**From the Editor:** This month marks 25 years of Halam News! The late Miss Ida Glazebrook kindly loaned me the first ever edition which was compiled and edited by Steven Brown in July 1979. I believe she kept every edition of Halam News since its conception, comprising a wonderful archive of village events and concerns over the last 25 years. Miss Glazebrook will be sadly missed.

The first ever edition included an article from John Ferguson, headmaster of Halam School, who outlined activities such as a weekend expedition to Hadrian's Wall, participation in a children's choir and an exhibition of children's work in Southwell Minster, a performance of Dick Whittington by the infants, and Sports Day on 7 July. The late Mr Eric Bust wrote an article about the 'new look' District Council, following the elections of 3 May 1979. A number of articles concerning the church were included. At that time Halam had a thriving Mother's Union as well as Halam W.I. which took part in the National Flag Relay and raised £2000 to help provide a child care unit in Botswana. If anyone would like to see or copy the original let me know.

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## Miss Ida Glazebrook



Sadly Miss Ida Glazebrook of The Old Oak, Radley Road died on Tuesday 1 June after a short illness. The funeral service, led by members of Southwell Baptist Church, was held in Halam Church on Wednesday 10 June. Miss Glazebrook was 90 years old. Members of the family have contributed the following tribute:

'Ida was the youngest member of a family of eight children and was born and brought up in Halam. She attended Halam School and helped in the family Market Gardening business. In 1944, as a mature student, she attended the Bible Training Institute in Glasgow for two years and went on to be a teacher, specialising in R.E., English and Natural History. This was followed by teaching posts at Eversfield Preparatory School, Solihull, and Bramcote Preparatory School in Nottinghamshire. Past pupils testify to her caring and inspirational teaching, and several 'Old Boys' remained in touch.

Ida was brought up as a Methodist but in later life she became a member of the Baptist Church and this was both her joy and way of life.

She was a kind and caring daughter, sister, aunt and great-aunt, and a good friend and neighbour to many. Although in many ways a private and independent person, her great motivation was her faith and her love for her church and family - not forgetting her garden and orchard which occupied many hours of both time and energy up until the last few days of her life.'

## Halam School News



**Ofsted Praises Halam School:** The recent Ofsted inspection at Halam School confirmed that standards of teaching have been maintained since the inspectors last visit (6 years ago), that the pastoral care of the children is very good, that there is a clear vision from the school leadership and that governance is strong.

In addition the lead Inspector was asked specifically to review the strategic vision for Halam School, to give an independent assessment of the 'new journey' which the school has embarked on. The 'new journey' being spearheaded by Head Teacher Mrs Kate Brown is one of maintaining and building on the school's high standards whilst developing a curriculum which is more innovative and inclusive, and it was pleasing to see the Inspection team thought that this was indeed the right approach for a school such as Halam.

Well done to the staff, the children, and the wider school community on such a good report!

**New 'Buddy Bench':** Halam School has received £500 from the will of former teacher Miss Ruby Hucknall who died recently. This money was combined with the proceeds from the children's stall at last year's Christmas Fair and has been used to purchase a 'buddy bench'. This has recently been placed in the school grounds and provides some useful extra outdoor seating for the children in a shaded area.

**New Investment:** The LEA recently confirmed that they have allocated up to £100,000 towards the cost of creating a proper school hall for Halam School. This is something that the school community and others have been campaigning for in the last 6 years, and is a big vote of confidence in the school. It is hoped that the building work can be completed in this financial year, subject to planning and LEA workload considerations.

## Parish Council Meeting 10 June 2004

**Present:** G. Herbert, S. Bust, N. Armstrong (arrived later), A. Fraser, A. Paris. Apologies: I. Sharman.

**Matters Arising:** 1) **Village Hall Questionnaire:** The Chairman reported that District Council would be unable to support the proposed project in the light of the number objections raised through the questionnaire. It was resolved that there was no point in the Parish Council pursuing this matter further. It was agreed to request this information from the District Council in writing. The existing village hall should be brought up to standard re disabled access requirements. The Clerk to report back next month regarding this and any other pressing maintenance needed.

2) **Parish Plan:** The RCC are currently preparing a draft flyer regarding the issues raised by the parish questionnaire. This will be circulated as soon as it has been seen and agreed by the Parish Council. Following that there will be an open meeting to gather further input from the parish on these main issues.

It was agreed that a letter of thanks should be sent to all those who have volunteered help and assistance through the questionnaire.

