



LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

The last Sunday in June will see us remembering St Peter, to whom Diddlebury Church is dedicated – and we will gather there for a group service to mark the occasion.

St Peter is one of the best-known of the twelve apostles. Having begun life as a fisherman on the Sea of Galilee, he travelled with Jesus for the three years (ish) of his public ministry. After Jesus' resurrection and ascension, Peter was one of the first to share the gospel with people who were not Jews before going on to spread the good news in Antioch and probably in Corinth. Tradition says that he ended his life being crucified in Rome and that he is buried under St Peter's Basilica.

I always think Peter is a someone who can give us encouragement as we try our best to be followers of Christ. As we read the gospels we perhaps get a better picture of Peter as a person than we do any of the other apostles (some of whom we only know as names in a list). He had great insights: he was the first to say that Jesus was the Messiah and was described as the rock on whom the church would be built. He was also fallible – he denied three times that he even knew Jesus. After the resurrection, by the Sea of Galilee, he was forgiven by Jesus and commissioned to lead the church.

Peter reminds us that we don't have to be perfect to be followers of Christ. He reminds us that we will get it wrong; and that getting it wrong is not the end of everything, even though it may sometimes feel like that at the time. He reminds us that the church isn't there for people who have already got it right, but it's there for people who would like to try to get it right (which is not always the same thing). Come and join us as we try to get it right together!

DIDDLEBURY FLOOD ACTION GROUP

An update on activity over the past few months. Last November there was the most serious flooding in Diddlebury, as recorded on the depth gauge on the B4368 road bridge.

Once the winter waters receded we experienced a long dry spell in April and May. This has allowed time to evaluate the state of the streams through the area. The stream beds appear washed out with their bed levels reduced, undercutting the banks along the watercourses. A lot of stone has been washed away.



To protect your property from flooding consider:

- The building of walls and fences to resist further erosion of the stream sides. An example of such a structure is this beautifully built living willow fence

- Walls in the upper parts of gardens to protect their house
- The installation of door barriers to stop water flooding into a property

An inspection has been made of the leaky dams on the Diddle brook between Middlehope and Diddlebury. Unfortunately, over half of these dams are now ineffective due to silting up, or damage. Some dams were entirely missing. These findings were reported back to the Shropshire Council Flood Manager and to Shropshire Wildlife Trust, the original installer of the dams. The destruction of the leaky dams will significantly reduce the 'slow the flow' effect.

A meeting was organised in May by the National Flood Forum at Culmington where the Flood Action Groups of Culmington, Ludlow and Diddlebury met to discuss ideas on how to improve flood resilience and communications. The meeting also discussed farming techniques to increase water absorption into the land. At the end of the meeting we were invited to review the Shropshire Local Flood Risk Management Strategy 2015, as this is due to be updated.

CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP

THEY SPEAK OF NIGHT BY JO JACKSON

At our May meeting it was with interest that we noted Jo Jackson is a local Shropshire author, who acknowledges the Wenlock Writers on the Edge for their encouragement and support. It was similarly fascinating to consider Jo Jackson's pathway to becoming an author after retirement, considering how her work as a nurse, midwife and family psychotherapist had contributed to the development of her novel (with particular emphasis on the latter).

Reviews of the novel were hard to find, but Good Reads notes *'the powerful and poignant story of loss and love.'* To quote again, it is *'An ambitious, hauntingly beautiful, sad but ultimately uplifting novel about the unlikely friendship between an old Indian gardener called Asadi and Lily, a young English woman struggling to make sense of her life.'*

Whilst just four Good Reads reviewers had given the book an average of four and a half stars out of five, our group was far less kind, with a star rating from two to four and the majority around three. We all acknowledged the book was easy to read and the plot was logical and clear, possibly making it a satisfactory holiday read, and the novel's development seemed contrived and the number of coincidences within the story unrealistic.

