WILDFLOWER MEADOW ON THE RECREATION GROUND

On 19th May the Wildflower Meadow on the Recreation Ground was mistakenly cut by KPC's contractors. The Parish Council deeply regret this and is working with its contractors to put in place measures to ensure something like this never happens again. The cutting of the Wildflower Meadow at this time of year is not included in the contract of works and KPC's contractor has admitted liability. Councillors share in residents' sadness and anger regarding this incident and will work hard to ensure the Wildflower Meadow recovers in time.

Residents are asked not to scatter any seeds, including wildflower seeds, on the area in an attempt to assist in regrowth, as the area is a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC) and this would cause further harm and complication to the conservation project.

REMINDER - KEEP HEDGES TRIMMED

Residents are reminded during this lovely warm weather (at the time of writing!) that this is also prime growing weather. Please ensure that hedges are kept tidy and under control, especially if they are by a road or path. Thank you.

HAMPSHIRE AND THE ISLE OF WIGHT AIR AMBULANCE CLOTHES RECYCLING

With an increase in wardrobe clear-outs taking place over the past 12 months, the HIOWAA has launched a much-needed clothes recycling collection service in the region. Supporters can bag up their textiles and clothes, contact them, and it will be collected, free of charge! All for a great cause. For every tonne that is collected, the charity is guaranteed to receive at least £210 – this will go a long way to help keep the service fully operational.

RETURN TO FACE-TO-FACE PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

Councillors were delighted to return to face-to-face meetings in the Club last month, it was a great feeling to welcome residents back to the Club after such a long time. At the time of writing the lifting of the restrictions on 21st June is under review therefore we may have to continue with the distancing and the Covid Rules for holding meetings for July too. Please continue to let us know if you would like to attend a council meeting to ensure we stay within the permitted numbers in the Village Club.

VOLUNTEERS FOR TREE WARDENS

The village currently has two volunteer tree wardens, and KPC would welcome more support for this scheme. The Tree Wardens scheme was set up by the Tree Council in association with local councils who appoint voluntary tree wardens to gather information, give advice, and encourage practical projects relating to trees in the community. No experience is necessary - just enthusiasm for trees and the local environment. Tree Warden tasks include being eyes and ears for the Parish Council on anything tree related, checking applications for work on trees with Tree Protection Orders (TPOs) or in conservation areas, doing surveys of trees and hedges, tree planting schemes and really anything else that the Tree Warden feels might be useful to the parish. Periodically in the past Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council has run one day courses to bring people up to speed on subjects such as trees and the law but clearly that has not been possible recently. Sometimes other courses are notified to the Parish Council. If you would be interested in becoming a Tree Warden, please contact the Parish Council.



LOCAL LEGEND - WILLIAM HOLDING 1836 – 1921

We have a lot to thank William Holding for ... the one who's name is immortalised on the plaque above the entrance to the Village Club, and whose family were so involved with and gave so much to the village.





The Holding family were large, stretching back many generations, and principle landowners in and around the village. 'Our' William was actually the fourth in six generations of William Holdings, such was the name handed down!

Originally born in London, he studied Law and Modern History at St John's College, Oxford, becoming a barrister. He married Mary Alice Fielden in London in 1869. They initially raised a family in Kensington, with a weekend residence at Hyde End House, Brimpton. Around 1874 they moved to Beenham Court, Headley (now Cheam School), later moving again to Burghclere Manor. By 1891 he was retired, and around 1898-9 came to Elm Grove, Kingsclere, after the death of his aunt Miss Frances Holding, the last of the nine children of William and Mary.

In 1920 William resigned from the Board of Guardians for the Kingsclere Union workhouse, having served for 45 years (42 of those as chairman). He had also been Chairman of the local Petty Sessions from 1878, and a County Councillor from 1888 to 1921.

Mary Alice, died on 16th June 1918, age 73, and William passed away on 20th July 1921 aged 84. They are both laid to rest outside the West door of St Mary's church. Unfortunately, his gravestone was removed in the 1966 clearing, however he will be remembered by a temporary memorial in its place for a year, and forever more by the plaque above the Village Club.

I'd left in good time and was driving down the A339 to have my first Covid vaccine. I was a bit nervous, a bit wary of the injection. I'd put the appointment into my calendar and was following directions on my phone when suddenly my phone battery died. I panicked. I couldn't miss this jab and yet I could remember nothing of where my appointment was apart from that it was a hotel in Lychpit. Immediately, I began to think how stupid I'd been not to make sure it was charged or a least to have read the name of the hotel properly.

I drove on guessing where I was meant to be going, stopping first in Popley to ask someone if they knew where the vaccination centre was. But I then ended driving halfway to Hook and coming back in the other side of Old Basing before coming to the hotel in Lychpit which was deserted. I went to the door and seeing no-one inside, thought the worst, until thankfully someone came to the door and directed me to a building across the road, where I received my jab.

Getting lost on the way going to something as important as a vaccine is not much fun at all. It's a waste of time and an inconvenience to others. Thankfully the Covid centre were very gracious.

