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# ASH WEDNESDAY

## What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day period of fasting, repentance, and spiritual preparation leading up to Easter. Traditionally observed by Catholics and now embraced by several Protestant denominations, Ash Wednesday serves as a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for repentance.

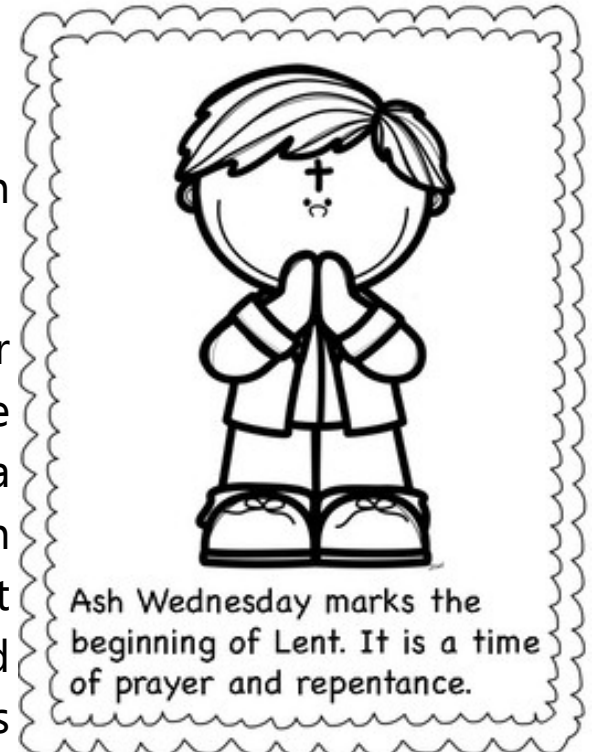
During Ash Wednesday services, a priest or minister applies ashes in the shape of a cross on the foreheads of worshippers, often while reciting the words: *"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return"* ([Genesis 3:19](#)). The ashes, typically made from the burned palm branches of the previous year's Palm Sunday, symbolise grief over sin, humility before God, and the hope found in Christ's sacrifices on the cross.

Ash Wednesday also sets the stage for Lent, a season reflecting on Jesus's 40-day fast and temptation in the wilderness ([Matthew 4:1-11](#)). The day before, known as Shrove Tuesday or Fat Tuesday, is often a time of feasting before the fasting and discipline of Lent begin. Many cultures celebrate with indulgent foods like pancakes or pastries as a final moment of enjoyment before the season of reflection and self-denial.

## When is Ash Wednesday?

For 2026, Ash Wednesday will be observed on February 18<sup>th</sup>.

Ash Wednesday falls 46 days before Easter Sunday, marking the official start of Lent. Since Easter follows the lunar calendar rather than a fixed date, Ash Wednesday's date changes each year. It always takes place on a Wednesday, but the specific date shifts between February 4 and March 10 depending on when Easter is celebrated that year.





## Commitment?



After several stop / starts over the years Notts CC officials have put the proposal to the politicians, who have agreed to sell the site in two sections:

- 1: The Staythorpe Road 'T' junction side to become housing (pending planning permission application aimed at September 2026)
- 2: The main entrance of the school and along the A617 to be sold to a community body. (hopefully The Hive).

There is an implication that the sale will include the demolition of the old school, but doesn't say whether the housing development, or the community element will pay for this.

The Hive team have enquired whether a new application is required and if they are successful whether they can move the conveyancing contract to the exchange element of the contract. This commits both parties to the contract (whatever is agreed) and puts the team in a much better position for fundraising from groups like The National Lottery Community Fund.

The team hope to find out by the March issue whether they have been selected as the Community Group to take this community project forward.

Next steps from the Hive team will be to re-start conversations with all villagers to see what you want to see happen in The Hive for: activities, educational/informational and social events, plus your ideas on the look and feel of The Hive and Community Garden. All of this will inform the Architectural brief that will give a good basis for costing to get the whole project going.

# Tools With A Mission



What's that? Never heard of it!

Over the next couple of months you're going to hear a lot more about Tools With A Mission because Kelham Church has decided to offer its support during 2026.

