Jane Herbert also off to Australia

My last newsletter highlighted all our Kingscroft players who had been selected for International duty.

Missing from the list – because the announcement had not been made at the time, was Jane Herbert, who will be going to the World Championships in Australia with Bowls England, as a Director.

What is a DBE bowls Director?

Jane's role as Director for the visually impaired is to be the eyes for the player. Sounds simple, but not as easy as appears.

Jane started playing bowls for Western Park in 1991 and has had her own successful career at club, county and national level, but two years ago, agreed to be Director for Sally-Ann Lewis-Wall.

It is quite easy to forget when one sees Sally-Ann around the green at Kingscroft, that her vision is seriously impaired. With no

peripheral vision, (like looking down a Biro) and a depth of field measured at 6m, Sally-Ann would not be able to bowl without her director standing behind her and describing the course of her bowl, the final resting position and the distance from the jack – all using a clock face key and distance measured in everyday items eg, egg box, shoe box, pallett. In pairs matches, when Sally-Ann is at the non-bowling end, Jane has to describe the approaching bowl so that Sally-Ann is looking in the right spot as the bowl enters her field of vision. This has to be done for every bowl bowled, including the oppositions woods, away from or towards the jack so that Sally-Ann has a complete picture of the developing head. Jane's own bowling experience is also important as she advises Sally-Ann on line etc. to avoid short woods.

The skills acquired are not specific to directing Sally-Ann. Jane was at practice matches against Australia ahead of the Commonwealth Games last year and successfully directed for DBE there.

Whatever it is that Jane does, it has been recognized by Bowls England as special, and Jane has been selected to travel to Australia, where she will be directing Alison Yearling and they will be getting together before the Worlds to fine tune their working relationship. Directors are included as team members and Jane will receive her International Cap.

Why does Jane do this? It is a huge commitment to be at every match that Sally-Ann wants to play and each match requires higher concentration levels than would be the case is able bodied matches. When asked, Jane replied "I like giving something back to the sport that I so enjoyed in my bowling career"

Jane also said that she takes inspiration from working with DBE and the way people overcome their disabilities to perform at the highest level. Jane said it is very humbling.

I am sure that the whole club will want to wish Jane a fantastic time in Australia and hope that she can direct BE to World Championship success.