We looked at the novel as if it had three parts. The first introduces Lily who is struggling to manage her life after a devastating university party event and, the following day, the death of her mother. The second is a description of India in the late 1930s and '40s where Asadi withstands an unhappy childhood in a rural village but whose early adulthood working

in Jodhpur brings no great release. A picture of the violence of the fight for independence and the tensions between Muslims and Hindus is clearly drawn. The last section brings the resolution where Lily travels to India and allows the author to bring some of the twists and turns within the story to a meaningful close.

It was felt that it was the India section which brought the book to life and the essential research by the author gave authenticity to the fiction. However, characters appeared insufficiently developed and this led us to discuss how stereotypical we found the characters themselves, and the culture being portrayed. Would we go as far as to say there was evidence of cultural imperialism?

The author states that she is character driven in her writing and she writes as if she were in each character's head. Here then she makes use of her work as a family therapist where she worked with people often at their most vulnerable. She has observed and listened and drawn from real life stories and experiences, so she is well equipped to deal with the shame and grief that lie at the heart of the characters of this novel. Perhaps a pertinent sentence for all of us, taken from the novel, is *'Grief has many faces. Sometimes it disguises itself as shame, or anger, sometimes as loneliness.'*

In summary therefore there were flashes of good description as well as 'clunky' writing, making the book 'a heavy subject but a light read' as one of the group put it.

What a treat we had in store too: lots of interesting boxes came in with Jan of her meat, sausages and ice cream produced from the farm she and her husband David run in the Shropshire Hills. Before we were let loose on the array of boxes Jan told us the story of the journey she and her husband made before moving to Shropshire and developing the businesses they run today. A family that multi-task with a vengeance!

David and Jan share five children between them and met and farmed with a herd of Jersey cows originally in Staffordshire. They had 70 acres with a third of their farm on flood plains which was quite a challenge. She particularly recalled a hard winter in 2008/09 when their fields flooded and then froze to become a skating rink, which was the fun part. However, the broken central heating which was not fixed until May certainly tested the family's resilience. All was told with a great sense of humour: even the baking competition she entered at the local show was a result of a failed TB test for 'Daisy Bell.' Both still working as well as farming they semi-retired to Shropshire after visiting friends in Bishops Castle for a 'thank you' lunch.

Having moved with their herd of 50 Jerseys and settled into the farm, they expanded further buying some pigs, trying various breeds along the way, then buying Muckleton Meats when it came up for sale. Semi-retirement it most definitely wasn't as they went on to 'twiddle' sausages, supplying nearby hotels and visiting farmers' markets on a regular basis. Ice cream came on board later using the milk from their Jersey herd.

Tasting the delicious ice cream at the end of the meeting was an absolute treat: my particular favourite was stem ginger, with the chocolate a close second! It is all made entirely from the milk of their own cows, so look out for Nanny Janny's



ice cream if you ever visit Lydham, Ludlow or Shrewsbury markets. I would highly recommend it.

Jan was thanked warmly by Claire for entertaining and feeding us so well. How we also fitted in the cake and tea baked by Janet and Judy, our own members, I really don't know - but somehow we did!! HAYTON & DISTRICT WI

