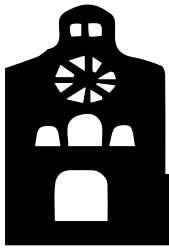

Fed Up With Slow Broadband?



Many of you have expressed your frustration over the poor broadband speed in our villages. In fact, it was one of the top issues identified by the Community Led Plan launched in June. Under Nottinghamshire County Council's 'Better Broadband for Nottinghamshire' program, we're unlikely to get superfast broadband until 2017 so witnessing villages like Besthorpe and Spalford only a few miles away receiving it simply adds to that frustration.

We want to do something about it which is why we're asking residents of Harby, Thorney & Wigsley to support our initiative. We believe the decision to upgrade the exchange in Saxilby that serves our three villages is a commercial one. If BT knew upgrading it now would lead to more business, it would receive greater priority.

HARBY HISTORY GROUP – Louise Herrick 703662

At the September meeting, returning guest speaker, Mavis Wilkinson came to give a talk on “Monastic Gardens”. She started the evening by saying she wasn’t going to bully Colin on this visit and he paid her the same courtesy by barely heckling at all! Mavis gave a very interesting, informative and funny presentation, describing what was grown in monastic gardens and gave examples of good monasteries to visit that would showcase this. She brought books and artefacts to show us, such as her treasured cow horn and her extensive collection of goblets for drinking the wine/beer/mead that the monks would make. She also had a supply of home grown fresh herbs that were passed around as we learnt what they were traditionally used for. This was usually a remedy for an illness or used in dyeing material, but occasionally to destroy witches.

At the October meeting, we welcomed guest speaker Tracy Borman who gave a talk entitled “The Real Wolf Hall: the story of Thomas Cromwell” based on her latest book. Tracy is joint chief curator of Historic Royal Palaces which includes Hampton Court Palace and the Tower of London. As a Tudor historian she is ideally placed to give us the inside story of the man who became a TV phenomenon earlier this year. Tracy’s talk showed how much research she had to do before her book could be written and we were in awe of the fact that she had handled original documents and letters to do this research. She made the life Of Thomas Cromwell absolutely riveting, entertaining and real. There was a question and answer session afterwards followed by the chance to buy her book which she gladly signed.

On 24 November, Richard Croft will be giving a presentation of “Curious Lincolnshire”. This is a follow on from “Curious Lincoln”, the talk that Richard gave last year. Richard uses a slide show to illustrate his talks and they are usually fun, interactive and informative.

The year has again come full season and thanksgiving for the harvest in church, followed by a splendid feast in the village hall brought members of the congregation and villagers together once more. The main course was provided by Salted Orange Food Company and a wonderful variety of desserts were cooked by church members. This year 47 adults and 9 children (aged from 10 weeks to 6 years), enjoyed the lunch. Some of these children attend Queen Eleanor's Primary School in the village whose own harvest celebration also took place in All Saints; thus strengthening the link between church and school.

In November our thoughts again turned to remembrance and on November 8th Harby residents gathered in the church to give thanks and to remember those who had made the supreme sacrifice in past wars and conflicts. Leaving Harby on the morning of Friday 18th September the team put in a 38-mile morning thrash on route 1 via Lincoln, Bardney and Tattershall Bridge to an excellent late lunch and refreshments at The Wheatsheaf at Hubbert's Bridge. A leisurely afternoon ride along quiet country roads through South Lincolnshire villages to The Bell Inn at Gosberton for further refreshments and subsequent finish in Spalding concluded a 56-mile first day.

Coincidentally, our stay at the Red Lion Hotel on 18th September was exactly 45 years after the death of Jimi Hendrix on 18th September 1970 ... Jimi had stayed in room 6 of the Red Lion Hotel after a gig on 29th May 1967. A curry and a few beers watching England beat Fiji in the Rugby World Cup provided the evening's entertainment.

Saturday morning saw a brisk 10-mile sortie to Crowland, sightseeing at Trinity Bridge and the Abbey before another 6 miles to Peakirk ... where John Howard's attempted murder of Richard Willows in the "*Salamigate*" incident marred proceedings. Running repairs to his bike and hops-based recovery beverages at The Millstone Inn at Barnack saw Richard make a full recovery, though a detour to Halfords in Stamford for new front wheel was required to fully restore his bike.