3) **Financial Risk Assessment:** A report from the Clerk was circulated which highlighted some potential risks. It was agreed that all these were covered by the Parish Council's financial procedures adopted last year.

4) **Budget:** The Clerk circulated a report updating the Council's financial performance against budget for the year to date. It was agreed that the figures were broadly in line with budget.

### Open Meeting:

1) The reoccurrence of youths gathering on Holme Lane with resulting nuisance and litter was highlighted.

2) It was reported that Highways had been seen measuring up the road for red tarmac by the 30mph signs at the entrance of the village on Radley Road. The need and suitability of such 'urbanisation' was questioned.

3) The issue of lack of vision when emerging from School Lane was raised again. It was stated that this was an ongoing problem.

### Planning:

It was reported that the application for the extension at Holbeck Cottage, Radley Road was going before the District Council planning committee. It was agreed to request a site meeting and that Di Parish would represent the Parish Council at the committee meeting.

### Finance:

It was agreed to pay the village hall cleaners and the Parish Council's annual insurance premium.

## Maintenance of the Churchyard



Halam is a delightful village in which to live. At the centre of the village is the church with its surrounding churchyard, and it is hoped that the churchyard will become a place where village people can walk or sit and enjoy the peace and quiet which is often missing in our busy everyday lives.

For almost 15 years my wife and I kept Jacob Sheep there for 3-4 months each year, and it was an amusing sight to see Glenys striding off to the churchyard with the matriarch of the flock in a head-collar, leading a procession of some 10 ewes and their lambs. Foot and Mouth put an end to this, mostly because of the excessive paperwork associated with flock movements.

Edward Gathercole kept the front of the churchyard and much of the new burial ground in great order for many years, but this was an enormous task. When Ed reluctantly relinquished this role a new strategy for churchyard maintenance had to be worked out. The churchyard is still open for burials, and no part is exempt from this, so a strategy was developed, one first put into effect in Bolton Percy in Yorkshire. Parts of the churchyard were designated 'natural' – these areas would be left unattended to allow natural flora and fauna to flourish. A mown path would allow visitors to view the wild grasses and flowers. Other areas would be mown regularly, and finally, those areas difficult to trim or mow would be treated with glyphosphate and then planted with weed-suppressing plants of different types to deter the spread of weeds such as couch grass and nettles.

Rebecca at the Waggon & Horses generously supplied food and drink for working parties, and the churchyard returned to some degree of order. Subsequently I have started a mowing and planting programme and its effects can now be seen. We have been approached by the National Garden Scheme which would like to include Halam Churchyard to their list of open gardens in 2006.

In the recent village questionnaire 24 people stated that they have regularly helped in the churchyard, and a further 24 offered their services. A regular individual commitment would be of great help, and those who volunteered should contact me so that a small regular task can be allotted either on a weekly or fortnightly basis. The task need only take 30 minutes but with many volunteers doing a regular stint the churchyard could become a source of community pride.

## Nature Notes



The more observant amongst us will have noticed the aerial displays of Swallows, Swifts and House Martins over our village. The first Swallow arrived in Halam around the 13<sup>th</sup> April (first arrival in Notts recorded on 17<sup>th</sup> March) probably from the Natal region of South Africa although increasing numbers are now wintering in Southern Spain. House Martins arrived soon after and the first Swift was seen on the 17<sup>th</sup> May (early April in Notts). Swifts generally arrive later than Swallows and leave earlier, some of them in July. It is hard to believe that Swifts rarely land. A young bird born here in Halam may well migrate to its wintering grounds in Africa, then return the next year and never set foot on branch, building or ground until they nest. That's nearly a year. They do everything on the wing, eat, copulate and even sleep.

## Nature Notes

Some of you may well have noticed the increasing occurrences of Common Buzzards this year. 2-3 have been seen regularly since early March, suggesting they are breeding. They are most often seen soaring over the land south of Radley Road towards the Oxton Road, and to a lesser extent over the wooded areas adjacent to School Lane. These birds used to be found mainly in the west of Britain but have been making steady eastward progress in the last 20-30 years, possibly as a result of stricter legislation which brought in harsher punishments for the persecution of birds of prey. - Ed Gathercole

**Present:** All councillors present; Apologies to Di Parrish who was missed off last month's attendance list.

**Matters Arising:** 1) Village Hall:- agreed to investigate further the costs of bringing hall up to standard re disabled access requirements & carry out essential maintenance; Chairman and Clerk to discuss with Martin Hubbard and report next month. Once a costed schedule of works has been formulated grant/funding options will be explored.

