Andover Concert Series ('ACS') – I liked it so much I offered to be treasurer!

Does anyone remember those Remington shaver adverts from the late 70's? (If not, a quick Google search will set you on the track!). Well I'm no Victor Kiam but I do want to plug the concert series that ACS put on as I think it's an undervalued local gem.

As a bit of a gamble, I bought a season ticket for the '23/'24 season – and managed to get to all 7 concerts. Basically, it's international standard classical (mainly) music but on a small scale – largely soloists to quartets – and a range of music from well-known and loved to new/challenging/fascinating introductions. And, because it's small and friendly, the artists would generally chat to the audience about what they were playing/their instrument/the composer – I felt like I was learning as well as enjoying. In that season, we had everything from saxophone trios to italian tenors to the most fantastic classical guitar and flute duo (who knew that was a thing?!)

But these concerts (which take place at 'The Lights' in Andover, usually on the 4th Thursday of the month at 7:30pm from September) have been struggling to get the audiences they deserve since Covid – and it's such a shame. Unless the club is better supported, these concerts will disappear and our area will lose a real asset.

So please take a look at the ACS website (http://www.andovermusicclub.co.uk/) and consider going to a concert from the `24/'25 season (£18 a ticket) – or even buying a season ticket (£80 for 7 concerts or only £20 for under 18's).

I'm particularly looking forward to the 'cello/piano duo in November and the harp duo in February and am annoyed that I booked our September holiday to clash with *Truly Madly Baroque* from Red Priest - that looks a great start to the season (see poster p6). And if Thursday nights don't suit you, there's a family concert on Saturday March 29th 2025 at 3pm - Simon Mayor's *Mandoliquents* - another great fun option.

Hope to see you there.

Stockbridge Neighbour Care Salisbury Trip

The inaugural run to Salisbury last month was a great success, with excellent reviews and useful comments from our 'guinea pig' passengers.

We have been able to fine tune the arrangements for the future – please make a note of these if you are interested in joining the monthly visit to Salisbury.

- 1. The bus/taxis will run every 2nd Tuesday in the month. This will avoid a clash with a bus to Andover. The next run will be Tuesday 13th August.
- 2. The pick-up time from Stockbridge will be 10am; pick-up points will be the White Hart Car Park and the Town Hall, depending on numbers and vehicles
- 3. The departure time from Salisbury, outside Bradbeers in the Market Square, will be 1.15pm
- 4. If you are unsure whether you are eligible for the service, or are interested in booking a place, please call the Neighbour Care number 0845 0943713. You must be on the Neighbour Care Salisbury list to be able to use the bus.

The service is available to anyone eligible (i.e. those with no other means of transport) in the Stockbridge Neighbour Care service area – Stockbridge, Longstock, Leckford and Houghton.

Lifts to and from the Stockbridge pick-up and drop-off points are arranged for anyone outside Stockbridge.

Blood tests & Online Booking

Just a reminder that all patients can now access blood test results on the NHS App. Blood tests can be booked online through the NHS App. Please be aware that we can only do blood tests which have been requested by a clinical member of the surgery team or a Consultant at a local Hampshire hospital.

If there are no GP appointments available to book on the NHS App, it does not mean that you cannot get a GP appointment. We offer same day appointments for patients with an urgent medical problem. Routine appointments can be booked for around 2 weeks' time. When we are low on routine appointments, we do not release them online because there are sometimes better options for patients e.g. same day appointment, physiotherapy appointment, pharmacist appointment, self-referral etc. More information on these services is available at *stockbridgesurgery.co.uk* – see the 'Do I need to see a GP?' page.

Padel Tennis - what is it?



Last month the theme of the magazine was sport, and it got us wondering about a game that more and more people are talking about with enormous enthusiasm - Padel. But many of us are not quite sure what exactly it is. So we asked an enthusiast.

Considered to be the fastest-growing sport in the world, it's a fast-paced, social sport, that's 'easy to pick up, but difficult to put down'. It is popular with experienced racquet players and complete beginners alike. You can have fun rallies even from your first session, and for experienced players it's a fast game with desperate retrieving, touch shots, smashes and lobs.

