onto the ceiling. It showed us that our galaxy is part of many within the universe. We saw the whole Solar System and loads of moons. We learnt that Saturn and Jupiter are both gas giants, and Neptune and Uranus are both ice giants. We also learnt that there are

over 2 billion galaxies in our universe. As we looked up into the night sky, we had a glance at all of our constellations. We saw ones like the big dipper and the great bear. Looking at all the stars and planets, you started to notice that space is bigger than you think. It felt like you were floating in space as if we had a space suit on. Many of the planets, such as Neptune (the god of the sea), are named after Roman gods and goddesses. We thought that it was spectacular to see our Solar System in a matter of minutes. As we made our way back to Earth, we headed outside into the rest of the Science centre.

Downstairs, there was a space suit that you could go inside for pictures. We went in to the small big room, which was really fun. On our way around, we saw wobbly mirrors that made you tall and small. There was also a game where you would roll balls around but they would slowly lose momentum and fall through the middle: this represented a black hole sucking in stars. There was a balloon which was in a chamber and you could change the air pressure. This meant that you could get rid of all the air in the balloon. Further along, there was a little Mars rover that you could control

through a keypad and it was put on a Mars-like terrain. There was a globe that could be switched to different planets and you could search the surface for any cool spots or storms on that planet. There was also a pumpable rocket where you pumped air inside to launch it in the air. This demonstrated how fuel amounts matter. There was a table on which there were multiple cans and you



could feel the effect of gravity on each of the planets. Collectively, we enjoyed the black hole ball game and the little big room most of all.

Upstairs, we went all around the whole exhibit and found a lot of interesting things. We were able to build Lego structures in ten minutes and when the ten minutes was up, the table we built them on shook. We learned that a pyramid shape is better than a square. Also, there was this interesting plastic bottle inside a water tube. You had to press a button to make the bubbles to go up and it dragged the bottle down. Next, there was a metal wire: you needed to get a straw and put it in the wire and bite it and cover your ears. Then you would feel the vibrations through your teeth to your ears and hear the twang noise.

To finish our day, we had a rocket workshop, led by the staff of Winchester Science Centre. We enjoyed designing our rockets and we realized the lighter they are, the better they fly. We had to shake the bottles for them to launch properly. The rockets were made in bottles and had methylated spirits in them to help it launch. There was Velcro on the bottle so we could stick accessories onto it. Most of us didn't stick much on it so it could go further. After we made them, we watched the instructor light the vapour of the methylated spirits and they flew across the room.

We all had an amazing day - it was a brilliant place to visit and we would love to go again!

Feedback from patients

Many thanks to those of you who have completed the new short on-line survey about how we all feel about the medical attention we receive and the administration of the surgeries. Response has been limited but by and large it would appear that we are broadly satisfied with the service we receive from both the administration of the practice and the medical team. Obviously, not all comments are complementary and we intend working with the surgery to suggest ways in which they can improve the service to us, their patients.

Surgery Update From CGHB

Flu and Covid Inoculations

CGHB reported that the surgeries have concentrated on flu and covid vaccinations as requested in a push from central government to do as much as possible by end October. 6500 flu and 5500 Covid injections have been carried out with some additional support from Health Hub.

They also reported to the weekly meeting with Integrated Commissioning Board (ICB), which feeds into Regional and National program, that it was not helpful that some invitations were sent from the practice and some centrally causing some confusion to patients. CGHB are about halfway through delivering the joint rollout program in the first four weeks and are not planning any more large Saturday inoculation programs.

Call and Appointment Wait Times

The Practice Regional Manager reported that call waiting times have improved but are not yet where they want them to be, with an average telephone wait time of 27 minutes. There are four full time vacancies for which they were interviewing and this should help with call wait times. Eight new members of reception team have joined in last few weeks with varied reasons for the new vacancies. Routine appointments are at four weeks, although 76% are seen within two weeks.

Dr.iQ

Dr IQ backlog has been cleared and it is only shut down when doctors are taken off to see patients, the aim being to keep Dr.iQ open to 5pm before shutdown. However, numbers are already rising.
