<u> Asset of Community Value (ACV)</u>

What is an ACV?

 An ACV is a registered building or land which is presently or has recently been used to further the social wellbeing or social interests of the local community and could do so in the future. (Examples in Berwick are The Boot Inn and The Farm Shop)

<u> Asset of Community Value (ACV)</u>

Why Register The Boot Inn as an ACV?

- Enables the Community's Right to Bid
- Lasts for 5 years
- Gives Berwick St James community the opportunity to keep the Boot Inn as a Pub

<u> Asset of Community Value (ACV)</u>

What happens if Red Oak Taverns try to Sell The Boot?

- Local Authority will inform Berwick that the asset is listed for sale.
- Community have 6 Weeks to decide if they want to be considered as a Potential Bidder (Initial Moratorium)
- Community then have 6 Months to put proposal together and come up with Funding (Full Moratorium)

Asset of Community Value (ACV)

ACVs - What Else?

- Does not give Village the Right of First Refusal
- Once Moratorium activated (Initial & / or Full), present owner (R.O.T.) of the Boot Inn cannot proceed to try and sell the pub.
- Moratorium doesn't apply if R.O.T. decide to sell The Boot Inn to another owner who intends to continue running it as a pub.
- Essentially, registering The Boot as an ACV is intended to give Berwick breathing space (6 weeks) to decide if the Village wants to keep the building going as a pub and if so, a longer period (6 months) to raise the required funding.


CSW Stats - Sessions

- 22 sessions carried out Jun Oct 2019 (17hrs)
- 1015 vehicles counted
- 32 speeders (3.2% of vehicles) 37mph 50mph mainly at the northern end of the village.
- Sessions at North View and Berwick House
- Recent session motorist abused the volunteers reported to police
- Persistent speeder (blue car) and dangerous driving reported to police

CSW Stats - Speeders

• Monthly Sids shows:

85% of cars coming into village <35mph 24% of cars leaving village at northern end travelling at >36mph Highest recorded speed 79mph leaving the village



CSW Stats – Vehicle Numbers


- Daily average:
 340 vehicles coming into the village
 270 vehicles leaving the village
- Total = 610 vehicles per day
- A303 and A36 incidents have a real impact on traffic into the village:


e.g. 9th July A36 issue: 360 vehicles recorded in 1hr 987 incoming from A36 623 incoming from A303


Total 1610 vehicles

e.g. 19th Sept A303 issue: 636 vehicles into village from A303

Berwick St James A303 update: What (should) happen next?

(Public examination ended on 2nd October 2019)

- 1. Examination Authority to submit recommendation to Sec. State, **2**nd **January 2020**
- 2. Secretary of State's decision due 2nd April 2020.
- 3. Preliminary Works start spring 2020 to autumn 2020.
- 4. Start of main works (i.e. tunnel) late 2021.

In other news

1. Only minor changes to the scheme NMC01 from a restricted byway into gated byway.



2. Rumours of a velodrome. west of W-S... (ideas for the community).

Photographic Competition - Autumn 2019







This is the third of a four-seasons photo competition depicting the various seasons as we see them. The third 3-month period (Autumn) started on 1 September 2019 and finishes on the 30 November 2019. Winter is the 1 December 2019 to the 29 February 2020 and so forth. The subject of the photograph can be of anything (village or country scenes, people, animals, etc), and can be taken with any camera (including phone cameras), so they don't have to be technically perfect, but they must capture the essence of the season. The photos themselves must be taken within the allocated period and be within the parish boundary (or thereabouts). Individuals should contribute no more than three photos per season, all given a title and emailed to me (in full resolution).

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
