Jubilee Field

The Council continues to maintain and improve the Jubilee Field facilities for all and suggestions for improvements are always welcome.

Pond. The pond has become very overgrown during the past year as we were unable to complete the partial dredging last winter due to the weather conditions at the time. We hope to carry out the dredging as usual this winter.

Pond Area. We have continued the slow process of redeveloping the area around the pond and where the poplar trees have been felled. Many of you will have noticed that the area has been levelled and we are now trying to keep the brambles, weeds and suckers from one of the stumps under control! We have recently had the whole area sprayed with a special weedkiller which can be used near the pond and which becomes harmless on contact with the soil. We have also added more wood chippings to the woodland paths to keep the weeds and mud at bay.

Circular Tables. We will be installing two new circular tables in the near future (one may even have been installed by the time you read this!). One will replace the rotting table near the footpath through to Craven Common and the other will be near the new play equipment. Both tables will have seating for 4 or more people, space for a wheelchair and will be made from recycled plastic material, like that used in and around the play area and should have a much greater lifespan!

Jubilee Field Tidy and Roadside Litter Pick.

The next Jubilee Field Tidy is planned for Saturday and Sunday 26/27th October, with the autumn Roadside Litter Pick on Saturday 2nd November.

The Uffington allotments continue to be busy and the large majority of plots are let. However, 5 plots and 2 half plots remain available for rent by residents of Uffington, Baulking and Woolstone. These plots each measure roughly 100 square yards and are mainly plots that have been worked within the last year but all the available plots offer great potential as a reward for some initial hard work. If you are a keen gardener or wish merely to enjoy the benefits of healthy exercise and growing your own fruit and vegetables, please contact Barry Godsell (bandha@hotmail.com) or Nigel Puddicombe nigel.puddicombe@uffington.net), who will be happy to show you round and give you more details. The annual rental is £25 per full plot or £12.50 for a half plot.

As is normal over the summer period the Hall had a quiet August. Fortunately, this enabled the changeover of the booking system from the Village Shop to Hallmaster, the on-line system. This work is now complete and working well. The new system is accessed through our website www.thmh.co.uk Once the "make a booking" page has been selected, guidance for use and the Terms and Conditions of use are given.

One of the most significant improvements offered by the on-line system is that users view the calendar showing all bookings that have been confirmed or requested and therefore can see at a glance the vacant time slots. Users who are unable to use this system can email booking@thmh.co.uk. The preferred payment methods are now bank transfer or Stripe (credit card). Our thanks go to Rose and Sarah in the shop for all their hard work in the past managing bookings, invoicing and payments.

The Hall Committee is very pleased to confirm that Robert Purdie has been coopted onto the Management Committee into the vacant position of Health & Safety Manager. This appointment will be formalised at the next AGM. Robert brings valuable experience in building design and maintenance; he is working closely with our caretaker, Paul Armishaw, on a review of all our facilities and a strategy for ensuring that the Hall remains a safe facility for all users.

We are still hoping to find a volunteer to manage our communications. It is increasingly important for the Hall to be 'visible' in a world of social media and this role would be a good opportunity for a young person to develop their skills in advertising and promotion. If you are interested, please contact one of the Management Committee; its members are listed on the information page of the website.

The Committee has managed several improvement projects this year. Those of you who may have noticed a grey coating on the lobby and storeroom floor can expect this to be soon transformed into a wood-effect laminate surface to complement the floors in the two halls.

A sub-committee is looking at the Hall Constitution, which was initially drawn up in 1974 so now needs an update to reflect modern practices. We hope to have a document ready to present to the Hall Council at the AGM prior to submission to the Charity Commission.

The Hall Committee is pleased to announce that we have several new regular hires. The Walfinch care organisation has run a successful art class on Wednesday morning for a year and has now introduced a seated exercise class on Thursday morning. NCT, a charity for parents, is now a regular hirer of the small hall for its classes. A Wednesday morning Zumba class has started in the large hall; plans are in hand for table tennis on Tuesday evening in the small hall, starting in January.

Finally, a reminder that we have audio-visual equipment in both halls which can be used for a variety of activities. The systems in both halls also have Amazon Firesticks and can be used for live or free-to-view television. They also offer the opportunity of a film club – it just needs a volunteer!

UFFINGTON CRICKET CLUB

The 2024 season saw Uffington back in Division 8 after the disappointment of relegation by 1 point the previous season, with a burning ambition to go straight back up. That ambition was fulfilled with 4 games of the season remaining, and the league title was sealed with a game to spare - the first time Uffington CC have won a division since 2004. The team won 15 of our 18 games, drew one, lost one and had only 1 lost to the weather (we were very lucky here given how wet the summer was) for a total of 421 points, which was the highest of all 189 teams in the Cherwell Cricket League...a tremendous achievement. All done with our customary attitude that it's only a game and having fun is the main thing!

Several of our players made the top 20 batters and / or bowlers in the division, with a special mention for Hassan Safdar who with 513 runs was the league's leading run scorer by over 200 runs and with 30 wickets was pipped by 1 wicket to taking the bowling top spot as well. Our cup run was ended at the semi-final

stage by a dubiously strong Kingston Bagpuize 3rd XI but we got our revenge on them the very next weekend in the league at least. And in the T20 Wednesday night league we won 6 of our 10 games for a solid second place finish.

