News from Ulcombe Village School

Some time ago it seems, I sat down to write this article thinking it would only take me a few minutes this month. Then I listed all the things that needed to go in it and I realized how much there is to report for June and to look forward to in July. I only hope I can get it all down before the newsletter goes to print!

What You Might Not Know...

As well as the things which are seen by all, plenty goes on behind the scenes that is sometimes known about, but rarely observed. At the start of June those of us that use the office computers were delighted with the hardware which replaced our previous, often frustratingly slow, IT equipment.

Also behind the scenes we continue to try to work with parents whose children have poor levels of attendance. Mrs Hargrave, since returning from maternity leave in May, has taken this on as Senior Teacher and has already started meeting with parents to find ways forward and ensure children make the best progress that they can. We look forward to witnessing improved achievement for children.

Mrs Wills is both sad and excited to have been given the opportunity to move on from Ulcombe and work in a large Infant school from September. We know that it will be difficult to replace her, as her enthusiasm and energy are infectious to both staff and children. I know they will all have plenty to say at the Leavers' Service on the last day of term, with plenty of funny and embarrassing moments to recall I am sure. We have almost completed the appointment process for her replacement, with final checks to be undertaken before we can announce who is joining our team for the new school year.

One of the pieces of work Mrs Wills has just completed with the children in Year 1 and some of Year 2 is the Phonics Screening Check that you may have heard about in the media. This requires children to use their knowledge of sounds to read unknown or unreal words. An awful lot of time is spent on such tests, and we will be sharing outcomes with parents at our forthcoming Parent-Teacher Consultation evening.

What You Might Have Seen...

The children have been involved in a wide variety of activities during June. Our Film Club has continued with several children enjoying the opportunity to watch films including Peter Pan, Prince Caspian and Meet the Robinsons as we use the club to broaden their exposure to different story ideas and characters.

On Monday 10th June Tawny Owls class made their way to Mote Cricket Club in Maidstone for the annual Asda Kwik Cricket Festival. The children had an enjoyable afternoon, taking part against three larger primary schools in the group stage. On the following morning Year 6 attended the annual Safety In Action competition at Maidstone Barracks. The children did very well, scoring full marks in some of the scenarios, which were set up to encourage them to think about their personal safety. In the same week the whole school walked through the village taking part in a World Record attempt to have the largest ever Walking Bus. We will have to wait some time for the attempt to be verified, but we hope we will hear good news about it

later this year. Lastly for that particular week we had a meeting for parents and children about next year's Residential Adventure. We will be heading off to the Isle of Wight again in 2014 and we will be joined by our friends from Platts Heath and John Mayne CE Primary Schools.

It was wonderful to be joined by so many family and friends for our final Ulcombe School Friends' Dinner for this school year. As it was just after Fathers' Day, Owlets told us why they love their dads, Barn Owls told us why their dads are super-heroes and Tawny Owls presented sketches to show what their dads are like when things are not going smoothly. At the end of that week Kent Fire And Rescue Service came in and spoke to each of the classes about fire safety, particularly in the home.

Our Sports Day and Summer Fayre took place on Saturday 22nd June. Whilst the sunshine made only brief appearances, many parents, family and friends from the village came along to support this event. We do not know how successful it was in terms of fundraising, but we know everyone who came had an enjoyable time. At the time of writing we are getting ready to go on a whole school trip to Groombridge Place before the end of the month. We hope the weather will be kind as we explore the formal gardens, meet the animals and birds of prey and find our way around the Enchanted Forest. The month will end, in terms of school activities, with the KCC/Hornby Model Railway Competition District Judging. The winning school will represent Maidstone at the County Final.

What You Might Yet See...

July will continue to see us keeping busy. We will have visits to the school from our New Entrants. Our guitar teacher will be leading an assembly so that all of the children who have been learning with him can show off their talents. Our Summer Production takes place in the second half of July, when we hope to stage The Wizard of Oz! All of our friends and neighbours are welcome to join us – please contact the School Office if you would like tickets. FUS will be hosting our end of year disco, before the Leavers' Barbecue on the last Friday of term. Everyone connected with the school, including family, friends and neighbours, is welcome to the Leavers' Service on Tuesday 23rd July at 9.15am, at All Saints Parish Church, when we will be celebrating the achievements and contributions to our school of all of the children in Year 6, and, of course, Mrs Wills.