Padel is a mixture of tennis and squash usually played on an open air court that's about two thirds of the size of a tennis court. The court has a net similar in height to a tennis net. However, the court has perspex walls, so your shots can be played off them – like in squash – to find wicked angles and creative shots to beat your opponents. As a bonus, you can even bounce the ball off a wall on your own side of the court – if you can get it to land on the other side of the court.

The bats are thick and of a solid composite construction with holes in the playing surface and the ball is very like a tennis ball, but has slightly less pressure. This means it will rebound off the walls slower, which helps give you more time to hit your shots. Scoring in padel is the same as tennis and is most commonly played as sets and games. To win one set, you have to win six games and be leading by two clear games.

Padel is a much more relaxed experience than other racquet sports. It is usually played as doubles, and its lack of formality is contributing to the sport's growing popularity. Its attraction lies not only in its accessibility but also in its ability to provide a fun and lively experience for players and spectators alike.

The sport was invented in Mexico in the 1960s - the first-ever padel court was set up by Mexican businessman Enrique Corcuera at his holiday home in Acapulco. Now with about 15 million players worldwide, it is particularly strong in the Spanish speaking world, with Spain and Argentina now dominating the padel world.

It is said that the sport's popularity along the Costa del Sol and in the Algarve has exposed it to a large number of British visitors, leading to the increasing popularity of the sport in the UK and the launch of the UK Padel Federation in 2011.

If you want to know more, you can watch the premier padel league online and find lots of lessons and explanations of tactics, positioning and the techniques for the different shots.

Most padel venues will have everything you need to get started and will have padel bats and balls available for you to hire, so you don't need to worry if you've never played before. Locally there are courts and clubs in King's Somborne and in Winchester, where there is a waiting list. Six new courts are coming soon to Trojan's Hockey Club, Stoneham Lane, Eastleigh.

The Weed Cut

To keep our river – The Test – flowing well and healthily requires constant care and attention so I thought it a good idea to say a bit on the weed cut which goes on every year throughout the warmer months. I will add something about what is involved in maintaining a prime trout fishing river. It is a big subject!

The Government is represented by The Environment Agency which applies the laws and keeps an eye on what is going on. The riparian owners and fishermen are represented by the Test and Itchen Association and similar public or private organisations.

So, on to the weed cut itself which must be undertaken with sensitivity to the needs of the river habitat. Overzealous or indiscriminate cutting of river weed or marginal vegetation can have a negative impact on a habitat for healthy fly life, fish and other wildlife.

At the beginning of the year, weed cutting dates are set - there are usually 4 official cuts a year, starting in May. The Test is split into 5 sectors - A, B, C, D and E - Sector A being at the source of the river and E the last sector before the sea. Each cutting session lasts for 6 days with a 7th day reserved for 'clearing off' when clumps of jammed floating weed are raked off and removed. Moving downstream, each sector starts a day later than the one above. The idea is not to let an upstream sector send its cuttings downstream unless this is pre-planned.

River weed has several characteristics. As it grows, it increases in volume and displaces water. When cut, the reverse occurs and therefore careful planning is required as water levels are affected. Weed is also a provider of a suitable environment for freshwater shrimps and other invertebrates to thrive and feed the trout - so even more planning is required. This ensures that the supply of food is reasonably constant to hold the fish rather than have them dash off to another marine pasture.

Further consideration has to be given to the condition of the river bed. This is a repository for more fish food. Both fish and river life need clean oxygenated water so there is balance between clean gravel for the invertebrates and silt for fly larvae and the like. Again, it involves weed to be used to control water speed, firstly to scour gravel and, secondly, to slow water to maintain silt levels.

So now to some of the actual weeds:There is *Ranunculus aquatilis* (water crowfoot) which
is usually obvious and vigorous in growth and is a
strong contributor to the life of the river. Then there
are starwort, mare's tail, lesser parsnip. Towards and
on the bankside, are reeds, bullrushes and watercress.

