Neighbourhood Watch

There have been several reports of suspicious persons and vehicles in the village recently. One in particular involved four youths in Grey Lane, near the bridge at 1.50am. on the morning of Sunday, 15th this month. It is thought that they are about 14 - 18 years of age and they were wearing coats with hoods, three of the hoods were blue and one was white. Infact, they were seen a couple of months before in the same area, again in the early hours of the morning. On the same night as this recent sighting of the youths a car was found burnt out on Radley Road, just past Sharman's farm but it is not known if the two incidents are linked. There has also been reports of bogus meter readers in the village. Please keep a watch out for anything suspicious.

Parish Council Meeting, 7.30pm, Thursday, 12th December, 2002

Present: Mrs Herbert, Mr Brown, Mr Rickett, Mr Bust, Mrs Gathercole, Mrs Davis, Mrs Armstrong Freedom of Information Plan: The Freedom of Information Act 2000 requires the Council to produce a publication scheme allowing information to be made routinely available to the public. A model publication scheme was reviewed. It was unanimously agreed to adopt a scheme based on making available the core classes of information indicated in the model scheme. The clerk was asked to source some of this information for the next meeting to ensure it was to hand in case of requests for it (4 for, 3 abstentions). It was unanimously agreed to publicise the chosen scheme in the Halam News early in the New Year with a donation of £20 being made to Halam News to cover costs.

Standing Orders: A revised version of the Council's standing orders was accepted unanimously

<u>Village Hall:</u> A variety of options for work to improve the Village Hall had been passed to councillors by Martin Hubbard. It was agreed to hold an informal meeting to review these plans in more detail before seeking the views of the village.

<u>Village Hall Cleaner:</u> This position has become vacant. It was agreed to advertise it in the Halam News for January and February before considering other options.

<u>Road Safety:</u> A meeting will be held in January with those responsible for Notts. road safety to see what improvements could be made. Don't forget to let a parish councillor know of any accidents in the village.

Planning:

1. Ashbrook House, The Turnpike - proposed extension Agreed unanimously.

Finance: It was agreed to hold the precept to £7,000 again for 2003/04.

It was agreed to pay the Ordnance Survey fees of £55 in connection with the Halam Village book out of the £460 which has been made so far from sales of the book.

Sadly the village has lost two great characters in one week -

Harry Kemp - Harry was born and went to school in Halam and after he married Ruth, a Lincolnshire lass, continued to live in the village he loved. He served on the first parish council and became Parish Clerk, a position he served for over 25 years. Blessed with a formidable memory, he was a fount of all knowledge in village matters and worked closely with Eric Bust with the aim of keeping the village as a village whilst accepting that a certain amount of growth was both necessary and inevitable. We shall miss seeing him sitting on the bench in warm weather and receiving a cheery wave and word. He was an enthusiastic allotment holder and always seemed to be able to shoot a rabbit to go with his vegetables. Almost the last member of a large village family, we extend our deepest sympathy to his daughter, Susan and brother, Cyril, as we remember with affection a true old fashioned country gentleman.

Ernest Nettleship - Ernie was a great character who came to live in the village some fifty years ago. He was born in Farnsfield and attended the Wesleyan School there. After he married he lived for many years in Westhorpe but then came to Halam to live in Walnut Tree Cottage and later on moved to Cedar Lea. Here he kept a Jersey cow and had an immaculate vegetable garden. So, if you found a cabbage or swede on the doorstep it was very likely to have come from Ernie. <u>Freedom of Information Plan</u>: The Clerk produced a copy of the Periodic Electoral Review and the Financial Regulations. He had undertaken risk assessments of assets owned by the Parish Council. It was agreed to put notices up about the danger of hot water in the Village Hall kitchen, to prohibit access to the kitchen for unsupervised children, to fit toughened glass to the bus shelter and to arrange for a hedge to be trimmed at the allotments. A draft job description and terms and conditions for the Clerk were produced for discussion at the next meeting.