2) Parish Plan: Findings Summary approved for circulation to the Parish. RCC will be asked to destroy all completed questionnaires now that statistics have been gathered.

3) Harvest Supper: To be held on 9<sup>th</sup> October, & used as fund-raising to help pay for village hall improvements.

4) Village Newsletter: Congrats to Karin for excellent 25<sup>th</sup> year anniversary issue of the newsletter. Thanks to all who have contributed to the newsletter's success over past 25 years. **Please note: the newsletter needs funds - £3 per household would be a great help!**

5) Traffic Calming: County Cllr A. Stewart reported that Halam is still high priority for a shared flashing 30mph speed sign. Meanwhile the gating system (red tarmac, larger signs) will be progressed, keeping our 'place in the queue' in case the signs are not forthcoming.

6) Neighbourhood Watch: Following open meeting, the scheme is progressing; co-ordinators are being organised prior to the Ring Master system being re-vitalised.

## Parish Council Meeting August 2004

**Matters Arising:** 1) Village Hall:- agreed to obtain two further tenders for the work in addition to that from Martin Hubbard. The yoga classes no longer wish to use the hall. 2) A letter from the District Council planning department was read out re the previous proposal for a new village hall. It was made clear that such a project would require a consensus of parishioners. 3) The clerk confirmed there are no restrictions in the deeds of the hall regarding private alcohol licences. 4) Parish Plan: The Findings Summary has now been circulated. Further information re the church will be sent out with the newsletter. Parish plan committee and Parish Council to liaise re open meetings in September. 5) Harvest Supper (9 Oct): this will have a traditional format and be fund raising. An expense budget of £350 was agreed. 6) Neighbourhood Watch: Contact information gathering forms are being circulated in order to set up the coordinator/ringmaster scheme. 7) Hedges: the one at the bottom of Halam Hill has been cut. Further work will be done at the appropriate season.

**Chairmanship:** subject held over to next meeting.

**Safety Liaison Meeting:** Community Speed Watch – information to be included in newsletter. Crime figures for area, - the official statistics, show a significant fall.

**Flooding:** Problems on Gray Lane and at Halam House were reported. The general opinion was that these had been caused by the freak rains and that they are being attended to by Severn Trent.

**Open Meeting:** Matters raised: 1) Traffic calming – need for red tarmac on minor road entrances to Halam questioned. C.C. Stewart said parishioners will be consulted before any work is undertaken.

2) Councillor Stewart commented on a letter he had received regarding the new hall at Halam school.

**Correspondence:** 1) Letter re extension of Halam School was read out and it was resolved to put the matter on next month's agenda and invite the Chairman of the Governors to the next parish council meeting. 2) Letter re closure of Back Lane (23 – 27 August)- the clerk will check any work will be co-ordinated by the utility companies.

**Planning:-** It was reported that the revised application for the extension at Holbeck Cottage, Radley Road had been PASSED by the District Council planning committee.

Ashcroft House, Gray Lane – new triple garage: Passed unanimously; but a comment to be added questioning need for 5 garages at new property.

**Finance:** End of year accounts and accompanying Internal Auditors report were discussed in detail. The accounts were passed unanimously.

It was agreed to pay:- village hall cleaners; wheelie bin charges; annual subscription Neighbourhood Watch; District Council's bill for Halam Parish Council Election.

**Next meeting:** Thursday 9 September 7.30pm.

### Parish Plan

The summary circulated last month omitted the survey findings section concerning Halam church. The Parish Questionnaire results were:-

- most respondents view the church as important as an historic building
- about 75% of the respondents wish to use it for weddings/funerals/baptisms etc., but only 30% of those that completed the questionnaire use it for worship – many of whom will attend only for school and Christmas Crib services.
- about 12% of those who responded would like to take part in churchyard maintenance
- about 16% of respondents would like to see the church used for drama and musical events
- 41 people indicated the desire for a prayer group

The church wardens have accepted that: "on the basis of the questionnaire, the Church is not important to the majority of Halam residents for worship."

"The majority of people are not interested in supporting the Church through worship and faith; therefore, we must try to open up the opportunities for villagers to become more involved through offers of churchyard maintenance, musical events and other similar social activities."

There will be the chance to discuss the church and its role in Halam and to pass on your views to the Parish Plan Committee on this and the other issues raised by the questionnaires at the Open Meetings to be held in September.