It's a Charity that collects unwanted tools, refurbishes them, and distributes them to people in developing countries who can use them to earn a living and gives others the opportunity to use their skills and experience in tangible ways that benefit others. At the same time, it prevents thousands of unwanted items either going to landfill or cluttering up our homes.

In the UK, the Charity can supply refurbished tools to Community organisations as well as providing volunteering opportunities to a whole range of people – anything from van driving to admin work. It provides space for volunteers – often with mental health problems – to socialise, make friends and at the same time use their skills in a significant way. Their work also supports other groups according to their needs, for example, offering work placements to young people with additional needs.

Overseas, it sends tool kits to training centres in six countries in Africa. Trainees study carpentry, tailoring, mechanics and other practical skills and after successfully completing the course, they are given a tool kit so they can start earning a living, support themselves and feed their families.

**Save the dates:– On 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> April**, Kelham Church will hold an 'Open Churches' weekend when you will be able to donate any unwanted tools you have – it doesn't matter if it's a single screwdriver or shed-load – we will collect them together and donate on behalf of our villages.

So when you're doing your annual Spring Cleaning, think of Tools With A Mission and sort out those overcrowded shelves and cupboards full of neglected tools.

## ASK Garden Club Report

Well, this was one of our busiest meetings.... We welcomed John Schofield in November to give us a talk and presentation on plants and in particular his collection of herbaceous perennial salvias. John arrived in a van crammed full with plants from his

nursery which he then displayed in our meeting room. John engaged in a relaxed manner with our group, inviting interaction from all our members.

So much so, despite it being a cold night and the heating going off at 9pm, no one seemed to want to go home!

We look forward to our group catching up with John again when he'll be exhibiting at local garden shows throughout the summer, details to follow in a future addition of The Plough.

Salvias or ornamental sages are great and come in a vast range of forms

and colours to enrich any herbaceous border. They flower for months on end from midsummer until the first hard frosts. The bees, butterflies and other pollinating insects benefit from the nectar rich flowers. The latin for salvia is salveo which means heal or save.





## ASK Garden Club Report Continued

We're familiar with *salvia officinalis*, as a culinary herb; however the Romans and ancient Greeks used it as a medicinal herb for healing.

Salvias look great in a mixed herbaceous border, but also consider planting them amongst roses. It's said that they will keep mildew and black spot at bay and as the rose's flowers dwindle, salvias will begin to flower at their best. They look great as part of an exotic planting scheme or simply as a standalone plant in a pot.

Varieties such as *Salvia nemorosa* and *Salvia sylvestris* are hardy and should come back year after year. Top tip, if you cut back after the first flowers fade in July this will ensure you have another display in late summer to early autumn.

Salvias grow best in full sun and free draining soil. If over winter the soil is too cold and wet salvias may be lost, therefore take cuttings late summer or grow tender varieties in pots and keep them in a frost free location over the winter months.

Also it's best to wait until late spring before you cut back the old top growth as this helps protect the root against the cold.

**Community Engagement:** Encouraging participation and involvement from the community in planning and decision making processes.

These areas are chosen based on the community's needs identified through surveys, research and consultations. The Parish Plan aims to create a vision for the future and an action plan to achieve that vision, ensuring that the community's voice is heard and that the plan is based on evidence and community input.