At our meeting on 8th May we welcomed our own member, Ria Baxter, who gave us a talk entitled 'Why Did They Leave My Dad Behind?'. We were all intrigued by this title – what did this mean? Where and when was Ria's father left behind? And was this story going to have a happy or unhappy ending? Well, Ria began by giving us some background information about her heritage. Her Dad was Chinese, and her Mum was Dutch, and they'd met and married moving to the UK during World War II. They moved to Liverpool and so Ria's father became a sailor in Merseyside, joining the important Merchant Navy service during the war. Around this time, approximately 20,000 other young Chinese men had travelled to England to become part of the war effort in which they all played a crucial role in supplying Britain with food, fuel and other essential goods as Inter-allied Merchant Seamen. Although these civilian sailors risked their lives to enable Britain to defend itself, unfortunately they experienced significant hardships, including lower wages and worse conditions than their British counterparts and were often denied the same war risk bonuses. They had to work away from the places they had made their homes often for up to a year at a time, never knowing if they would return home, sometimes transporting soldiers overseas into extremely dangerous waters while keeping the military supplied too. Many of these seamen had met and married local women in the Liverpool area and established families. Despite this, after the war in 1946 the Liverpool Constabulary, acting on orders from the British government under a scheme known as 'Compulsory Repatriation of Undesirable Chinese Seamen', forcibly deported around 2,000 Chinese sailors from Liverpool back to China in what was seen as a demobilisation effort. Thankfully, Ria's father, perhaps because he was already in this country having arrived from Holland, was not part of the deportation and repatriation to China. Hence, as Ria's title states, her Dad was left behind. Sadly, those 2,000 deportations were carried out without notice and left the sailors' wives and children believing they had been abandoned by their husbands and fathers. It wasn't until the release of declassified records fifty years later that this terrible treatment of loyal Chinese seamen was revealed and sadly some members of these families died before knowing the truth.

Our next meeting will be held on **Thursday 12th June** at 7:30pm when we look forward to Chris Eldon Lee's 'Humorous

and Intriguing Anecdotes from 50 Years in Broadcasting’.

2. Anyone can visit as few or as many churches as they wish.

Go anywhere... on foot, by bike, or by car, using our sponsorship form to collect sponsorship for your church and for the Trust.

It is not an event where church visits are centrally organised. There is no ‘central team’ which plans any walks, rides, or drives. It’s something that churches can do for themselves. And you can do it for your church. Just get some sponsors to back you on a church-based trip.

Visiting is important; otherwise, the event will cease. The county raised £38,446 last year - a record! This event has enormous potential - Dorset raised £98,629 last September.

On Saturday 10th May the group travelled to Walcot Hall in Lydbury North. We were welcomed by Lucinda and Robin Parish, the current owners. Over a cup of coffee, which was enjoyed in a peaceful courtyard, Robin explained we were standing in the area which had once housed an above-ground swimming pool! He gave us details of the house’s origins and how it came into his family and his habit of buying rare seeds to add to the interest in the gardens. We then made our way through the grounds. Our first stop was at the tiered fountain behind which was a cool grotto to walk through. In the height of the summer this would make a welcome escape from the heat of the day. In the arboretum were magnificent specimens including twisted bark sweet chestnut, which, with an understory of bluebells, was absolutely beautiful, particularly when the sun broke through the canopy. We made our way to the kitchen garden and its greenhouse with curved glass panes. Another part of the garden was an area with cultivated beds where, at the time of our visit, persicaria, planted rhythmically, drew attention. These beds were planted amongst mowed areas but in certain parts the grass had been allowed to grow and helped relax the feel of that part of the garden.

Rhododendrons and their scented relatives azaleas were in bloom and the different colours and forms were interspersed

throughout our walk. As with all gardens, the estate is undergoing some changes. The recent storms have left their mark, and a number of trees have had to be removed, opening up areas to new opportunities.

Dotted around the estate are numerous small permanently occupied homes and a mixture of yurts and various other converted buildings and vehicles including an old showman’s wagon. These are used for weddings and other events held on the estate. One unexpected building was the dacha.

While the focus was on looking inwards to the estate, every once in a while it was important to turn around and take in the spectacular views across the landscape of lakes, fields and onwards to the hills. Plentiful benches allowed time to stop and admire the vistas and the more secluded parts of the garden.

MUSINGS ON LIFE...

THE NODDLE – THINKING MATTER?

Last week saw two ridiculously different activities. One was an afternoon with a small group of friends talking about our heads and brains and how that complex appendage is put together and functions. It turns out that we know a lot about the structures but in all truth, very little about its workings.

The second activity was utterly different, tracing the narrow winding lanes of Herefordshire looking at interesting and surprising churches. Any connection? Well it's hardly promising!