### **Nature Notes - Phenology**

Chairman serves was further discussed - resolved to continue as at present (5 for; 2 abstentions). 2) **Village Hall:** Received 3<sup>rd</sup> quote; additional closed Parish Council meeting (20 Oct. 7.30) arranged to discuss further. 3) **Parish Plan:** M. Thompson reported open meetings had gone well. Draft action plan to be circulated at start of November. 4) **Neighbourhood Watch:** Target: to have scheme running by end of November. 5) **Community Speed Watch:** 8-9 have volunteered to man the scheme. ARP to find a lead co-ordinator, then contact P.C. Bill Brown to implement training. 6) **Road Safety:** Dangers for children crossing road at Strickland Farm reported, & possibility of extending pavement(s) discussed. 7) **Building Better Communities:** Agreed Clerk request funding for new village notice board for a footpath map of the parish. 8) **Licensing Act:** agreed to await further cost details before applying for village hall licence. 8) **Harvest Supper:** Chairman thanked all involved in making this a great success, particularly Marina & Julie for their hard work organising. Total amount raised not yet finalised. 9) **Holbeck Cottage:** Ian Sharman requested his support for P.C. decision not to support application and object at Appeal be noted. 10) **Halam Hill Footpath:** Still under consideration at appeal.

**Open Meeting:** Matters raised:- 1) **Halam Hill footpath** - comments from Parish Plan to be forwarded to Planning Inspectorate. 2) **Village Hall car park** is sometimes used by visitors to village, making parking for hall users difficult; Agreed to put up sign stating car park is for hall use and parking is at owner's risk. 3) **Holbeck Cottage** - A parishioner felt some comments made at last month's meeting had not accorded with the views of St. Michael's Close residents. Written response sent to planning had made clear the Parish Council's objections. 4) **County Council buses with no seat belts** taking children to swimming - Cllr Andy Stewart stated this is due to lack of suitable coaches in county. 5) **Drains problem, Radley Road** discussed. 6) **Halam House Farm development** was discussed at length, with numerous objections

**Correspondence:** 1) **Parish Council Conference** - N.A. & A.P. & possibly D.P. to attend. 2) **Holbeck Cottage** - Mrs. Simmons wrote with concerns re comments made at last month's meeting. Chairman made clear that P.C. had objected v. strongly to all applications for Holbeck Cottage.

**Planning:** 1) **Chartwell House** (Goldhill) conservatory at rear: accepted unanimously. 2) **Halam House Farm** - barn conversion (3 dwellings); demolish existing bungalow and farm buildings, erect 5 new dwellings and garages, and change of use (8 dwellings in total); Architect's supporting letter and 10 letters of objection were read. Proposals were discussed in detail. After careful consideration it was resolved to reject the application (6 for with 1 abstention) on following grounds: 1) Insufficient parking for barn conversions, 2) Too many houses, 3) Size and composition of houses should be reduced 4) Boundary wall with Radley Road should be preserved 5) Extra strain on already problematic drains in village to be addressed. 6) Legal agreement preventing any further development should be secured. These comments will be passed on to the District Council's planning department.

**Finance:** It was agreed to pay the audit costs, village hall cleaners, and the bus shelter cleaners.

### Nature Notes

40 bird species are now on what is known as the Red List. These are species of high conservation concern. Some of the birds do occur in Halam but in ever decreasing numbers. Skylark, Song Thrush, Marsh and Willow Tit, Tree Sparrow, Linnet, Yellow Hammer, Bullfinch, Grey Partridge, Spotted Flycatcher and even Starling and House Sparrow can all be seen in our village and are all on this list. Research is going on to find out why they are declining, as the number and distribution of birds is a good indicator of the state of our environment. An easy thing we can do to help is not to be too neat and tidy in our gardens and on our land. Nature does not like neat and tidy. If you have a large enough garden why not create a small wilderness area? Don't spray all of your paddocks, - leave some areas for weeds and insects. Scrubby areas, brambles and unimproved pasture are so important today. Let's help to our bit in the village to reduce the number of species on the Red List.

### Nature Notes: Southwell Trail

Nottinghamshire County Council is proposing to make the Southwell Trail into a Local Nature Reserve. ### Southwell Live at Home Scheme



The Parish Plan questionnaire asked for volunteers to help fellow villagers with tasks such as shopping or just keeping someone company. Ways in which volunteers could be put in touch with people who would like their help are being examined but there are certain legal issues which need to be looked in to first.

As an alternative, I'd like to let people know about the Southwell Live at Home Scheme. It is a volunteer-based scheme which offers support and friendship to older people in the community who may be isolated and unable to get out and about as they used to. Volunteers are matched with an older person whom they visit regularly. There are also coffee mornings which the older people can attend. Volunteers are also needed to help take people to coffee mornings, assist in the office and help with fundraising. As part of security procedures, volunteers are asked to provide references.

