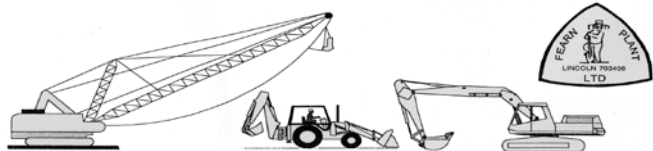

THORNEY SPOTTINGS (3) – Janet Collins

If you made the effort to start feeding the birds at the end of 2014, I trust you have continued your good work into 2015.

Winter is the worst time of year to forget to fill up any feeders you have.

Birds feed mainly at sunrise and before sunset (apart from during the breeding season, when things are a little more hectic). If they expect to find food in a particular place they will wait until it arrives, with dire consequences in winter if that waiting period is too long, or doesn't happen at all. Energy levels drop dramatically over the long nights, so the morning ritual must be maintained. Alternatively, don't feed them at all and miss out on all the activity! Maintaining a supply of water is also critical. Remove any ice, but avoid adding anything to try to prevent the freezing process.


Since the last article, goldfinches have arrived in small groups of six to eight at a time, and included a redpoll in early January. This migratory bird is frequently to be found in flocks of other seed eaters at this time of year, and will be happy to join them at your feeder.

Large skeins of geese have been passing overhead, with some smaller groups enjoying the hospitality of one of our local residents. Along with the greylag and Canada geese, shoveller duck and teal have been added to the list. They must love your excellent service and facilities, Terry!

Flocks of fieldfare are now regular visitors to Thorney. They prefer open fields, where they forage for insects and grubs. However, they can be seen in the hedgerows, and will visit your garden hedges and trees when they have to rely on hawthorn, cotoneaster berries and the like because of freezing conditions on the land.

To date (mid-January), no long tailed tits or bullfinches have arrived in the garden, although a cock bullfinch was spotted in the hedgerow close to the Thorney, Wigsley crossroad. What a gorgeous bird this is, with its beautiful plump, deep pinky-red chin and breast, and black head. In late December, Stan, the birdman, was lucky enough to spot a merlin flying along the hedgerow, heading toward the fishing lakes. This is our smallest raptor, and is a very rare sight in our area. If you have little experience in spotting birds, you may mistake it for a kestrel or a sparrow hawk, as the colouring is similar. One of the giveaway signs is the merlin's tendency to fly low along its chosen route, such as a hedgerow. The male is marginally bigger than a blackbird, and the female a little larger than the male. Although it is a resident bird, it is usually found further south or west. However, it favours coastal areas and agricultural land in the winter, so we occasionally fit the bill here. Talking of 'bills', most raptors have a moustache around their beak; this is missing in the merlin.

I began by reminding you about feeding the birds in your garden. As part of our three village initiative, a local supplier of bird food has been contacted. This supplier is happy to negotiate a reduced price for various products, providing there is sufficient interest. If you think you may be interested in supporting your local bird life on a regular basis and would like more details of joining a group of local purchasers, please contact either janetcollins@btinternet.com or edwh1ttaker@aol.com and we'll provide you with all the details. Obviously, the supplier needs a minimum number of people supporting the deal to make it worth his while.

Below is a summary of recent minutes. For full minutes please see the notice board or go to www.newark-sherwooddc.gov.uk/harby.

• Police

- Please report thefts as high value rural thefts are taking place and not being reported.
 - Keep outbuildings and oil tanks secure, as oil thefts have been taking place.
 - Please report any suspicious vehicles at night capable of carrying oil e.g. van with an oil tank on the trailer.
 - Police to monitor parking at the bottom of Station Road Bridge.
 - Some anti-social behaviour has been reported, the police and the anti-social behaviour team have visited some families in order to address these concerns.
- **School:** Consultation has taken place to implement a 20mph speed limit outside the school and to start enforcing the School Keep Clear markings.
 - **Benches on the cycle track:** A request from local residents the Council and County Council are looking to install two benches in our parish on the cycle track (heading in the direction of Newark).
 - **Village Improvements:** The Council has applied to a County Council fund, to install dropped kerbs on Low Street next to the village hall and also for new village signs (like those at the Collingham village entrance). We will find out in April if we have been successful.
 - **Trees:** Millfield Close trees have been reduced and the damaged lilac tree on Darbyshire Close has been removed. The large tree next to the Wigsley Road/Low Street junction has been added to the District Council's maintenance list and is to be reduced this winter. Previously none of these trees were on the District Council's maintenance list.
 - **Community Library:** The County Council suggestion to run a volunteer library from the village hall is not to be taken forward to the moment, as the mobile library is not currently under threat.
 - **Signs:** A footpath sign has been installed at the entrance of Clay Lane, to remind users this is a footpath rather than a bridleway.
 - **New Website:** The Council is developing a new website to make it easier to find council and parish information.
 - **Potholes:** The potholes on Church Road and outside the poultry farm at Eagle Moor have been reported.

