Geoff's talk

Thank you to the many villagers who braved the cold on Friday 22nd November and joined us in the village hall for a wonderful and enthralling talk on the woodcock. This native crepuscular bird, with it's ambiguous camouflage also has a migratory population which demonstrate incredible endurance in their flight paths travelling as far as Mongolia.

We also learnt from Geoff that the woodcock has a unique bone and muscle arrangement which allows it to independently open and close the top third of its upper beak whilst it is in the ground to enable it to grasp prey such as worms, as well as many other interesting facts.

If you're lucky, you may be able to spot these beautiful and elusive birds in our local area, particularly at Snelsmore Common. Your best chance would be at dusk in the springtime as the males perform 'roding' displays to attract females.

Sadly, this extraordinary bird is on the red list of the 'UK Birds of Conservation Concern'. The Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust do great work in helping to protect these amazing creatures.

A big thanks goes to those who had a drink at the bar, you have all helped raise £77 for the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trust!



MALTHOUSE WELL

Well we've had a few weeks where the weather has been kind to us, and we were doing well in November until Storm Bert arrived with a bang and dumped around 70mm rain late in the month to give a rainfall monthly total of around 100mm. This is yet another month this year where we have had an above average amount of rain and the Malthouse well level rose by about 2.5 metres over the month to currently stand about 11 metres below ground level.

Looking back to the flood year 2014, the graph below shows that compared to then we are now ahead of the curve. We really need the next few months to be kind to us weather-wise to prevent a repeat of 2014.

For those of a historical bent, we have records for the Malthouse well from 1964 onwards, and these showing an interesting trend. For 26 years from 1964 until 1990 the data show that the Malthouse well level was never higher than 6.0 metres below ground level and so ground water flooding was never an issue back then. However, the situation since 1990 presents quite a different picture. In the 35 years since 1990, the Malthouse well level has peaked above 6.0 metres on 11 Occasions. This gives rise to the big question: is this a demonstration of climate change or just natural weather variation? Either way the results are the same for us in West Ilsley.

COUNTRY NOTES

In Whiteshute Row a fleeting glimpse of something white, weaving fast between the trees, a large bird, a raptor, a goshawk. In the distance a pale patch on the dark track, greyish white feathers strewn on dead dark leaves, the remains of a freshly plucked wood pigeon. Small gobbets of pink flesh stuck to a grey banded tail feather, fluffy white down adheres to a dead dock stem, a prayer flag for the pigeon's soul. Are these the remnants of the goshawk's meal?

At the junction of Whiteshute Row with Furze Lane stands the truncated trunk of an old oak, three feet in diameter, thirteen feet tall, the height of two coffins. Hollowed out by fungi, open to the air on its southern side, it's interior walls are lined with rectangular, reticulated blocks of dead and decaying heartwood, they resemble a nineteenth century cork life jacket that has been turned outside in. Where the low

midwinter sun enters, the blocks glow a rufous red. I can just squeeze inside, peer out, enjoy an owl's eye view down the track that runs south to Wickslet. Encased in this vertical tube of decaying oak I recall the stories told to me by the chatelaine of Finca el Moro in the Sierra de Aracena, tales of the peasants who fled from the village of Fuenteheridos to the sanctuary of the woods to hide, in the hollow trunks of chestnut trees, from Franco's soldiers during the Spanish Civil war, fed at night by their wives when the coast was clear. This seemingly dead oak still clings to life, from the left-hand pillar of the entrance sprouts a single branch, six inches in diameter, reaching skywards in a bid for life giving light. THE ILSLEYS PRIMARY SCHOOL

At the end of last term, the children had a Halloween disco, which included: squash, hotdogs and some chocolate cake. Every year, the children do a pumpkin carving contest and a costume contest, the winners got some sweets for their amazing efforts. Before everybody left, they all got given a Halloween bag with some Haribo and a pencil inside.

At the start of November, all classes had a Diwali Dance workshop. The children had a professional theatre performer come to the school and teach them the story of Rama and Sita. After they learnt the story, the children created a dance about the tale of Rama and Sita. They all danced in sync to create the best performance they could.

On Wednesday 6th November, Arctic Class went on a school trip to Milestones. As their new topic is toys, they looked at lots of different toys throughout the years starting from the 1900s to the 1990s. The children visited a teddy museum; they all really enjoyed the trip and want to go back again.

On Tuesday 5th November, Atlantic Class also went on a school trip! They went to Charterhouse in London. When they arrived, the children walked for 3-4 minutes to arrive at their destination. children made a bag full of different herbs/ posies to resemble how the plague doctors used to fill their masks with herbs and posies. They all loved the trip and wish they could go back again!

Two weeks ago, the Year 6s sold poppies to raise money for the Poppy Appeal as part of Remembrance Day. At the end of the week, the children had an assembly to remember those that have sacrificed their lives for our safety. When the assembly came to an end, the classes had a 2 minute silence. In our classes, everyone made their own poppies, then the children decorated them and created a wreath.

Last week, the children had an action packed week for Anti-Bullying Week! On Monday, the Year 6s prepared an assembly for the younger classes. This year, the theme was 'Choose Respect' and the Year 6s demonstrated what being unkind is and what bullying is. On Tuesday, the children had Odd Socks Day and they decorated their own pair of odd socks. On Wednesday afternoon, the Year 6s went into different classrooms and played different games involving bullying and banter. It was then Thursday and the school purchased an online theatre production for all the classes to watch. Finally, on Friday, it was Children in Need Day and everyone came in non-school uniform with Pudsey themed headbands and badges.

On Tuesday 12th November, the children had a Parent Welcome and their parents came to look at their children's books to see their progress from the start of the school half term to now.

On Thursday 14th November, some of our Year 3s and Year 4s took part in a cross country festival. They went to Woolhampton and ran a relay race, they said it was really fun and want to do it again next year.

On Monday, some of our Year 5s went to do a Maths Challenge. They went after lunch and arrived back at school around 3:20. When the children got back they told us that they had an amazing time learning some new maths tricks and skills, focusing on multiplication! We wish you all a lovely Christmas, and take some time to relax and enjoy yourself!