My aimless wanderings to the East of Basingstoke remind me of the people of Israel in the wilderness. Having come out of Egypt, a land where they were slaves, and miraculously been saved from the pursuing army by the parting of the Red Sea, they find themselves about to enter a wonderful land, a place prepared from them by God. He said to them, "I send an angel before you to guard you on the way and to bring you to the place that I have prepared". And yet they do not enter it because they are afraid and end up instead wandering around the desert for 40 years, most never getting the chance to see that place of promise.

At a time when we are still struggling with all we've experienced over the last 18 months, it's a great comfort to know and to trust that the Lord Jesus is looking out for us each day, loves us with an everlasting love, and to trust in Him to bring us through.

Wildflower Meadow Dell Recreation Ground – shock cut in late May!

At the time of writing quite a lot of us are reeling at the baldness of the inopportunely cut meadow, a contractor error apparently. Thanks to the exceptionally cold spring all is not lost because most of the chalk downland specialities had sensibly kept their heads down. The lovely display of cowslips has gone and of course none will set seed this year but at least there are rosettes of leaves left so hopefully they will survive and flower next year. The allimportant hay rattle is only just showing so that should be fine (it is an annual so such a late cut could have been much more serious in warmer conditions). Hay rattle is a semi-parasite that feeds off the roots of some of the undesirable grasses (such as Couch grass and False Oat-grass) and weakens them so that the rich mixture of special chalk downland plants can thrive. Let's hope we can still look forward to a summer display of orchids, scabious, knapweeds (and the quite rare broomrape that is associated with them), quaking grass, ladies bedstraw and so many more.

July in The Garden

As July slips around, we are rewarded with so many lovely plants in flower. Roses will be putting on a wonderful show. Sometimes if I have a bunch of bought roses I particularly like, I will try and get one to strike. The only



drawback is if the stem does root the blooms that are produced by the cutting will not have a scent, but usually the flower is good, because they are bred purely for the flower. This is just a fun thing to do, but you need patience, because very often you may only get one stem to take out of ten. Cut off the faded flower and a small amount from the bottom of the stem, pop into soil, keep well watered and wait. Now is also the time to take clematis cuttings.

The annuals that were planted last month will be starting to flower. Delphiniums should be at their best just now, and if cut back right to ground level after flowering they should flower again in the autumn.

Be aware that in July we often get storms and possibly hail, so make sure tall plants are well supported, it can be devastating to see beautiful flowerbeds and borders flattened by a storm. Unfortunately when we get the rain at this time of year it doesn't always penetrate. There is always a discussion on how to water in dry weather. I remember speaking to a farmer who grew strawberries, he didn't water the plants, he maintained that the plant roots would go deeper to find moisture, maybe he was right, but sometimes watering is necessary.

There are plenty of pests around this month. Blackfly and greenfly can be a problem, but by planting something that attracts predators it can keep them under control.

The growth on lawns should be slowing down now; try to leave the grass a little longer when the weather is hot and dry. If the grass begins to look brown, no need to be alarmed, it will recover very quickly once the wetter weather returns.

Time to feed the late flowering perennials and dry any spring bulbs that you have lifted from the ground; store until required for planting in the autumn. After the rain that came in May there seems to be a huge amount of weeds. Continue to hoe to keep them under control.

Some vegetables will be ready to harvest. Shallots need lifting and left to dry out in the sun or somewhere dry if the weather is wet. Early potatoes should be lifted. If the first plant dug up has produced very small potatoes, leave the other plants to develop further.

When the onion leaves turn yellow and flop, it's time to lift and dry them. Plant out brassicas, and sow Spring cabbage.

Raspberry canes needed to be tidied up, cutting out the old canes, and strawberries need the old leaves removed to prevent disease. After three years old plants will probably need to be replaced as the yield tends to decline.

Continue deadheading in the flowerbeds and borders and you will be rewarded with a longer flowering season. Many plants that have finished flowering can be cut back to the ground, they may not flower again this year, but they will produce a cushion of lovely fresh leaves. For all the Sweetpea growers I hope we have a better year, they really don't like it when the weather is dry.

Nature Notes

The sight of several terns wheeling and dipping gave us hope that they were back and breeding again this year and, as we moved farther around the lake, it became evident that the raft was once again in use: two nests so good news. Well, only two cheers as sharing the raft a black headed gull had also nested and where there is one, others frequently follow, fingers crossed for a happy outcome.

A delightful scene was of a swan family with very young cygnets which were being fed by their mother. She was immersing her neck to pluck weed from the lake bottom and carefully selecting choice pieces to feed to her offspring which were bobbing around her. The cob meanwhile was on guard nearby and watching us warily. Good to report cuckoos calling persistently.

A nearby willow has produced a veritable snowstorm of seed-bearing fluff over five to six days. Borne on the wind, tiny seeds drift about and may land on any surface such as walls, fences, paths etc. even cobwebs: So prodigious is the output that wastage is inevitable. To germinate moist soil is essential and then in no time pinhead-sized leaves emerge but hazards are numerous, drying out, competition, cold and disturbance otherwise we would be overwhelmed with willow. Some of our pots have tiny forests growing on their surfaces.

While heading to a car park in Newbury recently a familiar bird call (but in the wrong place surely?) caused a glance skywards to see a pair of peregrine falcons wheeling above the tall buildings. A nestbox has been installed and chicks are being raised. There are plenty of pigeons as a handy food source.