Planning Applications Update

Pending decision

- Additional living space and utility room, 5 Station Road, Harby. Parish Council support.
- Alteration and extension including orangery and micro-brewery. Parish Council support developing the community amenity in principle but oppose the current proposal.

Approved by District/County Council:

- Demolition of single storey kitchen and bathroom and replace with oak framed extension at 6 Wigsley Road Harby. Parish Council supported.
- Extension for private leisure facilities including a gym and swimming pool at 9 Wigsley Road: Parish Council supported.
- Erection a free range poultry unit, and Feed Silos and formation of access at field adjacent Gibbet Wood, Thorney. Parish Council supported.

Refused by District/County Council:

- Retrospective Application for Fencing on Side Boundary and Rear Boundary of Garden for Barn Conversion, Enfield Court, Station Road. Parish Council opposed.

Next planned meeting is Thursday 19 March in the Village Hall Committee Room.

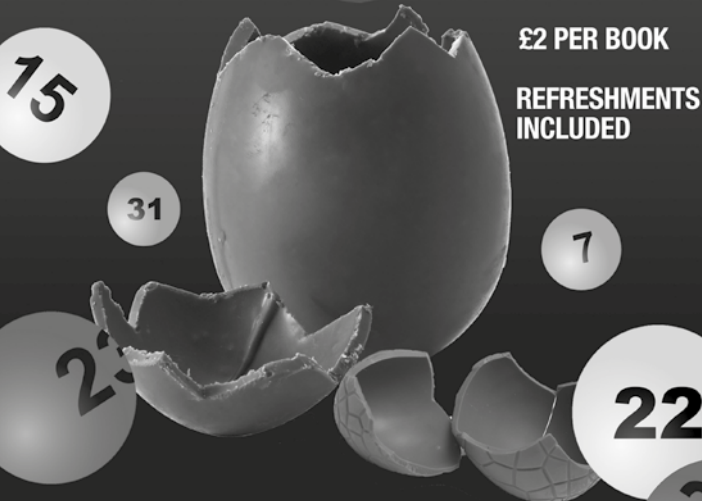

In July 2014 The Royal British Legion launched '*Every Man Remembered*', its greatest ever act of remembrance for the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War, asking the British public to pay tribute to each and every one of the 1,117,077 men and women from the Commonwealth who died in the First World War.

Nine Harby and Swinethorpe men made the ultimate sacrifice in the First World War, commemorated on the War Memorial in All Saints' churchyard tributes in Trio, the Harby, Wigsley and Thorney Newsletter 2016 - 2018 will individually commemorate each man around the appropriate centenary of his death.

Harby History Group will be presenting "Every Man Remembered" in Harby Village Hall on 30th June 2015 with a history for each man watch out in Trio for further details and dates to remember each of the nine men.



In May 2015 Matthew Tucker, George Dickinson, Paul Nolan and Richard Croft will cycle over 200 miles of the Western Front through France and Belgium to remember eight men who are buried or commemorated on memorials along the Western Front. All Saints' Church bells fell silent for the duration of the War and these men never returned to hear them again. The church bell headstocks were replaced in 2014 and George Dickinson has carved nine crosses from an old oak headstock to remember each man with a piece of home to be left at their grave or memorial along the route. George Townsend died in 1916 and is buried in an unmarked grave in All Saints' churchyard - his cross will be placed in All Saints' church.

The four will leave Harby on Sunday 17th May 2015, travel by rail to Chauny in France on Monday 18th May and cycle through northern France and Belgium to Bruges before returning via the Zebrugge – Hull ferry, arriving back in Harby a week later on Sunday 24th May 2015. Each of the eight men will be remembered en-route and in some cases include a visit the site of battle where they died as well as where they're buried or commemorated.
