





HERE IS OUR ANNUAL SAFETY REMINDER FOR FIREWORKS ... don't become a statistic



- Fireworks must not be sold to any person under the age of 18.
- Buy fireworks marked BS 7114 or CE
- Keep fireworks in a closed metal box.
- Follow the instructions on each firework.
- Light them at arms length using a taper.
- · Stand well back.
- Never go back to a lit firework.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby if you are setting off fireworks in your garden.
- · Never throw fireworks.
- Keep pets indoors.
- Alcohol and fireworks do not mix and may lead to injury.

The law says you must not set off or throw **fireworks** (including sparklers) in the street or other public places. You must not set off **fireworks** between 11pm and 7am, except for: Bonfire Night, when the cut off is midnight. New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year, when the cut off is 1am.

- **27/20-21 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT** Cllr Gilly Brown advised that a complaint had been received regarding the last Parish Council meeting and was being dealt with in the appropriate channels. Item 29/20-21 was brought forward to enable Mr Johnathon Cole to outline the proposal of OL/TH/20/0335 and answer any questions.
- 29/20-21 PLANNING All applications and decisions available online via the TDC website.

Coles Yard - OL/TH/20/0335 - 116 Monkton Street Mr Cole explained the reason for his attendance was to request the Parish Council to consider asking for the planning application to be called in, to recommend approval. Remembrance Sunday 2020 The year of the 75th Anniversary of VJ Day – 15th August 1945

VJ Day is a somewhat hazy memory for me, aged nearly thirteen and living then in Faversham. For some reason I had not been permitted to join any public celebrations, though I do not think they were on the same scale as those mounted for VE day; I can only remember the smouldering embers of one or two celebratory bonfires – (a strangely significant memory when one thinks about it!). Like many of my age, interest in the actual end of the war was overshadowed by the infinitely more impressive news of the explosion of two atomic bombs! Too young to fully appreciate the politics, yet old enough to sense that something very significant had occurred.

75 years on, as we commemorate the defeat of Japan in August, 1945, we remember that it was through the dropping of those bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki that victory was swiftly and finally achieved. President Truman's fateful decision undoubtedly saved many lives on both sides. The planned invasion of the Japanese mainland would have undoubtedly proved very costly in terms of both American and Japanese lives, whilst the suffering of Allied prisoners of war would have been even further extended.

However, the Allied victory still came at a very high cost. Nearly a quarter of a million men, women and children were killed in the most horrific obliteration of those two Japanese cities, with the after effects lasting for decades. Furthermore, the shadow of this appalling means of human destruction was to hang over the whole world for the foreseeable future. The nuclear threat has advanced and receded over the post war years, but it has never gone away, and probably never will.

Remembrance of the appalling consequences of nuclear war has surely helped to keep the nations from major conflict in the subsequent years, and it is our continuing Remembrance today which is vital if we would preserve the peace of tomorrow.

O God, who would fold both heaven and earth in a single peace; Let the design of your great love lighten upon the waste of our wraths and sorrows; and give peace among nations, peace to your church, peace in our dwellings and peace in our hearts; through your Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.

ungi – or mushrooms and toadstools as they are more commonly called – are just beginning to thrive this autumn; a dry summer prevented any early local 'fruiting' but the recent rains have sped things along. Given that there are c.15,000 different species of fungi in the UK, they are often overlooked in the natural world compared to our flowering plants (about 3,000 species), birds (just over 600) and mammals (a meagre 107!). The sheer diversity of fungi is matched by both their importance in the environment and the stranger than fiction variety of life histories that exists in this group,

This odd group of organisms evolved about 1 billion years ago, so pre-date virtually all the living things that surround us now. Globally, well over 120,000 types have been described but it is estimated that there may be anything from 1 to 5 million species awaiting identification! Whilst we think of the familiar field mushrooms that complement a tasty breakfast, and are aware that we should beware poisonous 'toadstools', the great majority of fungi are inconspicuous, hidden away within the soil, in decaying wood and plant matter, as well as forming those blue-green moulds on old bread and many cheeses. The range of mushrooms that we see on the ground are the tip of an often very large iceberg, representing the tiny 'fruit' of a huge underground living thing; the largest organism on earth is thought to be a fungus.

Underground, fungi form vast networks of very thin filaments called mycelia which spread across vast distances. In the Malheur National Forest, Oregon a single filament from a kind of honey fungus has been found to cover nearly 9 square kilometres, about one-and-a-half times the size of Thanet!

It is reasonable to say that we owe our very existence to fungi. Ecologically, fungi are critical to life on earth; all animal life depends – directly or indirectly - on plant life that, in turn, relies on fungi. Over 95% of plants depend on fungi; the roots of these plants need the presence of a type of fungus called mycorrhizae for the root system to work properly – no fungi, no plants, no animals! Other fungi contribute to human life in extraordinary ways, from the yeast that is used in bread-making to fungi that are used in producing the statins that help us to control our cholesterol levels. On the minus side, there are many fungal infections of food crops that have serious impacts on yields, with crop losses of up to 50% actually factored in by some producers.

From the sought-after white truffles that are used by chefs and can fetch over £2,000 per pound, to the infection that causes Athlete's Foot, the world of fungi is full of weird and wonderful tales!
