THE ALLOTMENTEERS - Carol Dallamore

The Autumn is again upon us and we look forward to crisp mornings and colourful leaves drifting down as we prepare the ground for a Winter's rest.

The early season's weather changes this year have resulted in less fruit on the bough. Walking along the cycle path it is clear there too fruit is sparser than last year. Pear and plums have rotted before ripening however I did manage to find enough to put down some Plum Brandy liqueur for Christmas. Hazel picked some Blackberries and cooked them with apples from an old tree of hers and had them with vegan custard.

Hedgerow jelly is fun to make and uses berries found in the hedgerow. A few are toxic including Privet, Holly and Bryony.

Rowanberry, Blackberry, Sloe, Hawthorn, Elderberry and Rose hips are safe and don't forget apples. The cycle path being an old railway line has several apple trees growing wild from the days when passengers would throw apple cores out of the window. Adding apples to the mix ensures natural pectin to gel the jelly. Crush the rosehips and hawthorn berries to break the hard skin, and roughly chop the apples, place the ingredients in a large pan and cover with water. Bring to the boil and simmer for an hour or so until all the fruit is soft, stir occasionally. Let cool a little and strain through a jelly bag overnight. Measure pint for pound liquid to sugar, bring to the boil and allow to boil steadily until the setting point is reached. Skim off any scum that rises to the surface, this can be saved and used as cook's perks. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Use with croissants at breakfast, add to stir fries, porridge and meat pies, also goes well with cheese!

As Allotmenteers we enjoy the fruits of our labour and preserving allows us to eat our produce in the leaner months. Freezing, bottling, chutneys and drying are also useful for a variety of produce and some last many months if not years!

Hand made Preserves make good gifts, just add biscuits and confectionery to make little hampers for Christmas.

Sadly, Carol and Richard are down to one hen, the other died naturally the other week. The survivor was out working with Carol as she cleared her plot and managed to find some very large worms for its tea. It was lovely to see the old girl wandering about – the Hen – that is not Carol! She is quite fit and not at all old!

I do hope that everyone has had a good summer. I know that the shorter days and the return of the kids to school signal the start of the harvest and the beginning of autumn, but we also need to be mindful of elderly neighbours that are likely to get out less as a result and may be lonely. Just remember to keep an eye out for them – they won't think you're being nosey, they will be pleased to see a friendly face and know that someone does care.

Do you get confused as to who does what in the Parish Council, the District Council and the County Council? This is not uncommon - the Parish Council sometimes struggle to find the right department too! If you need any assistance with finding the right point of contact for any of the Council Services, please don't hesitate to contact us and we will try to point you in the right direction.

The Parish Council will soon be undertaking its annual walk about, where we try to identify potholes, blocked gullies etc and then report them to the relevant department of the County or District Council to request they are rectified. If there are any areas of particular concern to you, please let us know and we will make sure we have a look at it, when on our walkabout. We hope that there won't be any problems with footways this year, following the job carried out by the County Council in the summer on High Street, Low Street and Church Road, which has made a huge improvement to the surfaces. Many thanks to County Councillor Mrs Dobson for putting this at the top of the list, without whom this work would not have been undertaken.

The Parish Council Annual Tree Survey has highlighted a number of problems, which we are currently seeking quotes for so that they can be addressed.

The new bus timetable started on 2nd September, it is hoped that this will better suit people's travel requirements. If you have any comments (good or bad) about the current timetable, please let us know and we will pass these on to the County Council for their consideration.