The afternoon ride through the most undulating terrain of the adventure and around Rutland Water was eased by refreshment stops at The Exeter Arms in Easton-on-the-Hill and The Horse & Jockey at Manton before arrival at The Brook Whipper Inn in Oakham to conclude a 50-mile day. HMRT veteran George Dickinson joined the fray for another curry and more beer in the evening before transporting the panniers back to Harby on Sunday morning.

Sunday's cycling was much easier without the weight of the luggage and a leisurely morning tea was taken at Wymondham Mill before crossing the Leicestershire Wolds, precipitous descent in to the Vale of Belvoir at Denton and along The Grantham Canal towpath to lunch at The Red Lion in Bottesford. After a splash through the ford at Bottesford, the route north became increasingly familiar to Newark and home on route 64 through Collingham.

HMRT President Brian Rippard led the team back in to the village at around 20mph down Wigsley Road to a final halt at The Bottle & Glass for refreshments and 'The President's Address' to conclude the 156-mile 2015 Adventure.

Plans are already underway for a special Tenth Anniversary Adventure in Flanders (Belgium) in June 2016.

Community First Aid Event

Gritting in Harby

One of the themes that came out of the Community Led Plan was requesting more gritting. The County Council policy on gritting is that they grit A roads, B roads, and major bus routes. When severe weather is forecast and resources permit, they will also grit one road to every major settlement.

Therefore in Harby if we want clear roads and footpaths it will be the residents who need to do the work! We have a number of grit bins, which you can use to spread grit on the public footpaths and roads, these will also include in them some bags of salt. The Government has issued guidance saying it is unlikely that you would be held responsible if someone is injured on a path if you've cleared it carefully. Speeding on Church Road: A request for new playground signs has been made; this is now being investigated by Highways.

Brickwork on Wigsley Road: The two lumps of rock/brickwork left on Wigsley Road from dredging will be removed by the Drainage Board.

THORNEY SPOTTINGS (9) – Janet Collins

If nothing else, autumn has taken its time arriving. With temperatures regularly in double figures into mid-November the leaves have been slow to fall from the trees. However, several windy days have made a big difference!

These warm conditions have meant that insects often found inside our houses in autumn have been content to stay in our gardens. Ladybirds, in particular, must have been seeking tasty tidbits (i.e. greenfly) on the flowers in gardens. Common seven spot and two spot adults usually snuggle half a dozen or more at a time in the corners of windows, ready for their winter hibernation. So in late autumn it is not unusual to get a good look at them from this position. To date I could count them on one hand. Hopefully, they may have found the dried flower stem compartments of insect boxes, if you have been kind enough to supply them.

Insect boxes can be made easily from three small pieces of wood knocked into an open triangular shape about the size of a small bird nest box. The inside area is then filled with dried flower stem pieces all cut to the width of the frame. Preferably, the stems should be from different species of plants, so they will be of differing diameters. This means a variety of insects can use the box. Of course, you need to check the inside of the plant stem, to make sure it is hollow! Delphiniums and bamboo are two good examples. You ought to find several suitable species among the perennials you will be wanting to cut down. The essential thing is to fill the box as tightly as possible, without crushing the stems. This ensures that they will not get blown out of the box once it is fitted to a wall.

In late October we began our winter bird feed programme, hanging out the first of the sunflower heart feeders. Within an hour, a nuthatch arrived, followed shortly by a second one. This seems to imply that we have a healthy population of them around Thorney. Of course, they were closely followed, if not preceded, by the usual members of the tit family. It also meant there were the 'hangers on', such as the blackbirds and robins, hoping for a few droppings.

Unexpectedly, because of the mild conditions and it being rather early for them, I noticed a flock of fieldfare flying across the farmland off Grange Lane in mid-November. These winter visitors are about the size of blackbird, but have a similar colour and spotted appearance to the mistle thrush, which is also a common visitor along the east coast. However, from a distance fieldfare are easily recognized by their distinctive flight pattern. They close their wings in a short, regular pattern but without undulating. I hope their arrival isn't an indication of harsh weather to come.

The cock pheasants are beginning to gather a harem now. I love watching the strutting, and dipping courtship display. They spread their tail and wings, which they dip while running rapidly towards and around a nonchalant female. Most of the time, the females don't look at all interested. However, not many of them leave. I suppose they recognize a good dance when they see one!