Sellack, near Ross, shows this commanding pulpit, superimposed upon and totally changing the orientation of a simple medieval church. The word was to master the mystery of the Mass! It appeared just a few years before Britain launched itself into a disastrous civil war, partly religious in origin. We are told that, proportionately, it killed far more people than the 'Great War'. France had its Wars of Religion, and Europe its catastrophic Thirty Years' War, in which Protestants and Catholics happily murdered each other. Small wonder, then, that the world wanted to replace religion with logic, and many of us may well have thoroughly approved. The grim truth, however, is that revolutions have the habit of replacing tyrannies with their own tyrannical dogmas.

Up to the 17th century (almost) everybody believed that our thinking and being were heart-centred. We still can be 'downhearted', or 'lose heart' or even 'learn by heart', so, what the heck was the brain doing? Well, for one thing, it was being dissected: techniques were being worked out (to learn more, research the work of René Descartes, Vesalius and our own Thomas Willis). It was not very difficult to describe gross structures and give them Latin names. But working out function was another matter.

To help them out, new ideas were being channeled through, among others, Englishman Francis Bacon. He, inspired by the cosmos and ancient Greek views on logic and rhetoric, came up with an early philosophy of burgeoning science. His was a rejection of medieval notions of man and the world. Bacon's thought was based on unchanging eternal 'laws' dating back

to the act of creation. It was no surprise that he articulated such a metaphor: he was a successful lawyer – they like laws!

So, no doubt, the early brain investigators took up these ideas with relish. They portrayed an ordered world where you could make 'logical' prediction, such as 'animal spirits' coursing through nerves to move muscles in a hydraulic sort of way. All that was needed now was to work out how the 'bêtes machines' (machine beasts) worked.

Of course, not everyone went along with a purely mechanical notion of the body, Charles Darwin apparently thought it was quite absurd, but nevertheless it is quite amazing how much of this thinking has survived to our modern age; materialistic, reductionist, dogmatic, mechanistic, even fundamentalist – let the pejoratives flow! A common question in modern medicine is 'what is the mechanism?' A telling phrase.

The critics of this view of the world regard it as narrowing, restrictive and ultimately harmful. So, a scientist may spend his whole life studying one protein, in the hope that it will have a commercial application in the end. It is rather like looking through a high-power telescope and concentrating on one object only – you can see dramatic detail but know nothing of the rest of the universe.

I have been trying to avoid the phrase 'non-holistic' – I have just failed.

So, when it comes to the noddle, it has been assumed that consciousness, memory, and perceptions are brain mediated processes. There has never been any direct evidence for this. On the other hand, I think there is a huge mass of evidence of other biological processes which makes human life infinitely more complex and full of possibility.

I am reaching my word limit.... no space to argue the point, so can I leave you with something to ponder and hope your inexplicably kind editor will let me write a word or two next time? In our house, the television is often turned on at 10pm and Clive Myrie appears to introduce the news. I say... believing that all we need to know about minds can be found in the chemistry or electrical activity of the brain is a bit like saying..... 'Clive lives only in the television'. Crazy tosh or a vital question for all our futures?

The atmosphere in the queue was very light-hearted and friendly as we all swapped stories about ourselves. Having proved our identity we entered the extensively lawned grounds and got our bearings. We were surrounded by people in military uniforms, national costumes, morning suits

and stylish outfits of every description. The lawns led down to a lake and tented area where light refreshments were dispensed. Seats were provided nearby, and we sat down to people-watch and swap anecdotes with others seated there and take in the splendour of palace.

After a rest we walked over to the main tented area of large marquees. Some were reserved for VIP and diplomatic guests awaiting the royal presence. The afternoon teas were dispensed from a very long refreshment tent with about 20 different food stations. We were advised not to leave it

too late as they could run out of cakes! Military bands were playing all afternoon but stopped as the National Anthem was played to announce the arrival of the Royal party.

