Church News



Letter from the Rectory

November is a month which always seems to be overshadowed by remembrance. We remember the departed on All Souls' Day, 2nd November. On 5th November the tone is rather different as we remember Guy Fawkes and his attempt to blow up parliament. Then on 11th November (Armistice Day) and 14th November (Remembrance Sunday this year) we remember those who have died fighting for their country – particularly in the two world wars, but also those who died in other conflicts.

As part of the Acts of Remembrance we will hold on 11th November we make an Act of Commitment. Members of the congregation are asked three questions to which they are invited to reply “we will” each time – Will you strive for all that makes for peace? Will you seek to heal the wounds of war? Will you work for a just future for all humanity? These are questions to which it would be possible to reply “we will” without too much thought, viewing them as questions for the nation as a whole and not as things to which we personally can make much difference. On an international scale that may be true, but if we look at it on a different level we find that our actions, attitudes and words do matter. One of the current problems in public debate seems to be an increasing tendency to focus on things that divide groups from each other rather than on the things that can unite, exploiting differences of opinion to demonise the other side and to escalate intolerance. We see it in political debate, but if we commit ourselves to strive for all that makes for peace, we must ask ourselves if we are guilty of it too, albeit in a way that doesn't make the national headlines.

On 28th November we mark Advent Sunday when we begin our spiritual preparations for the coming of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. How might we play our part in helping the world, or at least our part of it, to become a more peaceful place?

Finally, on Thursday 14th November we gathered at Abdon Church to remember Barrie Wilson. After a varied career Barrie and his wife Betty came to live in Abdon in the late 1970s, where Barrie quickly became part of the local community, inter alia serving for many years as Churchwarden at Abdon. Many will remember his slide shows, primarily of life in the Corvedale (he became a Fellow of the Royal Photographic Society). He and Betty, who died last year, worked well as a team in all that they did. A gentle, quiet man with a sparkle in his eye and a lively sense of fun, he will be much missed both in Abdon and further afield.

Our re-dedication and thanksgiving service last month was blessed by fine weather and a large congregation to welcome the Bishop of Hereford the Right Reverend Richard Jackson as we celebrated the restoration of the organ and the church's interior.



Corvedale Book Group



Why I'm no longer talking to white people about race by Reni Eddo-Lodge.



The Book Group is gradually re-forming, and we enjoyed our second face-to-face meeting at Diddlebury Village Hall on Thursday 14 October. October in the UK is Black History Month, a time set to remember important people and events in the history of the African diaspora. (Diaspora = the voluntary and involuntary movement or spread of any people from their original homeland.)

The book was a relevant and thought-provoking read.

Reni Eddo-Lodge is a journalist who wrote this book to encourage her readers to consider how it feels to be 'a person of colour', someone who is non-white, on a daily basis. She described how centuries of not having a voice, of constantly self-censoring what one says, where one goes, how one behaves, has been and is difficult in a world which is predicated on the simple dichotomy of white is good, black is bad. The words we use, often unthinkingly, have power to hurt or diminish others. Living in a society where the norms have been set for centuries by ruling white males, there is an unacknowledged power imbalance which does not provide equal opportunities to many of the population: people who live in poverty, women, older people, people living with disabilities, people labelled as being of 'lower class' or people describing themselves as LGBTQIA, people from other religions, other cultures.

The topic of disenfranchisement is complex and complicated. Reni asks us to consider '*who do we see in positions of power, exerting authority, are they like us?*' The answer to that question is often, if not always, no. She defines Racism as being in a position to negatively affect someone else's life chances by the decisions you take, the words you use, the way you behave. The ONS population survey 2018 found 86% of the UK population was white and 13.8% was from a minority ethnic background, 3.3% being black.

Having read '*Marriage Material*' last month, about a Sikh family trying to make a living in a corner shop in Wolverhampton, we had reflected on how hard it had been for them as individuals and as a family to gain access to housing, an income, education, medical care, police support and justice.

Reni investigates for herself the history of what it has meant to try to live in Britain if you are a person whose skin colour is not white. The history of the slave trade where one group of the population used another as '*human livestock*' and profited from this directly or indirectly has shaped the UK in which we live today and our economy. The slave trade started in 1562 and continued until 1833

when an Act of Parliament abolished slavery in the British Empire. That Act, and those which followed, including the 2010 Equality Act, have not yet enabled people who are seen to be different due to their skin colour to have equal access and outcomes to the opportunities and benefits gained by the white male ruling class.