I will digress for a moment since I have mentioned the word *Ranunculus* and I suspect many of our readers will have heard of Sir John Everett Millais, he of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood. You probably know his wonderful painting of Shakespeare's

Ophelia supposedly drowning in what seems to be a bit of the Test.



Looking at the picture, the water is crystal clear, the sun is peeping out whilst the *Ranunculus*, in which Ophelia lies, is lush, verdant and providing a comfortable place of repose. She, on the other hand, is shamming death and seeking publicity. She floats lightly with upheld hands and closed eyes, hoping... Hoping for what? Hoping for the rain to stop, like us? (I could develop this story...)

On a more serious matter, we in Stockbridge have a small army of Fishing Club keepers looking after the river and some of the carriers crossing the High Street and ensuring they are clear of obstruction. There are further waterways in the Town belonging to riparian owners - even though the owners may not be aware of the fact! These carriers are not the responsibility of the Fishing Club.

One carrier, in particular, always demands my interest - Lillies Stream flowing from the High Street past Nelson Close to the wooden bridge on to what I like to call Beryl's field. Following our wet spring and summer, the stream's banks are spectacularly

overgrown like elsewhere on the River. In a short while, this bankside growth will need cutting before it starts to collapse and become a nuisance. In the meantime, the lush growth is a haven for birds and insect life. You will also notice that the Lillies Stream



river weed has been very well cut by Hattie, the daughter of Daniel The Head Keeper.

Our readers may like to know that any bankside vegetation must not be allowed to fall or be put into the river. Any cuttings must be collected and disposed of in a responsible way. On this subject The Test and Itchen Association states:

'Above all else, be considerate and use your common sense. Do NOT send downstream what you would not want to receive from upstream.'



Stockbridge Parish Council News

Christmas Lights

The Parish Council has agreed to provide £1,000 funding for the Christmas lights this year. The Christmas lights have become an integral part of Christmas in Stockbridge and the imaginative displays using the High Street trees, the railings round the ponds and even lighting up the water make Stockbridge feel special at Christmas. The Parish Council has limited budget to support this endeavour, however, and it will be important this year for donations to be provided from other organisations and businesses because TVBC, which has provided support for the last two years, has confirmed that they will be unable to do so again.

Hampshire Police - Talk on Cyber-related Fraud Tuesday 29 October at 6.30pm in Stockbridge Town Hall

The PC has arranged for an officer from Hampshire Police's South East Anti Cyber Crime unit to make a presentation on cyber-related fraud (otherwise known as scams). These make up a significant number of reported crimes each month and cost the public and UK economy substantial sums of money each day, week and year. South East Police Cyber Crime Team have prepared a session which will cover a number of different aspects of both online and offline scams, methods to keep yourself safe and opportunities to spot behaviour which may be the start of someone trying to 'scam' you. Basic digital security need not cost anything and, with a few simple tips, can help keep you safer online and enable you to spot these offences before they develop. Please make a note to attend this useful session. There will be more information on the Parish Council's website and the newsletter.

Wildlife Habitats

TVBC is encouraging you to create a habitat for wildlife in your garden. With over 20 million gardens in the UK, even the smallest grassy patches add up to a significant proportion of our land which, if managed properly, can deliver enormous gains for nature, communities and the climate. So, find an area in your own garden, no matter how small, to create a haven for wildlife. In fact, TVBC has decided to relax grass-cutting schedules this summer to create urban meadows, which are more wildlife-friendly and provide a longer season of nectar for pollinators. TVBC has been increasing the amount of urban meadow it creates each year since 2021. This year, it will be letting a total of 44 hectares in Andover, Romsey and Valley Park grow wilder - that's more than 82 football fields of grass that will be left unmown until September, when it will be cut and collected. This approach will reduce the number of visits for mowing and allow grasses and plants to develop, providing valuable habitat for insects and birds.