The Royal party was led to a corridor amongst the crowd formed by Yeomen of the Guard where selected guests (not us) were arranged in groups by the Gentlemen at Arms for the King and Queen to meet. Naturally, there was a large presence around them, and it was difficult to see them as they progressed down the corridor speaking to the selected guests before entering the Royal enclosures. Less pressing were the people around the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh (who Di thought looked very smart) and Princess Anne who was equally very elegant.

At this point we headed off for our tea of sandwiches (less their crusts), and cake and a cup of tea. As we were eating the staff came around dispensing ice creams.

The organisation throughout was, as you would expect, very smooth and efficient and we were treated with courtesy throughout the event.

After an hour and a half the Royal party made the reverse journey down the corridors formed again by the Yeomen to take their leave and re-enter the palace. We then made our way to the exit via the front gate, this time, taking in the architecture of the building. It was strange seeing people looking in at us through the railings as we made our way out to find a taxi back to the Victory Services Club. Once there we retired to the bar to take in the novelty and excitement of the day and swap stories with the five other couples who were also staying there.

Overall it was a privilege and a once-in-a-lifetime experience.



VACANCY FOR A COUNCILLOR

At the elections on 1st May 2025 only eight candidates put themselves forward for election to the parish council, which leaves us with one vacancy to fill. We therefore invite one resident of our parish to put themselves forward to be co-opted as a councillor. As the hamlets of Westhope, Sutton, Middlehope and Peaton are not represented on the Council, we would especially welcome applicants from those areas. Set out below are the criteria for eligibility to serve as a candidate.

If you are a British or Commonwealth citizen, citizen of the Republic of Ireland or a European Union citizen who has attained the age of 18 years and either:-

You are registered as a local government elector for the Parish of Diddlebury, or for at least 12 months have occupied as owner or tenant land or other premises in the parish, or

Your main occupation has been in the Parish for the last 12 months, or

You have resided in the Parish or within three miles of its boundaries for at least 12 months and are not disqualified from holding office by reason of any disqualification set out

in the Local Government Act 1972, which include bankruptcy, county court orders, non-payment of council taxes, being found guilty of corrupt or illegal practices in election law, then you would be eligible to stand as a co-opted Councillor Diddlebury Parish Council.

We hold generally 10 meetings each year which alternate between Diddlebury and Westhope Village Halls.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 23RD APRIL 2025 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr D Hedgley – Chairman. Cllrs A Watson, C Martyn, R Povall, S Povall, A Rattu, T O'Boyle and R Morgan.

Apologies: Cllr T Pardoe.

In attendance: The Clerk.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Vote of Thanks: The Chairman gave a vote of thanks to Corvedale Cllr Cecilia Motley for her many years of support to him and to this parish. He also gave a vote of thanks to Cllr Tim Pardoe, who was not standing for re-election, for his service to the council and for all his carpentry works for the community.

To acknowledge and thank him for his 18 years of service to the parish council, plus his other voluntary works in the parish, the Chairman, David Hedgley, had been invited by HM King Charles III to attend a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace on 7th May 2025.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 26th March 2025 were approved.

Reports: The Chairman reported that he represented the parish council at the funeral of the late former councillor, Mr Mervyn Thomas of Peaton Farm. He had taken up with the Planning Officers their refusal of planning application 25/00743/VAR, challenging both their reasons for the refusal and their procedures. He would continue to pursue this matter.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn reported he would be meeting with Culmington and Ludlow's flood action groups on 6th May to discuss ways in which they could work collaboratively.

Highways & Environmental Matters: The Chairman would pursue the laying of gravel on the footpath from the school to The Moors, and the morning parking congestion issues in the DVH car park. Signs indicating pedestrians in the road at the top of Mill Lane had been requested and would be ordered, as there is no pavement. Mr S Bartell was thanked by the Chairman for voluntarily repairing a DPC notice board at Sutton.

Communications and Correspondence: Ten items of correspondence were considered.

