#### THORNEY SPOTTINGS (14) - Janet Collins

I wouldn't say it has been a glorious summer, but there has been some beautiful weather to be out in the garden or around the village. The house martins would appear to agree, because they were still here on 14th September. However, there have not been many unusual sightings during the last couple of months. In fact, regular visitors such as tree creepers and migrant visitors such as spotted flycatchers have not appeared this year. Has anybody seen them around the village?

Spiders, particularly house spiders, seem to have thrived, despite an inconsistent supply of houseflies. I suppose they are not bothered what kind of flying insect gets caught in their webs. At times, parts of the ceilings and windows in our house have looked like a set for the Miss Havisham scenes in a production of Dickens' Great Expectations. Of course, it could simply be that I have been spending too much time outdoors and letting the housework drift a little!

More than anything else, it has been unusual insects of one sort or another that have seemed prolific. One of the most interesting spottings was what I think was a garden chafer larva. The larva is white, with an orangey coloured head. Beetle larvae are easily told apart from caterpillars because they only have six legs at the top of the body. Caterpillars have six legs at the top, but then an extra set of eight legs towards the back of the body. A garden chafer larva lives in the ground for about two years, feeding on grass roots of one sort or another. Then it turns into a pupa, later into the adult and finally emerges as a beetle the following May. Hence the common name of May bug. I am hoping there are not many of these larvae in the garden, because they can devastate lawns in no time.

Another interesting spotting lately has been the number of toads on the roads in Thorney and in the garden. Interesting because several of them have been very young, not far removed from the tadpole stage. This seems to be becoming a regular occurrence for toads and frogs, that usually only breed in early spring. I wonder if it is connected with changes in weather patterns, or simply an ongoing development in those particular amphibians. At any rate, it probably means the slugs in the vegetable garden are being dealt with even more efficiently. Seems like a win win situation.

Finally, the best spotting was a kingfisher along the drain at the pumping station near the Doddington Road junction on September 18th. Fortunately, the iridescent blue-green back of this small bird made it quite visible as it flew swiftly along the drain from the pumping station bridge towards the A57 and then flew back again a few minutes later. On its rapid flight path it meandered from left to right, which meant it was definitely within the Thorney parish boundary for some of the time!

#### THE ALLOTMENTEERS – Carol Dallamore

A busy summer has resulted in an abundance of fruit and vegetables that have made their way to the table. For winter eating, these have also been turned into a variety of chutneys, relishes and jams; some fruits bottled and vegetables frozen.

Here is a favourite side dish of Marion's using some home grown produce:

¼ pt low fat yoghurt	1 tbsp brown sugar
2 tbsp pure orange juice	¼ tsp finely grated orange rind
1 red and 1 green chilli deseeded ar	nd finely sliced

12 oz grated carrot 3 ozs sultanas

Bunch of coriander and bunch of parsley finely chopped.

Mix in a bowl the yoghurt, sugar, rind and juice; fold in rest of the ingredients and leave to chill in the fridge for an hour or two or overnight. Serve with BBQ'd meat/fish, cold meats, also good with vegetarian dishes.

Courgettes allowed to grow on become marrows! These can be stuffed with a variety of mixes to provide a substantial meal. Try using Sunday dinner leftovers chopped and added to lightly fried sliced onion, finely chopped chilli, tbsp chopped fresh herbs, bread crumbs to thicken if needed, season to taste. Slice marrow in half, lengthwise and scoop out the seeds, sprinkle with salt, leave for 30 mins then rinse well. Fill the halves with the mixture, place them in a baking dish, lightly cover each with buttered parchment, bake 190c for an hour or until marrow is tender. Eat on its own or can be supplemented to provide a meal for 4 or 6!

Have a go growing your own next year, no plot too small and many plants happily grow alongside garden flowers!


