### Village Hall News

### **County Councillor's report**

It has been an extremely busy time at County Hall, with another very difficult budget, for 2014-15, agreed at a full Council meeting in February. The net revenue budget for the next 12 months will be £940m, covering 300+ services including schools, highways, adult and children's social care, libraries, trading standards and health, serving a population of over 1.5m. We identified £80m of savings and raised Council Tax by 1.99%, which will raise £10m for frontline services. Similar savings will have to be found next year and public spending is expected to be squeezed for several more years yet, despite the improving economic climate.

We had to find savings from the school transport budget, namely the Kent Freedom Pass, which has been renamed the Kent Young People's Pass. This will be valid from 6am to 7pm, from Monday to Friday, across the year except for August. The annual fee for the new pass will be £200, with a concession of £100 for children eligible for a free school meal; the pass will be free for children in care and registered young carers. Whilst this fee is double the current cost of a Freedom Pass, the revised scheme will still be the most generous in the country outside London for the transporting children living in Kent aged 11-16 attending Kent schools. In addition, we are also reducing the cost of the 16+ Travel Card for 16-19 year olds in sixth form, at college or studying at work-based learning providers from £500 to £420. Schools, colleges and work based providers will continue to be able to offer further concessions to young people using their 16-19 Bursary Fund.

I have a £25,000 KCC Community Grant pot for 2014/15 to support local causes. This fund is stretched very thinly across 15 parishes, but please do get in touch if you represent a scheme or organisation that is deserving of support.

I would like to apologise on behalf of Kent Highways for the failure to complete pothole repairs on Liverton Hill when the road was recently closed for this purpose over a two day period. I know the Parish Council were incandescent on behalf of residents. I took up the cudgels with Kent Highways, who undertook a site inspection following the works which were undertaken by contractors and identified four missing patches that were originally requested for attention. Arrangements were made to complete the repairs on 19 March. Kent Highways admitted that the "original repairs fell well below the expected standard" and committed to avoiding a repeat of this in the future.

I have provided funding for the Parish Council's Speedwatch scheme from my 2013/14 Member Community Grant and hope this will help tackle speeding in the village.

# **DEFIBRILLATOR PROJECT- STOP PRESS**

Thanks to a very generous community project sponsorship scheme piloted by A W COURT the village will very shortly have a

#### 'PUBLIC ACCESS DEFIBRILLATOR'

We of course hope that it will never need to be used but if it is needed it may just save a loved one or neighbour

The defibrillator will be sited externally in a weatherproof locked cabinet at a central village location to be determined shortly; the ambulance service will give the lock code to 999 callers in appropriate situations. The defibrillator is of a type suitable for use by untrained persons, however it is preferable and recommended that people do have some basic training in emergency first aid and resuscitation techniques – training sessions will soon be offered.

As a footnote in cardiac arrest (stopped breathing) situations, not to be confused with heart attack or stroke, ideally CPR (cardiac pulmonary resuscitation – chest compressions) needs to start within 5 minutes in conjunction with defibrillation (electric shock to jump start the heart). The chest compressions keep oxygenated blood circulated to the brain; 8 minutes without oxygen and the brain is irreversibly damaged. In a rural location like ours paramedic attendance in under 8 minutes and ideally in less than 5 minutes is unlikely to happen for a very high percentage of calls.

# **BUS SERVICE 66**

## Schooldays service to and from Cornwallis Academy

This service, which currently runs between Headcorn and Cornwallis Academy via the Pig and Whistle, has up to now been funded by KCC. Following a retendering process, Nu-Venture has decided to operate the service in future on a commercial basis. From 21<sup>st</sup> April this will involve a change of route, in fact a complete change of direction - passengers will need to wait on the opposite side of the road to now!

The morning service will start form Ulcombe Hill Top at 07.30 and call at the Pig and Whistle at 07.37 (exact time to be confirmed) and run via Headcorn, Sutton Valence, and Chart Sutton to Cornwallis Academy, due to arrive as now at 08.20. The return journey from Cornwallis Academy will depart as now at 15.05 with an expected arrival time at the Pig and Whistle of 15.43 (exact time again to be confirmed).

A big thank you to those of you who came and supported our carwash on the  $9^{th}$  March. We raised just over £460 which is a great amount for a small pre-school like ours.



This has got to be one of the simplest dishes I've put in the magazine. (I had trouble trying to string it out a bit to make it longer). The Pork can be substituted with chicken or beef. And vegetarians, can try using sliced carrots, potatoes or other vegetables of your choice. Serve with rice or noodles for that extra Chinese touch.

#### **Crispy Chinese Style Pork and Onion Rings**

Oil for deep frying	1/2 Teaspoon chilli powder
50g Plain flour	1/2 Pork Fillet cut into strips
50g Cornflour	1/2 Onion cut into rings
1/2 Teaspoon paprika	50g (1 ¾ fl oz) Milk
1/2 Teaspoon cumin	

1. Heat the oil in a deep fat fryer.

2. Mix together the plain flour, cornflour and spices. Using just over half the mixture, coat the strips of pork.

3. Soak the onion in the milk and then coat in the remaining flour and spice mixture.

4. Deep fry both the pork and onion rings for 2 to 3 minutes until golden. Test the oil is hot enough by placing one onion ring in first.

#### Christian Message - April 2014

Lent will soon be over and Easter Day is 20<sup>th</sup> April.

So what's it all about?

Lent is about remembering that Jesus gave up a lot to come and show us what God is like and to offer us a new way of living with a different focus. Just after his baptism in the river Jordan, on the brink of going public with his message, he went into the desert for 40 days. He had nothing to eat. He was preparing for the months and years ahead – he knew life was going to get tough so some training was in order. But it was more than that: he was developing his relationship with God, his Father, and practising dealing with temptation.

Each year, when we observe Lent, we are identifying with what Jesus did in the desert. It helps us develop our relationship with God, and it can also help identify our weaknesses, our own temptations, so that we can grow in our relationships with our friends and family, our community and with God.

These days, many people focus on doing something positive during Lent, rather than just giving things up. So maybe it's always letting someone out of a side road when you're driving, or putting aside some money or some tins for the Food Bank in Maidstone, or visiting someone you know to be a bit lonely, or taking someone a home-made cake; perhaps "random acts of kindness" like paying for the shopping for the person in front of you in the shop or newsagent.

Me? I've given up eating between meals – snacking – and I have decided each day to do something to bless someone around me.

So I will remember, when I think of a snack, to pray for someone or something. Perhaps it will encourage me to make a phone call, or visit someone. And I hope that I will do something positive in the community (if you see me about, put me on the spot and ask me what I've done today!).

It was this training and preparation in the desert that helped Jesus overcome the greatest battle of all – that of letting go of control of his own life and trusting his Father. As he faced the horrific cruelty and pain of death by crucifixion he prayed "My Father! If it is possible, let this cup of suffering be taken away from me. Yet I want your will to be done, not mine."

His willingness to give his life into God's safekeeping and to trust him is a challenge to all of us.

May you know his grace and strength this Easter and always.