<u>Village Hall:</u> An informal, closed meeting of the Parish Council will be held to discuss plans for the Village Hall before seeking the views of the village.

Footpath on Halam Hill: Letter to go to the Planning Officer and Chair of the Planning Committee.

<u>Neighbourhood Watch:</u> It was agreed to pay up to £150 to join the Ringmaster scheme. Let a Parish Councillor know if you have problems getting in touch with the Police as difficulties have been experienced by callers being passed from person to person before having their call properly handled.

Planning:

Planning:

- Footpath at Manor Fields: The official line currently cuts across the garden of Manor Farm Cottages. It
 was agreed unanimously that there was no objection to this short stretch being re-routed to the top section
 of Manor Fields road.
- 2. No.2 Back Lane Cottages 2 storey rear extension : Agreed unanimously

<u>Finance</u>: The Parish Council thanked "Tea at Two Thirty" for their kind donation of £30. It was also noted that they had sent £95 to the Air Ambulance. It was agreed to pay the bill for the fire extinguisher check and to buy a new flag for the Village Hall

Parish Council Meeting, 7.30pm. Wednesday 22nd January

All councillors present. This meeting was called due to late receipt of a planning application.

Road Safety: A meeting was held between councillors, the School and the authorities to discuss road safety. A School Safety Plan may result in improved safety features such as an island in the road to help children crossing. It may also be possible to have flashing lights to warn about the school. Village Hall: It was agreed unanimously to ask Martin Hubbard to work up costings for one of his options for the hall: moving the entrance, installing disabled toilet facilities and extending it to the depth of the existing porch. Once this is done, there will be a village meeting to discuss the plans.

- 1. <u>Land north of Cultersforth Extension of building to form barn and stables:</u> rejected 5 to 2 on grounds of scale and materials
- 2. Ashbrook, The Turnpike proposed extension: Accepted 4 for, 2 against, 1 abstention
- Notification: The council is concerned over plans being received late and whether neighbours are being notified. Concerns will be expressed to the District Council and the Parish Council will use best endeavours to notify neighbours itself - but cannot always guarantee to do so.

Finance: Agreed to pay £175 for expenses for the Halam book. Sales are now around £1000.

Open Gardens: The date has been set for 22nd June 2003 with proceeds going to the Church and the Village Hall.

<u>Dr Jackson's Book</u>: A copy is to be given to Halam School. Further copies are still available for sale -£5 each.

<u>CCTV Van:</u> It has been confirmed that the mobile CCTV surveillance unit is not compatible with the village street lights. A letter is to be sent to Notts. County Council.

<u>Road Safety</u>: No response has been provided so far to the issues raised with the relevant authorities. Andy Stewart, the local County Councillor, is following this up. The flashing lights may be reinstated. The Clerk was asked to request that all signs in the village, including the Neighbourhood Watch signs, should be cleaned.

Village Hall Cleaner: No applicants have been found. Contract cleaning will now be investigated.

The Allotment: This has now been let.

Unanimously agreed to send comments to Newark and Sherwood Planning Department re. loss of amenities, change of access, believed to be in the curtilage of listed building.
- 3. <u>Notification</u>: A letter is to be sent to the District Council Planning Department regarding individual planning notices not being sent out prior to the planning discussion at the Parish Council. The Parish Council will use best endeavours to notify neighbours itself but cannot always guarantee to do so.



VILLAGE OPEN MEETING Thursday 3 April 2003 7.30 –8.30pm

Residents of Halam will know that a steering committee was set up to look into the possibility of forming, and perhaps implementing, a village plan. A large majority of people in Halam voted in favour of the development of a Village Plan. As a result of this vote the Parish Council agreed to go ahead with the Parish Plan.

The steering committee has arranged for an open meeting to take place on <u>3 April 2003</u>. This meeting will be led by Susan Hackett from the Rural Community Council, who will give information on the background of such a plan, and will explain how this can be of help to us in Halam.

