Last month MPC advertised a casual vacancy on the council. Having co-opted Moulsford resident Martin Eagle, we are pleased that vacancy is now filled. Martin became very involved with the village objections to the planning applications for sports lighting lodged by Cranford House last year; we were grateful for his considered input at council meetings and look forward to working with him for the remaining time of our office.

In September, the editorship of Moulsford News passed into new hands; our thanks to Katja Abel for taking on this important role for Moulsford. Many of us know Katja from the Events Committee and happily she is continuing with that too – rather like her predecessor Bernie Sachse who was also very generous with her time and efforts on behalf of our village since 2009 when she moved here.

However, since upping sticks late 2020 to live just down the road in Goring, Bernie has gently loosened the reins on her attachment to Moulsford, culminating in her resignation from Moulsford Parish Council in mid-Sept 2021. We're sorry to see her move on, her commitment and enthusiasm are second to none and we thank her for her many roles in the village, whilst ruefully congratulating Goring on their luck at gaining such a super-volunteer!

The Parish Clerk has notified SODC of a casual vacancy on MPC and placed a notice on our village notice board, Website and social media. Should there be no requirement for an election we will consider co-option again, but we remain quorate in the meantime.

Parking and access in Moulsford is a perennial issue; we're a rural village without reasonable public transport. OCC Highways have recently visited Ferry Lane to advise how best to relieve the issues affecting residents there. We will be following their advice to take a measured approach so we don't force car parking onto other areas of the village creating even more problems.

The Pavilion Management Committee have had quite a time over the last 18 months keeping on top of changing rules in the fight against the pandemic, being thoroughly supportive of our Events Committee who naturally wanted to get back into action as soon as possible. It's not been easy!

At its last meeting, the parish council were delighted to hear that Pavilion bookings are bouncing back with a full and varied schedule. Since coming out of lockdown the pavilion has hosted parties and celebrations, wakes, yoga classes, sports TV screenings, practitioner courses, auditions/rehearsals and sales to name but a few.

Advance bookings are set to be even more varied with, as well as more of the above, a filming day, first aid courses, craft spinning classes, tea dances, boxing classes (as we welcome back Nixercise) and a meeting of the river users' group.

As usual, dates for our MPC meetings are at the back of this newsletter, we hope you will join us from time to time!

The result of the efforts of Goring/South Stoke based Railway Action Group, North Wessex Downs and Chilterns AONBs, Mend the Gap is responsible for identifying suitable projects for enhancement along the railway route using £3.75m of funding which has been secured from Network Rail.

Recreation Ground Update

The Recreation Ground Working Group has had a quiet summer while the professionals at ASA Landscape Architects finish compiling all the feedback into a revised plan for us to share with the wider village. In the meantime, regular visitors to the Rec may have noticed that unfortunately some more of the playground equipment has had to be removed, and sadly our toddler swings were put out of action by some thoughtless individuals. But, looking forwards, repairs to the swings will soon be made and they'll be back in action better than ever. Also, the first key steps in carrying out some of the first ideas hatched by the Recreation Ground teams are being eagerly anticipated - and everyone can join in.

Every year, the Woodland Trust make millions of free trees available to community and school groups in planting packs. From the start of the new planting season in October until the end of next year, the Trust is linking its free trees scheme to the 'Plant a tree for the Jubilee' campaign to celebrate Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. Our application for 105 trees was approved, and we'll be taking delivery of our 105 native saplings in early November, including hawthorn, dogwood, wild cherry, silver birch, rowan, hazel, a mix selected for year round colour, with blossom, berries and autumn displays. A planting plan is currently being devised, but it's anticipated that most of the saplings will help thicken up the existing wooded boundaries, filling in patchy stretches and generally adding some additional cover and enhancing biodiversity.

We will be holding our planting event on Saturday 13th November from mid-morning onwards - please do grab a spade and come along to help dig in our new Recreation Ground residents. The Events Committee are helping to make refreshments available to participating tree-mendous volunteers at the Pavilion, so anyone coming along to help will be well looked after. Full details will be posted in the next Moulsford News, but please save the date if you can and we'll look forwards to seeing as many folks as possible over a tree and then maybe a cup of tea!

From the Vicar Andrew Petit

My Dear Friends,

September has seen us in many ways trying to resume our 'normal lives' living with Coronavirus. Mercifully the number of cases per day seems to have levelled off, despite fears last month of an exponential increase, as have the numbers being admitted each day into hospital. This is all just as well as we begin to move into the cooler weather of Autumn, which normally brings with it an increase in flu and other winter illnesses. The death rate from Coronavirus is also beginning to level off and last week there were no Covid-related deaths at all in South Oxfordshire.

Maybe one thing that the Covid epidemic has done is make us far more aware of death — whether it is the daily national figures being given out on the news, or personal experience of someone who has died prematurely because of Covid. Most of us had previously been living in a society and culture where the subject of death was often hidden away in hospitals and nursing homes and only very rarely brought up in private conversation, let alone public debate.