If you are elderly and would like to become a member of the scheme, or someone with an hour or two a week to spare to become a visitor, please contact The Live at Home Co-ordinator at Southwell & District Live at Home Scheme, Southwell Methodist Church, Prebend Passage, Westgate, Southwell, Notts. NG25 OJH, or ring 01636 816565. The office is manned on Tuesday & Thursday afternoons. Although the scheme has links with the Methodist Church, its services are available to any older person in need – not just Methodists.

### Recipe For A Very Merry Christmas...

**Dry Martini** (makes 4 glasses): 8fl oz dry gin; 4fl oz dry vermouth; ice cubes; 4 strips lemon rind. Impale an olive on a cocktail stick. Pour gin & vermouth into a jug with a handful of ice and stir gently. Strain into glasses. Twist a strip of lemon rind over each glass to release the oils then drape over the edge of the glass.

**Buck's Fizz** (makes 8 glasses): 8fl oz fresh chilled orange juice; 1 bottle chilled champagne. Pour juice into a large glass jug & add champagne; pour into glasses.

**White Lady** (makes 4 glasses): 4fl oz gin; 2fl oz cointreau; 2fl oz fresh lemon juice; white of an egg (optional); 4 maraschino cherries; 4 orange slices; ice cubes. Put ice & all ingredients in a cocktail shaker, shake, then strain into glasses.

### **Matters Arising from Minutes:**

1) Village Hall: Architect Clive Booth has been appointed to draw up initial plans & costings for discussion at the December P.C. meeting. There may be additional charges over the approved quote to cover the cost of a quantity surveyor. 2) Cllr Stewart: a) The interactive 30mph sign promised for Halam will be shared with at least 10 other parishes. The road 'gating system' is still possible and will be pursued further. b) Cllr Stewart stated that under the new legislation children could be refused a place at the village school as there is an alternative school within 2 miles of Halam. c) Seat-belted coaches are available for school trips, but the school have to pay the difference in cost. Pressure will continue to be applied for all approved coach providers to have seat belts in their vehicles. 3) Neighbourhood Watch: The scheme is progressing and should be in place by the end of November. It was agreed to fund the purchase of files, folders and photocopying for the re-launch of the scheme. 4) Community Speed Watch: ARP is looking for a volunteer to take on the role of Lead Coordinator. **If you are interested in helping to organise this scheme and to act a police liaison please contact Andrew Paris on 815844**

5) Licensing Act: The District Council will be releasing their policies in February. No action until that time. 6) Harvest Supper: This event raised £544.58. GH suggested that some of this should be donated to a chosen charity. It was agreed that as this was not the original purpose the money should be used for the village hall as previously publicised in the village. It was agreed that another Harvest Supper should be held in early October 2005. 7) Drains in Village: The County Council and Severn Trent have been working to improve the situation. **Please report any further problems in writing to the Parish Clerk.** 8) Village Hall Lettings: Bookings will continue as usual and the situation will be revisited at the December meeting. 9) Parish Plan: Parish Council agreed to adopt Draft 3 of the action plan and to have it circulated to the other appropriate organisations.

**Open Meeting:** Items raised: - 1) A public meeting was requested if further plans are submitted for Halam House Farm. It was agreed 3 for, 1 against and 1 abstention that a meeting would be held to give an opportunity for the parish to discuss any future plans that may be put forward for this site. 2) New admission rules at the school will not affect Halam residents but may affect Edingley. 3) It was confirmed that Halam school does pay for buses with seat belts when transporting children to the swimming pool. 4) If a new notice board is purchased (under the Building Better Community scheme) can it be sited in a more prominent position than the present notice boards? 5) Any volunteer help/transporting scheme in the village will need official clearance and appropriate insurance. This needs further

investigation (through NALC).

**Correspondence:** None this month.

**Parish Council and Press Representation:** Further to a recent press article re the proposed Halam House Farm development it was resolved (4 for; 1 abstention) to refer all press enquiries to the Parish Council Press Officer.

**Planning:** 1. Halam House Farm – plans have been withdrawn 2. Beckside Cottage, Gray Lane – application for extension and re-modelling has been rejected by the District Council (Policies DD1 and H24) 3. The Scypen, Radley Road – insert additional window in 3<sup>rd</sup> bedroom: AF declared an interest as an immediate neighbour and took no part in discussions and abstained. Passed 4 for with 1 abstention.

**Finance:** It was agreed to pay the village hall cleaners