The Parish Council applied for a grant on behalf of the steering committee, and this application was successful, so we are now in a position to go ahead. Anyone who would like to serve on the committee, or could offer help in other ways would be welcomed. The findings of the steering committee will be reported back to the Parish Council in due course.

Please make every effort to attend this meeting – the Parish Plan is about <u>your</u> village and the issues that directly affect all villagers!

Please note that District and Parish Council elections will take place in Halam Village Hall on **Thursday**, **May 1st**. Please remember to exert your democratic rights.

Road Works in Southwell

The work on reorganising the road network in Southwell will start on April 14th. Transco are also laying a new main from Westgate to Queen Street via Market Place, starting on the same day and lasting two weeks.

The Village Shop

Please remember that the Village Shop still needs your support. Organic vegetables are now available and will people note that benefits and pensions can still be collected at the Post Office. Trade has been a bit sluggish of late so please can we make a special effort to use the shop and so maintain its viability.

Kerbside Recycling Scheme

The District Council operates this recycling scheme. Collections of waste paper are on the same day as bin collection but every two weeks. The next collections should take place on the 1st and then the **15th April**. Please place your bags (untied) next to your bin. The Council will collect newspapers, junk mail, catalogues, telephone directories, brochures, envelopes (remove plastic windows), comics and textiles, shoes and belts (in a separate bag, to be kept dry). However, cardboard, Yellow Pages, brown envelopes, dyed or coloured paper should not be put out for collection.

Victim Support

Parish Council Meeting, 7.30pm, Thursday, 13th March

Present: Mrs Herbert, Mr Brown, Mr Rickett, Mr Bust, Mrs Armstrong, Mrs Davis, Mrs Gathercole Parish Plan: The five pages of results of the recent questionnaire attached to the Village News were provided for review. They will be displayed in the village notice boards. In summary, good aspects of the village included the School, Church, community spirit, friendliness, events in the Pub and Village Hall, countryside, shop, working life in the village, proximity to work/city, unspoilt nature. Areas of concern included risks of over development, lack of affordable housing, car parking, danger from cars, lack of footpath up Halam Hill, poor bus service, fear of burglary, lack of Parish Priest, no employment prospects.

<u>Clerk's Contract</u>: It was agreed unanimously to set the Clerk's job description and contract according to the model contract provided by NALC. The salary was set in accordance with the appropriate Local Council Scale, but will be phased in over two years.

<u>Water Quality</u>: Some villagers have commented about the poor water quality in Halam. The situation will be monitored to see if more people raise this as an issue.

<u>Victim Support</u> Mr Brown had attended a meeting which raised the need for more volunteers. Planning:

- 1. 3 Manor Fields insertion of 2 Velux windows Passed unanimously.
- 2. <u>Land West of Evergreen House outline application for residential development</u> Four parishioners wrote objecting to the application. The application was rejected (4 for rejection, 3 for the application) on the grounds that it breached all 3 elements of Policy HR23 on backland development (inappropriate in the location, impact on neighbouring properties, accessibility)

<u>Finances:</u> The Council is now required to advertise publicly that it has an entertainment license for the Village Hall. It was agreed to advertise this in the Bramley for £55.

<u>Date of next meetings:</u> The Annual Parish Meeting will be held at 7pm on Thursday 10th April, followed by the normal Parish Council meeting at 7.30. The following meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday, 8th May and will be the Annual Parish Council Meeting. As it will be held after the election on 1st May, it will be the first meeting of the new Parish Council.