The concrete apron at Motte Farm, Middlehope was to be further investigated. It was agreed that Westhope Village Hall's defibrillator maintenance and pad replacements would be financed by DPC. The requirement that DPC changed its email name to clerk@diddleburypc.gov.uk and that all councillors individually had gov.uk domain names was discussed and agreed. The new requirement that all councillors must personally complete and thereafter as necessary amend their Disclosures of Pecuniary Interests form online was discussed. This edict from SC assumes everyone had Broadband signal and was IT enabled and literate.

SC had notified DPC that eight nominations had been received for the 1st May parish council elections, leaving one vacancy which could be filled by co-option at a later date.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for April 2025 was considered and cheques totalling £923.09 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £12,367.49. Cllr Watson verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statement. No applications were received from local groups seeking small donations from DPC. The provision of a notice board for Bache Mill was deferred to the next meeting.

Audit 2024 - 2025: Councillors approved the new Standing Orders and new Financial Regulations, also the schedule of all income and payments and the year-end bank/cash book reconciliation. As the Council's income and expenses exceeded £25,000 in the 2024 – 2025 financial year, DPC was subject to a more vigorous audit regime for that year and would attract two sets of audit fees.

Any Other Business: Arrangements were discussed for the Annual Parish Meeting. There being no further business, the Chairman closed the meeting as 8.45pm

The next Parish Council meetings are the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Meeting, both held on Wednesday 14th May 2025, commencing at 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON 13TH MAY 2025

Apology for Absence: Cllr Jo Mear.

Annual Reports of the Parish Council and Other Groups/Committees for the Year 2024-25: Culmington Parish Council Chair's Annual Report:

Cllr Matthew Seabrook thanked everyone for attending. He reported the very sad passing of ex-councillor Mrs Jenny Norton. He thanked Cecilia Motley for 23 years as Councillor for the Corvedale and welcomed Cllr Colin Stanford who is her successor. He thanked John Turley for over 55 years as a parish councillor and Ian Steele and Andrew Pike for their terms as Chair and Vice Chair and Mary Holland for many years of service. All have stood down as councillors. He thanked Jeff Williams and his team for their work on the footpaths around the parish, Dave Lewis for his work as the environmental maintenance officer and Hugh Disley as the Emergency Officer. The main achievements during the year have been the installation of a second vehicle activated sign, working with Shropshire Council and Mr Turley on alleviating flooding on Seifton Lane, working with Shropshire Council to try to improve the speed on the B4365 and obtaining a tree preservation order on the limes and pines opposite the village hall. He also thanked the Parish Clerk.

Cecilia Motley, Shropshire Council: This report will be made available on the website. Cllr Colin Stanford thanked Cecilia for her many years as a councillor. He sees his role as a conduit between parishioners; the parish council and Shropshire Council and he will be holding the new administration to account. He has a good working relationship with Stuart Anderson MP and John Campion, Police and Crime Commissioner which will help him in his role representing the Corvedale. If anyone has any issues they would like to discuss with him his details are on the Shropshire Council website.

Cllr Jo Mear, Village Hall Committee: Cllr Mear had sent a report. It had been a busy year organising a variety of events to cater for all age groups. They had been marketing the hall, promoting the website page, and have more regular bookings. They work closely with other village halls when planning events. They were considering a new sign to promote events and continue to raise funds for the extension. They had drafted a new governing document and were waiting for changes to the Land Registry entry. Lunch clubs and coffee mornings were regular events and there had been two celebrations when the beacon had been lit; to mark D-Day and the 80th anniversary of the end of the war. The AGM would be on 20th May. Avril Enston, the treasurer, was stepping down, so a replacement was needed. Cllr Mear thanked all of those who had supported the hall, and they looked forward to future events and the new extension.

