If there are insufficient members to fill the positions vacated on the 31st March 2023, then the Hall will have to be **closed**, which we are sure that *nobody* wants to happen.

The Hall and field are governed by a Charitable Trust, which was set up when the Hall was built and not MBC which is a common misconception throughout the village.

Report It!!

Potholes and fly tipping are two of the three most common subjects that people approach Parish Councillors about (the other is planning but that is for another Observer edition ...).

The key to getting both dealt with is reporting it to the appropriate Council. We have all driven over a pothole or spotted some fly tipping and assumed that someone else must have already reported it. They may well have done but your additional report will move the problem up the priority list for either Kent County Council (potholes) or Maidstone Borough Council (fly tipping) to deal with. On the other hand, it may be subject to the "someone, everyone, no-one" approach:

- Someone should report it
- Everyone could report it
- No-one does report it

Reporting using the online tools provided by both councils could not be easier. Just Google "Kent potholes" or "Maidstone fly tipping" and, hey presto! you are through to their online reporting page.

Describing exactly where the problem is used to be a bit hit and miss (who knows the postcode associated with that bit of road?) but now both sites use What3Words. This is a really simple app for your smartphone which will give a unique 3 words that describe a 3 metre square anywhere in the world. As an example, Stockbury Village Green is 'sharpness.guises.juggle'. It is quick to download and free!

As Patrik Garten has often reminded us, numbers count. The more people report each problem, the faster it will be dealt with.

South Lees Lane, South Green 9th May, 2022

M2 junction 5 Stockbury interchange improvement scheme

We have now started our works to widen Oad Street, to allow for the new road layout at junction 5. To do this, we have closed Oad Street between Woodgate Lane and the A249.

The road will initially be closed from 25 April for six weeks, we'll then reopen it for the summer, before closing it again in the autumn. Advanced notice will be provided ahead of the re-closure.

For drivers who would normally use Oad Street to access the A249 southbound, follow the diversion via the A2 to Key Street roundabout, where you can join the A249. For drivers wishing to access Oad Street from the A249, please use the A2 and Borden Lane. This will add approximately 10-15 minutes on top of the usual journey time.

We would like to thank everyone for your patience while we carry out our improvements.



Who Gives a Cr@p? Urgent Update!

The Big Plastic Count – UK's largest ever plastic waste survey to shed light on our broken recycling system.

On Tuesday, 29th March registration opened for The Big Plastic Count – the UK's largest-ever investigation into household plastic waste – taking place 16-22 May 2022.

The Big Plastic Count is a collaboration between Greenpeace UK and non-profit organisation Everyday Plastic and is encouraging individuals, households, schools, community groups and businesses across the UK to count their plastic packaging waste, record the different types they throw away and enter their results into the campaign website.

The Big Plastic Count will uncover the truth about how much plastic packaging waste households throw away and how much of it is really recycled – new evidence that will be vital for pressuring the government and supermarkets to tackle the root cause of the plastic crisis.

Greenpeace UK and Everyday Plastic will use the results of The Big Plastic Count to push the UK government to introduce stricter policies to reduce plastic waste. These include setting a target to reduce the UK's single-use plastic by 50% by 2025, banning all plastic waste exports and implementing an all-in Deposit Return Scheme (DRS) for recycling and reuse.

Stockbury Book Club

This month's book was **This Must Be The Place** by Maggie O'Farrell

As a young woman, despite having no acting experience, Claudette is cast in a leading role in an art house film; the film is written and directed by Timou, a young Swede. They marry and she becomes a glamorous film star. At the peak of her career she "disappears" to live a bohemian lifestyle in a isolated derelict house in rural Ireland with their son, who has significant speech difficulties. Happenstance brings her into contact with Daniel a visiting American linguistic professor, whom she persuades to help her son. He is divorced and his children live exclusively with his wife. They marry, have children, divorce and then latterly rekindle their relationship. Looks like an easy read!

As the saying goes "looks can be deceiving". So can books, which was certainly the case with this novel. Everyone found it a challenging read. The chapters were akin to short stories about episodes in Daniel, Claudette's and their family members lives told by different narrators covering various strands/events. Whilst these were often deftly crafted with good descriptions of places and their atmosphere as well as providing insights into the relationship, feelings and emotions of the people involved, they created a confusing picture. It wasn't clear who the narrator was and their relevance to the "story". You needed to get about half way through the novel to get used to the writing style, the threads then started to come together and it began to make any sense!

So how did we rate the book? As the football adage goes "it's a game of two halves" This month's read was like that. Half of us completed it. You had to get past the first half to do this. Half of us attended the review meeting. Half of the attendees had completed the book.