Parish Plan Meeting

A well attended open meeting of around 50 people was held on Thursday, 3rd April to discuss the Parish Plan. Maurice Hinde, the Chairman of the Parish Plan committee, clarified a few points initially, such as the fact that the committee was fully endorsed by the Parish Council and that grant funding had been obtained through the Parish Council. Susan Hackett from the Rural Community Council outlined what was involved and how the existence of a plan would increasingly be required to obtain grant funding for village initiatives. The results of the recent brief survey of good points of living in Halam and areas of concern were presented and an opportunity was given to add further issues to the list. These will be more fully explored in an independent questionnaire which is being drawn up by the RCC for use in the village to help shape the plan. More volunteers were welcomed to either sit on the committee, contribute to specific aspects of the plan, provide help for open days on specific issues or help in many other ways. Annual Parish Meeting, 7.00pm, Thursday, 10th April

The meeting was well attended with around 35 villagers present. There was some discussion regarding recycling as a matter arising from the last meeting. Information on paper recycling was publicised in the last newsletter. Mrs Herbert gave the Chairman's Report. She outlined some of the new obligations on councillors in the past year including the new Code of Conduct, Financial Auditing procedures and Freedom of Information legislation, all of which the Council has adhered to. Planning applications are on the increase, perhaps in advance of changes which may occur as a result of the Parish Plan. The District Council has not always informed neighbours of planning applications so the Parish Council is endeavouring to do more to assist in this. The Chairman thanked Richard Brown and Harry Rickett who are standing down from the Council this year and have between them 70 years of service in a role which is unpaid, often unthanked and unacknowledged. Richard was one of the first councillors, has held the role of Chairman and Vice Chairman in the past and has given good service as Road Safety Officer. Richard was awarded a long service award by NALC at a Buckingham Palace Garden Party last summer. Harry's father was one of the first councillors and Harry followed in his footsteps. Noteworthy events in the year were the publication of "A Living History of Halam Village 1900-2000" by Dr Jackson (copies still available for £5), the Jubilee celebrations and Harvest Supper. The Chairman closed her report by thanking everyone for their contribution. Issues raised were the possibility of a plaque for the Jubilee Tree, problems with parking for the Pub, the one way system in Southwell, the need for Dog Bins, the fact that footpaths weren't being swept and the ongoing issue with the lack of a footpath up Halam Hill. The meeting closed at 7.30pm. Where appropriate, these will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting.

- 4. Halam Lodge, The Turnpike proposed 1st floor extension and conversion of garage: Two letters of objection were read out. Rejected unanimously on the grounds of infringement of privacy, loss of amenity and scale of the extension.
- 5. Manor House, Radley Road listed building consent for proposed internal alterations: Accepted 5 for, 1 abstention
- 6. Barn Cottage, Radley Road listed building and planning consent for proposed conversion of outbuilding into granny annexe: One letter of objection was read out. Rejected using Chairman's casting vote 3 for, 3 against on the grounds that the design wasn't appropriate

Parish Plan: Agreed to give £1,000 from the grant which had been received on account to the Parish Plan Committee on condition that any monies spent were fully accounted for in line with Parish Council standards.

Finance: A number of bills were approved for payment including the electrical check for the Village Hall, the Clerk's salary, the Audit fee and the cost of a new flag for the Village Hall flagpole.



Warning

Two scams are operating in the area. One is where women in particular are phoned and asked to confirm their postcode by the "Post Office". They are told that they are eligible for gift vouchers and are asked to give their address. 90% of the women who have provided this information have been burgled, as it is assumed the their homes are empty during working hours. The Post Office are not conducting any surveys. The other is when an "AT&T service technician" phones asking to test your phone line. They ask you to dial 90 then the hash key. This gives them full access to your line and allows them to place long distance, international and chat line calls which will be billed to your account. Police believe that many of these calls come from local prisons. Do not press 90 for anyone.


Fly-tipping and Illegal Rubbish Dumping

This is perceived to be on the increase in Halam, especially on Holme Lane, past the mill. Especially worrying are the reports of syringes being found amongst this rubbish. Please phone the hot line on 0845 3000 630 if you see such rubbish and the council will come and remove it for free if it is on public or council land such as verges. If it is on private land, it is the owner's responsibility to remove it, however, the council will do so for a charge. In the case of syringes, Newark and Sherwood recommend that you do not try to clear these up yourself, but that you use their phone in service on 655600 which operates 24 hrs a day, 7 days a week for syringe collection and disposal. Any suspicion of illegal drug related activities should be reported to the police.