How can we work towards a society which is more representative of the population? 8% of MPs are from BAME backgrounds (Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic); 5.8% of the Members of the House of Lords are from BAME backgrounds, 14% of local councillors are from BAME backgrounds (www.diversityuk.org). There are 195 female MPs out of 650 members of Parliament. 223 women to 565 men in the House of Lords (www.parliament.uk).

The book is worth reading and thinking about. Our discussion was wide ranging as we tried to understand the implications of the layers of social and political injustice faced by many people in the UK today. We questioned our own unconscious racism and how the structural prejudice in society which has been very evident for all disadvantaged groups during the pandemic, might be changed.

Our next read is *Milkman* by Anna Burns, which again takes as a theme power in relationships.

Footpath Maintenance Group

We have been very short of supplies this summer, particularly for replacing stiles and steps. However, we did have a small delivery and since July, have managed to replace a stile at Abdon, another 'dog friendly' one, and as this particular site has a very steep slope where the footpath leaves the field, we've created a platform to make access a bit easier. We've also replaced a stile which abuts a bridleway up at Heath. This stile was leaning at an angle of 45 degrees, so had been very tricky to cross, and we replaced a couple of steps on another stile a bit further along the footpath. We've replaced another stile at Tugford; however, this still requires some work to replace the steps and gatepost, and to make this, too, 'dog friendly'.

Under the guidance of the SC Footpath Officer for the Corvedale, and with the help of a couple of Shrewsbury volunteers, we've replaced the (extremely rotten and

overgrown) 24' footbridge at Thonglands, cleared some of the overgrown footpath and repaired and/or cleared other stiles on that route. So, the footpath between Little Thonglands on Rowe Lane, and the next lane across, which is the lane between Tugford and Holdgate, can now be walked. It comes out on the lane between Castlemoor Farm and Holdgate. It wasn't easy to find this stile, see the 'before' and 'after' photos! and a weary volunteer...

Several difficult footpaths and stiles that need repair or replacement have been reported to me, either directly or via Shropshire Council. We have plenty of work to keep us busy for months to come. I am grateful for this information and very pleased that many are getting out and enjoying the walking in this very beautiful part of Shropshire. All have been noted and we will get around to the repairs (eventually!)

Westhope Wilding Project Launches

Members of the public in South Shropshire attended the launch of a reserve and wilding project at Westhope Village Hall on 21st October.

Interested members of the public who attended the meeting had the opportunity to find out more about the reserve and the flora and fauna it aims to protect. Founding members of the group were on hand to explain about sensitive plants and wildlife and how the reserve will establish a 'forever home' for species under threat.

Westhope is home to a vast array of flora and fauna and many of the people that live here and work the land are passionate about preserving it for future generations to enjoy.

So, 'Wild About Westhope' was born! Under the custodianship of Anne Dyer, owner of Westhope Estate, the new reserve will convert areas once used for commercial shooting into wildlife-friendly habitat.

During the course of the next few months, the group will establish various activities and recruit volunteers to help with wilding projects - from woodland planting and meadow preservation initiatives to species identification.

Longer term, a wild walk will be developed that will take in some of the lesser and better-known beauty spots in and around Westhope.

Those who attended the public meeting were able to walk to parts of the reserve and view some of the areas in the immediate vicinity of the village hall to see some of the early planting.

Munslow Parish Community Speed Watch (CSW)

Final Report: It is with regret that, for the time being, there will no longer be any monthly articles reporting the progress of the Munslow Parish Speed Watch Team.

Our West Mercia Police Liaison Officer, Mark Booth, informed the CSW team that we will be standing down until further notice. Road safety data collected by the West Mercia Police Road Safety Team via temporary fixed speed cameras, police bike cameras, physical police speed checks along the B4368 and the Speed Watch Team's work in Munslow, confirm that the volume and speed of traffic travelling through Munslow (the only stretch of the B4368 that we were allowed by the police to monitor) has greatly increased since we started to operate in 2019. Consequently, West Mercia Police Road Safety Team has deemed it too dangerous for the team to continue collecting traffic speed data in Munslow. However, as all members of the team are police trained, then should circumstances change, we stand ready to be called upon again if needed.