Grafty Geek - About Virtual Drives

The arrival of Windows 8 has introduced people to the world of virtual drives. Virtual Drives have been around for some time, but not many people have been using them. Some people have been using them, but did not know how they worked or that they were known as Virtual Drives eq: Flicker for photos.

What is a Virtual Drive?

Computer storage area (Drive) that you can access from any device (Mobile Phone, Tablet, Computer), anywhere you can get access to the internet using the Cloud.

Why use a Virtual Drive?

1. You can store any documents, pictures or videos in the Drive just as you can on your computer and they can be shared with other people if desired.

2. Documents stored in virtual drives will not be lost if your computer fails.

3. If you travel a lot and just want to get access to your documents using a Virtual Drives means that you do not need to carry heavy laptops or use USB sticks.

Where do you get a Virtual Drive?

There are many different providers of Virtual Drives eq: Google, SkyDrive, BT Cloud and Dropbox. All offer different storage capacity and all have their own

plusses and minuses. The best thing to do is consider why you need the drive, what you use already for email and, if you want to share your documents, what the other people are using, as they will need to sign-up for the same provider. You will also need to consider the type and size of documents you want to store to make sure you get enough storage space for free. All providers do offer more space at a cost, but there is a lot of space available for free.

How do you use a Virtual Drive?

Once you have signed up for a Virtual Drive, which is accessible only by you logging in with a username and password, you can simply upload your documents. The documents will then be available to you via the internet from whatever device you are using and from wherever you are accessing the internet. You can then share your documents

with others if you wish, when you select share you will be asked to add the email address of who you wish to share with, they will be sent an email with a link to the document you have shared. Remember they will also need to sign-up for the same provider. Only documents you share will be seen by other people.

Note: There are other benefits of using Virtual Drives, for example: you can set up your computer to have a quick link to the Drive to make things quicker, but you need to be careful about making sure you keep a track of the latest version of the document as it doesn't always save in the way you think, and in some cases, you may have to re-share the document once it has been changed. More on this next month!

What Does WKPS Do and How Does It Work?

WKPS is concerned with the welfare of the Weald as a whole. One of the activities which contributes to this goal is the detailed examination of planning applications that are made to the 3 Local Planning Authorities (LPAs) that cover the area, Ashford, Maidstone and Tunbridge Wells borough councils.

Every village/town in WKPS area is the immediate responsibility of a Planning Scrutineer. Typically he/she has responsibility for about 3 of them, normally though not invariably excluding his own. Each week they study the latest applications for their respective towns and villages. A minority appear to warrant WKPS response: Objection (3%), Comment (5%), or Support (2%). They draft the response for the Planning Secretary, who edits to be stylistically consistent for LPAs and emails it to the relevant LPA. If there is a difference of view, the Planning Secretary will contact the relevant scrutineer; if they still disagree, the matter is referred to the chairman of the Planning Committee for a final decision.

The system has worked well. Anyone volunteering to Prospective scrutineers is interviewed promptly; generally, only thoughtful people welcome the job, so the quality is high. Our reputation for comments is pretty solid with all 3 LPAs.

Scrutineers should, and generally do, keep in good touch with WKPS' network of village contacts, and they are not blind to Parish Council comments. For the past year or two, the very low numbers of substantive planning applications have resulted in low numbers of Scrutineer responses.

Generally, the Planning Committee discusses individual cases (getting consistency of approach and keeping up to date), rather than WKPS response to wider issues and to LPA and central government initiatives and consultations. The latter are primarily the remit of the Policy Committee. Although WKPS responses to such initiatives and consultations comes from Policy Committee, though they are usually drafted by the Planning Committee's 2 representatives on it. Responses to central government are rarely heeded (though we certainly wrote long and hard on NPPF), but those to the 3 LPAs and Kent County Council are much more likely to receive reasonable attention. It is the developing local Plans which cause the bulk of the Policy Committee's work.

Grafty Gourmet

This is a fantastic yet simple recipe for barbequed chicken. Served with fresh pineapple and bacon salsa it is refreshing with a hint of smokiness from the bacon.

BBQ Chicken with Pineapple & Bacon Salsa: Serves 4

4 skinless chicken breasts Salt and pepper, to taste 2 cups of your favourite barbecue sauce Olive oil, for brushing the BBQ grill For the Pineapple Bacon Salsa: 2 cups diced fresh pineapple 4 strips cooked smoked bacon, chopped 1/2 cup chopped Coriander 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion 1 tablespoon finely chopped jalapeno pepper 1 clove garlic, minced Juice of 1 large lime Salt and pepper, to taste

1. Season the chicken breasts with salt and pepper. Place the chicken breasts in a large freezer bag. Add the barbecue sauce and mix until breasts are covered. Let the chicken marinate in the refrigerator for 1 hour.

