Dear All

The action we take on our main roads is aimed at keeping Kent moving - and keeping people safe across the whole county. This is a well planned and well rehearsed campaign.

We have seven weather stations which, used with our external provider, give us reliable and accurate data and forecasting.

Our primary routes - which do not include the motorways and trunk roads - account for about a third of the country's roads - that's around 1,500 miles.

We also cover secondary routes (700 miles) - and we have a team of around 180 farmers on standby, whom we supply with snow ploughs for their tractors, that will tackle specific rural routes. During the summer KHS reviewed the roads included on the primary and secondary routes and added a number of routes. We welcome input to identify other roads that may be suitable for inclusion on these routes.

Our preparations started in the summer:

- began building up our salt stocks
- assessing how effective we were last winter
- drawing up our winter service plan
- ensuring our salting lorries and equipment are ready so, we are well prepared.

We were out each night last week and a number of times in the previous week. We have started receiving salt stocks to replenish the salt we have already used.

We have plans in place for when the weather changes like this:

- we do precautionary salting, putting the salt down before the road freezes
- if it rains, we wait until the rain stops, so that the salt isn't washed away

We hold 20,000 tonnes of salt - which is enough for at least 20 days continuous salting.

Last year we trialled pre-wet salting, which involves spraying a saline solution on the salt as it is spread out of the lorry. This new system has two main benefits:

- it makes the salt stick to the road and prevents it being blown away
- because of this we use 25% less salt, and therefore there is an environmental benefit

KCC are responsible for the clearance of pavements with the support of Districts/Boroughs, any further offers of support would be greatly valued.

Over the weekend, Kent Highway Services worked continuously day and night in response to the severe weather by deploying a full contingent of staff at all of its depots. All 53 primary routes were salted six times and 48 secondary routes four times between Thursday night and Sunday. In addition 26 crews hand salted key areas such as hills, road junctions and filled salt bins. Ploughs were fitted to the salting lorries on Friday night and ploughing was carried out as necessary. Farmers across the county also ploughed designated rural areas. 6,500 tonnes of salt was used over the weekend. To this, local runs have been undertaken as required. Resources were moved around the county to ensure that more severely affected areas were treated as needed.

I know that you would wish me to thank, on our community's behalf, the staff for the outstanding service they have carried out.

Ulcombe Friendship Club

The Ulcombe Friendship Club meets in Ulcombe Village Hall at 2.30 pm on the last Thursday of the month. Anyone in the benefice would be very warmly welcomed. It is a very friendly club. We have speakers, outings, parties and lunches. Each month, we have a rota of members who provide a delicious tea after the talks. Membership is just £5 a year which pays for the hire of the hall. We also have a £1 raffle which helps to pay for speakers. If you would like to come along and see what we're all about, just turn up. You will be very welcome.

The Club enjoyed a very interesting talk about The Dogs Trust at their meeting on the 26^{th} of November in Ulcombe Village Hall.

The Dogs Trust was established in 1891. It was formerly known as the National Canine Defence League. It is the UK's largest dog welfare charity. The Trust has a non-destruction policy – meaning that no healthy dog is ever destroyed. It has three main functions: education to promote responsible dog ownership; neutering – to prevent unwanted litters and reduce the number of abandoned dogs; and micro-chipping - to increase the number of dogs being re-united with their owners.

The statistics are mind blowing. In 2008 the trust picked up 107,000 dogs and all but 7,000 were saved. Our speakers said that across the UK one dog is destroyed every 80 minutes!. Last year, the Trust neutered about 69,000 dogs, micro-chipped 1,600 at a cost of £9.50 each, vaccinated, and reunited 15% with their families. The Trust deals with 'handovers' when an owner dies, a marriage breaks up, people are made redundant, or an elderly person has to move into a home where dogs are not allowed. The Trust aims, where possible, to find new homes for the dogs and out of every 100 dogs, 86 are re-housed. Care is taken with pre-adoptive visits, and new owners are given a free collar, a lead, food samples, and the promise of advice for life.