New Speed Enforcement Signs: New rectangular yellow signs have been erected at both entrances to Munslow village. They show an image of a camera with the words 'Community Concern' above it and 'Speed Enforcement' below. These signs enable the police to prosecute drivers and riders exceeding the 30mph speed limit which they fully intend to do. West Mercia Police Road Safety Team also confirm that they intend to maintain regular patrols with speed cameras and will be more vigorous in handing out appropriate penalties to offending drivers and riders.

Thanks: Mark Booth forwarded his grateful thanks to the team of volunteers who have given up their time to help raise speed awareness amongst all users of the B4368. Thanks also go to all the Corvedale residents and road users who have supported what we and West Mercia Police Road Safety Team have been doing to keep our roads safe from potential fatalities.

The Corvedale Kitchen

If you enjoyed Ian Fotheringham's Creamy Leek Croustade at the Diddlebury Village Hall Harvest Supper here is the recipe so you can try it out for yourself.

Serves 6

Base Ingredients

6oz (175g) fresh wholemeal breadcrumbs
2oz (50g) butter or margarine
4oz (100g) cheddar cheese, grated
4oz (100g) mixed nuts, chopped
½ tsp (2.5ml) mixed herbs
1 garlic clove, crushed

Sauce Ingredients

3 medium-sized leeks
4 tomatoes
½ tsp (2.5ml) butter or margarine 2oz (50g)
1oz (25g) wholemeal flour
½ pint (284ml) milk
Salt & pepper to taste
4 tbsp (60ml) fresh wholemeal breadcrumbs

Method

- Put the breadcrumbs into a bowl and rub in the butter (or blend in a food processor) and then add the remaining base ingredients. Press the mixture into an 11" x 7" (28cm x 18cm) tin. Bake in the oven at 220°C (425°F/gas mark 7) for 15 - 20 minutes, until golden brown.
- Meanwhile, slice the leeks and chop the tomatoes. Melt the butter in a saucepan. Sauté the leeks for 5 minutes and then stir in the flour. Add the milk, stirring constantly, bring to the boil and then reduce the heat to a simmer. Add the remaining ingredients, except the breadcrumbs, and simmer for a few minutes to soften the tomatoes. Check the seasoning. Spoon the mixture over the base, sprinkle with breadcrumbs and heat through in the oven at 180°C (350°F/ gas mark 4) for 20 minutes. Serve at once.

Tips: Skin the tomatoes if using fresh ones or use tinned tomatoes for convenience!
You can also use half wholemeal and half white flour in the sauce.


Corvedale Past and Present**I repent!**

In retrospect I thought it was a bit mean to set you all homework last month, and I don't suppose that many people did it anyway! However, if you did it might come in useful this month. But don't worry if you never look at a computer screen: I'll explain how to do this on a good old school map.

If, like me, you feel fascinated by the history of our countryside and the changes that have shaped it over the years and centuries, you may sometimes be drawn up short and ask 'yes, that's all very well, but what can that teach us about today?' The implication is that if it can't teach us anything it's nothing more than a bit of self-indulgence. Increasingly people are worried about the state of the world's living creatures and our climate. Have you noticed how many times it creeps into everyday conversations these days, when it wouldn't have done even 10 or 15 years ago?

There seems more and more to suggest that the past is terrifically important as we decide which road to take in the future. If you happen to follow these things, you are likely to notice increasingly that historical geography or landscape history and cutting-edge ecology are coming closer together as they must urgently do.

If you have an Ordnance Survey map of the Long Mynd and Wenlock Edge with an orange cover (217), and if you can, go to 569 893 - Birchen Coppice. Right is a map image of the same area, just to the south-east of Holdgate in the Corvedale. The dots show a long unbroken hedge-line which is the north-westerly border of a former huge medieval deer park – Earnstrey (Birchen Coppice is the regular rectangular wood centrally north of the line). Earnstrey Deer Park stretched from the dale floor right up to the top of the Brown Clee and was well over a thousand acres. Much of the boundary can still be traced on the ground. Its extraordinary size was known until the 19th century when 'parish tidying' took place, as up to that time it was shown on maps as a detached outlier of Diddlebury. This particular park probably existed from Saxon times but is likely to have come into its real importance after the Norman Conquest. It was part of a vast complex of South Shropshire hunting grounds: forests, which were open areas of village farmland, moorland, and woodland where the king had exclusive rights of hunting. Parks were the preserve of nobles and church hierarchy like bishops and priors. Such places were deer reserves for these individuals.