Even today, discussion has been mainly about death rates which is both necessary and understandable, but nevertheless as we are reminded not only of the fact of death but its unpredictability, one very important dimension is to consider how well we are prepared spiritually for our own deaths. Many of us just bury our heads in the sand about the inevitable fact that one day we too will die. Many will have no religious framework and have not begun to think about "what will happen to me when I die?". Some will say they believe that death means complete extinction, although I am always struck by how very few actually believe that when a loved one dies. Many will have some kind of Christian faith, but for some, rather than bringing spiritual peace, their latent faith brings out anxiety or fear that "they might not be good enough to go to heaven".

In actual fact the heart of Jesus' ministry and message is that none of us are good enough to go to heaven. However, the very reason Jesus came was to conquer death on our behalf and enable any of us to enjoy eternal life by putting our trust in him, in his grace and in his death for us on the cross. As Jesus told his friends (and as I remind people at the beginning of every funeral I take), "I am the resurrection and the life.

Whoever believes in me, even though they die, will live. Whoever lives and believes in me will never [truly] die."

This is wonderful news but not in itself a reason for believing. I myself believe because, having considered the life and teaching of Jesus Christ, I am convinced that he is indeed all that he claimed to be – including "the resurrection and the life". I believe this, not only on an intellectual level, but on a deeply personal and experiential level having over the last 50 years seen the impact and blessing that such a belief makes not only in my own life, but in the lives of my fellow believers. However, if entrusting our lives to Christ provides even just a possibility that it will enable us to face death with confidence and hope, then surely that makes it worth at least considering and investigating further. If that is something you would like to do, then why come along to church one Sunday, or speak to a friend who you know is a committed Christian – or even get in touch with your Vicar! I'd love to have a conversation with you or point you to ways of finding out more.

Life at Greenlands Farm

Harvest is now all gathered in, with yields being much better than last year. The wheats have unfortunately not made Bread grade so will be used for biscuit manufacture.

The Rye, first attempt for us this year. Not an easy crop to harvest as very bulky straw, which was a bit green in the bottom, making the harvest of it rather slow. There is quite a market for this crop for animal feed, especially pigs. Spring Barely for malting, reasonable yield and being moved as I write this to the maltsters.

Lastly peas for next springs seed. A much better yield than last year. However, a very slow and tedious harvest. It could only be harvested in one direction. Otherwise would keep blocking up the combine header. Now in the store. We were lucky with the weather with only needing to use the drier for some of the wheat.

Now the fields are bare the wild life can be seen in its abundance. It is quite evident that the hares have had a productive year. Our English partridges have also bred well and are now big enough to avoid the pursuance of the Red Kites and Buzzards.

Please can I urge walkers with dogs, to keep them under control. I witnessed a black retriever chasing a Roe deer along the back of Underhill yesterday. Autumn planting will begin shortly, in our case Wheat and Rye again. We have also planted 100acres of over winter greening cover.

The building lets have just about returned to pre Covid, being now full again. Fortunately we have had very little turn over.

Keep safe, enjoy the countryside.

Gardening diary

Hi guys!

A few weeks ago, we went camping in Germany.

When we were there, we went on a lovely walk around a lake where we saw lots of cool things. We saw a grass snake, curled up on a log but surprisingly, it didn't slither away as soon as it saw us, which is what these shy creatures normally do. This could be because it had just laid her eggs, and wanted to protect them or keep them warm. We also saw a stinkhorn mushroom and we all dared to smell it. It smelt like drains - It was disgusting!

Back in England... We have just finished eating our lunch which included peppers and tomatoes out of the garden. Half an hour ago, I planted some dwarf daffodils and dwarf irises. Then I made some cuttings of rosemary, lavender and sage for next year. To make cuttings, you cut off a sprig of whatever you're taking a cutting of. Take it and cut off the bottom bit until just underneath a node and take off some of the bottom leaves. Take off the newest growth from the top. Put it into some soil mixed with grit, about five or six cuttings will fit in a medium size pot.

Railway Work Advance Notice to Residents

Dear Neighbours,

Upgrading the railway tracks between Gatehampton to Moulsford Viaduct.

We're working with train operating companies to bring you faster, safer and more reliable rail services. As part of this work, we'll soon be working near you to replace sections of the railway stones along the tracks.

We need to do this essential work overnight, while trains aren't running. The work will take place on **midweek and weekend nights** between **29 September 2021** and **5 February 2022** from **10pm** until **6am** the following morning each night. We've listed our planned shifts below, but please note that this may be subject to change.

We'll be working across more than four miles of the railway, so we won't be outside your home the whole time, but we wanted to let you know when you might see us working nearby.

To keep our colleagues safe, vehicles moving around near our teams will need to sound horns at times and when repositioning.