Difficult dogs are given behavioural and emotional therapy. Of the very small percentage of dogs not suitable to be re-housed, there is a dogs' sanctuary -a 'dogs home' - where they are looked after for the rest of their lives.

There is a Dogs Trust centre in Canterbury which has 10 staff, and costs \pounds 500,000 per annum to run. The Dogs Trust is a charity and relies entirely on donations, legacies, dog sponsorships, and 'Buddy' foster schemes. It also welcomes knitted jackets for dogs!. Heaths Countryside Corridor Receives Boost for Wildlife

The Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) has awarded a grant of £50,000 to support the Heaths Countryside Corridor's Wondering and Wandering project, it was announced today. This will allow the group to help local people explore the natural heritage in the Charing Heath and Lenham Heath area as well as unearthing the heritage features on the three sites owned and managed by Heaths Countryside Corridor.

The award will fund a series of events that will be open to all including guided walks, wildlife events, archaeological digs, talks and practical conservation activities. The Heaths Countryside Corridor group has purchased three sites on the greensand ridge which runs parallel to the North Downs with the aim of conserving and enhancing the natural heritage of the area for the benefit of all local people and visitors.

Work will start early in 2010 with a launch event to be held at Charing Heath and Lenham Heath Memorial Hall on Sunday 28th February. The three year project will see restoration works taking place on the ice house at Chilston Park as well as the pond at Bull Heath and benches and panels installed to help people enjoy their visit to these sites.

Commenting on the award, Ruth Lovering of Heaths Countryside Corridor said: "This is a fantastic opportunity for the group to really involve people in the work we are doing. We now have the chance to help everybody to become as inspired by the natural beauty of the Heaths Countryside Corridor as we already are."

The Grafty Gourmet

This is a lovely warming dish, ideal for the cold Winter months. You can serve with vegetables or, as I do on a bed of noodles, with a little soured cream poured over the beef.

Paprika Beef

Serves 2 to 3

3/4 lb stewing beef, cut into 3/4-inch cubes
2 teaspoons vegetable oil
1 small onion, thinly sliced
1 garlic clove, crushed
3/4 cup water, (divided)
1/4 cup ketchup
1 teaspoon brown sugar
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon mustard
Dash cayenne pepper
1 tablespoon plain flour

1. In a large saucepan, brown beef in oil on all sides.

2. Add onion and garlic; cook until onion is tender. Add 1/2 cup of water, ketchup, brown sugar, paprika, Worcestershire sauce, salt, mustard and cayenne; mix well. Bring to the boil.

3. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to $1 \frac{3}{4}$ hours or until beef is tender.

4. Combine flour and remaining water until smooth; gradually stir into stew. Bring to the boil, cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Serve over noodles, or with vegetables.

My favourite memorial in St. Nicholas church is to Dr Leonell Sharpe described as a "constant preacher for 40 years upward of the free saving grace of Jesus Christ." Dr Sharpe was chaplain to the Earl of Essex; then to Queen Elizabeth ('by her own choice'); Prince Henry and King James.

He died, aged 71, on 1st January 1630. According to the memorial, "He lived cheerfully and died joyfully." Do read the full description of this great man when you are next in Boughton Church. I wonder what he would tell us about life in Boughton Malherbe in the 16th and 17th centuries? What some share with him is faith in Jesus Christ and we can all enjoy the wonderful view which he saw.

There was probably work for every one in 1630. No doubt Dr Sharpe had many servants. Many begin this year unemployed and looking for purpose and direction in life. In the week before Christmas I learned from two friends about needs in different parts of the world.

Rev Joseph Ayok-Loewenberg started 'Under Tree Schools' in the Sudan a few years ago. Joseph is Sudanese and longed for children in that war-torn country to receive education. It being impossible to establish permanent schools Joseph's idea was that children and their teachers could meet under a tree and then escape, with the blackboard and easel, into the bush when fighting began nearby.