Rights of Way

Stockbridge PC is working with neighbouring Parishes and their volunteers to ensure that the Rights of Way around Stockbridge and other Parishes are maintained. HCC has announced that it can no longer undertake the cutting-back work but is providing funding for equipment and training courses for the volunteers. Stockbridge PC is intending to ask HCC for funding for a brushcutter and a hedge trimmer along with the training for these items. If anyone is interested in taking part in the training and the cutting-back work, please contact the Clerk.

Health Walk Volunteers

TVBC is looking for new health walk volunteers to spare a few hours and enjoy walking and chatting to other people. The volunteers will be guiding health walks in different parts of the borough. Each of the walks is led by a qualified leader who will ensure a safe, fun and enjoyable walk. Some walks are a gentle stroll, others more brisk and they all last around 60 minutes and cover 2-3 miles, although, if you need a shorter walk, this can usually be accommodated. Most end with a chance to stay for a drink and a chat and they're great for boosting mental as well as physical health. If you interested in volunteering as a leader, please contact Fen Holland on

Potting Shed Cuttings for August

Pruning

By pruning lavender bushes into neat mounds, your plants will produce a sizeable number of flower stems next year. Avoid cutting down into the old woody shoots, as the plant generally will not regenerate from woody stems. Trim back pyracantha shrubs as well; the stems will have grown and hidden the attractive berries. Canes from summer-fruiting raspberries which have finished fruiting can be cut down to ground level; new shoots, which will produce next year's crop, should be tied in. Climbing and rambling roses which are not repeat flowering varieties, but which have finished flowering, can be pruned back to a suitable framework.

Sowing

Sowing has eased up this month, although salad leaves can still be sown, along with Chinese leaves, parsley and a final few spring cabbages. Onions and shallots can be planted for early crops next year. Hardy annuals for next year can be sown directly into their flowering position towards the end of the month.

Planting/Potting Up

Autumn bulbs such as colchicums can be planted early this month. Check borders for seedlings from perennials which have germinated since the spring; these can be potted up and will be ready to go into borders next year. Some varieties of daffodils can also be planted this month.

Miscellaneous Jobs

Lawn care will depend on the weather; if it is hot and dry, raise mower blades a little and leave cuttings on the lawn to retain moisture. Even in drought conditions, only newly-sown or laid lawns should be watered. Ponds should be topped up where necessary and blanket weed removed. Remember to allow tap water to stand for 24 hours at room temperature before adding it to the pond. Bulbs for indoor decoration at Christmas, such as Paperwhite narcissi, can be started off now. Make sure shade is provided for greenhouses; ventilation is essential this month and temperatures and humidity levels can be controlled by spraying the floor with water. Pests such as whitefly, red spider mites and mealy bugs are all active in greenhouses this month; check plants carefully and treat affected plants with your preferred method of control. Ensure all leaves and other plant debris are removed. Continue dead-heading flowering plants and check containers regularly for ants and vine weevils. The latter can be treated with a

proprietary pest control. For ants, stand the containers in deep saucers of water and, in general, water containers regularly to discourage them from making their home there. Ants are an important part of the ecosystem, so try to live with them, rather than destroy them.

In the vegetable garden, take the tips out of runner and French beans, remove tomato side shoots, water regularly and feed with a high potash feed. Don't forget to feed and water potato plants to encourage large, healthy tubers. Runners from strawberry plants can be pinned down into individual pots to encourage root development. These new plants can be used next year. Keep picking crops to encourage plants to produce more fruits.

Serves 4-6 people

Ingredients for the Purée:

5oz Caster Sugar

7oz Strawberries

Ingredients for the Mess:

3.5oz caster sugar

15fl oz double cream

4 meringue nests, broken into rough pieces

8 oz strawberries roughly chopped

1 teaspoon vanilla essence

Method

Purée the sugar and strawberries. Put to one side. Beat the caster sugar, double cream and vanilla essence together to form soft peaks.

Stir in the meringue and the chopped strawberries.

In a serving dish, starting with the purée made earlier, layer alternatively with the cream mixture.

Garnish with a handful of mint and even some raspberries, the garnish is your choice.

I guarantee there will be none left!

Are you an eco-activist?