2. Make the Pineapple Bacon Salsa in a medium sized bowl. Combine pineapple, bacon, coriander, red onion, jalapeno, garlic, and lime juice. Stir until well combined. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.

3. When the chicken has marinated, brush the grill on the BBQ at medium-high heat with olive oil. Remove the chicken breasts from the bag and place on the grill. Discard the leftover barbecue sauce and the bag.

4. Barbeque the chicken until cooked through, about 5 minutes per side. Remove from grill and serve warm with the Pineapple Bacon Salsa

Broadband Update

The Malherbe Monthly understands that soon an agreement with Internet Service provider VFast will result in infrastructure being installed in Boughton Malherbe which will facilitate fast internet connections. This has already happened in Ulcombe with reports of very high speeds attained (in excess of 20mb per sec). More will be announced as soon as possible. Contrary to some reports the infrastructure will be installed regardless of any committed uptake from residents.

The July Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Gemini for the whole of July. There is more about the **Sun** at the end of this article.

New Moon occurs on Monday 8th July. **Full Moon** is on Monday 22nd July when in the constellation of Sagittarius.

Mercury rises with the **Sun** in the constellation of Gemini, so again we will not be able to see it in the twilight.

Venus also rises in the northeast just after sunrise in Cancer, and sets in the late evening with the **Moon**, and towards the end of the month moves into Leo. So again will not be visible this month.

Mars & Jupiter both rise in the northeast just after sunrise in Gemini, so again this month will not be visible.

Saturn is rising in the southeast in the late afternoon, near the constellations of Virgo, and is low in the southern sky before setting in the early hours in the west. Through a telescope you should be able to see the famous rings together with many of its moons.

The famous **Perseid Meteor Shower** returns at the end of this month. The meteors appear to radiate from the constellation of Perseus, which is rising in the north-east in the evening, and is high in the east at dawn. The meteors are expected to peak next month. I will give you more information in my next article.

I have recently read that NASA has launched a new telescope to solve a particular sun heat mystery. NASA's Interface Region Imaging Spectrograph, known as "IRIS", is a high resolution telescope, which will be placed in orbit 660 kilometres above the Earth. It is hoped to carry out a more detailed study of the **Sun**'s chromosphere, a region between the **Sun**'s surface and the corona, the plasma layer that envelopes it. The aim is to help explain why the temperature of the corona at 1 million Kelvin is so much hotter that the surface at 6000 Kelvin.

It seems that anyone of us can be living our lives quite smoothly one day, then suddenly we can be plunged into crisis. There must be times when all of us are fearful of what might be happening.

How many of us are scared of the dark? Probably few of us, as adults, are afraid in the sense we once were, as children. But there is still something about darkness that makes us associate it with the sinister, the evil, and the unknown. Only last week I heard a visiting preacher say how he was fearful of walking through Maidstone alone, in the dark! He felt it intimidating.

It is not surprising then, that if there is one thing we associate with God, and one symbol used for him more than any other, it is light. 'The Lord is my light and my salvation', says Psalm 27, 'of whom shall I be afraid? And yet, while this is true, as far as we are concerned, it is not the complete picture. There are times when life seems bleak, grim and forbidding, when even God seems far away and we might cry out in despair. What do we understand of moments like these? Where is God we might be asking. Has the God of light no place in these situations? Must we face them alone? Certainly not if the words of the gospels concerning the death of Christ are to be believed. In the gospels we read of how darkness descended on the land as Jesus hung on the cross. It seemed, even to Jesus who called out, 'My God, why have you forsaken me?', as though God wasn't present ... but, the reality, of course, was different.

It was here that God was supremely and astonishingly at work, offering himself for the life of the world. Though darkness seemed to have overtaken the world, the reality was that the light of God's love was shining brighter than ever, and nothing would be able to overcome it. There are times when, for us all, Christian and any other, life seems dark and God seems far away, but I encourage you to never feel that God has abandoned you, because it is sometimes in those darkest moments that he carries you most of all. Maybe this prayer will help:

God of light, be with me in my darkness, until night passes and your light breaks through. In the name of Jesus I pray. Amen.

'If I say, 'Surely darkness will come upon me, and daylight become as night', even the darkness is not dark to you, the night is as bright as day, for darkness is as light to you.' Psalm 139: 11-12