Last April a more permanent school was opened in Malek. Naturally finance is a problem but what concerns the Trustees more is the quality of education and they are looking at ways of improving the curriculum. Joseph is hoping to find volunteer teachers from England to work in Malek for a few months or maybe even a year.

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


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The January Night Sky

The Sun is in the constellation of Sagittarius at the start of January, and moving into Capricornus on the 20^{th} January. The Earth is at perihelion (its closest to the Sun) on 3^{rd} January. Now that we have passed the Winter Solstice we can expect the days to gradually get longer.

New Moon occurs on Friday 15th January, and Full Moon on Saturday 30th January. Due to an optical illusion the Full Moon always appears larger as it is rising. However, this month it will appear even larger as it is near perigee, (its closest to the Earth).

Mercury passes almost directly in front of the Sun on 4th January. But on the 27th it reaches its greatest distance west of the Sun, so there is a chance to glimpse this small planet in the southeast at dawn. Venus is at superior conjunction (almost directly behind the Sun) on 11th January, so it will not be possible to see the brilliant planet this month. Mars rises in the northeast at sunset, and this month is at its closest to the Earth. Mars is moving steadily northwest from the constellations of Leo into Cancer.

It will be very difficult to see Jupiter this month, as the giant planet is low in the south- west at dusk, and disappears below the horizon during the course of the month. Saturn is rising in the east just before midnight, and is high in the southern sky at about 5 am. It will appear almost stationary in the constellation of Virgo.

There is yet another meteor shower this month known as the Quadrantids. They are expected to peak in the evening of Sunday 3rd January, but it will be better to look in the early hours of Sunday or Monday. The meteors appear to radiate from a point between the handle of the Plough and the bright star Vaga to the North.

Some of you may have read that Britain is to set up its own NASA-like agency to take the country into a new space age. The new organisation has not yet been named, but it is expected to be called the British Space Agency, and will represent this country in all dealings with its international partners. We will be following Germany, France and Italy, who all have individual national space agencies backed up by single budgets.

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

The Month's Good Cause - Kenward Trust

Started when Ray and Violet Sinden provided accommodation on their farm for an old man who spent his nights on a bench on the London Embankment, today Kenward Trust offers residential accommodation to more than 100 men and women, with 25 therapy places across Kent and East Sussex. The work is carried out at six primary residential rehabilitation centres, four secondary supported housing projects and two day recovery centres. The trust receives some funding through "Provision of Care" on behalf of local authorities, and some residents contribute themselves. However, there is a significant shortfall, and additionally Kenward Trust elects to support some who are classified as "unsuitable" to obtain funding under the Care in the Community Act. For example, the recently refurbished Kenwood House provided opportunity for resettlement of offenders after completion of prison terms.

Consequently fund-raising to maintain and improve the service provided is constantly required. The trust has asked the Churches of our Diocese, and individuals, to help bring new life from addiction to those who consider themselves to be worthless.

How to Stow Luggage – for four passengers

(Seasonal advice for those travelling to relations, from "Newnes motorists touring guide")

"Where four passengers are carried resort will have to be made to the luggage grid, and care must be taken to prevent this fixture being overloaded. I have always found it best to store all the luggage which is to be carried in this position in a single trunk, which I cover with an old army ground sheet to protect it from rain and dirt. The ground sheet, by the way, should be wrapped round the trunk. Three straps are required to secure the trunk, two being passed from back to front and one from side to side. This precaution is necessary to counteract the lateral motion of the car.

When using the rear luggage grid it is as well to bear in mind that on no account must the rear number plate be at all obstructed, for if the police consider it not visible from every reasonable point of view one stands a fair chance of being fined.

A grid, working on the 'lazy-tongs' principle can be fitted to the offside running board, and one or two suit cases conveniently carried there. Failing that....[here the author explains at length how to construct further support 'from four metal loops such as an iron monger would supply and a pair of rubber door stops']."

There is though a sense in which we all need to build ourselves up, and I am speaking now in terms of our relationship with Christ.