Kings and nobles seemed to be obsessed with hunting, regarding hunting spaces as a sort of paradise where they could not only disport themselves but escape the everyday, and from which they could distribute the unique largesse of venison to those 'lower' than themselves.

Earnstrey is an interesting case in point because, as well as an enclosed hunting ground, deer fold and farm, it was probably also very important for the production of horses, and in particular the 'destrier', the heavy war horse and the tank of its day. One of the early Earls of Shrewsbury, Robert de Bellême, was a serial importer of such horses from Spain, the most notable source. It was also through the next few hundred years a massive source of wood and timber.

Interesting, you might think, but what is this to do with the situation today? Well, there are parallels with modern times. The years between 1100 and 1300 showed at the very least a threefold increase in the human population of England. Land was increasingly used to grow cereals, while other characteristic landscape such as wood-pasture (much more of this next time), was being whittled away. Industries were also developing and expanding and havens of long memory, like Earnstrey would have been valued as the ancient country became more fractured, enclosed and hard worked.

Some historians view these times as setting the stage for later changes to the countryside, though of course the 19th and 20th centuries and up to the present day have put ever greater pressure on the land. If allowed, I hope to say more in December!

If both elements seem surprising then perhaps we could remember that eagles, which we have forced to live in mountainous areas and on rocky coastlines, perhaps once had a much wider distribution and by preference nested in trees!

Of Tithes and Men

Part Two: Tithe Evasion and Other Matters

Much has been written about tithes over the centuries, most notably by the great legal writer John Selden, who published *A Historie of Tythes* in 1618. Curiously, this seemingly innocent work created a storm of controversy, and got its author into serious trouble with the church authorities. The reason was that after the Dissolution of the Monasteries under Henry VIII, secular landowners who had bought monastic estates became rectors and received the tithes which went with the position. What is more, these tithes were a piece of freehold property which could be leased or sold, so that tithes were collected by people with no connection to the church for their own benefit. Selden, a Common Lawyer, asserted that disputes arising from these arrangements were the business of the secular courts rather than those of the church. The bishops reacted furiously, with only one of their number, the saintly Lancelot Andrews, supporting Selden. The hearing of tithe disputes remained firmly in the hands of the Church Courts.

We know a great deal about tithes in Diddlebury from the 1637 Glebe Terrier, which I mentioned in last month's article. While the other parishes which now comprise the Corvedale Group also have terriers of various dates, they are less informative. It is clear that by 1637 the process of changing from payment in kind to money payment was well under way, though varying between the different townships. Earnstrey Park was the only one still to make all of its

payments in kind, while standard charges were made for the rest of the parish. These included a penny for wood burnt as fuel in each house, four pence for every calf, a penny per cow for milk, and a host of other small charges for such things as wool, apples, pears, geese, pigs and eggs. The tithe charges for hay are the most complicated, with different sums being levied on each holding according to size. Tithes

represented a considerable burden on parishioners, and it is hardly surprising that many attempts were made to avoid and evade payment wherever possible. This led to disputes which had to be resolved by the church courts.

Great numbers of records relating to tithe disputes over the whole diocese survive from 1660 onwards, and are kept in the Herefordshire Archives. A few years ago I transcribed some of those which relate to the Corvedale, but there are many more awaiting processing. Most follow a similar format: the plaintiff alleges that, for example, a certain piece of ground had never been liable for tithe, and produces sworn statements from old inhabitants to back up his claim. The vicar, or a layman who had leased the right to collect the tithes, then produces his witness statements stating the opposite. Annoyingly for the historian, as often happens with judicial records, the judgement is frequently absent.

Rev. William Fosbroke, who was Vicar of Diddlebury from 1676 until his death fifty years later, seems to have been particularly zealous in pursuing tithe avoiders. The case which he brought against William Filcox is in many ways typical, and concerned a piece of land known as the Ox Ryes by the River Corve. Filcox made a number of points in support of his case. He claimed that as he was a 'foreigner' who lived at Harton in Eaton parish, to which he paid tithes, he should not be liable for tithe on the Ox Ryes, which he rented. Furthermore, he claimed that the field was part of the glebe or church land of Diddlebury, and therefore exempt from tithe. This in fact proved to be correct, for it emerged in the course of the dispute (which dragged on for 18 months) that the land in question had been the Rector's glebe held by the Baldwyns of Delbury Hall. Despite other witnesses who swore that the Baldwyns had owned the Ox Ryes since 'beyond the memory of man' it seems that the family had acquired it by giving the Dean and Chapter (the Rector) another piece of land in exchange. This illustrates the complex arguments and issues raised in these cases, of which there are a very great number. It took another 150 years before the government took a hand and tackled the issue on a national scale.

