

Power Cuts

Pet's Corner!

Pets in Focus - The Rabbit!

There has been some debate in the news recently as to whether we are neglecting our pet rabbits! Tales of lonely rabbits kept in too-small hutches with poor diets, no exercise or social contact make sad news, indeed. However, these fascinating and highly inquisitive pets are relatively easy to sook after providing a few simple steps are taken.

Companionship

Rabbits are social animals so if you are unable to provide that companionship yourself, it is best to provide another rabbit as company for your pet. Fernales (does) that are introduced when young will generally get along together, and males (bucks) can be neutered to be kept in pairs together or with females.

Exercise

Combined with a good dlet, a rabbit who has regular access to fresh air and the opportunity to exercise will be far healthier, less prone to obesity (leading to fly strike and feet problems), and be less tikely to exhibit certain behaviour problems. You should provide a large hutch (at least 6' long) and tall enough to allow your rabbit to stand upright. Rabbits dislike extreme weathers so provide shade and a draft-proof shelter at all times. Rabbits are excellent jumpers and diggers so bear this in mind when providing exercise pens.



Digt

To prevent selective feeding (eating the tasty bits and not the nutritious pellets) it is best to feed rabbits a good quality, complete, pelleted food.

This should be fed in small amounts as recommended on the packaging. The bulk of the diet should be fresh, leafy greens and natural forage such as grass and dandelions, with a good quality hay (check for dust and mould - it should smell fresh!) Long grass and hay provide excellent abrasive grinding material to maintain healthy teeth (these grow continuously throughout the rabbit's life!) as well as helping the gut to function effectively! Carrots and apples can be fed in small amounts.

If your rabbit becomes inappetant or stops eating altogether, always seek veterinary attention urgently as "gut stasis" can occur and can be lifethreatening.

Vaccination

All rabbits should be regularly vaccinated against mynomatosis. This common and often fatal disease is passed on by blood sucking insects such as midges and fleas, and usually peaks around autumn. Vaccination is also recommended against viral haemorrhagic disease, another widespread disease which usually results in the sudden death of the rabbit.

"Fly Strike"

Rabbits pass soft droppings which are eaten again straight from the anus. These then pass back through the digestive tract and are then passed as hard, round droppings. If your rabbit suffers from dental problems, is arthritic or overweight, they are not able to eat these soft droppings and they stick to their bottom, attracting flies. The flies lay their eggs on your rabbit, which hatch into maggots. This horrific disease is common and products from your vet are available to prevent fly strike. Fly screens, cleanliness of toileting treatment of dental problems and obesity and checking your rabbit's bottom every day during the summer can help prevent this problem.

Clubs – These will start during the week beginning Monday 10th January. There will be a new clubs letter at the start of the new term.


In the event of bad weather — We will use the text messaging service, our school web-site and contact local radio stations. If you do not hear from us you can assume the school will be open, however ...

Proposed development at Ivy Farm

You may be aware that a planning application has been submitted to Maidstone Borough Council for a proposed development at Ivy Farm on Liverton Hill. This application is being submitted under the PPS7 section of Planning Law that allows development to be undertaken in isolated rural locations that would not normally be entertained under normal planning law.

This PPS7 states that "Very occasionally the exceptional quality and innovative nature of the design of a proposed, isolated new house may provide this special justification for granting planning permission. Such a design should be truly outstanding and ground-breaking, for example, in its use of materials, methods of construction or its contribution to protecting and enhancing the environment, so helping to raise standards of design more generally in rural areas. The value of such a building will be found in its reflection of the highest standards in contemporary architecture, the significant enhancement of its immediate setting and its sensitivity to the defining characteristics of the local area."



The Grafty Gourmet

This is another easy recipe. You don't always have to use beef to make a chilli. This recipe uses chicken, or alternatively, you can use any leftover turkey from Christmas. Serve with rice or Tortillas.

Spicy Chicken Chilli

Serves 4

2 tablespoons cooking oil
2 jalapeño peppers, seeds and ribs
removed, chopped
1 onion, chopped
1 tin of chopped tomatoes
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 ½ cups chicken stock
4 chicken breasts, cut into thin
strips

1 tin drained and rinsed red kidney

beans

4 teaspoons chilli powder ½ teaspoon fresh-ground black pepper 1 tablespoon ground cumin ½ cup chopped fresh coriander (optional) 2 teaspoons dried oregano

1 teaspoon salt

1 cup grated mature cheddar cheese

- 1. In a large saucepan, heat the oil over a low heat. Add the onion and garlic; cook until they start to soften, about 3 minutes.
- 2. Increase the heat to moderate and stir in the chicken strips. Cook until they are no longer pink. Stir in the chilli powder, cumin, oregano, and salt. Add the jalapeños, the tin of tomatoes and the broth. Bring to a boil, reduce the heat, cover, and simmer for 15 minutes.
- 3. Uncover the saucepan and stir in the beans and black pepper. Simmer until the chilli is thickened, about 15 minutes longer. If you find the sauce is not thickening, cheat and add a little cornflower and stir in until it thickens.
- 4. Serve topped with the cilantro and grated cheese.

The January Night Sky

The **Sun** is in the constellation of Sagittarius at beginning of January, and moves into Capricornus on the 20th. The Earth is at **perihelion** (closest to the Sun) on 3rd January.

Last month we had a total lunar eclipse, but this month we have a **Partial Eclipse of the Sun** on the morning of Tuesday 4th January, when the Moon passes almost directly in front of the Sun. When the Sun rises in the southeast, about a third of its left hand side will be hidden by the moon, and as the Sun rises the Moon gradually draws away.

Please do not look directly at the Sun, and certainly not through binoculars or a telescope, as this can permanently damage the eyes. The only safe way is to project the image of the Sun on to a white card or wall.

New Moon occurs on Tuesday 4th January, and Full Moon is on Wednesday 19th January, in the constellation of Cancer.

Mercury is at its greatest distance west of the Sun on 9th January, and rises in the southeast in the early morning. You should just be able to see this elusive planet low down in the twilight sky.

Venus is again a brilliant "Morning Star" this month, low in the south-eastern sky just before sunrise, and will appear a little lower down every morning.

Mars sets less than an hour after the Sun, so again we will not be able to see the "Red Planet" this month.

Jupiter can clearly be seen in the southern-western sky early in the evening, and sets around midnight. It appears as a very bright star with a steady light, and is moving slowly north-eastwards in the constellation of Pisces. Through a telescope the disc of Jupiter can clearly be seen, together with the dark and light cloud bands and some of the four major moons.

Saturn is rising in the east in the early hours of the morning, and is well up in the southern sky at dawn. You will be able to see Venus to the left, which is very much brighter.

The **Quadrantid** meteor shower produces a good display during the first week of January. They appear to radiate from a point in the now disused constellation of Quadrans Muralis, between the bright star Vega and the "handle" of the Plough. This point is low in the north at midnight, and climbs high in the east by dawn. The best time to see the meteors is expected to be in the early hours of Tuesday 4th January.