All in all it was a very successful and enjoyable season. We are a very small club of around 16 regular players and a few others who play occasionally. Thank you to all who support us with enthusiasm, kind words and donations; it is much appreciated. We will be setting up a 'Friends of Uffington Community Garden' membership very soon, for those who value and want to support our efforts without actually getting their hands dirty! There are many ways to get involved so please come over, watch out for our postings and follow us on Facebook if you like.

Some will have seen us recently pressing apples at the Farmers Market and serving the freshest juice you've ever tasted! **We will be apple pressing again at the October Farmers Market** (Sunday 20th) **so be sure to come and say hello and put your surplus apples to good use.** The squished apple pulp goes to local Uffington free-range pigs too, so nothing is wasted. We also have freshpicked produce on the day.



Growing organic fruit, veg and flowers, we are increasingly aware of the need for diversity. We have group membership of the **Heritage Seed Library**, entitling us to obtain long forgotten varieties that have simply been lost or are deemed not commercially viable. Supermarkets and growers tend to find one variety that 'does the job' with tough, travel-worthy skins and a long shelf life and stick to it regardless – often resulting in mediocre but reliable crops. That's not good for choice but it's also not good for food security.

Sowing different varieties can mean that they won't all succumb to the same pests and diseases; we can extend the season with various crops coming to fruition at different times and of course, you have a range of qualities and tastes to suit more people! Not everyone's favourite apple is Golden Delicious! Some people like Russet, Cox or Granny Smith. Pollinators also want to extend the growing season and different flowers produce different pollen. Gosh, it's complicated! But actually, we don't have to know everything; we just have to hedge our bets and grow as many varieties as possible – for everyone's and everything's well-being.

Some of our heritage varieties this year have been 'Favourite' cucumber – sweet, juicy and thin-skinned. Renowned in the past for cucumber sandwiches on British

seaside holidays, complete with a sprinkling of sand, no doubt! 'Mummy' peas, reputedly from those found and grown-on from Tutenkhamun's tomb (we at least doubled our peas so will try again next year!) and 'Hero of Lockinge' melon – developed by Lord Wantage's head gardener Mr Atkins. Just one from many little fruitlets this year but it's a whopper and we can't wait to share a ceremonial tasting! Thank you, Guides, for your enthusiastic sowing – up for a tasting?

RESTORATION OF THE WHITE HORSE

Whitehorse Hill is legally protected for its ancient monuments, as a Site of Special Scientific Interest and as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It is the responsibility of Historic England, English Heritage and Natural England, while the land is managed by the owners, the National Trust.

Something must be done!

A few years ago, the diminishing visibility of the Horse was noticed. In 1965 it looked like this:



In 2021, it looked like this:



Concerned by this shrinkage, in 2022 archaeologists from Oxford Archaeology carried out a detailed survey of the Horse, using a drone, and compared this with earlier images taken from aerial photographs and surveys. This new survey suggested that the lines of the Horse had shrunk, particularly in the head and neck area, by as much as 40 percent in recent years.

In 2023, the archaeologists dug narrow trenches across some of the lines of the hill-figure and confirmed the aerial survey results. The Horse was indeed shrinking, as soils and turf had been allowed to grow over, and obscure, its chalk lines. Also in 2023, proposals were agreed with Historic England, Natural England, and the National Trust to undertake preliminary investigations to:

- Remove the turf and topsoil soil from around parts of the Horse to 'ground test' the results of the survey, and
- Establish how much of earlier extents of the Horse were visible immediately beneath the turf.

It was known from the 1990s investigations that below the modern topsoil the stratigraphic layering of earlier rammed chalk and eroded chalk-wash were complex and therefore not to be disturbed lightly, so it was decided to initially target the head and neck where those more significant changes could be seen.

In 2024 the team from Oxford Archaeology, led by David Miles (the former Chief Archaeologist at English Heritage and author of The Land of the White Horse (2019)) and Simon Palmer, (recently retired Chief Financial Officer at Oxford Archaeology) who carried out the research project from 1989-1995, with support from the National Trust, began the restoration of the Horse by trenching the topsoil further.

In July 2024, the team was back in Uffington for another season of fieldwork. This time, the purpose was to restore the hill-figure to its size and shape of about 40 years ago and, ultimately, to make it more visible. In the past year, it had been agreed that the head and neck should be widened to reflect the findings of the 2023 trenches and drone survey. This would involve the removal of the turf to a pre-set outline (based on what was revealed in 2023), recording the archaeology beneath the topsoil and then infilling with new chalk. This is akin to picture restoration where minimal, if any, disturbance is made to the original paint and what is newly added can be easily reversed.