Remembrance: The Royal British Legion's Centenary 1921-2021

Following the upheaval, devastation and traumas of the Great War there arose many emotions not least of which was the need to remember those who had fallen. The cemeteries to the dead which sprang up wherever conflicts had occurred, the countless war memorials throughout the British Empire, the Cenotaph and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier were products of this need. Alongside this there also arose a realisation that those who had endured suffering both during the war and those who were likely to continue to suffer for the rest of their lives also needed caring for. Many noble causes to meet these needs were spawned and today the one which has remained the most prominent is The Royal British Legion (RBL) which this year celebrates its centenary.

More than 6 million men from Britain had served during the First World War, of whom more than 700,000 were killed and some 1.75 million wounded or disabled. Of the latter number more than half were permanently disabled. Widows, orphans, families of the wounded, disabled and unemployed all needed support. Faced with the injustices of a government that had taken a conscious decision to restrict pensions and to not provide adequate training or support for employment, they had to rely on charities. The formation of British Legion also coincided with the depression which brought mass unemployment and great uncertainty. The British Legion was formed in May 1921 in the aftermath of the First World War. Four national organisations of ex-servicemen established after the war came together to give a unified voice to those facing the bleak reality of Britain after that harrowing and deadly conflict.

- The National Association of Discharged Sailors and Soldiers
- The British National Federation of Discharged and Demobilized Sailors and Soldiers
- The Comrades of The Great War
- The Officers' Association

The amalgamation of these diverse bodies can be attributed largely to two men: Field Marshal Earl Haig and Tom Lister of The Federation of Discharged and Demobilized Sailors and Soldiers. Lord Haig served as the President of The Royal British Legion until his death in 1928. A royal charter was granted to the British Legion in 1925.

In its early days, the British Legion was also deeply concerned by the rates of tuberculosis (TB) among returning service personnel. Over 55,000 men returned from the war suffering from the disease, and by 1922 18,000 had died. Dedicated hospitals and communities for TB sufferers and injured veterans were established. During the depression of the two million unemployed, 1 in 3 was an ex-serviceman and soup kitchens and emergency payments were made to keep families out of poverty with 250,000 payments made in 1923 alone.

The funding for this work came from the idea of the poppy based on the poem 'In Flanders Fields' by Col J McCrae. Earl Haig was persuaded to adopt the poppy as the Legion's emblem in the UK. The British Legion, which had been formed in May 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. They sold out immediately and raised over £106,000, a considerable sum then, to help veterans. So, the Poppy Appeal was born with today over 40 million distributed by volunteers over the remembrance period.



Sadly, as we now know the Great War wasn't 'the war to end all wars' and conflicts involving servicemen and women alongside civilians has continued to this day. As well as fresh victims of war the veterans from previous conflicts have aged adding to those who need support.

Although best known for the yearly Poppy Appeal and Remembrance Services, the RBL remains a campaigning organisation that promotes the welfare and interests of current and former members of the British Armed Forces and their dependants. The Legion supports nearly 36,000 War Disablement Pension cases for war veterans and make around 300,000 welfare and friendship visits every year. The RBL's campaigns include calls for more research into things like Gulf War Syndrome, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and compensation for its victims, upgrading of War Pensions and better support for British military personnel resettling into civilian life.



On 15 May, the Legion unveiled a display commemorating 100 years of support of our Armed Forces at the National Memorial Arboretum. The display was made up of 24,840 messages of support from ordinary people. It was a striking and moving display next to the Armed Forces Memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum that recognised the lives and sacrifices made by the Armed Forces community, past and present, thanking them for their support and promising ours in return and confirming that after 100 years the RBL's work carries on.







The Clerk now has access to the online bank statements and the signatories can apply to use internet banking. The Clerk reported that the Council was within budget except for £35 overspend on internal audit and £260.65 on Vehicle Activated Sign but a VAT reclaim for £804.11 will be made in 2022-3.