Cllr Carol Byng, Flood Action Group: The Group has had a very proactive year working hard to sustain relationships with the Shropshire Council, the Environment Agency, and Shropshire Wildlife Trust. There had been several multi-agency meetings to keep the main issues alive and record progress. It had been another challenging year, with flooding becoming worse and more frequent. The main defences were to monitor the highways drains and the 'slow the flow' natural flood management programme. The second phase of the programme was under way with Shropshire Wildlife Trust as project manager. This had been launched in November 2024 at a well-attended meeting and there had been a positive reception. Stuart Anderson MP wished to be kept informed of developments. Peter Lines

had been elected to the English Severn and Wye Regional Flood and Coast Committee, and the Group had just begun online attendance at the National Flood Forum Group. The relationship between the Group and the Parish Council and its Environmental Maintenance Officer was critical, and the emerging Emergency Plan for the Parish Council would be the same plan as the Flood Action Group's plan. The Group was waiting for training from Shropshire Council on emergency procedures. Although the rain kept coming Culmington parish community worked together to mitigate the challenges that each flood brought.

Mr Jeff Williams, Culmington Footpath Group sent a report: There were four active members of the group, Andrew Pike, Peter Lines, Hugh Disley and Jeff Williams. Over the year they had worked at Seifton Lane, Vernolds Common, Burley, Sparchford, Seifton and Culmington village to replace bridge planks, install new surfaces on paths, replace and install gates and stile footbeds, and replace finger posts and signposts. He asked walkers to report things directly to him rather than Shropshire Council. Two sets of tools were held, which are the property of the Parish Council.

Mr Hugh Disley, Emergency Plan reported that the plan had been reviewed with the Parish Council. He had been communicating with Shropshire Association of Local Councils about the insurance for volunteers who would be involved during Emergency events. He will bring the updated plan to the Parish Council meeting in July.

Consider Expenditure of the Neighbourhood Fund: The Parish Council held £3,234.22 which could be spent on infrastructure projects in the parish. The following projects were discussed:

Village Hall Extension: The village hall had requested consideration of various smaller items. The Council was particularly interested in providing some funding towards the cost of the works to improve foul drainage as it is Custodian Trustee of the hall.

All Saints' Church Repairs: The PCC needed to restore and protect the West Norman tower of the church and was seeking funding to carry out these repairs to prevent further damage and prevent the risk of falling plaster.

Village Gateways: To consider installing gateways on the western entrance to the village. There were concerns about the cost of the gates, and the cost of installation was not yet known. It was decided that the Clerk would investigate the full cost of installing the gateways and continue to push Shropshire Council to reduce the speed limit on the B4365 to 30mph and extend it to beyond Clay Lane.

Other Projects: Repairs to the bus shelter and installation of a bin: defibrillator at Seifton.

Once the costs of the gateways were known the Parish Council would reconsider these projects, and decide how to allocate the Neighbourhood Fund. The Clerk would ask Dave Lewis to repair the bus shelter and consider a site for the defibrillator at Seifton. There was a charity which provides defibrillators for free on the understanding that the parish raised some funds for the charity.

Open Forum: An opportunity for members of the parish to raise issues for discussion. A member of the public raised the issue of a very wet area on the bridleway near Brooklyn. The Clerk would contact Mr Williams to see what might be done to improve this.

Election of Representatives: Village Hall Committee - Cllr Joanne Mear; Flood Committee - Cllr Jayne Disley; South Shropshire Area Committee - rotating attendance by councillors; Emergency Officer - Mr Hugh Disley

Code of Conduct, Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and System of Internal Controls were all adopted.

Finance: It was agreed to remove Mr John Turley and Mr Andrew Pike as signatories and to make Mrs Jackie Watts an online signatory.

Annual Accounts Report: There had been an increase in income and expenditure during 2024-25 due to the Neighbourhood Fund and the purchase of the Vehicle Activated Sign using a grant from the Police and Crime Commissioner received the previous year. The bank account held £9,970.21 as at 31st March 2025 which accounts for holdings of the Environmental Maintenance Grant, Parish Paths Grant, Neighbourhood Fund £2,643.82 reserve and £1,566.00 to use on projects in the year 2025-26.