Somewhat surprisingly the novel achieved a score of 6 (range 3-7.5). Those who finished it were glad they persisted to the end. It is though clearly not a book to pick up if you are feeling a bit fuzzy headed, best to leave it until your head clears.

In summary as one member put it "I think I could go back to the beginning to read again now I understand better the way the book is written"

Next month's read is Mercury Falling by Robert Edric.

Patrik Says ...

Funny thing: the leader of the Liberal Party apologised to me after a committee meeting ... why? ... Because he agreed with me twice in one day!

Sometimes the right decision is just right, regardless of party colour and on that note I am pleased to announce that the Planning Committee threw out the speculative application to build 1700 homes near Detling Aerodrome, the so-called 'Binbury Park'.

A development like this cannot be pushed through the back door. Maidstone has a valid Local Plan, which is

reviewed every five years; this plan is our tool to fight off unplanned and/or unwanted development. The right decision was taken by the members of the Planning Committee. Thank you.

This application has been on the table ever since I was elected, maybe even before. Not to include this development into the Local Plan was a cross-party political decision. However, by law, Maidstone has to consider speculative applications. The application was validated in 2018 and has been around, like an annoying fly, ever since. It feels strange to experience a great relief. And to be perfectly honest, it was a wonderful proposal with many very good features but it was likely in the wrong place and certainly it would have been morally wrong to push it through the back door, bypassing the Local Plan. The decision by the Planning Committee is proof that democracy works and that Maidstone's councillors can be trusted ... I would say such nice things about politicians, wouldn't I?!

Local Plan Review

The Secretary of State has appointed Inspector David Spencer, BA(Hons), DipTP MRTPI to carry out the independent examination of the Maidstone Local Plan Review. He will determine if it has been prepared in accordance with the relevant legal requirements and that it is 'sound' – i.e. positively prepared, justified, effective and consistent with national policy.

Prior to the hearing sessions of the examination the Inspector does not have direct contact with either the Council or anyone who has an interest in the Examination. He is currently appraising the Local Plan Review and evidence base together with the representations received at the Regulation 19 stage. All the information on the examination is posted on the examination web pages which will be updated regularly.

Biodegradable Packaging a Costly Advertising Con?

The Government has said that compostable and biodegradable packaging should be put in the black bin because there is little evidence that it is good for compost and it can contaminate recycling. New rules will say that "do not recycle" labels must be added to all compostable and biodegradable packaging. "Compostable packaging materials are not widely targeted, collected or processed as part of normal council waste services in the UK because many of these types of packaging do not perform as advertised when treated in real-world conditions at industrial composting facilities," commented Jacob Hayler, the executive director of the Environmental Services Association which represents the waste industry.

Gillingham FC v Plymouth FC or Highwaymen Upset a Stockburyite!

We planned to take four disabled clients to the football match between Gillingham and Plymouth on Saturday 19th February 2022 and I would be taking three, including one in a wheelchair, myself. Two more care workers and a fourth client were to meet us at the Preistfield ground. I expected a hectic day but luckily, I had the prospect of sitting by my log fire tucking into Roquefort, French bread and one or two glasses of port on my return home.

The Highway Authority had notified Stockburyites of a planned closure of the A249 between Stockbury and Maidstone as part of its road revision scheme and the Met Office reported storm conditions. In Stockbury trees were falling and hedgerows collapsing. Not deterred, I was firmly committed to take my clients safely to watch the match

I had arranged the timetable to pick up my clients at 12.30 in Maidstone, at 1pm in Upper Halling for the wheelchair client and 1.30pm in Walderslade, with the aim to be at McDonalds by 2pm. I started out through the village lanes, hoping not to be blocked by fallen trees or any other obstacles due to the weather conditions and was pleased to find none had blocked my way. The only things holding me up were the three-way roadworks traffic lights at Maidstone Road, Wigmore. The red light against me stayed on, and on and on; I started to think there must have been a serious fault with the timing of the red light as I waited there and queued for well over five minutes, time I could barely afford in my schedule. I continued down the Maidstone Road through Boxley to reach my first client in Maidstone. Combined with the delay at the traffic lights, and extra traffic in the lanes, surely this was due to the Highway Authority advising the A249 had been closed,


so we, the usual A249 drivers, were forced to use the back lanes instead. The time lost amounted to a total of fifteen minutes as I proceeded to Upper Halling on the M2. I decided to drive a bit faster than I normally do. I reached my second client 12 minutes late. I then picked up my final client at Walderslade, it is fortunate none of my clients lived on country lanes but on safe secondary and main roads. Though there were high winds on the Medway Bridge, I was very cautious slowing down to cross it. Due to all the highway delays, I was well past my scheduled time to reach McDonalds, buy the lunch and park my car in time to eat our food and walk to the football ground. I trusted in God and his providence and St Simon Stock, and was fortunate to receive a very speedy service from the McDonalds staff. I drove to our usual, specially reserved parking space, right on top of the ground. We had our McDonalds meals and enjoyed them after all that frustrating driving. I pushed my wheelchair client and my two walking clients walked each side of me safely to the ground, meeting up with my other care workers and fourth client.