Payments to Wilkinson Associates (Ecologist) £192, D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £225.41 and the British Heart Foundation Donation £25 were made since the last meeting. The balance in the account as of 5th October 2021 is £10,030.02 but a bank reconciliation was not possible as the latest statement had not been received. The Council is in budget except for being £25 over budget for

donations and £271.40 Speed Activated Sign but VAT of £471.40 will be reclaimed. Payments to H Coonick (Clerk) salary £814.32 and D Lewis £157.50 (Environmental Maintenance) were approved. It was agreed that the Clerk be removed as a signatory on the bank account.

The Clerk reported that the Environment Agency are due to revisit the Laundry Works and will report on the outcome before the next meeting.

The Policing Contract was reviewed. The Council did not have sufficient information to decide upon the outcome of the review and the Clerk was asked to invite PC Knight to the next meeting. DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL**Summary of the draft Minutes of Diddlebury Parish Council's
Meeting held on Wednesday 22nd September 2021 at Westhope Village Hall**

Present: Cllrs D Hedgley (Chair), T O'Boyle, G Neden, S Povall, A Watson, T Pardoe, A Rattu and R Morgan. Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr R Povall.

In Attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Cllr Cecilia Motley and seven members of the public.

Presentation by and Q&A session with Ms R Corner of SWS concerning Broadband signal in hard-to-reach parts of Diddlebury Parish. This 35-minute session is fully reported in the Minutes. Any parishioners with little or no Broadband signal may be eligible for £1,500 Gigabit voucher (£3,500 for businesses) and are urged to contact SWS to express an interest in using their service and to seek a survey.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 28th July 2021 were approved by councillors and signed by the Chairman. Two matters arising were dealt with.

Reports: *The Chairman* reported on issues he has dealt with recently which included assisting with a planning application at Sutton Barn concerning restrictions placed on the permission by SC, resulting in a new layout being agreed. He advised on developments at the Tally Ho in Bouldon. He reported that Mr Ian Kilby, head of planning at SC and Ms Heather Owen, a planning officer, have both left. Mr Tim Rogers is the interim acting head of planning. He has spent time discussing the DVH car park with Cllr Motley and the Gigabit scheme and Broadband generally with Cllr Rattu.

Unitary Cllr Motley reported on the recent steps she has taken to progress the re-surfacing of the DVH car park. She spoke about the Town & Parish Boundaries Review and the Parliamentary Boundaries Review. She had planned on calling a Chairs & Clerks meeting to discuss the former in September, but is still awaiting

details of the proposed Review and too many anomalies need to be clarified before her meeting can usefully be convened. SC's government funded budget for next year remains unknown and in the meantime SC is operating on a large deficit. SC has set up a new initiative to serve residents who live far from the Shirehall and have difficulty in obtaining information, namely Shropshire Local, a mobile information service. An Information Desk has been set up in Ludlow Library and mobile library vans have been repurposed as travelling information services. It is hoped village halls will co-operate and support this initiative by providing facilities for the staff and for parking.

Reports were also received from the Flood Action Group, Westhope and Diddlebury Village Halls and the Louisa Powell Almshouses Trust.

Planning: Two new applications were considered: **21/03813/LBC** - an application for Listed Building Consent for the replacement of all windows and the rear door at Brook Cottage, Peaton. Members voted unanimously to support this application. **21/03278/COU** - an application for change of use from a holiday let to a residential annexe at Little Sutton Farm, Stanton Lacy. Members supported this application with a caveat that a condition be applied that the annexe remains an integral part of the farm and cannot be sold off separately.

Chairman's Action Pursuant to Standing Order 27: As there was no meeting in August, the Chairman convened a Group to consider application **21/03367/FUL** - for the erection of an extension to an agricultural building to form a stock holding area at Sunnyside Farm, Corfton. The group considered the plans and supported the application. They also considered **20/02197/VAR** which related a slight change of position for house

No 3 at the old poultry sheds, Corfton. The variation was considered to be acceptable.

Highways/Environmental Matters: Cllr Povall confirmed the safety mirror for the junction B4368/Bache Mill will be installed shortly by himself and Cllr R Povall. The issue of dog waste bins had provoked a number of responses. SC advise that separate bins are no longer provided, but they have stickers which can be attached to existing waste bins indicating they can be used for dog waste which has been bagged. Members reported on pot holes and blocked drains in the parish which the Clerk will raise with Highways.

Communications & Correspondence: Fifteen items of

correspondence were discussed and dealt with.