It is hoped that this work will lead to the agreement of a 'Management Plan' for the future maintenance of the Horse, to improve the future management, and also lead to more accurate dating. In the 1990s optically stimulated luminescence dating (OSL) was used to date soil layers below the Horse, to between 1380 and 210 BC – later Bronze Age or Iron Age. The old excavation trenches were reopened to acquire more dating samples which will be analysed by OSL again – but with over 30 years of scientific development improving the technique. The work is principally funded by Oxford Archaeology and by a generous donation from Ian Godfrey and Lecki Ord, Australian lovers of The Horse. Following the work in July 2024, the Horse now looks like this:



Is the restoration of the White Horse complete? No, it is not. Centuries of soil erosion, hill-wash, has changed the profile of the hillside effectively flattening the slope that the Horse gallops across. While this build up is a boon for archaeologist since it preserves hidden layers (as revealed and sampled in the excavations of the 1990s), it is to the detriment of those viewing from below.

Obviously, the slope that the Horse is framed upon cannot now be changed, but the erosion can be reduced, slowing the buildup, and the angle of the actual chalk infill of the body steepened. This will be achieved by reducing the height of the chalk body, built up by several decades of unnecessary re-chalking, or scourings, and which now stands proud of the surrounding turf. The chalk will be reduced down so it is lower than the turf line, to create a clear edge along the Horse's belly (which was originally there) to slow the run-off of eroded chalk on to the slope below.

Study of the survey results also show that there has been a shortening of some legs and the tail. These will be lengthened to ensure that the Horse maintains its traditional extent. This will again be achieved by the removal of the turf and infilling with chalk. All lovers of the Horse will now be looking forward to the next phase of restoration – in 2025?

UFFINGTON MUSEUM

By the time this edition of the Courier goes to press we will have welcomed over 1000 visitors to the museum. Our last weekend opening for this season will be Saturday and Sunday 26th and 27th October so make sure you plan some time to visit. This year's exhibition, featuring the Wellington Bomber DV595 that crashed in a field outside Uffington in 1942 with the loss of six lives, has proved very popular. It displays the personal accounts by two Uffington residents who remember the event and who captured their memories for the museum – Brian Tilling and Jim Jones. Together with memorabilia loaned from RAF Welford and the Wellington Aviation Museum, the exhibition details the events on that fateful night.

Jane Golding, who helped curate the exhibition, gave a talk in the village hall which again was very well attended. She later ran a follow-up workshop on Saturday 5th October in the village hall to record details of other local military aircraft crash sites. janegolding57tt@gmail.com

The museum continues to exhibit the history and archaeology of the area including the White Horse and Wayland's Smithy. We have permanent displays on Thomas Hughes and Tom Brown's Schooldays and also the time that the late poet laureate Sir John Betjeman lived in the village. We have a mock Victorian Schoolroom and continue to record the changes in village life in Uffington with nearly half the collection consisting of photographs and articles from the late 1800s to the present day.


In July we welcomed over 100 children from the primary school to help them celebrate White Horse week, learning about the local area, reading poems and stories as well as putting on a treasure hunt and a quiz.

As a reminder, the museum is run entirely by volunteers and is one of the smallest in Oxfordshire. It was granted accreditation status in 2013 by Arts Council England and successfully renewed in 2017. UFFINGTON GORSE and WBCT

Every time I visit Uffington Gorse, I am reminded how very special this site is with its beautiful woodland and the historic Wilts & Berkshire canal and towpath. There is always something new and exciting to discover such as glorious foxgloves and water dwelling yellow irises.



The West Vale Branch of the WBCT and other volunteers have been very busy at Uffington Gorse over the last seven months, progressing with plans to restore the 200m of canal and towpath and maintain the beautiful woodland for everyone to enjoy. However, as the woodland continues to age and grow, we are aware of the constant need to monitor and maintain the site not only to increase biodiversity but for the safety of everyone that enjoys this site.



In response to this we have submitted a 10yr woodland management plan with a vision "to develop a highly ecologically and structurally diverse mixed native woodland" at Uffington Gorse to be reviewed by Forestry England. To achieve this one of the proposals is to create a number of small "coupes" or clearings over the coming 5-10 years to improve age diversity by introducing a range of different native woodland trees and shrubs. It is hoped that this will enrich and enhance the woodland environment so that with a mixture of different aged trees and shrubs it will be more attractive to a greater number of wildlife species such as birds, insects and mammals.

Following a survey to assess the condition of all of the trees, we have felled a number of those which posed a significant hazard to health and safety. Other tasks such as the tidy-up of the newly cleared towpath remain an ongoing activity. As you can see from the photograph, the hard work by all the volunteers is definitely worth it! Over the next few months we will be removing trees from the canal bed and across the towpath so there is plenty of hard work ahead. I have been back from my Sabbatical for a while now but, I hope, the good effects will stay with me for some time to come. We explored Scotland in our campervan, partly for the scenery and great camping and partly to acquire a bit more knowledge of 'Celtic Christianity'. The latter is rather an amorphous subject but, armed with a little local knowledge (thank you Prof. Wendy Davies for some inside information), some good books, and a desire to visit Melrose Abbey, I felt I got a bit deeper into an area which is shrouded in the mists of time.

Melrose Abbey is associated both with St Aidan and his successor St Cuthbert, and it was from this place that they were called to evangelise the Northumbrians, and to settle on the island of Lindisfarne.