We supporters suffered the superior quality of the Plymouth team, who beat Gillingham 2-nil but I was consoled when there were no further problems taking my clients home.

Having had such a frustrating day due to the weather, Highway hold ups, traffic congestion and losing the match, I wanted to avoid the country lanes. So after delivering my final client home to Maidstone, I took a cheeky turn and went down the road off the Chiltern Hundreds roundabout leading to the supposedly closed A249 and found, to my great astonishment and relief, it was open and must have been all day. I say this because on a previous occasion the Highway Authority gave notice but did not close the A249. I confirmed later that the A249 remained open on the 19th of February, ALL DAY, by discussion with other Stockburvites in the Harrow Pub. To offset my great chagrin, that evening I had the consolation of sitting by my log fire tucking into Roquefort, French bread and two or three glasses of quality port.



Cooking with Zenia

First off, I would like to say I'm sorry for talking about baking last month but then writing a recipe that didn't actually include any baking ... Apologies ... I make mistakes sometimes ... I really don't do well with baking (unless it's a pie ... all my cakes collapse or die in some way or another). Anyway on to this month's recipe:

Labneh (Yoghurt Cheese) Balls

So in hotter countries, cheese-making developed as a less complicated process; ageing wasn't feasible in a desert or a hot tropical forest. It would drive me up the wall being without cheddar whenever we travelled away from home but this dish is now one of my all-time favourites. I remember quiet early mornings in a desert town, sat with the elders of a family I was visiting with, spreading Labneh onto bread and having a steaming hot cup of black cardamom infused tea.

So what goes into making this simple cheese? Yoghurt, salt and olive oil. You don't really need anything else but you can add more to it for extra flavour.

The Ingredients:

- 700ml whole milk yoghurt
- A generous pinch of salt (pink is best)
- Olive oil (use normal, not extra virgin because it's a fairly sharp cheese as it is, it doesn't need to be sharper) possibly a whole bottle
- Dried thyme leaves

Method to the Madness

- 1. Set a cheesecloth in a mesh strainer over a large glass bowl. You need a bowl that is significantly larger than the strainer so that the liquid that will sit at the bottom won't touch the cheese.
- 2. Spoon the yoghurt into the lined strainer and sprinkle with the pink salt.
- 3. Pull the cheesecloth up around the yoghurt and tie a tight knot so liquid starts dripping into the bowl. I sometimes use a pencil to twist it tighter.
- 4. Place a small plate on top and then weigh it down with something heavy like a heavy can.
- 5. Leave this in the fridge for a day or two. The longer you wait, the thicker the cheese.
- 6. Take out the bowl and turn the labneh out of the bag. You can use the whey left at the bottom of the bowl for another project.
- 7. The cheese should be a doughy, easy to mould consistency. Take pieces of it and roll them (they see me rollin', they hatin'...) into neat little balls. Oil your hands with a little olive oil to make nice clean balls.
- 8. When all the Labneh balls have been rolled, fill a jar with them and top up with olive oil, enough to cover all of it and add the thyme.
- 9. Now for the fun ...
 - a) The Optional Ingredients:
 - Dried garlic granules
 - Red chilli flakes
 - Dried dill
 - Cumin seeds
 - Crushed pistachios
 - Dried parsley
 - Dried and crushed pomegranate seeds
 - Crushed walnuts
 - · Nigella seeds

- Sesame seeds
- Rose petals
- Lemon peel
- Edible lavender
- Za'atar
- Dried mint
- Dried coriander
- Sumac
- Poppy seeds

b) You can roll each of the balls into one of the above spices/herbs. You'll have a wonderful jar of jewels in your fridge - or on a large platter in the centre of your table for a party (I generally only make this when we're having guests). Each ball has a different colour and flavour. It's striking.

The oil is meant to preserve them but I've never had the labneh last more than a week and I've read nothing to suggest that floating dairy balls in olive oil will last for very long. The oil can be used for vinaigrettes and other cooking.

Serve with crispy pita bread or toast triangles. And tea. Always tea. If you're having a small dinner party, then you can serve this with my Israeli Orange chicken - if you've mislaid that copy of The Stockbury Observer, I can email you the recipe!