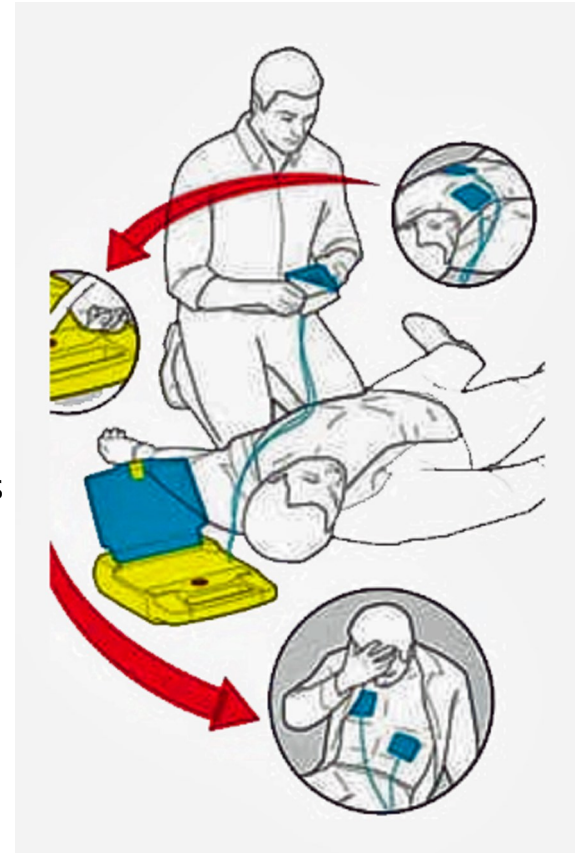
## Parish Council Continued

A lifesaving decision was made to repair existing Defibrillators and add a new one. Repairs and updates have been carried out in Staythorpe and Averham Park, with the addition of a new one at the end of Staythorpe Road on Hopwas Close, Averham. The hope is we never use them, however, here are brief details: **ACCESS CODE to ALL machine cabinets is C0159X**

### Brief Instruction on using a defibrillator

To use a defibrillator effectively, follow these steps:

1. **Call emergency services** and start CPR if you are trained.
2. **Remove clothing** from the person's chest to expose the skin.
3. **Attach the pads** to the chest, following the devices instructions.
4. **Allow the device to analyse** the heart rhythm.
5. **Deliver the shock** if advised, ensuring no one is touching the person.
6. **Resume CPR** if the shock is not needed.
7. **Keep the pads in place** until further instruction is given.



For detailed instructions and visual guidance, refer to the provided booklets and guides.

## Dear Villagers,

I hope you've had a good start to the new year. As we move through February it's always a joy to see the first signs of a new season approaching with the early buds and flowers beginning to show and new life appearing.

It's been a joy to see signs of new life in the church too in recent times with lots of reports of people returning to church and statistics to show for it (google the 'Quiet Revival' report if you haven't already).

At St Michael's Church in Farnsfield (where I'm the vicar) we've been blessed to have seen that a little over these past few years, many new people joining our church family, attending Alpha Courses, and taking steps in faith. One of the highlights of 2025 was seeing 14 adults (many of whom were new to church this past year) being baptised as a sign of their newfound faith and desire to follow Jesus.

Perhaps you've sensed a fresh openness to spiritual things too, either in yourself or in others?

All this is a really exciting context to the new 'Rural Clusters' which have been created in conversation with the team at the diocese and particularly our Archdeacons. Farnsfield has been identified as the 'hub' church for 'Rural Cluster 3' which includes the Riverside churches of North & South Muskham, Averham & Kelham, and a number of parishes in between.

The new Rural Cluster won't change anything in terms of parish boundaries – and I'm pleased to say the plan is still for the Riverside parishes to have their own vicar in due course. Rather this is a strategic and missional partnership aimed at enabling our churches to work together to resource new ministry and encourage growth.

Alongside the clergy posts which will continue as planned, there will be a number of new paid cluster roles which have been made possible through the generosity of the national church, and which will support new mission and ministry. My role as the (fancy title alert) 'Lead Mission Enabler' will be to work alongside this new team, as well as local clergy and Parochial Church Councils, to support these developments.

Whilst we're still getting our heads around what it all means and how it might all work, I think it's a great opportunity to work together as parishes as we seek to follow God's lead and enable more people to find a home in our churches.

We haven't yet got a name for our new Rural Cluster (we're still currently known by the not-very-catchy title of 'Rural Cluster 3') but we have got a guiding verse to set us on our way. In Luke 10:2 as Jesus sends out his disciples into the towns and places he was about to go, says to them the words: 'The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.'

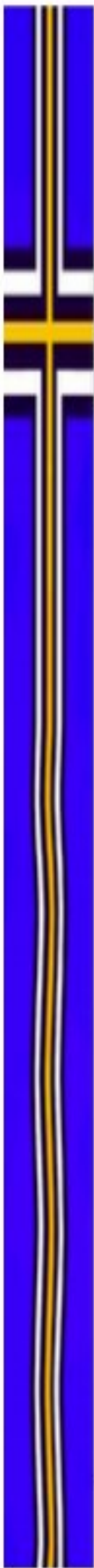