This was a question that Megan McCubbin asked at a talk at The Lights recently. Most of her audience (including me) kept our hands down, thinking she meant that we had to be storming oil platforms or lying down on runways. However, she challenged our thinking, saying that any action you take for nature – from feeding the birds to buying at zero waste shops (and we've now got two of those locally) makes you an activist!



Encouraged, Michael and I joined the 'Restore Nature Now' march in London at the end of June us and over 60,000 people from charities as diverse secondly - and I know this is a challenge - but the as our own Hawk Conservancy to Greenpeace, from A Rocha (who run Eco Church) to the Woodland Trust. Whatever the differences between the charities, everyone could combine behind a request that, in one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world (the UK!), we manage 30% of our land and marine areas prioritising nature. (Hopefully a request that can be met and I'm encouraged that my MP has offered to meet me to discuss this.)

It was an amazing event; from the time we met complete strangers on the train and ended up making friendship bracelets with them, to the mass gathering in Parliament Square, it was friendly, relaxed and interesting.

And, while there, we had a fascinating conversation with a friend from the Test and Itchen Association, whose members include river owners, river keepers, and others interested in conserving and protecting the Hampshire chalkstreams. As a river owner, I had assumed that our friend's main concern would be around the recent sewage spills we've had locally. Not so (although don't misunderstand - he wasn't saying that was a good thing!). An even bigger concern for our rivers is the spot on flea treatment many of us now put on our pets. As well as killing fleas, it kills all insect life it comes into contact with, making our rivers barren when it enters them - and our water treatment plants have no way to remove it currently. So what can you do?

Firstly – please don't let your dogs into rivers and streams, especially after recent treatment. But treatment gets into the water supply when you wash your pet blankets - so if you can, please wash them in a tub outside in the garden and put the water on your garden, provided you're not close enough to a river for it to run off into that.

Good luck with your eco-activism, in whatever form works for you.

Following very positive feedback on the concert given by Stile Antico, reviewed above, Stockbridge Music has announced the group would love to return to St Peter's in the future, testament to how much the church as a venue is appreciated. In Old St Peter's, 'The Salisbury Organist' brings its history to life whilst enchanting us with his music (see above). These are just two examples of how our churches host and provide focus for all manner of activities outside the religious curriculum, many of which this magazine highlights throughout the year.

From the Ministry Team

The Olympics in Paris – this is really exciting – so many varied sports. I understand from someone who is going that it is 'pot luck' for which category you receive tickets. My friend told me their tickets were for the wrestling, although they were also travelling down to Marseilles for the sailing.

So much has to go into the planning – all the sports bodies, the venues, the security. Then the competitors themselves, training, preparing both physically and mentally, ensuring the right diet. There is personal discipline, practice and preparation.

The aim for all, personal satisfaction and the ultimate goal of a Gold Medal. A good film to watch would be 'Chariots of Fire' with the refusal of one athlete to run on a Sunday...

There are not many things nowadays that you can't do on a Sunday – a far cry from how it used to be when all shops were closed and it was a day for Church, a gentle walk and reflection.

During the month of August, the Gospel set for the readings is from John chapter 6. It is worth reading this chapter from start to finish. It covers a very interesting aspect of Jesus' Ministry, starting with the feeding of the five thousand, walking on water and one of the 'I am' sayings: 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.'

The crowds had sought out Jesus and followed him across Lake Galilee. Jesus told them they were following because they wanted him to continue to feed them. They did not understand what he was telling them – that He was sent from heaven to bring a new Kingdom. They wanted more 'signs'.

He wanted their faith and their belief in Him. They challenged and referred back to his background and life in Nazareth, 'Who does he think he is?'

'Those who believe in me will have eternal life.' That promise is as good today as it was in the first century. The requirement is that we believe in Jesus, follow his ways, engage with Him in prayer. That we practice our religion – put the same effort into our faith as the athletes put into their training.

The promises made in the first century - Jesus' promises - are for us, now. In his time, many disciples turned away as finding faith was too hard. Let us pray we can find the right path and keep going, through good times and bad.