Finance: The Finance Report for August/September 2021 was considered by members and cheques totalling £799.48 were approved, after which payment DPC holds £21,660.02 in its account. Cllrs O'Boyle and Watson verified the bank statements/cash book reconciliation. Members voted to move its banking facilities from HSBC to NatWest. Peaton bus shelter had been badly damaged in August by a hit-and-run driver who remains unidentified. Replacement wooden bus shelters are very expensive – in the region of £5,000 plus VAT, delivery and erection. After discussion Cllr Pardoe agreed to examine the shelter and see if he could repair it.

Next meeting: Wednesday 27th October, commencing 7.30pm in Diddlebury Village Hall

ABDON AND HEATH PARISH COUNCIL

Draft Minutes of an open site meeting at Red Barn, followed by Abdon Village Hall Thursday 16th September 2021

Present at Site Meeting: Cllrs R Price (chair), G Trim, M Whalley, C Yarwood. Clerk: W Richards, plus 22 members of the public.

Site Visit: Cllr Trim said he has applied to the Caravan and Motorhome Club for five pitches. The CMC Club will contact the local authority, and any planning application required by Mr Trim will be processed in October once Dianne Humphries has returned to work. Mr Banks of Upper House has also applied for a five-pitch site. The notice was posted on the field gate beside the wooden horse stable, although two members of the public contested this as they walk past regularly and did not see it. None of the other members of the public present had seen it. In answer to questions Cllr Trim said the CMC will restrict the size of vehicles attending his site, and he would supervise this. He has two holiday lets with no issues of noise pollution, and he would insist on no loud music and no music at all after 10:30pm. However public raised concerns that recently there had been noise disturbance from caravans in his field, but he said that had been caused by family members. He would need to supply bins and vans will have their own toilets which could be emptied into his existing septic tank which he showed attendees. The silo was for a BBQ facility. He has spoken to Shropshire Council today to determine whether planning permission is required.

The rest of the meeting was held at Abdon Village Hall.

Open Session: In answer to questions from members of the public Cllr Trim said he is talking to Shropshire Council as to whether he needs planning permission for shepherd's huts and a silo for BBQs. Cllr Trim's website says he intends to provide shepherd's huts and a silo for BBQs. He does not wish to increase the height of the existing silo. Excavations are for site levelling. He is in contact with Shropshire Council as to whether he has to submit a planning application.

Although the council cannot discuss an application before it is submitted residents could raise matters of concern in the Open Session. The planning issue to be discussed at this meeting was the silo.

Two complaints have been made to Shropshire Council and Cllr Trim has discussed this with Shropshire Council. No shepherd's huts had been erected.

In answer to a question about extra traffic Cllr Trim said the size of motorhomes would be limited.

The Clerk read out emails from Tristan Williams (planning) and Shropshire Councillor Cecilia Motley, who reminded residents that representations about the proposal had to be received by the CMC no later than 19 September.

Mr Banks will not be proceeding with his proposed CMC site.

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: Cllr Trim is land owner applying for Caravan and Motorhome Club site.

Apologies: Cllr P Hartley and Cllr Motley.

Proposal for certified Caravan & Motorhome Club site at Red Barn: It was agreed that the Parish Council should report the concerns of residents to the Caravan and Motorhome Club and the concerns of residents. The Clerk will inform Shropshire Council of the silo being a potential planning breach.

Minutes from meeting held on 12th August 2021 were read by the Chair, unanimously agreed as correct, and signed by Chair.

Finance: Balance £5,330.75 at 3rd September 2021. Total in £135, out £40.

Highways: The Clerk had emailed Mr A Keyland at Shropshire Council re Bouldon Bank but had not received a response. The Clerk will action again, and the public were invited to report any issues. There are concerns that the drain opposite Upper House may be blocked on land of Manor House Farm, but Mr Wedgwood insists that pipe runs well across his land and enters the brook. There are issues below Upper House where water runs on the road surface resulting in the dangerous edge to the road which could damage vehicles, and constant holes and bad surface to the road. He proposed installing a pipe there with drains so that water is piped into the brook below. This should mean that road surface repairs will last. This was agreed and the Clerk will action it. The drain opposite Abdon Church gets blocked: Mr Banks will forward details of his Shropshire Council contact to the Clerk.

Correspondence: The Clerk read Cllr Motley's report.

AOB: None.

Items for consideration for the next meeting (for dissemination of information only): Drainage from Upper House. Update on developments at Red Barn.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 7:15pm.
